

My last point deals with an innovation that has already been decided by the present student council. It is called Keyhole. This is the policy whereby all tickets sold for any function must be sold from one specific location. To use this facility a tech must attend at least 60 per cent of all student council meetings. Failure to do so will mean that a tech cannot sell tickets for any function and therehy will not make any revenue for their tech. The conception behind this is to increase student participation and communication. This will help the smaller techs to stage a function with a good chance of sucess. It will be my job to oversee this operation and make sure that it runs smoothly

and effectively.



Edmonton Hire a Student

Edmonton Hire a Student, formerly Operation Placement is a cooperative program designed to meet the summer employment needs of the student and business communities.

Specifically, Edmonton Hire a Student assists in the placement of post-secondary and secondary students in summer employment positions. In addition, the program promotes and satisfies the summer staff requirements of Edmonton and area businesses, and helps to stimulate the development and operatin of student-run businesses.

As a non-profit community service; we are sponsored by the Federal Department of Manpower and Immigration; the Provincial Department of Advance Education and Manpower; the Edmonton Chamber of Commerce; the Edmonton Public School—board; the Edmonton Separate School Board; the students' unions of the University of Alberta, Nait and Grant MacEwan Community College; the Nait Administration; the U of A Administration and the City of Edmonton.

The Edmonton Hire a Student Program channels its activities into five specific areas in an effort to ensure the maximum effectiveness of the program. These are the Promotins, Speical Projects, Employer Relations, High School Visitations and Student Business Task Forces, each headed by a Chairman responsible for the program activities in that area.


The success of Edmonton Hire a Student's promotional program depends largely on the public exposure and community awareness of the services we offer. Due to our limited budget, we rely heavily on the excellent support we recieve from the public, and news media, and area businesses for sponsorship. We have been fortunatge enough to appear on radio and television talk shows, arrange speaking engagements with service clubs, air public service announcements, place newspaper advertisements, etc. This community cooperation is vital to the quality of the service we give in return and is greatly appreciated.

Teams of trained employer relations people visit the majority of Edmonton businesses in order to survey their summer employment needs and explain our available services to the potential employers. In effect, they investigate and promote job possibilities.

Since Edmonton Hire A Student is a liason between employers and students, we must also ensure similar exposure to the students. This is accomplished by means of our highly successful High School Visitatins program. Trained student counsellors arrange sessions with the rudiments of seeking and securing employment, handling job interviews and writing resumes. These informative sessions are possible through the excellent cooperation of the school boards and guidance counsellors.

Edmonton Hire A Student also promotes and advises students interested in starting their own summer business. We can assist by referring students to legal counsel and providing them with job referrals. These businesses, fully staffed and operated by students, offer a wide variety of services in such areas as landscaping and yard maintenance, construction, painting, roofing and many more. Their success lies in the fact that they provide an immediate and quality service to Edmonton homeowners. Free estimates and referrals are available to anyone interested in using this service. The experience gained in operating these companies has proven invaluable to the students in future careers.

Canadian Army Welfare Fund

In 1974, the Canadian Army Welfare Fund established an Educational Bursary Programme to assist dependents of former members of the Canadian Army (Regular) with post-secondary ed-

The amount which at present is allocated by the Board of Directors of the Canadian Army Welfare Fund, is \$75,000. per year. This amount is subject to change depending on the availability of funds which may be appropriated to this program in the future years. Bursaries up to \$1,000 may be awarded primarily to finance tuition fees and the purchase of

Qualifying service of the parent in the Canadian Army (Regular) must be between 1 October 1946 and 31 January 1968.

Financial need is the determining factor in the selection of bursary recipients. The Selection Committee considers the family's financial circumstances as well as those of the applicant in reaching

Applications may be obtained from the Manager, Canadian Army Welfare Fund, East Memorial Building, Wellington Street, Ottawa, Ontario, KIA 0P4.

The established deadline for the submission of application is JULY 1 each year. All applicants are notified of the results by 15

INFORMATION FOR **APPLICANTS**

PURPOSE

2. To assist dependents of former members of the Canadian Army to obtain a post-secondary education by providing financial assistance primarily for tuition and purchase of text books. ELIGIBILITY

3. All applicants must be dependents of former members of trhe Canadian Army (Regular) who served between 1 Oct. 46 and 31 Jan. 68. Dependents include natural, step, or legally adopted

4. Service with the former Royal Canadian Navy or Royal Canadian Air Force Does not Constitute Eligibility.

ACCEPTED INSTITUTIONS

5. Eligible educational institutions shall be limited to Canadian universities and colleges, community colleges or technical schools requiring not less than two years leading to a certificate, diploma or degree. **SELECTION**

6. The selection for bursaries will be made by the Canadian Army Welfare Fund Executive Committee, acting as Selection Committee. The main criteria governing the selection will be:

(a) financial need: this is the primary consideration.

(b) scholastic ability. (c) length of service in the Canadian Army (Regular).

7. Candidates normally will be advised of the results of their application not later than 15 August. Each bursary will be awarded

for one year only. **OBLICATIONS OF RECIPIENTS**

8. Bursary recipients must be prepared to enter college, university, communikty college, or technical school on a full-time basis in the year of application, and to maintain a course of study during that year leading to as degree, certificate, or diploma. Part-time or evening courses are not admissible

9. Recipients must submit to the Selection Committee, as soon as possible after being advised of selection for bursary, proof of admission to the institution concerned and confirmation or intention to attend.

10. It is the obligation of the recipient to maintain satisfactory progress. Students must comp-

Its up to you.



Packaging An Expensive Pain!


SAN FRANCISCO (ANS-CUP) US food industry forced customers buy 46.5 percent more packaging between 1963 and 1971 according to the Environmental Action foundation.

In the same period food consumption increased by a mere 2.3 percent the foundation reports.

In 1973 consumers forked over extra dollars to pay for about 52 million tons of containers and packages, including 800,000 tons of aluminum containers and 28 million tons of glass containers.


PUBLICATIONS CHAIRMAN



Edmonton Hire A Student's main objective is to stimulate and satisfy summer employment needs. Since many students and employers that register with our office have employment needs in areas other than Edmonton, we work in cooperation with other student manpower offices located in the rural and major centres of the province. This cooperation proves beneficial to the students and employers for whom we operate."Hire a Student Week", a highly successful province-wide promotion, is a result of the hard work supplied by the Edmonton office and the cooperation and participation by other centers. The Edmonton Hire-A-Student office is without a doubt, one of the most successful in Canada in terms of achievement.

Last year over 15,000 students registered with our office. We were able to place over 7,900 in suitable jobs and more than 5,000 employers made use of our services. Our placement figure does not include the many students who secured jobs on their own after registering with us.

Edmonton Hire A Student '77 is facing a tremendous challenge this year in its attempt to satisfy the needs of both students and employers. In 1977 we expect to register between 14 and 15 thousand post secondary and secondary students. We are expanding our mailout contact over last year to just over 12,000 employers: and increase of 70 percent from 1976. addition we will be making personal visits to at least 3500 Edmonton and area employers.

With this kind of employer contact combined with a more professionally planned promotions program, Edmontin Hire A Student will attempt to place over 7,000 students in summer jobs. We will also attempt to increase the dollar volume of contracts for student businesses by increasing the efficiency of referrals; setting up more efficient student business siminar's at Nait, U of A, and Grant MacEwan Community College; and setting up a mandatory contract system which will help prevent any legal problems that could arise with the clientele of the student businesses.

With our continually expanding program and the enthusiastic response we receive from business and the general public, we look to this year with great anticipation. However, our success will ultimately rely on the hard work and dedication supplied by the funding bodies, the students and the employers of Edmonton who have made Edmonton Hire A Student the most successful student employment program in -Canada.

Changes can be made and will be made! Our paper is probably our best communicable devise which in my estimation can be used to attract more readers and generate college spirit.





Also, next year I will be looking for a competent year book staff, hopefully matching the good work being done presently by three ambitious persons.



Eugene O'neill's Long Day's Journey into Night Theatre 3, March 15 to 27, 1977

Bad luck seems to come in groups. First, the length of the play (3 to 4 hours after editing) tends to allow the plot to drag on until the second half. Here, the plot picks up in tempo and the audience is let in on some key idiosyncrasies of the plays main characture, Mary Cauan Tyrone. Second, due to "personal rea-sons" one of the major actors in the play, Michael Murdock, had to quit the play before an understudy could be trained. This resulted in 2 days cancellations (Wednesday and Thursday).

The play, set in 1912 New England, revolves around a Morphine-addict Mary Tyrone, her miser-landlord husband, and her two useless sons.

Walter Kaasa plays an convincing James Tyrone, ex-actor, now a misely landlord who is easily sucked into investing all his money into worthless land. He drives his wife into a continued morphine addiction by leaving her alone in hotel rooms night after night during his acting tours.

Actress Jacqueline McLeod's character, Mary Cauan Tyrone, a highly psychotic drug-addict who drifts in and out of her childhood days at a convent school where "life was a bed of roses."

James Tyrone Sr, portrayed by quick study actor Larry Farley who was the stage manager, is the elder of the two brothers. He is depicted as a useless boozer and steady customer of the local Bordellio who fails at everything he ventures into.

Edmund Tyrone, the younger brother, played by David Mann, is suffering from consumption from a life of drinking forsien rot-gut whiskey.

Cathleen, Kate Gentles, put a humorous note to the play in the role of Tyrones Irish maid.

Actors Larry Farley and Jacqueline McLeod must be commended for this role playing. Larry Farley for being able to fill in his role convincingly with only two days memorization - Jacqueline McLeod for the amazing ability to cope with the multitude of emotional changes her psychotic role presented to her.

Would I recommend this play? Only if the first half of it was speeded up to prevent dragged out scenes and repititious lines.

On March 12, Mount Royal College in Calgary hosted the 1977 provincial wrestling championships. There were two levels of wrestling: 1. 16-20 years of age is considered to be a junior and 2. 20 years and over is a senior. Approximately 250 of Alberta's best wrestlers, including the Northwest Territories attended the oneday affair. Participating for Nait were John Cusak and Randy Paley (long-line veterans of the sport) and a newcomer to the wrestling circle, Sid Thorowsky, a heavy weight. 
