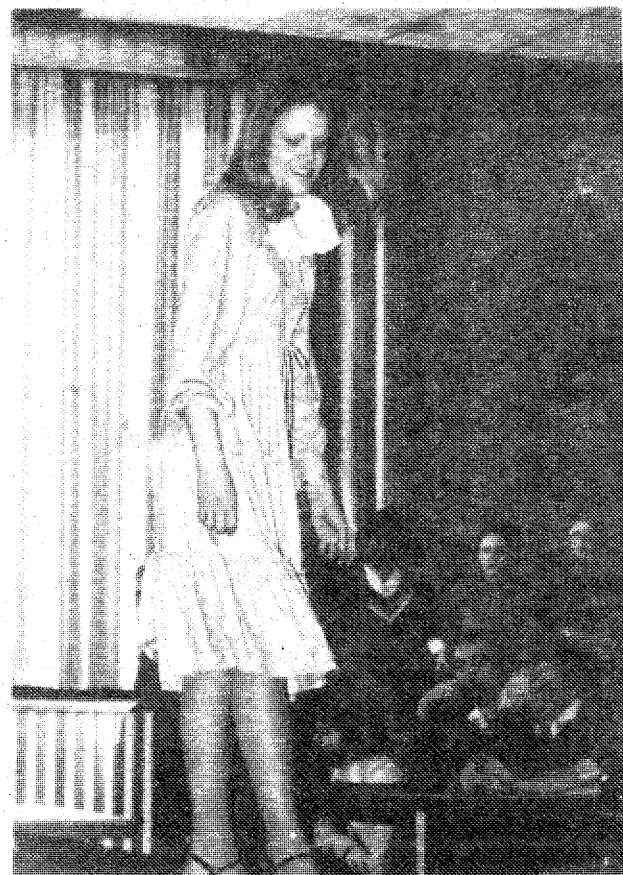

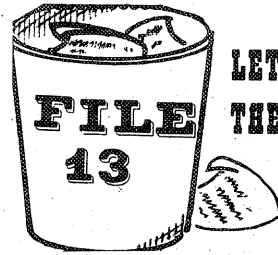

Task Force Meets

"The establishment of this committee, and that task which it now faces, will have major significance not only in Alberta, but across Canada. You have accepted the challenge to explore and develop a rationale for assessing student tuition fees."

Dr. A.E. Hohol, Minister of Alberta Advanced Education and Manpower, made these remarks to the members of a task force appointed to review students contributions to the costs of post-secondary education in the province.

He continued, "Such a rationale has never been established. You will have the opportunity to determine from various perspectives the reason tuition fees are at their present levels, and to provide alternatives."

According to committee chairman, Ron Grantham of Edmonton, the purpose of this initial meeting was to establish contact among members and to discuss the role and operations of the committee.

"The members of the committee are anxious to begin this most difficult task. We have a strong commitment to the need for public input. During the next six months, we will hold meetings at various centres across Alberta, and request views from all concerned sources," he said.

Prior to the next meeting scheduled for February 7 in Edmonton, the committee will attempt to come to grips with the scope of their task, and develop a plan for further action.

The committee was appointed by Dr. Hohol on December 21, 1977. He explained, "In order to receive regional representation and views from Albertans across the province, we have appointed individuals from St. Paul, Edmonton, Red Deer, Calgary and Lethbridge."

The nine-member committee represents Alberta's public at large, and staff and students from post-secondary institutions in the province. Members of the committee include Jeannette Boulet, St. Paul; Ede Duckering, Red Deer; Dr. Walter Mitson, Lethbridge; Carol Wilmot and Robert B. Redlin, Calgary, and James C. Spalding, Dr. Steve M. Hunka and Dianne Y. Woods, Edmonton.

"I'm pleased to chair this important committee involved in issues of top priority to the citizens of Alberta," Mr. Grantham said.

Dr. Hohol expressed his confidence in the committee and added, "I commend these nine individuals for their interest in this significant area. Their enthusiasm demonstrates the concerns Albertans have for post-secondary education."

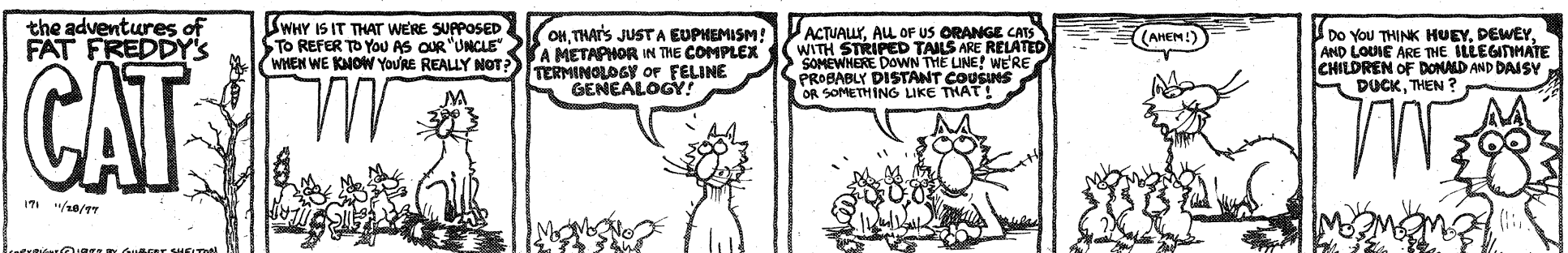

SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS

The score should have read Bruce Small -8, NAIT -6, as the Red Deer forward figured in all 8 Red Deer goals, scoring 4 himself and setting up 4 others.

Four times the Ooks were leading (2-0, 3-2, 4-3, 5-4) only to let the Kings get back into the game, due primarily to give-away by the Ooks.

In the first period, NAIT netted two quick goals, only to allow the Kings to tie the score shortly after. The Ooks scored late in the first period and thus lead by one at the end of one.

In the second, the teams alternated scoring goals, but RDC netted 3 and the Ooks managed 2.

Neither team played well defensively, and both had their offense functioning efficiently. With the teams tied at 5 after 40 minutes, it was just a matter of "who wanted it more." The Kings outscored NAIT 3-1 in the final period.

Throughout the game, one team would scroe, then relax momentarily, only to let the other team score. This problem continues to hinder the Ooks progress.

The Ooks are now 6 and 11 and play in Calgary this weekend, versus MRC (Saturday evening) and SAIT (Sunday afternoon).

HOCKEY

SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS

Backed by the super goal-tending of Brian Jubinville, the Ooks defeated SAIT and MRC over the weekend and, in so doing, got back into serious contention for an ACAC playoff position.

Brian played exceptionally well in the Ooks 3-2 victory over SAIT, blocking 38 Trojan drives, several of them from close range. On Sunday, he was again very steady as the Ooks handed the short-staffed Cougars an 8-4 defeat.

Against SAIT, the Ooks seemed to play only as well as they had to. Both teams appeared sluggish and played very cautiously, with the defended prevailing. The Ooks, at times, swarmed around the SAIT goal, but could not find the range. Defensively, the entire NAIT squad played well.

On Sunday, the Ooks jumped into a 4-0 second period lead against the Cougars who dressed only 12 players due to a rash of fairly serious injuries. Again, the ooks were inconsistent in their performance, playing very well in spurts and, on other occasions, seemed to put forth only enough effort to stay on top of the Cougars.

The Ooks entertain RDC on Tuesday at 8:00 p.m. at the NAIT Arena, then travel to Calgary the following two weekends.

An Interlocking tournament involving all the teams in the South and North Divisions of the ACAC Volleyball league were at NAIT this past weekend to hone their skills for the final stretch drive in regular season play.

NAIT and Red Deer were the favourites of the tournament going in, but unfortunately only one of those teams made the finals and that team wasn't NAIT.

NAIT was playing the type of Volleyball that made them second in Western Canada last year early in the tournament as they easily defeated Medicine Hat, SAIT, MRC, Leth., but in the fifth game they ran into a fired up team from Olds College.

The set against Olds was easily the highlight of the tournament, the teams exchanged wins in the first two games to force the crucial third game.

NAIT had won the first game and it was assumed by most of the fans in attendance that they would finish off Olds in two straight, but it was not to be. NAIT did look a bit over confident against Olds as they had only lost 1 game throughout the entire tournament but I think the big difference was bench strength. Olds had a very well balanced team and the coach substituted freely and very smartly as a result even in the final game against Red Deer the entire team was quite well rested compared to Red Deer.

Getting back to NAIT their bench consisted of only one player and after 5 games in less than 24 hrs. that is not quite enough.

The team is playing very well right now and this minor setback will not deter the Volleyball Ooks in their quest to avenge their defeat in last year's 4 West Championships.

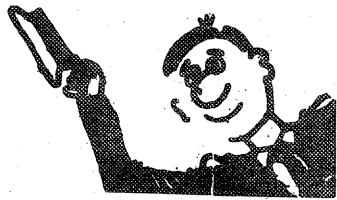

Those days you awake to find a heavy snowfall, can be a discomfort to us all.

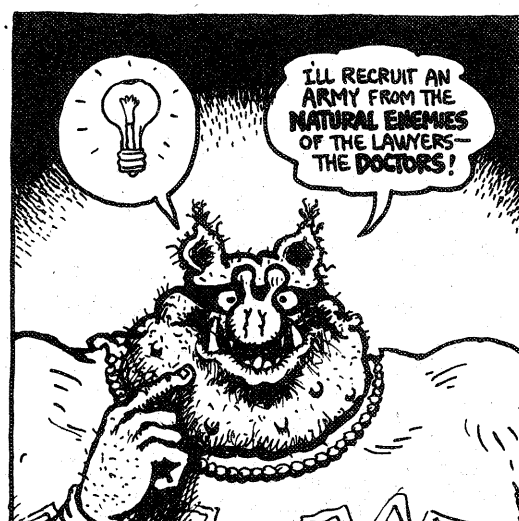
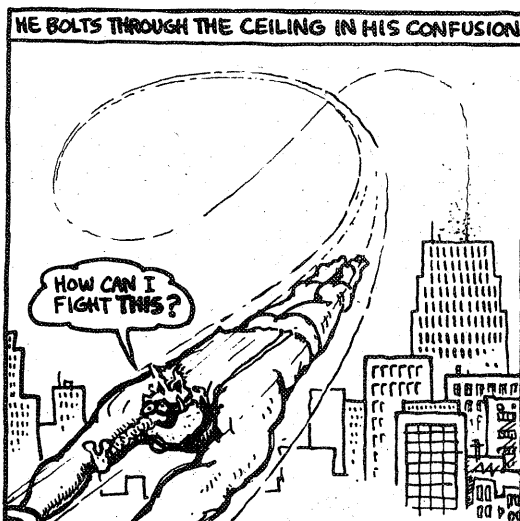
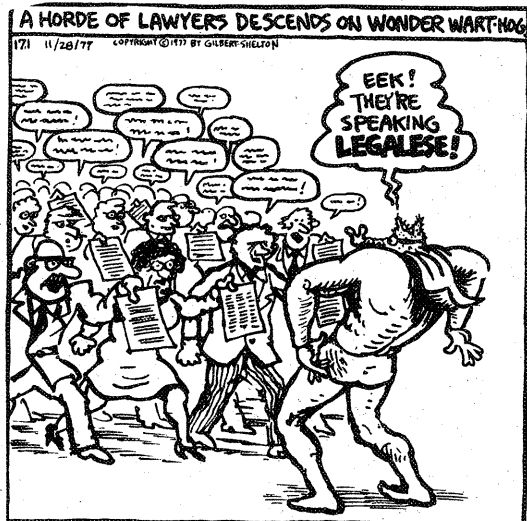

Hohal appoints nine Albertans to Force

Dr. A.E. Hohol, Minister of Alberta Advanced Education and Manpower, has announced the appointment of nine Albertans to a committee which will review student's contributions to the costs of post-secondary education.

He explained, "The Task Force will gather and review information, dating back to 1969, concerning the levels of student's contributions to the costs of post-secondary services at Alberta's institutions. Following a year of study, the Task Force will provide a report of its activities, conclusions and recommendations."

Dr. Hohol named Edmontonian Ron Grantham, one of five public members, as chairman. Others are Jeannette Boulet, St. Paul; Dr., Walter Mitson, Lethbridge; James C. Spalding, Edmonton;

and Carol Wilmot, Calgary.

Institutional representatives Ede Duckering, Red Deer College and Dr. Steve 'm. Hunka, the University of Alberta. Representing post-secondary students are Robert B. Redlin of the University of Calgary, and Dianne Y. Woods of the University of Alberta.

Dr. Earl A. Mansfield, Assistant Deputy Minister, Manpower Services division, will represent the department. Peggy Garrity, Administrative Services division, will serve as the executive secretary to the Task Force.

Mr. Grantham, a graduate in engineering from the University of British Columbia and post-grad from M.I.T. in Boston, is a consulting engineer with Reid, Crowther and Partners Limited. He is a director and senior shareholder in the firm, and regional manager of the Edmon-

ton Office. Active in the community, Mr. Grantham is a past president of the Rotary Club and the Edmonton Club. He has served on the board of directors of the Opera, Symphony, and Canadian Bible Societies, and the Winspear Foundation. A member of the Association of Professional Engineers, Geologists and Berophysicists of Alberta, he was influential in the development of Canterbury Court, a senior citizens' residence.

Mrs. Boulet is extremely active in further education activities at the local, provincial and national levels, and is a former member of the Minister's Advisory Committee on Further Education. The mother of six children, she is well-known for her service to the St. Paul community in the areas of the arts, preventive social services and education.

Dr. Mitson, a graduate of the Ontario College of Optometry, is a member of the senates of the Universities of Calgary and Lethbridge. He is a past president of the Alberta Optometric Association and the Lethbridge Downtown Lions Club. In 1974, Dr. Mitson was the chief clinician on a team of senior interns which delivered a vision care program to the British Virgin Islands, under a Canadian International Development Agency agreement.

Mr. Spalding, president of a management consulting firm, received his B.Sc. in Electrical Engineering from the University of Alberta. Active in professional and community organizations, he has served as a national director of the Canadian Information Processing Society and president of its Edmonton section.

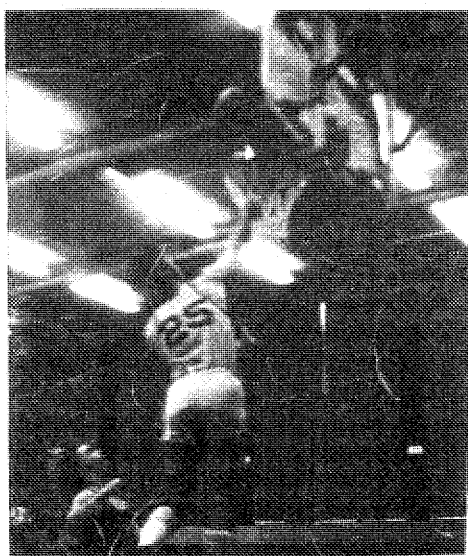

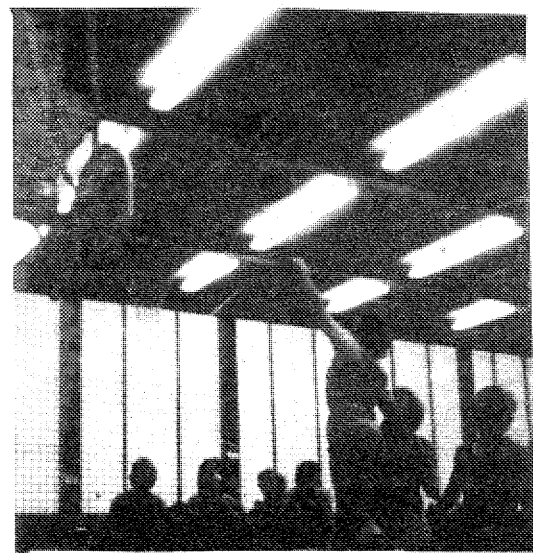
It's Up! It's Good!
