## TECHNICAL AND VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

The Minister's Advisory Committee on Technical and Vocational Education to Dr. A. E. Hohol, Minister of Alberta Advanced Education and Manpower, will hold its first meetings of the 1978 - 79 year on October 18 and 19 in Edmonton.

The committee will meet on Wednesday, the 18th, at the Legislative Building, and on Thursday at NAIT, where a tour of NAIT facilities is scheduled. Introductions, organization and planning form the major part of the two-day agenda.

A new chairman, Edward Raitz of Leduc, and eight new members have been appointed to the advisory committee. Mr. Raitz is a retired superintendent of the County of Leduc school system. During his 30 years of work in educations, he was a teacher, principal and strong supporter of adult education. He replaces Dr. Duncan J. Currie, Edmonton, head of the chemistry division with the Alberta Research Council.

Three of the new members are students. They are: Shane Doyle, Fort Macleod, in his second year of agricultural engineering at Olds College; Frank Lilley, Jr., Calgary, in the second year of a business admin. program at SAIT; and James Dick, Lethbridge, a vocational rehabilitation counsellor with the Worker's Compensation Board and a second - year student in management arts at the University of Lethbridge.

Named as public members are: Frederick A. Dubray, Calgary, coordinator of counselling services at SAIT; Harold Jensen, Olds, a retired farmer who is prominent in business and the community; Christina J. Jones, McLennen, a life underwriter with the Manufacturers Life Insurance Company and a member on numerous boards and committees serving pre - school to post secondary education; Jim Lore, Carstairs, a farmer and agricultural consultant well - known for his service to the community; and Phil Shragge, Edmonton, coordinator of course and program development at Grant MacEwan Community College and a former instructor of economics and

political science.

Members continuing on the committee include Herbert Brown of St. Albert, Elsie Fish of Medicine Hat, Glen Ingalls of Calgary, Norman Milan of Calgary, Dan W. Porter of Lethbridge, and R. Guy Spencer of Fort McMurray.

Appointed as new executive secretary is Gary A. Innes, Edmonton, Administrative Officer with the Manpower Services division of Alberta Advanced Education and Manpower.

## ALBERTA ADVANCED EDUCATION AND MANPOWER

Dr. A.E. Hohol, Minister of Alberta Advanced Education and Manpower, today announced the appointment of a Lethbridge lawyer as chairman of the board of governors of the University of Lethbridge, effective September 26, 1978.

The new chairman is R. Philips M. North, a senior partner in the law firm of Paterson North in Lethbridge. Mr. North has been a public member of the board since February, 1978

Mr. North, 2410 - 17 Avenue South, Lethbridge, was born in Manitoba and graduated with a B. Sc. from Brandon College. He received his Bachelor of Law degree in 1971 from the University of Manitoba, Winnipeg. In 1972, Mr. North was called to the Alberta Bar. Professionally, he is a member of the Lethbridge Bar Association, the Canadian Bar Association and the American Trial Lawyers Association.

Active in the Lethbridge business community, Mr. North is the director of the local chamber of commerce, chairman of the chamber's transportation committee and sits on the business advisory committee at Lethbridge Community College. He is a member of the city's air transportation committee, the local Jaycees and country club.

Mr. North devotes much of his leisure time to the leadership of a local Beavers boys' group, and is involved in organized recreational athletics.

Commenting on the appointment, Dr. Hohol said, "Mr. North has demonstrated genuine concern for post - secondary education in Alberta. I am confident that he will contribute significantly to the operation of the University of Lethbridge."

#### **UNIVERSITY AFFAIRS**

The Minister's Advisory Committee on University Affairs to Dr. A.E. Hohol, Minister of Alberta Advanced Education and Manpower, will hold its opening meetings for 1978 - 79 in Edmonton on October 1 and 2.

The committee will kick - off with a dinner meeting at the Edmonton Inn on the evening of Sunday, Octob<sub>#</sub>r 1. A full - day session is scheduled Monday in the Devonian Building East Tower, location of the administrative office of Advanced Education and Manpower.

With 10 new members and a new chairman, these initial meetings are designed mainly for introductions, orientation, meeting department senior officials and planning the year's activities.

Named to chair the committee is Dr. John G. Paterson of Edmonton. Dr. Paterson is a professor of educational psychology and coordinator of the Faculty of Education Clinical Services at the U of A. He has also served as chairman of the Edmonton Public School Board. He succeeds T.W. (Bill) Snowdon, a Calgary lawyer, who completed his term as chairman.

Also from Edmonton are the following new public members: Rita Calhoun, former member of the U of A Senate and of the YWCA Board of Directors; Dr. S.C.T. (Stan) Clarke, currently professor emeritus, having retired in 1977 from the U of A faculty; Dr. John Paran, a podiatrist, who is active in health, community and military organizations; and Aylmer A. Ryan, professor emeritus, and former provost at the U of A.

Other new appointees from the public at large include: John Church, Balzac, former businessman and active in professional and community associations; Irene Hutton, Calgary, a former history instructor at Grande Prairie Regional College; Dr. Turrall A. (Terry) Moore, Lethbridge, chairman and assistant professor of anthropology at the University of Lethbridge; and Lyle F. Widdifield, Bonnyville, chartered accountant with his own practice.

Two students were named to the committee. They are: Pearl Calahasen, Edmonton, a former instructor of reading at the Alberta Vocational Centre in Grouard, currently studying elementary education at the U of A; and Keith Raymon Fry, Calgary, a Ph. D. candidate in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Calgary and a participant in many university and student activities.

Members continuing on the committee are Dr. Peter Gretener and Sergeant Hugh Young, both of Calgary, Lorna Shaw of Medicine Hat, and Terry Toivanen of Fort McMurray.

Peter Maxwell - Muir, Calgary, remains the executive secretary. He is a program consultant with the Alberta Vocational Centre, and institution administered by Alberta Advanced Education and Man ower.

#### CORRESPONDENCE

Education Minister Julian Koziak today announced that, as an incentive to Alberta Correspondence School students to complete courses, tuition fees for courses in grades 7 - 12 have been increased with a refund of 50 percent, provided the course is staisfactorily completed. There is no charge to Alberta residents for courses in the elementary grades.

Mr. Koziak also announced that Alberta residents 65 years of age or older are now eligible to receive correspondence courses free of charge.

Each junior high school course now costs \$16.00. Upon successful completion of the course \$8.00 is refunded.

To qualify for the 50 percent refund, the student must have achieved a grade of "D" or a "pass" within the year of initial registration, must have been a resident in Alberta while enrolled in the course, and must have returned all materials, such as text books and lab kits on loan from the Alberta Correspondence School. The refund is given to the person or institution that paid the fee.

Persons still eligible to receive correspondence courses without charge, in addition to students in elementary grades, include those unable to attend school because of mental or physical handicap, illness, or imprisonment.

The Alberta Correspondence School was established in 1923 to provide educational services through correspondence to students of elementary age who mught not otherwise have access to school programs. By 1942 the School had grown to the extent that it offered a full curricular program, comprising all 12 grades. As of March 31, 1978, the school had an enrolment of 20,475 pupils. Elementary grades accounted for 149 pupils, junior high school for 887, and senior high school for 19,439. Of the total enrolment figure, senior citizens accounted for 24 pupils.



One of the stars from last year who is returning is Brian Jubinville, a second team all - star goalie. The returning forwards are Joe Mykietyshyn, Bart Szoke, Rocky Smith, and Brian Goodfellow. The returning players anchoring the defense will be Don Owchar, Bill Sutherland, Grant Gordon, and Brad Stilas.

Some interesting prospects trying out for the team include Dave Reid, Carey Winquist, and Rene Brodeur. Dave was a forward last year with the Red Deer Rustlers. Carey was a first all-star goalie in the Alberta Intermediate Hockey League last Another goalie worth looking at is Rene, who last year was a key factor in the play of the K of C Pats. inere are also several very good players from the Capital Junior Hockey League trying out, but are too numerous to mention.

Tryouts started last October 2 with 94 players battling to make the team. By the end of this week, the team should be down to 35 bodies. The first action for the Ooks will be on the weekend of October 20 - 22 in Red Deer. This is an annual tournament held as a warm - up before the season begins. The season begins in earnest on October 28. By this time, the team should have twenty healthy and robust players ready to improve on their fourth place finish of last year. COBRA - DALE JACOBS (EPIC)

On "Cobra" Dale Jacobs lets his creativity run free. A master of keyboards. Dale shows special interest in electronic synthesizers. but his interest is only matched by the group cohesiveness which is found on "Cobra".

Vancover based Jacobs spent a year in the studio experimenting with what is now known as Cobra. This is easily realized when one

listens to the clarity of recording and expertise of musicians on either side of the record.

Though a year has gone into this album each song has the sponteneity of a moments jam on stage. Jacobs is just the one to shine on stage as you may have noticed when he appeared with the Domenic Triano Band at the SUB Theatre recently.


Energy flows through Jacobs jazz on selections such as "Cobra" and loose "Connection" but a mellow mood is best captured "On the Wings of a Song" and "Patch Bay"

If you enjoy hearing something other than ordinary rock n' roll, you might try listening to this album. Those who have heard progressive rock before and know what to expect, should really enjoy it.

The four musicians who make up U. K. have quite prestigious credentials. Bill Bruford (drummer) played with YES and KING

CRIMSON; John Wetton (bass and vocals), also with KING CRIMSON, as well as FAMILY AND ROXY MUSIC; Eddie Jobson (violin and synthisizer) belonged to CURVED AIR, ROXY MUSIC, and FRANK ZAPPA'S MOTHERS; and Allan Holdsworth (guitars) was with GONG, SOFT MACHINE AND THE TONY WILLIAMS NEW LIFETIME.

The music on this album is quite complex; included is a suite which takes up most of the first side, entitled "In the Dead of Night". Unusual melodies are featured, as well as unexpected changes in rhythm. Jobson plays the violin imaginatively and builds up layers of sound on the synthesizer for Holdsworth's guitar to weave through. John Wetton plays a deep throbbing bass and adds occasional vocals (which become a bit awkward in places), while Bruford pulls it all together with his sharp complementary drumming.

U. K. just completed a U. S. tour as an opening act for Tom Petty. Hopefully, their next album will boost their reputation and get them more of the recognition they deserve as a fine progressive band.

Here are a few suggestions.

If you enjoy sweeter tasting cocktails, chances are the ALEX-ANDER would be a good choice.

1 oz Brandy 1/4 oz creme de cacao (dark or

white) 1½ oz sweet creme

Shake with ice and strain into cocktail glass. Sprinkle nutmeg on top.

The STINGER is a drink with a little stronger Brandy taste, yet will definitly stand alone in its uniqueness.

In a mixing glass with ice pour 1 oz Brandy

1/4 oz Creme de Menthe (white)

Stir and strain in to a martini Garnish with a glass. lemontwist.

Finally the THUNDERCLAP cocktail. Approach it with caution 3/4 oz Dry Gin

3/4 oz Rye

3/4 oz Brandy

Shake with ice and strain into a cocktail glass. Save this one for that rainy day.





The "ANNIE HALL" look will be one of those fame figures that many won't forget, seeing that it sums up the Fall Fashion look for 1978.









