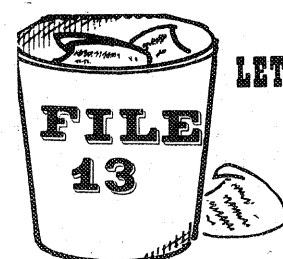
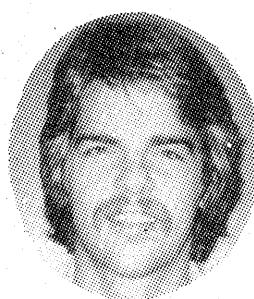

STUDENTS WIN FIRST ROUND OF B.C. TUITION BATTLE

VANCOUVER (CUP) --Students at Simon Fraser University have won the first stage of a fight with the university and the B.C. government over a 25 per cent tuition fee increase levied last April.

B.C. Justice Macdonald ruled Jan. 5 in favour of a hearing for the SFU injunction which would halt collection of the tuition increase and force the university to return fees already collected. The students' society is contesting the increase on the grounds that the university, which has the sole right to set tuition fees, was forced into the increase by budgetary pressure from the provincial government.

Macdonald ruled that the Nov. 16 injunction in fact dealt with an issue that greatly concerns the community at large, and should receive a closed hearing later this month to decide if the case should go to open hearings. The justice said the increase could be an injury to potential students at the university.

If the injunction passes, it will set a precedent for students in their fight against tuition fee increases, which are expected in more than half of the country's provinces in the next year.

The Simon Fraser students have received moral and financial support for their court case from the student councils at B.C.'s two other universities. The B.C. Student Federation and the national Union of Students also support the Simon Fraser action.

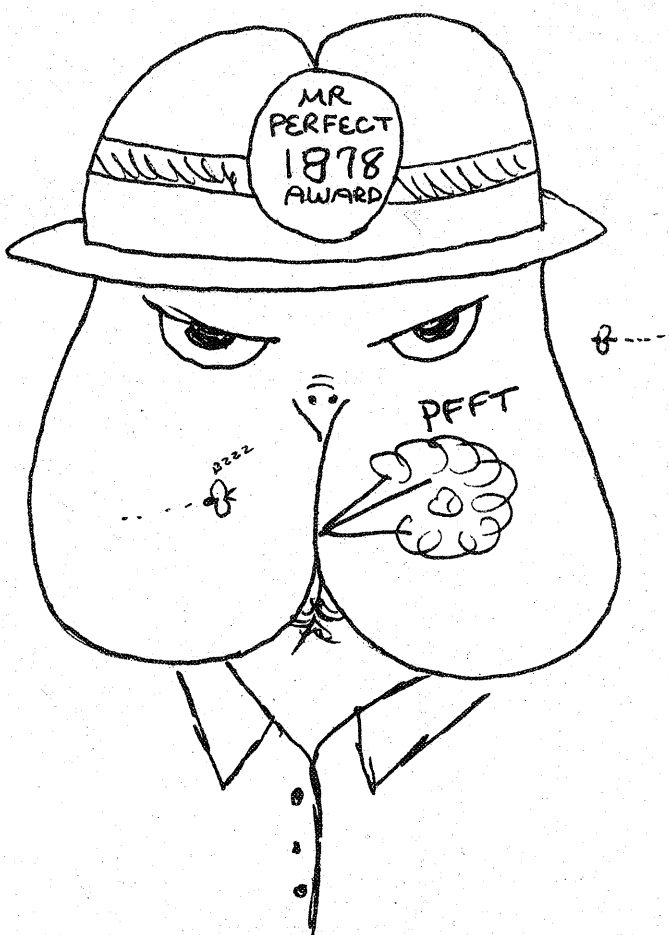
Item: If you're dying to see a decent flick but can't get through the lineups of the three BIG ones in town, check out the Goodbye-Girl at the Westmount.

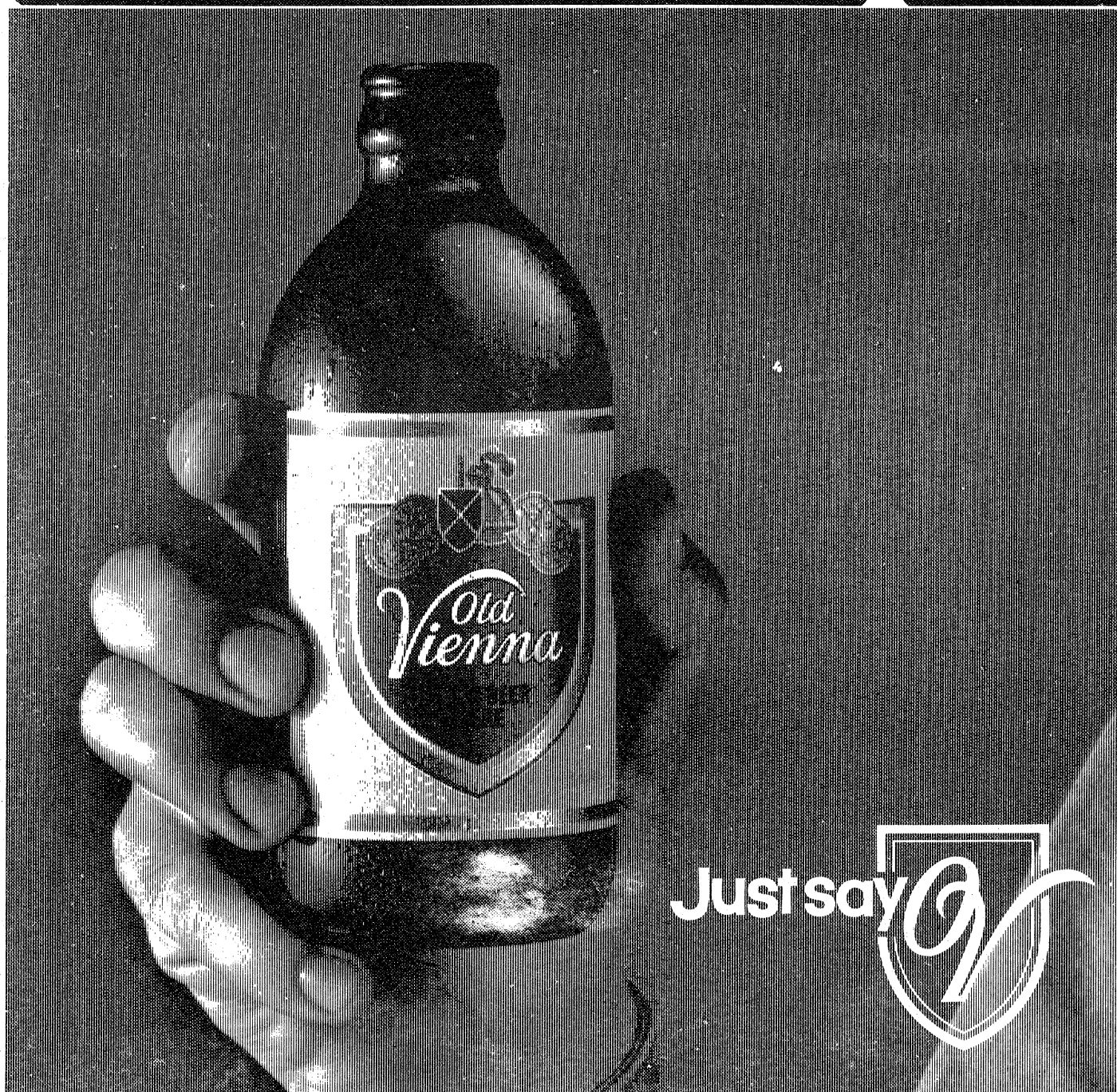
The tight checking that the Ooks displayed will serve them in good stead as they headed down the stretch in search of a playoff bid.

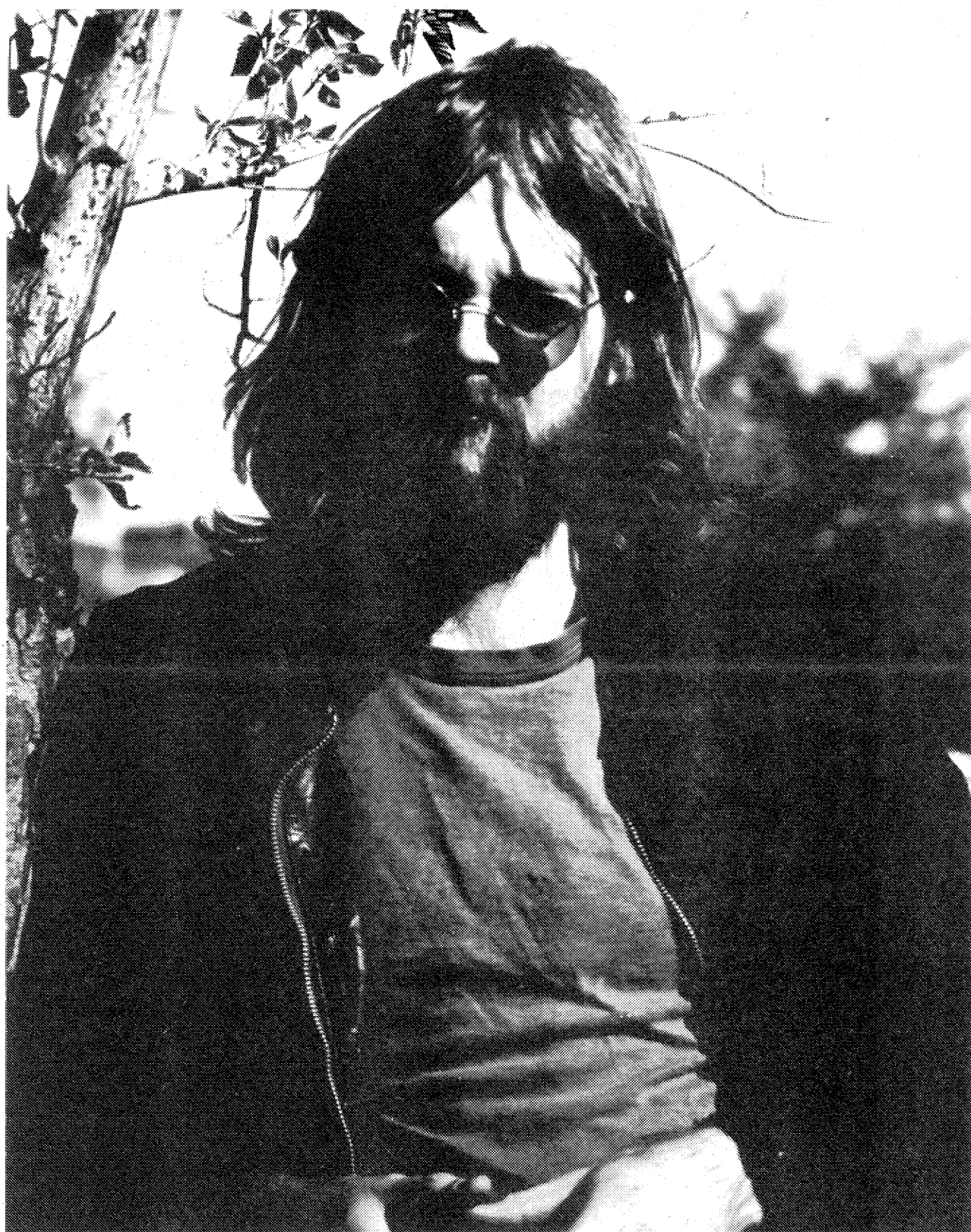

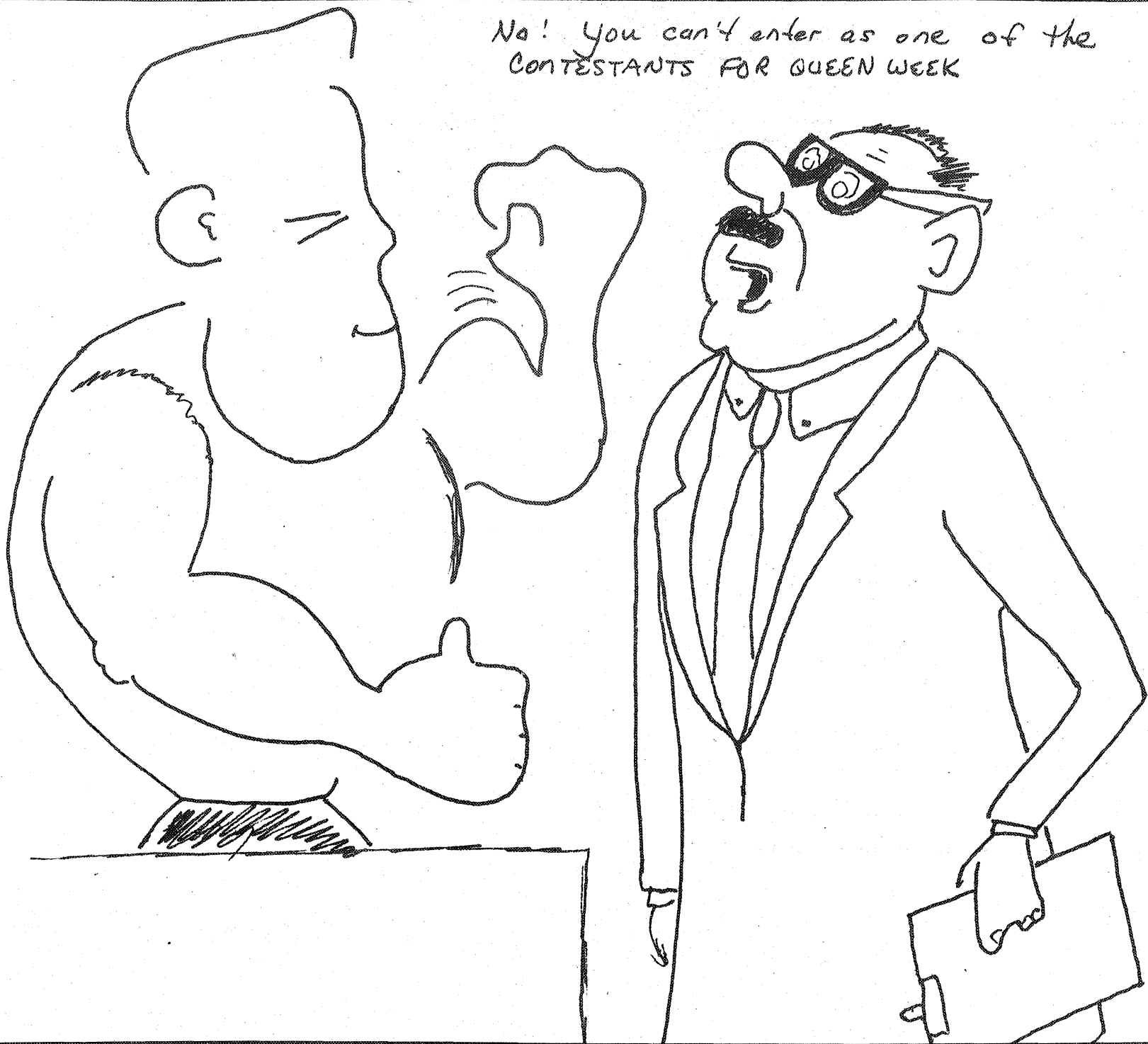

SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS

The game was very fast and exciting, and, despite the fact that the Ooks worked hard and played well as a team, they still lost to the first place Vikings.

The Ookpiks started quick, forcing a turnover on the first shift and counted a goal after only 14 seconds. Camrose came back and netted a "cheap" goal only 22 seconds later to dampen the Ooks high spirits. Shortly after the Vikings went in front 2-1 only to have the NAIT team count two more before the period ended. In the first period the Ooks played the body, skated and hustled, and generally took the play to the Vikings.

In the second period the Vikings scored 2 unanswered goals, the second one, perhaps the key goal of the game, came on a rebound with 31 seconds to play. Late in the second period the momentum shifted towards CLC as the Ooks backed off momentarily and allowed the Vikings more time to set up and break out of their zone.

Another key goal was scored by the Vikings late in the third period while they were short handed. That put them ahead 5-3 but the Ooks got a powerplay goal less than two minutes later to draw to within one.

The final goal was scored into an empty net, the fifth time this season the Ooks have been scored upon in that manner.

Overall, the Ookpiks have played their best hockey of the season since the Christmas break despite dropping both games.

Saturday and Sunday afternoons (2:00 pm) the Ooks entertain SAIT and MRC respectively at the NAIT Arena as they battle for a play-off position.

WOMEN

SUE SCHOOL

FOR SEXUAL

DISCRIMINATION

SAN FRANCISCO (HER SAY -CUP)--A Yale University undergraduate student has won the right to sue her school for sexual discrimination in U.S. District Court.

Six persons had initially sued the school, claiming they had suffered discrimination because instructors sought sexual favours.

However, U.S. Magistrate Arthur Latimer ruled that only one of the six, Pamela Price, could continue with the suit in District Court. In his ruling, Latimer said: "It is perfectly reasonable to maintain that academic advancement conditioned upon submission to sexual demands constitutes sex discrimination in education."

The suit will be the first in federal court against a university for sex discrimination under U.S. education laws. If it is found guilty, the university could lose all federal funding.

BLOOD DONOR CLINIC- There will be no "Blood Cup" award as tech names were not taken at the Blood Donor Clinic.

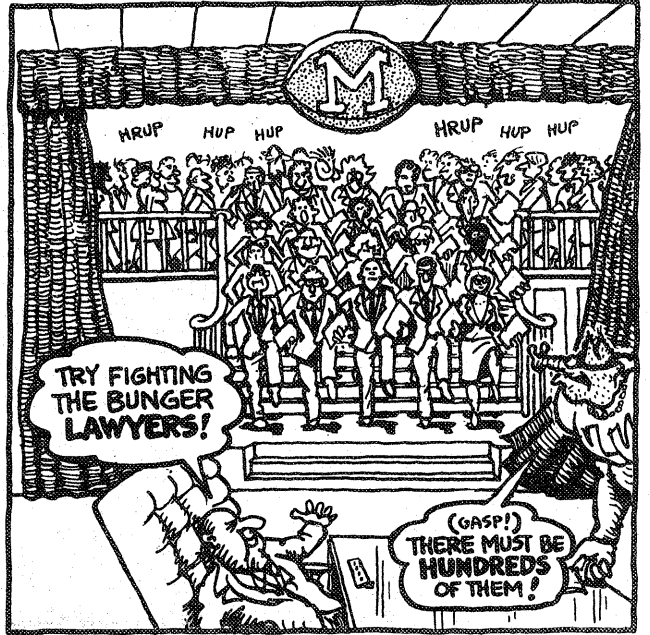
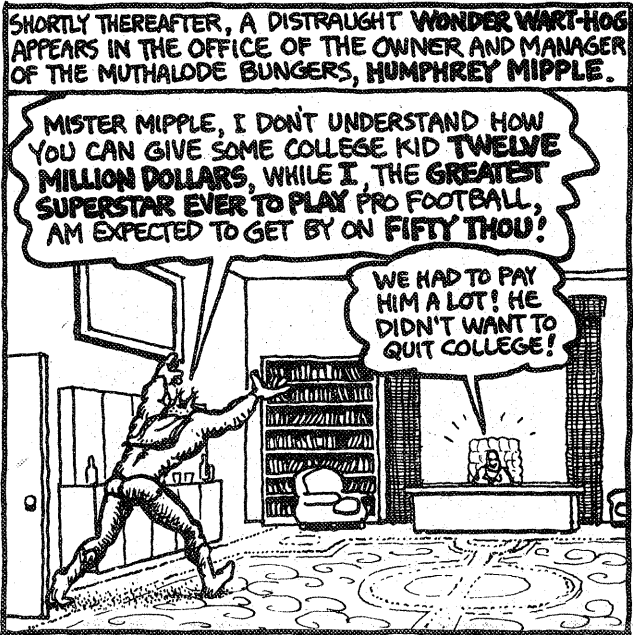
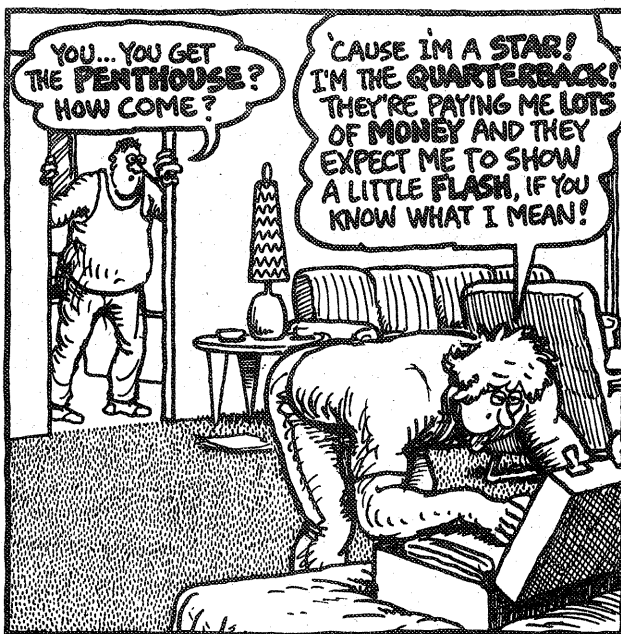

How to talk about drinking & driving

to your teenagers

We all know going out is fun, and no parent wants to take away those good times. But these days, with teenagers in and out of cars so much, it's crucial that they understand the dangers of drinking and driving, and that they can avert potential trouble by making the right decisions.

First, set your son or daughter straight on this often-misunderstood fact: beer, wine and spirits—in excess, all three are just as dangerous on the road.

A good way of avoiding trouble is to plan ahead. Suggest that your teenagers review their evening before going out. If they see drinking involved, far better to leave the car at home than to take chances later behind the wheel.

Far better also to say no to a drink, to refuse to drive, or to turn down a lift with an impaired friend than to go along with the crowd and maybe regret it.

You can support your teenagers and give them confidence by letting them know that if they ever need help you'll go for them, pay their cab or do whatever is necessary to get them home safely.

Most important, be a good example. Never drive if you've had even one drink too many. Better still, don't let it come to that. Know your limit and stay within it.

to your parents

If you're not of legal drinking age, don't touch a drop. But if you are, and you drive, then you're old enough to do your part in reaching an agreement with your parents on the subject.

Sure they worry. Because even if you don't drink, others in your group may. The friend driving you home one night may have had too much.

Show that you're equally concerned. Get serious. For instance, what have you read lately about the dangers of drinking and driving? Do you know how much beer, wine or spirits your body can safely handle before your judgment becomes impaired? Do you know the law in your province? And what happens if you break it?

Get the facts and discuss them calmly. Then take the initiative and propose a few family ground rules.

No driving if you've been drinking beyond your limit. (We'll send you a valuable free chart on responsible limits if you write us.) No riding with a friend who's been drinking. And convince your parents if a situation ever turns dicey, you won't hesitate to phone for help.

Finally, remind your parents you're concerned for their safety, too, and that the family rules on drinking and driving apply to them, as well.
