Oh the words are just plain and simple, and any one instrument is simple, but when you combine a couple of guitars, a set of drums, bass, saxophone and keyboards and the voice of Michelle Pagliario, the end result is anything but simple. It's a well engineered piece of music that's quite delightful to listen to and so it was for 500 or so people who attended the Pagliario cabaret in the large cafeteria on Friday.

Michelle Pagliario is French-Canadian, but the rest of his group comes from various places in Canada - the United States. Pagliario's claim to fame so far is reflected in his hit record "Hell It's Only Rock and Roll" I feel the record is a reflection of Pagliario himself and what his music stands for. Sort of like a standard, a grade to base the rest of his music on. When I caught my first glimpse of Pagliario in those deceptive glasses, leather

You don't really have to ask people if they're enjoying the cabaret, as you can pretty well tell they are when 150 dozen bottles of beer and an undisclosed amount of liquor is all sold out by 11:30. No sir, you don't really have to ask.

Student Executive Elections - March 25

NAITSA will be holding elections for the 1977-78 executive on March 25. All executive positions (except treasurer) are open for nominations right now.

NAITSA needs students who are interested in student government and who are leaders and self starters.

A few advantages to being on the executive are having your own office, a small monthly honorarium and excellent job reference when you graduate from NAIT.

Any students (from any

technology) are eligible for nomination. Nomination forms are available from Gary Fortier, returning officer in room E-133 or Student Services E-134.

The positions are: President: to be responsible for maintaining efficient administration of affairs of NAITSA, and shall exercise supervision over all other officers in the discharge of their duties in their respective organizations. Shall be an ex-officio member of: General Faculty Council.

Shall work full-time for NAITSA for an annual salary of \$4,000. Term of office shall be from May 31 to May 31 of the following year. He shall be required to take a minimum of three (3) hours and a maximum of fifteen (15) hours classroom instruction per week.

Vice-President: Shall act as public relations officer. Shall act as returning officer for all NAITSA elections and referendums.

Treasurer: Shall be appointed by the executive.

Shall chair all financial committee meetings. Shall sign ALL NAITSA purchase orders and cheques along with the President's nominee. Shall be responsible for inventory of equipment.

Secretary: Shall take minutes at council meetings. Shall type correspondence.

Activities Chairman: Shall be chairman of the Social Chairman's committee. Shall be responsible for co-ordination of all social activities of NAITSA. Shall co-

ordinate the activities between all students clubs or organizations and NAITSA and assist and provide information for the said clubs or organizations. Shall sit on the athletics board.

Athletic Representative: Shall sit on the athletics board and shall represent the athletics board on Students' Council.

Publications Chairman: Shall be chairman of the publications committee. Shall be responsible for all publications of NAITSA.

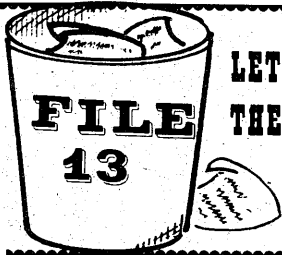

I hope if I ever do attempt another cabaret at NAIT, there are some improvements. By the way, I did enjoy Pagliaro!

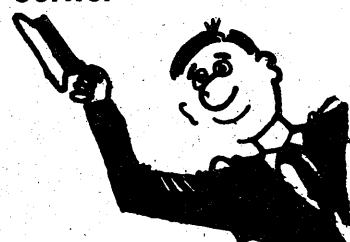

Drafting Rattled over Hockey Disqualification

Ookpiks upset Red Deer

You know the old saying that says you can't do something wrong forever. Well for the Ookpiks it finally turned out true as they finally beat the Red Deer Kings for the first time this season. The final score was 7-5.

The game started off slowly with both teams checking and this resulted in a lot of players from both sides landing on their fanny a time or two. The passing was erratic as well, probably as a result of the tight forechecking. Red Deer had a goal disallowed at 8:09 of the first period because they were in the process of getting a penalty. The first period was basically penalty filled as one or the other always seemed to have someone in the penalty box. Red Deer scored at 13:09 of the first period. NAIT tied it up a few minutes later when Bob Cruthers made a super pass to Bruce McCaskill in the slot who ripped a shot in off the

goalies glove. The first period ended up tied at 1 all.

NAIT started off the second period forechecking Red Deer again. As a result someone for the Ookpiks got a breakaway but he was tripped up. This resulted in NAIT getting a penalty, (I don't know, you figure it out). They got another quick penalty and as a result they played for nearly one and a half minutes with two men short. At 8:28 of the period Pat Dittar stole the puck from a Red Deer defenceman and slipped a backhand shot past the Red Deer goalie. Less than a minute later E. Parans took the puck from inside his

own blueline all the way down the ice and let a slapshot from just inside the blueline that the Red Deer goalie misplayed 3-1 NAIT. A defensive error on the part of NAIT made it 3-2 at 10:42 of the second period. Around the 15:00 minute mark, the Ookpiks

were caught in a line change and as a result the Kings got a 2-0 breakaway. The original shot missed the net, but the rebound came out in front and the second Red Deer player blasted it over a fallen McGinley. What composure the Ookpiks had early in the second period was gone.

As Red Deer took over control of the game scoring another goal the second period ended with Red Deer leading 4-3.

The third period was probably one of the Ookpiks better periods of the year as it saw them come from behind to outscore the Kings 3-1. It started early when Garth Fano prevented a Red Deer breakaway. Red Deer's frustration then started to show as they got a penalty and the Ookpiks put on some excellent pressure and tied it up.

At 8:50 Bob Cruthers slipped around a King defenseman and slipped a shot between the legs of the goalie. Ookpiks out in front 5-4. Talia Shaine portrays a Victorian Librarian type who livens up both in looks and personality as the picture progresses.
