

Death is a difficult, if not an impossible subject to deal with. It is hard at best for most of us to face our own demise, much less watch, describe, analyze, and portray that of someone else.

Yet Theatre 3's recent production of "Shadow Box" dealt with just that, and more, as it projected the very essence of death and it's effects on those touched by it's all consuming finality.

David Lovett's set design depicted "Three Cottages On The Grounds Of A Large Hospital". Using various levels of wooden platforms surrounded by sand, and a minimum of props, the adult sand box took shape.

Against this back drop, the intricate games of those dying physically, and their emotionally

ex - wife. Jim deserves to be complemented for producing a multi - facited character with unswerving reality within himself, and his interactions with others.

Without a doubt, Linda Rabinouith's "Beverly" was the perfect partner for Brian's Oral Sword play with his ex-wife. Her costume itself was outragious, but Linda's voice and mannerisms made the character zany, yet seasoned with tragic tenderness and believability.

Their neighbors in the last "Cottage" were comprised of; Agnes and her parapolegic mother Felicity (Barbara Reese). More often than not, her openly crass honesty kept *Patricia Bell* in a constant state of nervousness

perishing triends and relitives unfolded.

Emotions changed rapidly as the different characters portrayed their various relationships, feelings, and outlooks on life, love, and inevitably death.

In Cottage One, Joe Vassos played the difficult role of "Joe" although resigned to his pointless end, he was the catylist for moments of sheer electricity between his son Steve, and Joan Hurley's notable portrayal of his high-strung wife Maggie.

Cottage Two housed the less than successful writer Brian. Jim McQueen's performance as this witty and wordy intellectual attempting to rationalize his untimely finish, as well as dealing with both his male lover, and his

and tention as her sadly neglected and devoted daughter. *Miss Bell* personifies the agony felt by Agness with frightening intensity.

The final scene was a quick collage of feelings, thoughts, and questions. The timing of the dialogue, like the finished product, was boglling.

Theatre 3 (as was "Shadow Box") is under the direction of Keith Digby, and is rapidly becoming recognized as a proffesional and versitile company, comparable to the Citadel.

Their next production is "The Primary English Class". November 21 - 25.

People often describe me as some kind of Ed Sullivan show carnival freak. They say I imitate conga drums, flute sounds, drummers and bass players. They make me sound like a mimic instead of a singer. But except for the occasional visual resemblance, everything is handled in the context of the music in such a way that its only music.

I scat sing, but I don't use the some vowels and combinations of vowels that the bebop singers used. I use my own sounds guitar - like, electronic, grunts, hisses, ahhhh's -- I like soft sounds. I don't think of the instrument when I'm doing it. I just take the conga sound or whatever and make it into something different.

Two years ago in 1976 Al Jarreau faced his first large audience at the Montreux Jazz Festival. Jarreau had with him from the USA, Tom Canning. A pianist expected to accompany him at the festival were some European studio musicians. three hours before show time they called to say they decided to play with someone else.

Jarreau and Canning went on stage and played a duo. After three standing ovations during the set-Jarreau could say the trip was more than worthwhile.

Al Jarreau is a singer of the extra ordinary. A son of a preacher and whose mother was a pianist. Al preaches in the barroom and the stage. Jarreau's message is simple. Everyone can enjoy life with just the simplicity of trying to understand your neighbour.

"All Fly Home" is Jarreuas fourth album. The albums which preceded this included one double live album, "Look to the Rainbow", "Glow" and his first "We Got By".

Tom Canning is with Jarreau on his new album. They collaborated their talents together on some of the songs. One which stands out in mind is "Thinking About It Too".

Joe Correro starts this song out on the right foot with a prominent drum beat. He is soon joined by Jarreau and group. The song has free flowing rythm throughout and this is relized by Jarreau's vocals and Lee Ritenour's guitar.

McCartney and Lennon's "She's Leaving Home" leaves you gasping for air after Al Jarreau finishes.

He does the vocals and changes what once was Peppermusic into

music by Jarreau.


"(Sitting on) The Dock of the Bay" is another song Jarreau reintroduces in a casual fashion.

Jarreau has had some important fore - runners people like Sarah Vahghan, Ella Fitzgerald, Billie Holiday, Jon Hendricks, and many others.

Jarreau in his own style has introduced to the music industry and lovers an all new style of singing.

LYNYRD SKYNYRD -"Skynyrd's First and...Last"

This album serves as a fitting monument to the talents of Lynyrd Skynyrd. It is a compilation of works' recorded mostly between 1970 and 1972, and is of the same superior calibre as their first two albums, "Pronounced Leh - nerd Skin - nerd" and "Second Helping". ("Second Helping" was the album containing their biggest hit, "Sweet Home Alabama".)

As most rock fans know, the group met a tragic end a few months ago when the plane that was carrying them to their next concert date crashed, killing Ron-

nie Van Zant (lead vocals), Steve Gaines (guitar), and his sister Cassie Gaines (back - up vocals).

Listening feeling, knowing that the band was just starting out when these songs were recorded. They had a very successful but all too short career ahead of them.

As far as the album itself goes, the songs recorded here contain the soaring guitar work typical of Skynyrd. Most of the lyrics pertain to simple themes. The album's two best songs are "Things Goin' On", a social commentary about life in the ghetto, and "Was I Right or Wrong". This song tells the tale of a young man who sets out to find fame and fortune as a rock star. When he "makes the big time" he returns home, only to find that his parents are both dead. The song sounds as if it were an autobiography of Van Zant's life; surprisingly, it's not.

Lynyrd Skynyrd has always been among the most well - liked and respected of Southern bands. Their last album shows why. They will be missed.



Do you remember where the piano was. Sure in the smoke filled front corner.

At that corner sits Tom Waits. In his left hand is a burning cigarette Under his right is the piano. In his voice is a frog.

Flanking Tom on both sides are musicianslike Pete Christlieb on tenor sax, Jim Hughart on upright base and Bill Goodwin on drums.

These musicians if you're not familiar are golden of the jazz era. Tom Waits is not.

Tom is introducing ballads done with a run of bluesy piano chords accompanied by pros. Waits is a pro.

First time when you listen to either of his six albums you'll be surprised.

Listen a little longer and you'll find Tom brings to mind and illustrates life which occurs in some unusual individual days.

On "Blue Valentine" the music is crisp clean and clear. Waits is a purest down deep. This album was recorded like his last three. One simple 2 - track tape direct to master with all musicians in the studio playing simultaneously. That includes orchestra and accompanyment.

Most musicians will tape on a 16 - track machine.

Waits carries you through delerious nights to nostalgia filled

Like the first song featured on this album, "Somewhere" (from the West Side Story)" has got a sentimentality that wasn't captured on the original production. Waits fills it out with orchestra and a piano.

Maybe you've heard "Ol' 55" played by the Eagles "On the Boarder Album'' that's an early Tom Waits.

Waits sings a bit of bebop and always includes a strong company of professionals to build his somewhat humourous and

exalting lyrics.

Waits was a guest - star on the "America 2 Night" show before it was discontinued.

Some say Waits is ahead of his time as was said about "America 2 Night". If he is so far ahead there must be many listeners in the same state as this is Tom's







TELECOM'S CABARET--AVERAGE



Harlequin. Mmhh? Don't they write those teany bopper romance books? Guess so, but the band and the books should not be associated by any means.







PRIM



With the release of Prism's second album, See Forever Eyes, a powerful blend of rich, soaring harmonies and torrid, hard driving rock, all the promise and potential of Prism has been delivered.

Their initial LP, Prism, in addition to being certified platinum in their native Canada (a first for a Canadian act), containtwo charted singles, "Spaceship Superstar" and "Take Me To the Kaptin." Combined with a pair of FM anthems, "It's Over" and "Open Soul Surgery," the debut album launched Prism into the ranks of audience favorites in such far - flung bastions of hardrock as St. Louis, Detroit and Los Angeles. In short, wherever Prism toured, they left behind a swath of sales figures and rave reviews

On See Forever Eyes, Prism's five members, Ron Tabak (lead

vocals), Rocket Norton (drums), Allen Harlow (rhythm guitar - bass), John Hall (keyboards), and Lindsay Mitchell (lead guitar), together with producer Bruce Fairbairn, labored from December 1977 to March 1978, logging time in three different studios to emerge with an LP that would reflect a variety of material that would best showcase their collective talents.

From the roadhouse rock of "Nickels and Dimes" to the synthesized majestic grandeur of "See Forever Eyes," to the tender ballad "You're Like the Wind," to the sci - fi imagery of "Just Like Me" (a song about cloning), the album bristles with authority and sopistication encompassing the diverse musical spectrum that is Prism.

Look into Prism and See Forever Eyes. occasionally it involves and instructs. One such rare occasion is now taking place at Northern Light Theatre.

"Rare Occasion" is a biographical piece about a woman who has been placed on the same pinnacle of success as Isadora Duncan and Sarah Bernhardt. She performed to audiences on two continents, and was loved by men of the stature of Yves Montand and Charles Asenover. Her name; "Lamonde Piaf".

To try and portray simply one aspect of her life would be a project worthy of any performer. But director Scott Swan has blended both the caberet singer and the woman into a vibrant tapestry called, simply "Piaf".

The actress on whom the entire weight of the production falls, is best described as perfect. She does not play the role of Edith Piaf, but rather becomes Edith Piaf. Her name; Kathy Michael McGlynn.

One finds one hypnotised as she feels and projects the emotions, if not the very essance, of a woman blessed with both laughter and love. Miss McGylnn must not only act, but dance, and sing. Sing she does in a languages with the resonance and depth of Streisand.

Kathy was kind enough to meet

a group of us after her performance Tuesday. When I asked her about her singing, she replied; "I just open my mouth and hope what comes out is good." That it is! She has done a lot of private research and preparation for her role, by reading about, and constantly listening to records of, Edith Riaf.

This profesional approach is obvious through out her performance

Although her two co-stars; Mel Ericksen and Hank Stinson do not have a comparable command of the French language, they do posess the talent and versitility to play a variety of characters and instruments, of a challenge for any performer.

The set design of Allan Stitchbury transports the audience to a french caberet, with members of the audience actually seated on stage. The atmosphere even reaches to the foyer, where you can have coffee and a snack under DuBonnet canopies.

If you enjoy being entertained by good music and humour, treat yourself and maybe a friend to "Piaf". You will learn about a remarkable woman and see a truly remarkable performance.

All these ingredients lead to humourously complete sanemonium, with moments of hilarity between Marlane O'brien's Mrs. Hardcastle and Tony (Doug Kier); the less than evil villan of "The

We must also give a hearty thanks at this time to Al, Lynn, and Debbie who also came down from NAIT to cheer us on. Thank-






OOKS VOLLEY FOR POSITION
