UNIVERSITY OF ALBERTA TO HOST INTERNATIONAL GYMNASTICS COMPETITION

The University of Alberta Department, in conjunction with Coca-Cola Ltd. is pleased to announce the first Pacific Rim Gymnastics Competition to be held at the Edmonton Coliseum May 14 at 2:00 P.M

The event will feature Canada's top gymnasts competing against world-class athletes from China, Australia and the U.S.A.

It is hoped that this will become an annual affair the will expand to include other countries such as Mexico and Japan.

Upon finishing the competition in Edmonton, the athletes move on to Vancouver, May 17 for the second instalment of the tournament.

Dates of arrival in Edmonton have new been established with Australia arriving May 10, China arriving May 11, the U.S.A. and Canada arriving May 12. The Judges arrive May 13. All official members of the competition will be staying at the Chateau Lacombe.

At this time only athletes from Canada and Australia have been confirmed but it is known that the U.S.A. will be selecting their team immediately following their National Championships (May 5-6) and that their top gymnasts will be here. China's men's team is currently ranked in the top three in the world with their women ranked slightly below that.

IN THE CITY

NOTICE TO COMMENCE BARGAINING

- 30 to 90 days preceeding expiry date of agreement or longer period if provided for in collective agreement.

-notice to commence bargaining must be served at least 10 days before the time fixed in the notice for commencement of bargaining within 20 days.

AUTHORITY TO BARGAIN

¶the employer must appoint a person resident in Alberta with authority

1. to bargain collectively
2. to conclude a collective agreement
3. to sign a collective agreement on behalf of the employer and shall notify the union.

CONCILIATION

-if parties fail to reach an agreement either party may apply to the Minister for appointment of conciliation commissioner.

-upon receipt of request the Minister must decide within 5 days whether or not to appoint.

-if conciliation commissioner fails to affect settlement within 20 days (longer period if agreed upon or fixed by Minister) he must make one of the three following proposals:

1. that the Minister appoint a conciliation board
2. that the Minister refer recommendation of concilia-

- tion commissioner to parties
3. that parties decide whether to strike or lockout.

CONCILIATION BOARD

¶when a conciliation board is unable to affect a settlement within 20 days of the date the board is established or such longer time as may be agreed by the parties or fixed by the Minister, the conciliation board shall make recommendations and send them to the Minister.

The Minister shall refer the recommendations of the conciliation commissioner or board to the parties and require them to accept or reject the recommendations and to notify him of their decision before a date fixed by him.

No Government supervised vote is required at this stage.

STRIKE VOTE

¶where a union rejects the recommendations of a conciliation commissioner or conciliation board, it may notify the Board of Industrial Relations that it wishes a strike vote to be supervised by the Board. The vote is to be supervised by the Board not conducted as in the previous Act.

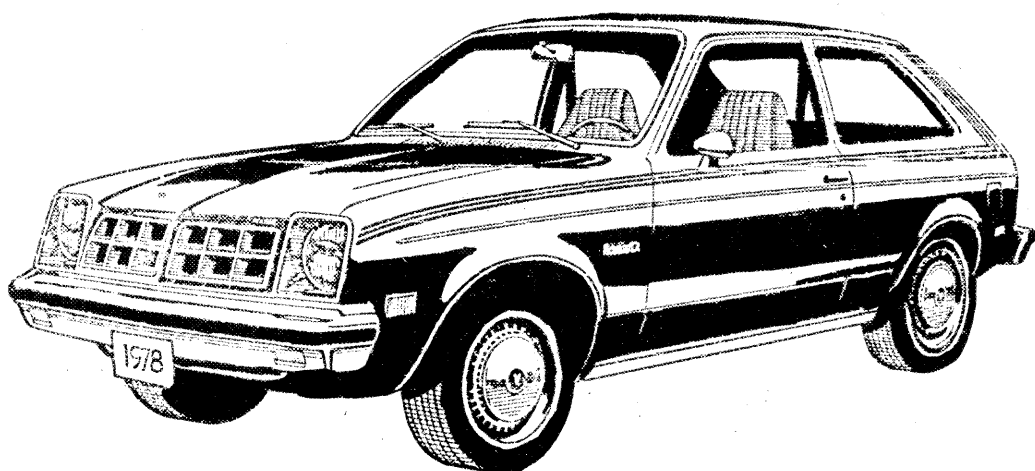

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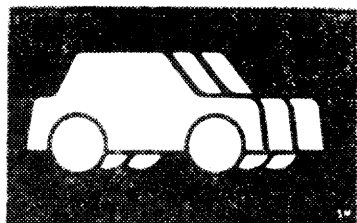

CAPITAL GAINS TAX ON THE DISPOSITION OR EXCHANGE OF PROPERTY

The red tape jungle of the present government has caused such a state of confusion that it no longer is able to interpret or define its own regulations.

On March 31, 1977, Donald Macdonald, after a considerable number of meetings with myself, introduced a rollover clause so that farmers and businessmen would no longer have to pay a capital gains tax on the sale of one parcel of property for the repurchase of another one of equal value.

Recently it has come to light that the Rulings Division of Revenue Canada is so rigidly defining the regulations so as to nullify the major intent. As an example, I recently received a letter from the Rulings Division respecting three farmers in my riding which stated in part, "the replacement of farmland used in a wheat farming business with farmland used in a dairy farming business would not qualify." The statement clearly contravenes many decisions that I have obtained for farmers from the Rulings Division of Revenue Canada in earlier rulings given since the end of March 1977.

During the past week the government has changed its position twice in this regard; first, telling opposition Member that they would go back to the original concept that a farm was a farm without concern for the specific enterprise, and then reversing their decision again to a rigid and specific position.

When I raised the question in the House of Commons on the 13th of April, 1978, we found that we had no Minister of National Revenue because he is now sitting in the Senate and the Government House Leader did not know who was the Acting Minister for Revenue Canada.

The flip-flop in defining the regulations are going to create a financial burden and embarrassment to many farmers who have already received a ruling, and the crass activities of this government makes what should have been a favourable piece of legislation a complete jungle of chaos.

EDMONTON HIRE A STUDENT FACT SHEET

Edmonton Hire A Student, formerly Operation Placement is a cooperative program designed to meet the summer employment needs of both the student and business community.

Specifically, Edmonton Hire A Student assists in the placement of post-secondary and secondary students in summer employment positions. In addition, the program promotes and satisfies the summer staff requirements of Edmonton and area businesses and helps to stimulate the development and operation of student-run businesses.

As a non-profit community service; we are sponsored by the Canada Employment & Immigration Commission; the provincial Department of Advanced Education and Manpower; the Edmonton Chamber of Commerce; the Edmonton Public School Board; the Edmonton Separate School Board; the Student's Unions of the University of Alberta, N.A.I.T. AND Grant MacEwan Community College; the U of A Administration, the N.A.I.T. Administration and the City of Edmonton.

To acquire an understanding of the actual mechanisms of the Edmonton office, it is best to view our collective efforts as comprising two major aspects. They are internal (Operations) and external (Student and Employer Relations). If this office is to be successful as a whole these two distinct sections require the closest possible liaison and cooperation.

The former aspect (Operations) comprises the job Information Centre where orders are posted, the actual student-client interviewing, the pre-screening and referral activity, the information dissemination area, the reception of job orders and student registration dissemination area, the reception of job orders and student registrations, client reception, telephone activity, and the clerical function.

The later (Student and Em-

ployer Relations) channels its activities into five specific areas: Promotions, Special Projects, Employer Relations, High School Visitations and Student Business Task forces, each headed by a Chairperson responsible for their respective program activities.

The success of Edmonton Hire A Student's promotional program depends largely on the public exposure and community awareness of the services we offer. Due to our limited budget, we rely heavily on the excellent support we receive from the public, news media and area businesses for sponsorship. We have been fortunate enough to appear on radio and television talk shows, arrange speaking engagements with service clubs, air public service announcements, place newspaper advertisements, etc. This community cooperation is vital to the quality of the service we give in return and is greatly appreciated.

Teams of trained employer relations people visit Edmonton businesses in order to survey their summer employment needs and explain our available services to the potential employers. In effect, they investigate and promote job possibilities.

Since Edmonton Hire A Student is a liaison between employers and students, we must also ensure similar exposure to the students. This is accomplished by means of our highly successful High School Visitations program. Trained student counsellors arrange creative job searching technique sessions in the city high schools and some colleges, acquainting the students with the rudiments of seeking and securing employment, preparation for job interviews and writing resumes. These informative sessions are made possible through the joint efforts of the Hire A Student program, the school boards and the guidance counsellors. This year, as well, counsellors will be

visiting junior high schools to conduct 'awareness seminars' designed primarily to inform these students of the realistic opportunities available to them in the summer months.

Edmonton Hire A Student also promotes and advises students interested in starting their own summer business. We assist by referring students to legal counsel and providing them with job referrals. These businesses, fully staffed and operated by students, offer a wide variety of services in such areas as landscaping and yard maintenance, construction, painting, roofing, concrete work and many more. Their success lies in the fact that they provide an immediate and quality service to Edmonton homeowners. Free estimates and referrals are available to anyone interested in using this service. The experience gained in operating these businesses has proven invaluable to the students in future careers.

Edmonton Hire A Student's main objective is to stimulate and satisfy student summer employment needs. Since many students and employers that register with our office have employment needs. Since many students and employers that register with our office have employment needs in areas other than Edmonton, we work in collaboration with other urban and rural student manpower offices located throughout the province. This cooperation proves beneficial to the students and employers for whom we operate.

Last year, over 12,000 students registered with our office and we received over 3,700 employer job orders. The result was placement of 6,436 students in summer jobs.

In 1978, we expect to register between 13 and 14 thousand post-secondary and secondary students. Over 14,000 potential employers will be contacted by mail. We will be making personal visits to at least 4,200 Edmonton

and area employers. With this kind of employer contact combined with a more professionally planned promotions program, Edmonton Hire A Student will attempt to place over 7,000 students in summer jobs. We will also attempt to continue in those areas which in the past have been marked with considerable success while trying to improve those areas which have not.

With our continually expanding program and the enthusiastic response we receive from business and the general public, we look to this year with great anticipation. However, our success will ultimately rely on the hard work and dedication supplied by the staff, the funding bodies, the students and the employers of Edmonton who have made Edmonton Hire A Student one of the most successful student employment programs in Canada.

TALKIN MONEY

Sometime before accepting a position with a company you may need to negotiate salary. This has to be done with tact, and the applicant should know the going rate for the position he/she is ready to accept.

You might be asked what your present salary is. It's to your advantage to tell the truth, most personnel officers know the salary rates of their competitors. Also, most employers will fire an employee if he/she is found lying, they just figure that the applicant is not to be trusted. Remember that the application forms say something to the effect that. "All the information above is true to the best of my knowledge" and then you sign your name.

Even after you've been hired, they can dismiss you if they find lies in the form, according to law (and the best of my knowledge) the contract never existed.

If you are asked how much you'd like to be paid, it's best not to mention a specific figure. If you quote too high a figure they may not be in a position to hire you. You'll be better off to say that you are flexible about salary, you can always negotiate, but do not push too hard, watch for signs that the interviewer has made his/her final offer and stop right there. Once you've been working and you've proved your value to the company you can always ask for a raise.

When negotiating salary do not forget to ask about such things as pension plans, health insurance, life insurance, and any other benefits which might be of interest to you. These forms are a vital part of the salary, it's not only the dollar figure that matters.

Above all show that your interests lie in other areas, personal growth and achievement for example. Tell how you want to contribute to the company's well

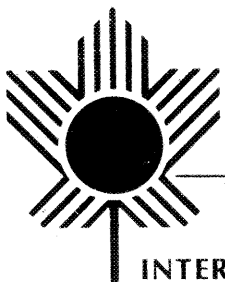

and light are two essential ingredients for our live. The sun has
always been held in high esteem, attracting worship from many
ancient civilizations. For example, in Ancient Egypt, the sun god
RE was regarded by the people as the most powerful of the gods.

Today, while we do not worship the sun as a god, we are realizing
more and more the importance of the sun's energy--in the form of
direct sunlight, wind falling water and biomass.

As the non-renewable souces of energy such as oil, natural gas
and coal are seen toa be approaching their limits of supply, we are
turning to our old friend the sun.

The sun's energy comes to us free, in non-polluting in its use and
is available in varying quantities everywhere on earth. There are
many possibilities for harnessing the sun's energy to heat our home
and water, our office buildings and warehouses, our swimming
pools and greenhouses.

What is needed now is increased work on solar technology and
heightened public awareness of its necessity.

WHAT THE SUN CAN DO

In Frederiction, N.B. a mechanical engineer has built his own
solar domestic water heating system for \$1,500.

A couple in Flesherton, Ontario has reduced their annual heating
bill by 30 percent through the use of 192 sq. ft. of south facing
windows. The windows are triple glazed and have thermal drapes
and insulated shutters to pull across at night.

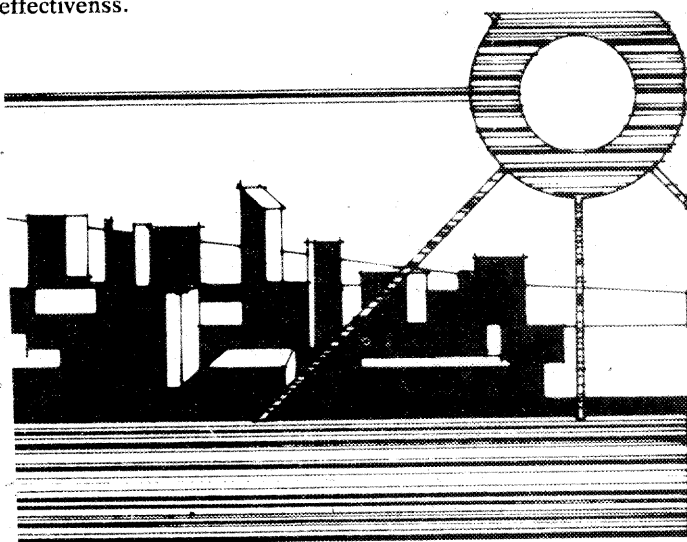
In Winnipeg a family has designed their own home with vertical
warm air collectors on the south side. By combining active and
passive solar heating systems, increased insulation and a

down-draft wood burner, they hope to keep fuel bills to a minimum.

A floating home in Vancouver is designed to be heated by a heat
pump with assistance from solar. About 500 coubic feet of
Glauber's salts will be stowed for heat storage purposes under the
deck.

CANADIAN SOLAR DEVELOPMENT

The National Research Council of Canada has taken an active part
in the research and development of solar energy applications across
Canada and, through the agency of its Solar Energy Project, has
funded the installation of many solar space and hot water systems in
residential, commerical an industrial buildings. The Division of
Building Research has been responsible for an on-going monitoring
program of these solar installations in order to appraise their
effectivenss.

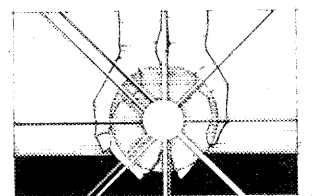


WAHT YOU CAN DO ON SUN DAY

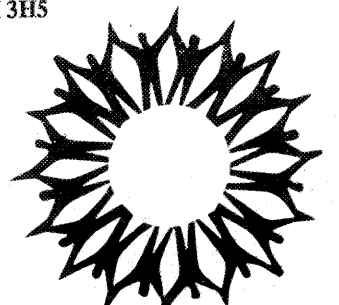

Commissionaires Corner



Persons attending any sports actions and using lockers should attempt to hand-in any expensive or personally valuable items to a known visitor or to responsible sports attendants. Wallets, watches, rings, etc., could require more protection in lockers.

A point worth mentioning, people have reported note books, lost or stolen from hallways when attending class or having lunch. This is a poor habit and detection and recovery is impossible.

Report lost or stolen items to Commissionaires. This will enable a record to be maintained which will indicate frequency and area.

MAIN STORES have a Lost and Found department. Commissionaires dutifully turn in any found or suspected stolen items from this department. Checks made to this area may provide some recovery.

Loss of personal property from lockers, by theft, has been reported.

Some of these thefts might have been prevented, had the persons involved been aware of the use and design of NAIT lockers.

The following information is presented for the protection of locker contents.

There are two types of lockers in use at NAIT:

(a) Storage of study material and equipment during class periods;
(b) Storage of personal items during participation in sports activities.

Neither of these two types of lockers can be considered SECURITY VAULTS. Expensive and valuable items should not be considered safe or secure when stored for even short periods. Entry can be achieved although locks are fastened.

During any class period, the lockers cannot be completely relied on for safekeeping. It would be wise to carry valuable items from class to class. Longer periods-involving overnight or weekends - should be avoided.

Some cases reported revealed an uncertainty as to whether the lock was snapped shut.

A quartet with Chick Corea provided the most potent and impressive creation of musical perfection.

It has become standard to find Getz absorbing the challenge of

placing himself in unfamiliar and sometimes provocative musical environments.

Getz, now 50 years of age, has displayed in recent years a preference for surrounding himself with the younger generation of musicians. His newly formed quintet is no exception. Andy Laverne a 29 year old implements the use of grand piano Rhodes electric and string synthesizer. Efraim Toro, veteran of five years' study in classical percussion, and between these two Billy Hart, the drummer in his fourth year with Getz. Accompanied by Rick Laird on bass.

The result of this combination is a two album set recorded in Montreux Switzerland. New ideas wider horizons were developed in the direction of electricity. Getz himself makes use of a device called an Echoplex. A sophisticated echochamber which allows the users phrases to be repeated while he builds further upon them. For a player with Getz's ability it is an enchanting fusion of sound.

Getz a perfectionist in the true sense of the word has never been totally satisfied with his playing. He regards himself as "a pretty sufficient saxophone player" an understatement to say the least. Accepting change easily and viewing his musical extensions as stretching. "Stretching is different", Stan says. "I like that word. Pushing, reaching, grabbing...that destroys music, I think. It takes away your relaxation". The purpose and the result.

DENTICARE FOR CHILDREN

Despite this province's wealth and the billions of dollars witting in the Heritage Savings Trust Fund, the Alberta government has been very reluctant to spend money on a variety of health and social programs. Indeed, with some of these programs, Alberta is one of the last holdouts among the provinces.

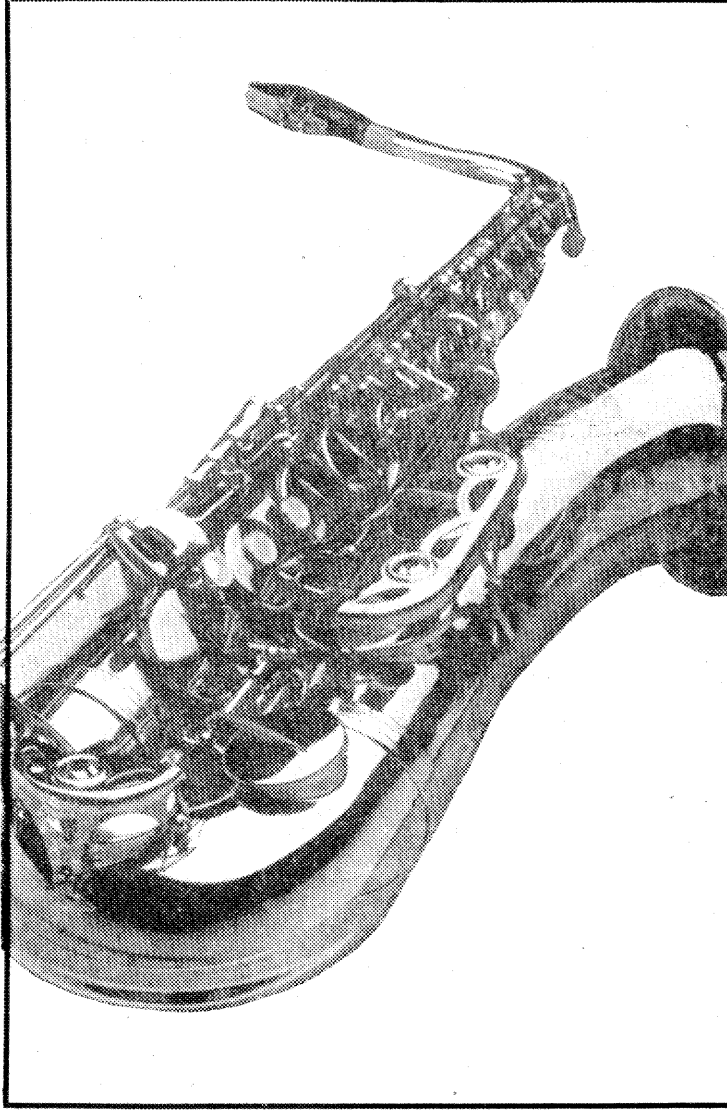
A good case in point is a program of dental care for children. Eight of the ten province in Canada have adopted a denticare plan for children in this province should have access to quality dental care regardless of the income of their parents, I have recently introduced two private member's bills designed to establish a dental care plan for children.

Fill 241, The Dental Health Workers' Act. and Bill 243, the Dental Health Services Act, are patterned on enabling legislation passed by the Saskatchewan new Democratic party Government four years ago which led to the implementation of a dental plan for children between the ages of three and twelve.

The bills would permit the government to pay for the provision of dental service to children, and would provide for the training of dental nurses to perform many dental tasks under the general supervision of a dentist. More complicated work would be referred to a dentist.

The Saskatchewan plan has proved to be immensely successful in providing good quality dental care at reasonable cost to the taxpayer, without overburdening the province's dentists. A similar plan in Alberta would benefit at least 275,000 children here. Unfortunately, there is no indication the provincial government intends to support these bills or to introduce any kind of denticare program of its own.

When one considers the relatively modest cost of such a program and the life-long benefits it would provide the children who would be covered, it is hard to understand why the Alberta government is so reluctant to get in step with the rest of the country in setting up a denticare plan for children.
