



own cafeteria. Try eating in the Marmot lodge sometime.





N.A.I.T. Outdoor Education Relections and Projections



and snowshoeing and winter surviual will be offered in the second quarter's out door education program. Most people are pleasantly surprised with their ability to adapt to winter outdoor, whether it be on skis or spending a night in a lean-too at 35 degree centigrad below zero. With the right kind of preparation, both mental and equipment wise, the hardship can be met with surprising ease.

A special offering, for those who have taken a basic survival course, or who have a good grasp of the skills, it an advanced survival course. The individual placed in a smallated survival situation. Either in pairs or by himself. The situation with provide the basics axe, knife,

plastic shelter, sleeping bag and clothing plus a limited amount of food.

Each person(s) will be taken to an isolated campsite where they will setup their camp for two days and one might. Whistles will be provided in case of emergency and NAIT staff will be keeping close observation on the individuals.

These people will get a real chance... to be alone-to think-examine.

examine his or her position in a more direct contact with the natural world. The result may be some insight into the individuals personal space...just a side line to his or her ability to deal with a survival situation.

This past quarter has seen the Physical and Leisure Education Dept. offer a variety of basic outdoor recreation experience to you the students. The list of courses included; basic lake canoeing, fall camping, backpacking, basic survival skills, Nature Interpretation and an introduction to map and compass use. As co-ordinator of these programs I must say that I am pleased with the interest and efforts put out by those who attended the weekend sessions. These individuals were willing to venture forth and over come the "difficulties" of cold, sore muscles, heavy packs, wet feet or beyond, and other inconviences to gain a number of satisfying rewards.

The most obvious of which is a skill developed. All individuals learned the basics of an outdoors skill: keeping a canoe straight in a wind, lighting a fire from available natural materials, how to for and icy river(fast) how to signal for help if lost in the bush, proper care of the use of a knife. All of these things demand concentration and physical co-ordination which can be quickly developed; providing an immediate reward.

As people develop basic skills there are two things present which make the experience more enjoyable. First of all you have 10 -15 other individuals working away, each with his or her own personality and ability level so you can meet, share communicate with, and enjoy one another. Living and learning together, as a group, provides for the building of deeper and more meaningful relationship which are often times hard to establish in a vast social gathering such as NAIT. Talk to some one who has taken a weekend.


The second element you will find present, adding to the value of an outdoor experience, is the setting. The natural world, in an undisturbed state reveals much to the outdoor recreationist. Canoeing as quietly as possible a cross a smooth lake following a muskrat or beaver, skiing through a herd of bison, tracking a wolf through a valley over a pass and down watching the white caps come in behind you pushing your boat to shore, are some of the real challenging, and rewarding events in realm of those who participate in outdoor pursuits. It is enough to mention the clean air, earthy smells, soft colors, and silence that ran also be found, built in the background of this experience.


As you enjoy the activity, setting and fellow participants there is no doubt that your physical output will be increased as a matter of necessity, fending off the heart attack machine.





Back sometime ago the concept of Student Housing was toyed with by the men who make the decisions about these kinds of things. First there was a great disruption caused by the fact that some of the two unit dwellings along Princess Elizibeth Avenue were not rented out due to the decision that they should be used as housing for familys, instead of students and someday would be torn down and replaced with a new addition to the Nait Campus. Then we started hearing from the owners of the small string of stores along 118 Aye. just south of the new Plaza 2 complex. Supposedly the Nait traffic does not come close to the traffic that abounded before Sears moved. The store owners are greatly in favour of a student campus. However Nait is expanding at a breathtaking rate with only a limited amount of space to expand to. We can't move to the west because of the airport; a new campus building is planned for the north parking lot; south is the Kingsway Garden Mall with its vast parking with rates only if they call a tow truck on you not allowed to park there).

So... it looks like east is the only direction to take. The tradeoff lies within whether to sacrafice housing facilities for more people and raising the population of Nait or to retain the present population and increase their present available facilities.

The Dept. of Advanced Education shed a little light on why student housing does not place high on the priortiy list. It seems

that more private residences have opened their doors and are more readily renting out basement suites or whatever the accommodation to students making things a bit easier.

Advanced Education feels that it they can't provide housing in the immediate area then they should be more concerned with providing housing on traffic routes which run almost directly to Nait. At the

moment transportation to Nait is the problem. The bus service is slow but effective. Unitl anything new comes along we'll just have have to put up with it.

Another reason for stalling the project is that the NAIT year lasts only 9 months. This means that 3 extra months costs must be absorbed. What about University residence? The difference is that in the months that the U of A is out for summer vacation, some of the extra units are used by summer students. The number of students NAIT has that need residence during the summer is lower per potential population than the University. This means the extra costs will be assimalated in the other 9 months.

Looks like the idea still has a few bugs.

Turning present dwellings into housing structures would be difficult as most of the buyable apartment buildings in the area are two and three bedroom. This is alright if you like roommates. But what about the economics of only one person in a bachelor or one bedroom suite? Will it cost more? Which students will be previledged? The most likely alternative is to build specifically for the problem. Innovations in this case look as though they would be costly not to mention complex in the manner of how to rent them. We are definitly in need of a more organized approach in order to decrease the number of problems present and future students have in finding houseing.

The need is here, but Red Tape and discussion dominate over all and it may be a while before another closet in E wing is opened up and a student housing services sign is tacked on the door.

STUDENT EVICTED FROM RE-SIDENCE FOR GAMES

BRANDON (CUP) -- The 1979 Canada Winter Games will have a major impact on students at Brandon University.


Residence students will be required to vacate thier rooms and will have their personal belongings moved out so that the athletes can stay in the residence. The Games will also mean a loss of one week of classes and it has not been determined how these classes will be made up.

The residence students will be provided with room and board in Brandon if they cannot return home during the Games. According to Hans Burmeister, a faculty member on the Games committee personal articles will be moved at no cost to the student.

The decision to use the university residence to house the athletes was made in 1975 by the Games committee. Robert Campbell, student union president and student representative on the committee at that time, supported the decision. Since then, other council members complained that Campbell never consulted them on the issue and they still fell left out of the Games committee activities.

The student representative are beginning to accept the residence decision as a fait accept. However, they are pushing for more imput into the planning of the housing scheme in order to minimize the inconvenience to students.


