



That's Gas

Reprinted from Medical

LONDON, Ont. - Not since Hippocrates wrote dissertation on gas called 'Winds" has the flatulent person been taken seriously. He either has been the object of gross humor, or else has been hard done by, as during one period of the Roman empire when passing gas in public places was

Now all may be changed. Dr. Michael Levitt, a Minneapolis internist, has examined flatulence thoroughly and seriously, though his study has not been without its moments of high hilarity.

In the process, he has dispelled some current medical myths concerning the origin of gas. The upstop may well be relief for the windy individual.

As the journal "Post Graduate Medicine" puts it, 'through his elegant scientific contributions, Dr. Levitt has given status to flatus and class to gas."

What Dr. Levitt has done is to study the cause of gas in the individual, and to determine the kind of gas or gases produced and exactly where. Also, he has set standards as to the amount of gas a person normally passes and what can be considered excessive finally, he suggests a remedy for the problem.

Nothing like it has been done before. The result is a clear blueprint for most

physicians to follow in helping a discomfited and embarrassed patient.

The major conclusion reached by Dr. Levitt is that gas appears to be produced by bacteria, acting on food from a diet that the bowel has been unable to digest, such as certain sugars or lactose in

The remedy, then, is to work on a person's diet, until one has been found that does not cause gas.

Dr. Levitt absolutely refutes on the evidence of his test that the origin of gas is caused by a person swallowing air.

This is borne out by his clinic's detailed analysis of gas throughout the entire intestinal tract. No oxygen or nitrogen - two atmospheric gases - have been found in the rectum when gas is present. Instead, his findings show mainly hydrogen and methane.

Dr. Levitt said that certain small amounts of oxygen and nitrogen and carbon dioxide gases are found in the upper intestinal tract, but they have been absorbed into the blood by the time major gas production takes place.

With the help of a patient developed flatograph, Dr. Levitt has determined that the normal gas passing values for males between the age of 20 and 30 are 13 passes per rectum per day. Agematched volunteers were

paid to jot down their gas passes.

"The literature on the subject does not contain a large number of normal values," he told his amused audience.

He concluded that allowing for a standard deviation of about two-and-a-half passes a day that anything more than 20 passes of gas a day would be abnormal.

'The serious result of the findings is a measurable standard for a physician to go by when presented with the patient who says he has too much gas. Until now, Dr. Levitt said, the average physician has approached the problem of gas in an absolutely irrational fashion. First of all, the patient says he has too much gas. The physician doesn't measure it; he simply hasn't any idea whether the patient has too much gas. He accepts the patient's definition.

The next step, he added, is that the physician then proceeds to all sorts of tests without having any idea whether the problem actually

"In fact, there isn't a single cause of flatulence that I know of that possibly could be uncovered by these studies.

"And lastly, he (the doctor) treats the patient with a series of medications. . which to the best of my knowledge really couldn't have any beneficial effect on the patient."

To determine the composition of gas in the entire gas pool, volunteers are tested during fast periods, on special diets and on normal meals.

During his studies, Dr. Levitt's team found in the normal intestinal tract there is about 100 - 180 cc of gas present. A normal patient can stand added diffusion of gas into the intestine - since he passes it out as rapidly as it is put in. Those with abnormalities are easily sensitive and have pain.

Antibiotics won't work because they produce hydrogen, Dr. Levitt said. Bacteria not only makes hydrogen, but other bacteria catabolizes it. This may be the reason why patients on antibiotics frequently complain of gas from the rectum.

What about methane and carbon dioxide?

For some reason, only about one third of people produce methane.

Because bacteria is involved, a methane producer seems to result from environmental circumstances such as dormitory living. If the mother is a methane producer then the chances are almost certain that the offspring will be a methane producer

Participants at stags and fraternity houses have long established the empirical method of determining a methane producer. A lit

match is placed at the trouser seat of a person expelling gas. If a royal blue flame bursts forth, then you have a methane producer, Dr. Levitt said.

The possibility of an explosion from hydrogen and methane in an individual is possible, he said detailing a case. The blast was such that the internist was blown across the room and the patient's head jammed down in the table.

What his research had showed, Dr. Levitt said, in a mixture of jest and

seriousness, is that a simple five-minute 'flatonalysis' test developed by him to measure gases "will be crucial to the work on flatulent patients as on any other major medical analysis."

Perhaps the laugh highlight of Dr. Levitt's talk was when he counted the true-life story of a patient who had heard of his work and written asking for assistance. Details of this patient previously were reported by Dr. Levitt in the "New England Journal of Medicine.'

Not only had flatulence been a problem for nearly eight years, ruining his sex life and educational opportunities, but the patient has come to the conclusion 'that if engineers could hook me up, I would be a solution to the national energy crisis."_

He had said physicians and internists over the years had (Continued on Page 8)

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Hell It's Only Rock 'N' Roll

Michel Pagliaro is not the who about aesthetics. He plays music-hard. C'est tout, simplement. People do talk about Pag. . . the voice reminiscent of Little Richard; the Rick Nelson stance; a touch of Neil Diamond, a McCartney melodic twist.

music critics, Among Pagiliaro's superstandom is a foregone conclusion. Pas encore, "Quebec's best kept secret," they are incredulous that he has eluded the intemotional spotlight this long.

Pagliaro is the only Canadian with gold disques - 10 maintenant - in both English et en Français. He personifies the conjunction of primitive American rock-raw and nasty-with the stylized intensity of "Les Quebecois." Surtout, there is the British predominance of guitar.

Rock'n'Roll staples comme Dizzy Miss Lizzy, Pagliaro transfigures with the fever of his stuccato French. His heady, J'entends Frapper has been ranked with the classics, Johnnie B. Goode and Jumping Jack Flash. Critic Greg Shaw asserts that Pag is probably, "the first to do anything original to the French language." Some Sing (Some Dance), Loving You Ain't Easy, and Give Us One More Chance, have created a mushrooming Pagliaro cult.

Pag has been the idol of French Canada since he began his solo career with producer manager George Lagois ten years ago. Toujours, c'est la meme chose, when Pagliaro steps on stage with his back-up group ''Les Rockers," dimonium breaks loose. As a crossover artist, he has been successful in both A, and FM formats. He keeps getting better. Reviewing his first Engligh LP on Columbia, Pagliaro I, Bill Mann, of the Montreal Gazette, stated flatly. "This is the most impressive work I have ever heard by any Canadian rock or pop artist."

(Continued from Page 7) given him all sorts of tests and medication to no avail. He had learned to chew his food slowly, walk slowly and "do everything slowly." He had been convinced by a psychiatrist that his problem was a "Jewish mother syndrome" and that it would take long-range therapy to help him.

He had devised on his own a "flatograph" over a threeyear period, recording every passage of gas, every belch and every single item of food eaten over a 24-hour period.

His own statistics showed that he passes gas 33.6 times a day on an average and belched 13 times a day.

Dr. Levitt notes from the dietary recordings that it was obvious that every time this patient drank milk he seemed to have a lot of gas.

Because of this he had the

patient drink nothing but two quarts of milk a day for two days and keep a recording. On the second day, the patient passed gas 141 times in a day and in one four hour period, 60 to 70 times. Dr. Levitt said.

"Both these values are pending acceptance by the Guinness Book of World Record," he quipped.

Meat seemed to cause the least gas and so by trial and error a diet using meat as a baseline was worked out for the patient. At last report (no pun intended) he seemed in the ninth year of flatulence on the way to normality.

What causes the odor in gas, since methane and hydrogen are odorless?

Dr. Levitt confesses to not having had a whiff of success in this area. The odor-causing gases apparently are too small to measure.


