MENS AND WOMENS CURLING TEAM'S WIN TRIP TO 4-WEST CHAMPIONSHIP

Rinks skipped by favourite Rob King and longshot Deb Lukawesky captured the Mens and Womens titles at the 1978 A.C.A.C. Sports Weekend. A total of fifty nine games were played in the tournament, hosted by Grant McEwan at the beautiful Royal Glenora Club. SAIT captured the mixed title. All three teams will represent Alberta in the 4-West Championship March 3rd & 4th. in the Pas, Manitoba.

Rob King and his mates Bruce Lewis, Lorne Reed and Chris King went through the two day competition undefeated. Its easy to see why the rink were the prohibited favorites. Rob is one of top curlers in the city. He has

won the Canadian Schoolboys Championship and represented Canada twice in the World Juniors. Third, Bruce Lewis skipped the NAIT mens team last year and just two weeks ago captured the Aberth in the city mixed play-

downs. Second Lorne Reed has two purple hearts to his credit. Lead Chris King has helped his brother capture all his major titles.

In Round Robin play they defeated Grande Prairie 11-2, Olds 10-3, and Medicine Hat 7-3. In the semi's they ousted SAIT 13-2 and defeated Red Deer 10-5 in the final.

The Cinderalla team of the tournament had to be the NAIT

girls. Given very little chance of winning except by their coach, the girls used some black magic in copping their round robin division with a 5-1 record. Red Deer, Camrose and Grande Prairie finished second with a 4-2 record.

To win the title outright and avoid a four way tie NAIT had to defeat Red Deer in its last game and have Grant McEwan defeat Camrose. True to script Grant McEwan stunned Camrose by

defeating them 10-3. Meanwhile NAIT was losing 6-0 to Red Deer after three ends. Then NAIT counted two on four and stole six on five when the Red Deer skip facing two counters proceeded to

eliminate three of her won rocks and leave white rocks in the

house. Shaken Red Deer gave up two more on six and one in seven. down 11-6 Red Deer made NAIT throw their last rock to ensure the win.

They achieved their record by defeating Grande Prairie 7-3, losing 8-4 to Camrose and then sealed off four straight wins, 9-2 over Medicine hat 9-5 over SAIT, 10-3 over Grande McEwan and 11-6 over Red Deer.

The Cinderalla team are all from the Accounting Department, Deb Lukawesky, Kathy Dunn, Janice Nelson and Debbie Bryan.

The mixed team of Jeff Armstrong, Pat Holawack, Doug Mclean and Diane Belsheim finished third in their section with a 1-3 record. They had on excellent chance to give NAIT three titles but just couldn't put enough shots together on the weekend.

Congratulations to all three for their fine showing. Best of Luck to Rob and Deb and their mates in the 4-West Championship.

Charting Your Course

"No doubt you have acquired an overview of your chosen route and have fixed on a specific destination. However, many immediate important choices face you such as government or private sectors, the type of business, the size of the organization, the kind of position and degree of specialization.

You will encounter many challenges in pursuit of a career but the rewards of success will be high. In 1978 several factors will darken the job outlook.

The national economy is faltering due to inflation, and adverse trade balance and increased competition for Canadian exports. Although technological development and many resourced continue to grow, other vital resources are now diminishing.

Continuing political upheaval in Canada appears certain. Many blame increasing government intervention and taxation for a loss of jobs in the private sector. Progress towards effective legislation to encourage the growth of small business has been slow.

In contrast to the general situation, Alberta has emerged as a region of favourable employment levels with good prospects for industrial development. Large pipelining construction expenditures will help support many industries and services. Expanded government operations have also created new career opportunities. There is a pressing need for more professional and sophisticated business management.

A prime objective of this conference is to help Business Administration students take advantage of a favourable conditions in the province. The committee has been fortunate in obtaining resource people who are familiar with the Alberta business scene and have the opportunity to exchange ideas, firm up on options and avoid some of the hazards and obstacles in "setting your course."

The 1978 Conference Committee

These words were written on the introductory page of the booklet that was prepared for the two hundred plus Business students that attended a conference in the MacDonald Hotel on Wednesday Feb. 15, 1978 between the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The day was set up so that's there were two morning sessions at which small groups of student would listen to individual speakers. The lunch would be served, followed by a keynote speaker

who spoke to the whole group. In the afternoon, the students were broken up according to their specialties into panel sessions. It was here that 4 selected speakers would talk for 10 minutes each, then try to answer questions from the students. This was the fourth annual conference and judging from the impressive list of speakers and auscultators, one would have to say the conference was successful. Conferences of this sort are put on so that the potential graduate can gain an insight as to what their potential future employers will be like. It gives the student the opportunity to mingle with the "pros" and to ask them questions as well as listen to what they have to say about their individual companies, and what they like to see in an employee.

The morning was set up so that there were two 1 hour sessions with different speakers assigned to different rooms. It was during these sessions that the students would go in, listen to what their speaker had to say, then fire questions at he/she afterwards. Since there was such a variety of speakers on so many different fields of employment, the student chose his speakers by picking two people who would have more information on the students chosen field.

After the morning sessions were over, dinner was served. The guests were seated at their tables and after a short wait the maitre d' dees came around with the meal. Dinner consisted of soup, followed by roast beef, mashed potatoes, and carrots. After dinner coffee was served along with dessert for those that weren't already stuffed. Next the head table was introduced.

Jim Doucette who was the Chairman of the Conference Committee got up and thanked the various donors who had donated the wine and cheese. As well he thanked the people who helped make this conference possible. He ended his speech by saying, "People make the difference."

Alex Mair the Information Officer for next was next. It was his duty to introduce the Keynote Speaker. Alex said, "It's my duty to introduce a man who needs no introduction. A man who was never content at only doing one thing at a time. Always doing two things at once. This man is the only man I know who can honestly say that he once turned down an offer to play football for the New York Giants. Instead he went to Italy for 18 months to get his

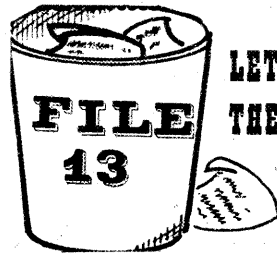

Task Force Meets

"The establishment of this committee, and that task which it now faces, will have major significance not only in Alberta, but across Canada. You have accepted the challenge to explore and develop a rationale for assessing student tuition fees."

Dr. A.E. Hohol, Minister of Alberta Advanced Education and Manpower, made these remarks to the members of a task force appointed to review students contributions to the costs of post-secondary education in the province.

He continued, "Such a rationale has never been established. You will have the opportunity to determine from various perspectives the reason tuition fees are at their present levels, and to provide alternatives."

According to committee chairman, Ron Grantham of Edmonton, the purpose of this initial meeting was to establish contacts among members and to discuss the role and operations of the committee.

"The members of the committee are anxious to begin this most difficult task. We have a strong commitment to the need for public input. During the next six months, we will hold meetings at various centres across Alberta, and request views from all concerned sources," he said.

Prior to the next meeting scheduled for February 7 in Edmonton, the committee will attempt to come to grips with the scope of their task, and develop a plan for further action.

The committee was appointed by Dr. Hohol on December 21, 1977. He explained, "In order to receive regional representation and views from Albertans across the province, we have appointed individuals from St. Paul, Edmonton, Red Deer, Calgary and Lethbridge."

The nine-member committee represents Alberta's public at large, and staff and students from post-secondary institutions in the province. Members of the committee include Jeannette Boulet, St. Paul; Ede Duckering, Red Deer, Dr. Walter Mitson, Lethbridge; Carol Wilmot and Robert B. Rediin, Calgary, and James C. Spalding, Dr. Steve M. Hunka and Dianne Y. Woods, Edmonton.

"I'm pleased to chair this important committee involved in issues of top priority to the citizens of Alberta," Mr. Grantham said.

Dr. Hohol expressed his confidence in the committee and added, "I commend these nine individuals for their interest in this significant area. Their enthusiasm demonstrates the concerns Albertans have for post-secondary education."

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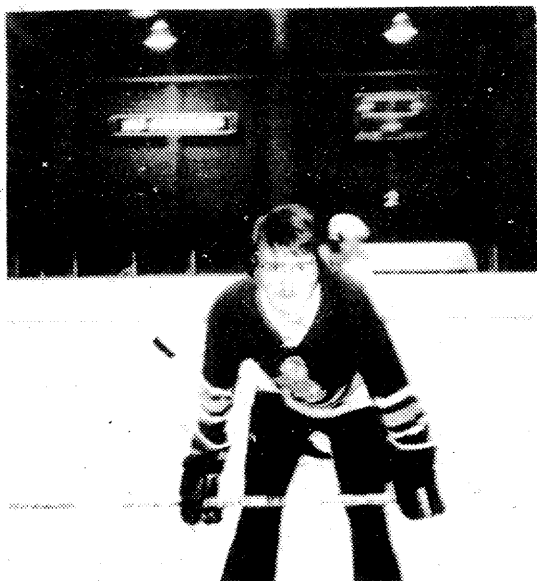
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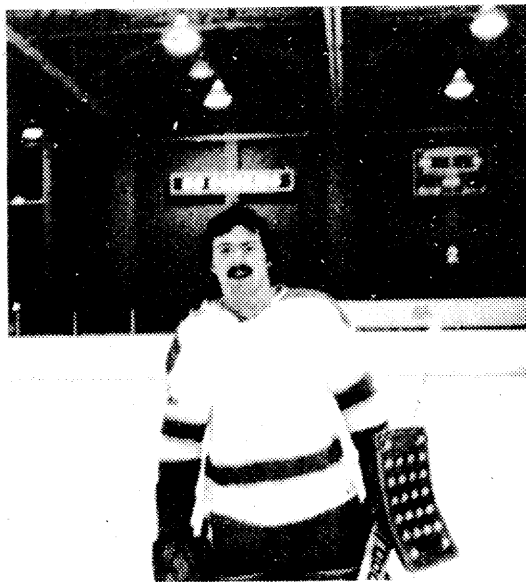
OOKS WERE & HAD BEEN

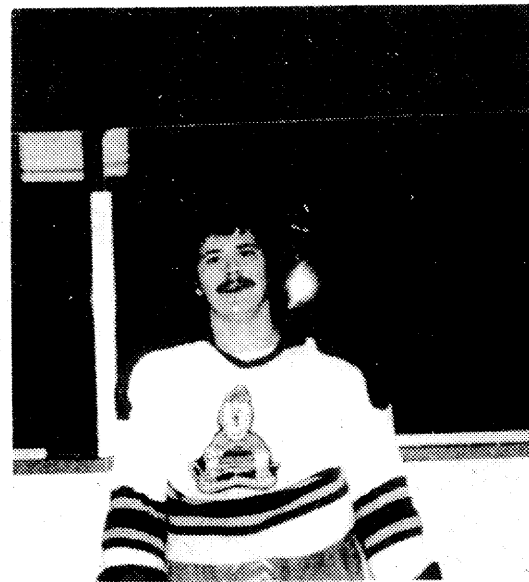
Don Owchar (Bird)

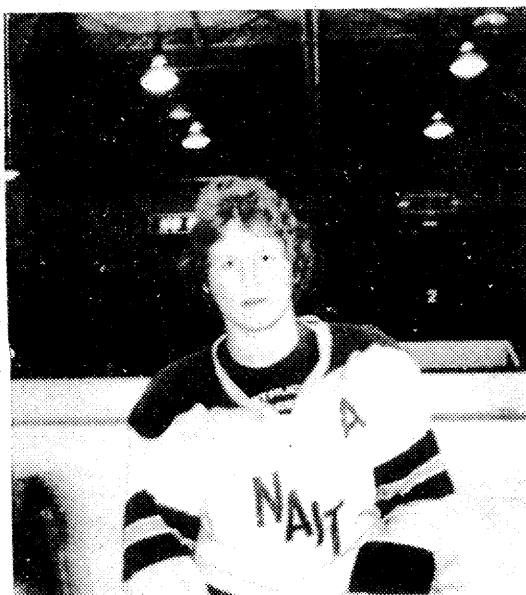
Brian Jubinville (Jubie)

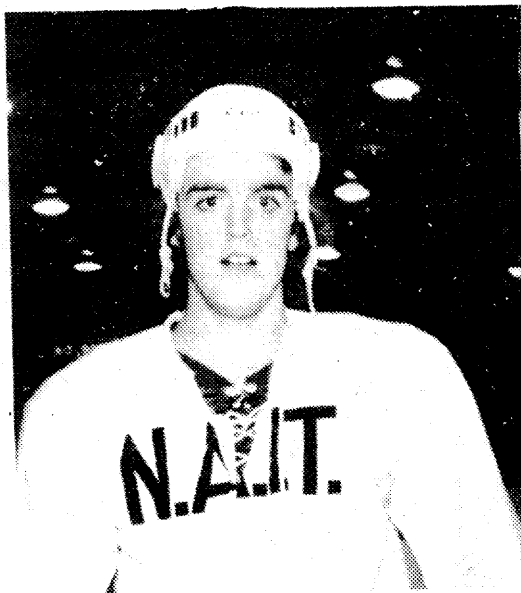
Rocky Smith

Dale Henwood

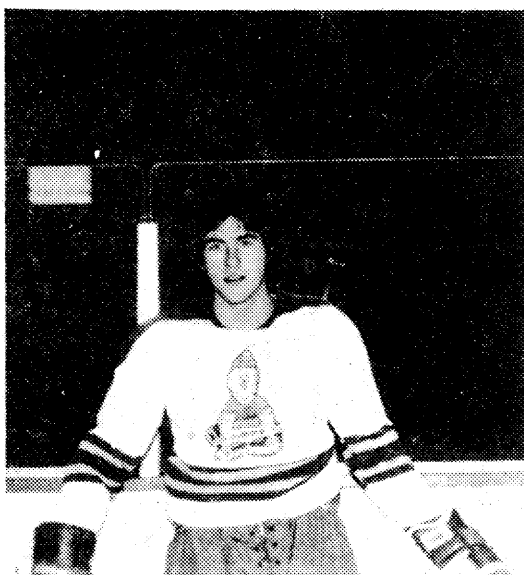

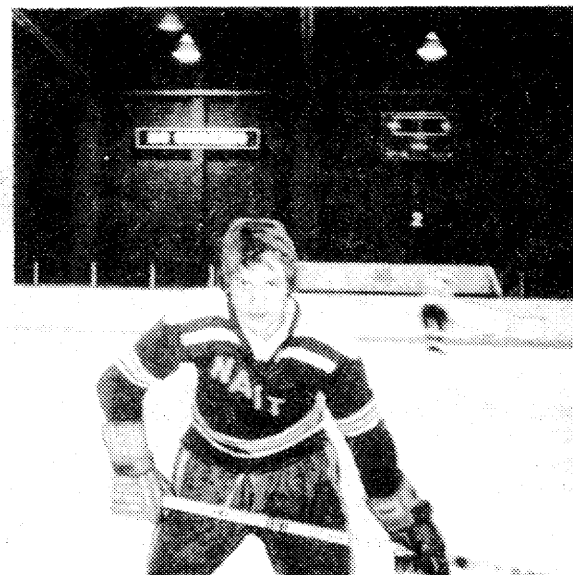
Pat Dittaro

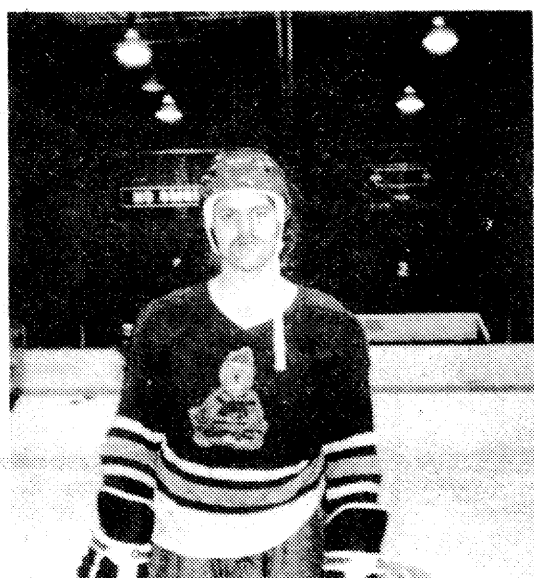
Bill Sutherland

A steady defenseman that can get the puck up the ice to the forwards, fits Bill. Bill is a first year player who has really improved and should be a leader on next year's team.



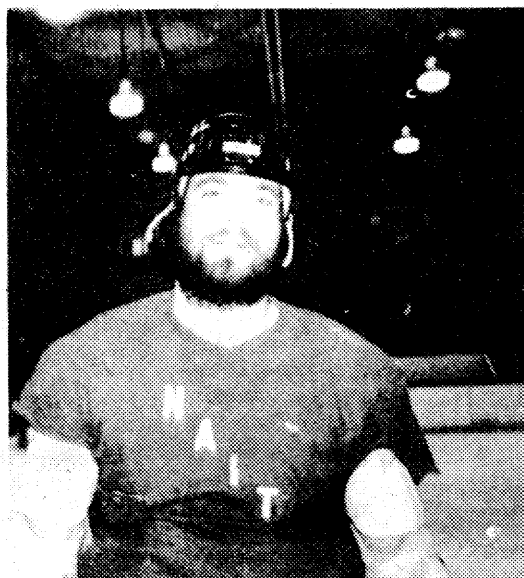
Mike Ferris

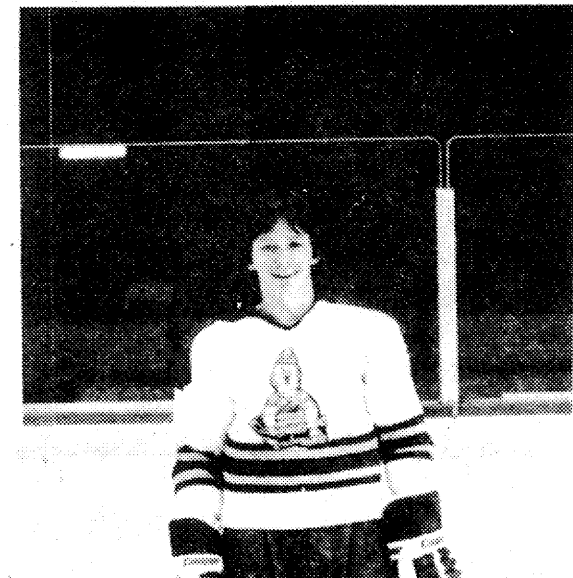
Bruce McCaskill

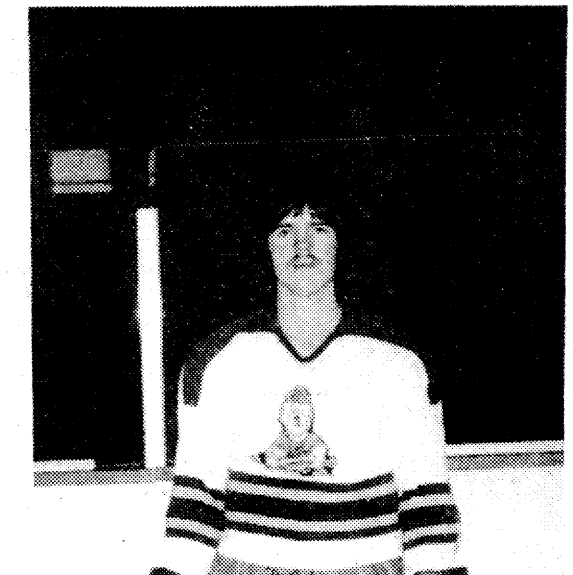
Wayne Jeske

LANGUAGE TEST USE CALLED
DISCRIMINATORY

EDMONTON (CUP) -- The University of Alberta student council is demanding that the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) either be applied to all foreign applicants or that it be repealed.

In a motion passed Jan. 24 the student council criticized the university's administration for deciding whether applicants should take the TOEFL on the basis of the country they come from rather than on their past academic record or past experience with the English language.

Buy Huntington, student vice-president academic, said the registrar automatically makes students applying from the West Indies or Africa take the test while applicants from New Zealand, Australia, United States or Britain are waved by.

The motion calls for a re-evaluation of the TOEFL which would make the academic history of applicants and their experience with English more prominent in determining whether they take the test.

The council's motion also rebuked the university registrar for using TOEFL as a basis for denying admission to many students. Huntington said administrators of TOEFL say test results should only be considered as a relative indication of English proficiency and shouldn't be used as a basis for admission.

Huntington also said many Canadian citizens whose last name sounded "foreign" had to take the test even though they had studied only in Canadian schools.

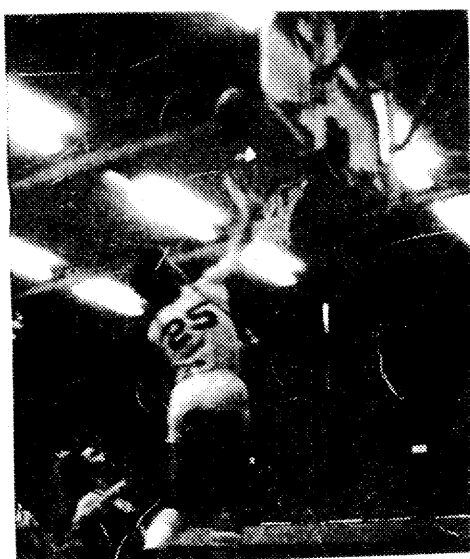

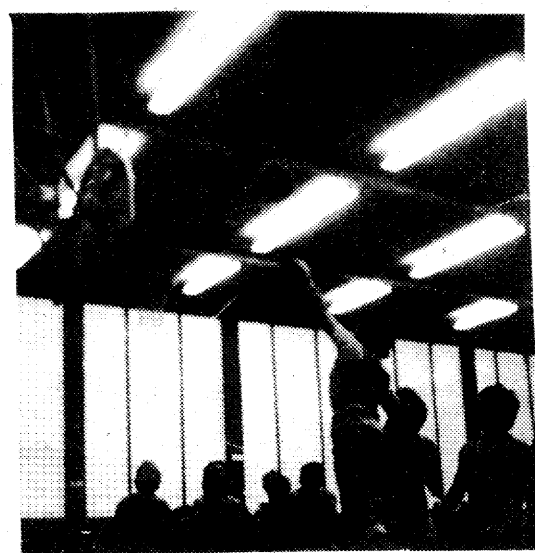
It's Up! It's Good!

look south. We proved we can put people on the moon or let them live underneath the sea. WE can beat any single problem by itself. Nothing we can't do if we challenge the single problem.

Putting Them On

The condom, or prophylactic, should be put on before there is any contact between the penis and the vaginal area. This is important, as it is possible for small amounts of semen to escape from the penis even before orgasm.

Unroll the prophylactic gently onto the erect penis, leaving about a half of an inch projecting beyond the tip of the penis to receive the male fluid (semen). 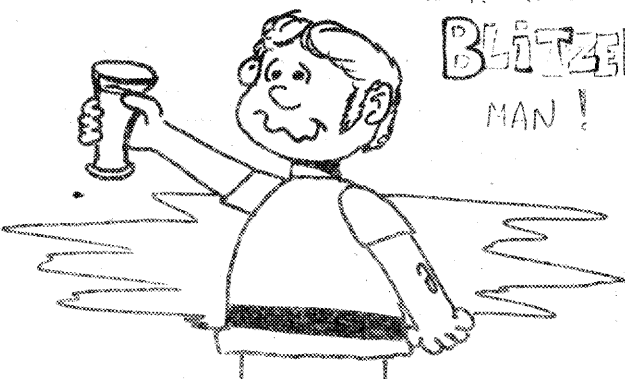

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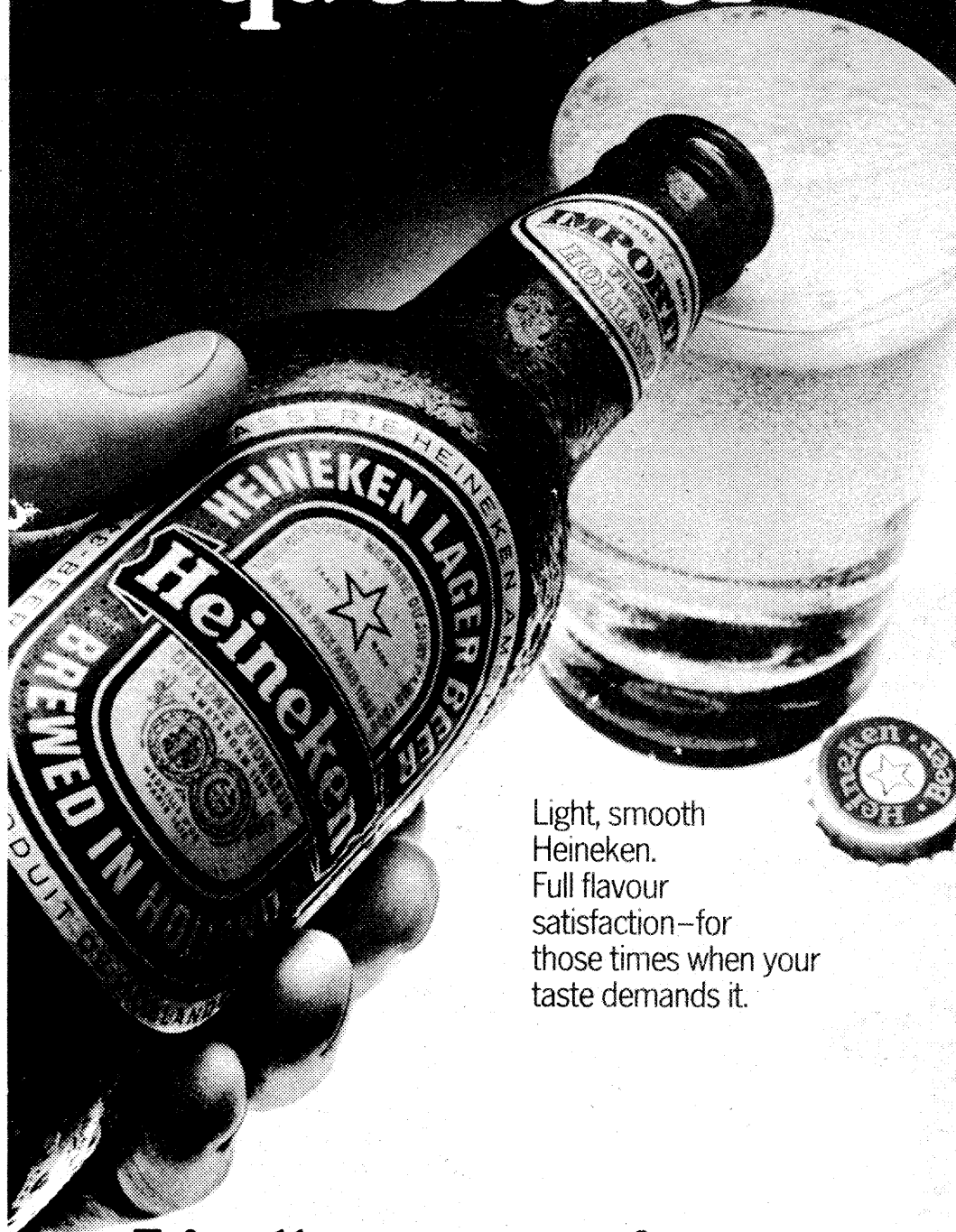
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
