

"Ask me if I Care"

Canadians May Face Draft

OTTAWA (CUP) -- Canada's youth may face compulsory military service if Defence Minister Barney Danson has his way.

Danson, in remarks following a speech to Toronto Liberals on Sept. 26, said he favours a compulsory standing army for Canada and would like to open public debate on the idea.

The man who brought Katamavik to Canadian youth this year said young people should consider the armed forces as an alternative to unemployment insurance. He also urged young Canadians to join the reserve.

Danson, a wounded veteran of the Second World War, said each day friends and constituents who are concerned about the lack of motivation in their children have raised the question of complulsory service.

"A lot of people are asking "Should we?" he said. "It's heartbreaking to see talented, intelligent kids without the challenges to exploit," he said.

But he said compulsory military service is not imminent.

Fund Established

CALJARY (CUP)--A fund established last spring by the University of Calgary student union to enable international students to meet this year's higher tuition costs has fallen \$12,500 short of its \$15,000 goal.

"The results of the fund-raising have not been as encouraging as we had hoped," said student union vice-president (academic) Blair Redlin. "The goal we set of \$15,000 would have provided every foreign student with \$300 but with \$2,500 we have just enough money to give to the more needy students," he said.

The fund was initiated because "we felt there were many foreign students who just wouldn't be able to come here unless someone offset the \$300 (increase)," Red-


THE LONGEST SHINE





With reference to the "Exterminators" (namely the pro-sized defensive line comprised of Leon Lyszkiewicz, Dave Willox, Lorne Degroot and Bill Hole), Syrotuik's unit kept the Huskies passing offense completely off balance throughout the afternoon with intense pass rush pressure. Meanwhile the PPP, led by veteran safety Don "The Pil" Guy, had a field day again, pocketing no less than 5 enemy passes. Wes McHarg led the Bear pilfer squad with 2 interceptions.

Offensively talented wide receiver Joe Poplawski provided most of the spark with 7 catches for 89 yards and one touchdown. "Joe Pop converted several second and long situations with some amazing catches," verbalized U. of A. HEAD MENTOR, Jim Donlevy.

With his seven-point production, Poplawski has moved into the WIFL scoring lead (39 points).

In a back-to-back scheduling quirk, the Bears face the Huskies again this Wednesday (October 4) but on Edmonton turf at Clarke Stadium. Game time is scheduled for 7:30 P.M. Wit good weather conditions a crowd in the vicinity of 10,000 is projected.



Just hours later a New Brunswick court ordered the Corporation to cease its distributing operations.


A spokesperson for the CUPE local at Mount Ailison said that although the university was obviously bootlegging no the unions would hold no harsh feelings toward those involved in the incident.

Cycle Drags




Left to Right Members are:






Shinerama





















"REAR--END--IN--STALLS" by - Sgt. - Johnston

Commissionaires have been very busy lately-tagging Vehicles that are backed into stalls. Ther is no grudge (or axe to grind) in this case-really not being bitchy either it is for the protection of those patrons of parking at NAIT.

It is realized that everyone likes some sort of explaination for an action and here are the reasons for our watchfulness.

When rear windows are fogged and iced up during the winter months-backing in a stall can be dangerous for the vehicles parked. Rear visibility is poor and backing is not accomplished with the same accuracy as going in nose first.


