



PHILOSOPHY OF EDUCATION: FATCAT SAYS WE NEED LESS **EDUCATION: SOCIAL SERVICE**


MONTREAL (CUP) -- Quebec's univeristy population should be reduced by a third and the emphasis of the province's postsecondary education should be shifted toward engineering, business and vocational programs, according to enlightened industrialist and muse A.K. Velan.

Velan, whose holdings suck a couple of million dollars a year out of the province, says Quebec's declining economy can be attributed to overspending in education and social services, being too nice to unions, and not giving industry big tax cuts.

The province spends \$4 billion on education, including universities and colleges, which Velan says "have become huge parking lots for youth," who become unemployed because they haven't been trained to do the jobs industry needs done.

If people were trained for the "right" kind of jobs, Velan suggests, there would be almost no unemployment, and Quebec would save another \$1 billion it spends on social services like unemployment and welfare.


Tickets are \$2.50 and \$3.50 and its at Pleasantview Hall (10860-57 ave). Starts at 8:30.

On the 28th of October, the all-time favorites of the month, '5th Ave. Allstars' are playing a Hallow'een ball at the Yellow-


head Hotel. Costumes are essential and no admittance without it. I'm sure who's sponsoring this one but tickets are on sale in F-208 for \$5.00 apiece.

Right now check your latest copy of the Certificate of Eligibility or Reinstatement Form for the latest academic year end date. Your exemption period expires six months from that date. Even though you may have applied for further financial assistance, this does not automatically reinstate your loan, and negotiating a Canada Student Loan does not automatically reinstate your Guaranteed Provincial Loan, or vise

If you fail to reinstate your loan within the stipulated exemption period you will be required to pay the interest charges accrued up to the reinstatement


period has expired. If you should remit any payments on your loan prior to expiration of the six month exemption period be assured that the payments are being applied only on the principal; no interest charges have been assessed by the bank

MEDICAL and LAW STUDENTS -Upon graduation you have a six month exemption period. In addition, upon application to the credit institution (bank), a further 9 month deferment of principal payments only may be granted. This requires you to pay interest charges only for this period

MEDICAL RESIDENT STUDENTS — You cannot be reinstated to interestfree, full-time status. A Medical Resident Student is assessed tuition fees paid for by the sponsoring hospital and is in receipt of a salary and therefore considered to be gainfully employed






