

### TUITION

OTTAWA (CUP)--The Ontario Federation of Students (OFS) has opposed a recent report calling for higher university and college tuition, saying it is based on a "perverse sense of equity".

The report, released Mar. 26 by the Ontario Economic Council, called for the unpegging of tuition among universities and colleges, and general increases in tuition fees at both, with college fees being raised to the same level as undergraduate university tuition.

It (OEC) justified the increases by saying that fees have not kept pace with inflation, rising about 20% since 1973 and another 5% this year.

As well, it called for greater increases in programs with very high costs or professional courses such as law or medicine. Professional students should pay more, it said, because their programs "promise unusuhigh pecuniary rewards."

But OFS chairperson Miriam Edelson pointed out that tuition is strictly a 'deterrent fee'', not a method of paying for education.

"Its sole function is to increase the financial risk involved in going to college or university. If the council is worried that post-secondary graduates fo not pay the government back for their eventual advantage in earning power, they should call for tax reform, not higher deterrent fees.'

## FEES

She also opposed the recommendation that each university and college set its own tuition fees, saying it would "give the governmr a license for irresponsibility."

"The government has to control tuition fees if it wants to make any pretense of offering its citizens affordable post-secondary education.'

That alternative had been already proposed in the P.S. Ross report, in which a large number of university presidents proposed setting their fees at 20% of costs if the fees were unpegged.

At that level, said OFS researcher Jay Drydyk, undergraduate students would pay \$920/year in 1980/81, and graduat students nearly \$2000/ year.

"Who would be able to afford it?" Edelson asked. "Where are people supposed to find the money to meet these extra costs? Every year it gets harder to find a summer job. The real income of the average Ontario family is declining. Student aid will once again fail to keep up with students' costs of living.

Drydyk said that the recommendation calling for equal college and university fees "simply indicated their (the council's) ignorance of the entire college system."

When colleges were formed in the mid-sixties, he said, "one of their explicit purposes was to provide a more open avenue to postsecondary education." Then Education Minister Bill Davis even promised that uition at colleges would be nodest in amount, he said.

#### HOW TO CONDUCT YOURSELF DURING AN INTERVIEW:

Once you've sparked the attention of prospective employers don't kill your chances of landing a position by being umprepared for the interview. Here are some pointers on how to conduct yourself during the interview:

- 1. Give yourself time so you won't arrive at your appointment late and breathless.
- 2. Know about the firm, its products or services, its objectives and policies.
- 3. Know about the job.
- 4. Have clearly in mind what attributes you feel you can bring into the position and tell the interviewer.
- 5. Don't just answer yes or no to questions, your answers should be as informative as possible.
- 6. If you need to know something about the position or firm ask, it's to your advantage.
- 7. Be polite and confident.
- 8. Look directly at the interviewer when speaking, it will convey trust, poise and self-control.
- 9. If yo find yourself being nervous breath deeply (without being obvious) and speak slowly.
- 10. Think before you speak.
- 11. Don't mention the need for work, need is not a criteria for hiring prospective employers.
- 12. Leave the matter of wages, hours and benefits for consideration after the job has been offered to you. Chances are these will be explained without your asking.
- 13. Answer all questions directly and truthfully, lying and hedging is not going to get you the job.
- 14. Comply with requests to fill out an application form, supply references etc.
- 15. Leave promptly (not hurriedly) when the interview is over, with a courteous farewell.

Two years ago Mattson and Christensen started their own summertime fencing business and they've never They have looked back. worked with both wooden and chain link fences in residential and commercial situations. Deseret Fencing has shown the partners that level headedness, sound planning, and a desire to work enable the student to be. both his own boss and a success at the same time.


Deseret Fencing has allowed Mattson and Christensen to earn respectable amounts of money while gaining business experience.

Initially in the summer of 1977 the partners concentrated on smaller residential contracts, however, they quickly landed a job for a major commercial chain link fence worth \$25,000.

Deseret's expansion was so successful that the two students paid off all their loans and made a handsome profit as well. Their business also paid out over \$20,000 in wages to students employed by the firm.

Faced with ever increasing academic responsibilities, the two young entrepreneurs will be winding down their business this summer. Mattson is thinking about a year round business in another field which he will be able to run while interning, while Christensen is awaiting his acceptance into law school before deciding hwo best to employ his own entrepreneurial skiils.

## **Operating Grants**

Operating grants totaling close to \$262 million will be proposed to the Legislature for the province's universities, and public and private colleges, according to Jim Horsman, Minister of Alberta Advanced Education and Manpower. These grants, part of the 1979 - 80 budget estimates, represent an increase of \$22 million over last year's allocation.

In addition to an eight per cent increase to base operating grants, conditional grants being recommended include \$2.2 million to the universities and \$1.8 million to the colleges for new programs which have receiv-

ed development approval. \$1.5 million to cover the cost of extended practicum in teacher training through 3 universities, and special funds for the Banff Centre for Continuing Education to a year - round operation have said.

Mr. Horsman explained, Since government grants represent in excess of 80 per cent of institutional operating budgets, the general increases to the operating grants are being announced at this time to assist the institutions in their planning processes. This information is being provided as a result of the later than usual sitting of the Spring Session and announcement of the provincial budget.

"The proposed eight per cent increase to base operating grants is consistent with government policy. ## Dick Hacked Inadvertently

**SURGERY ERROR COSTS** \$825,000

PITTSBURGH (UPI)- A court has awarded a large sum of money to a man amputated at a hospital just before his wedding.

About \$825,000, was given to Harold Michael, 26.

Last year, Michael turned down a \$300,000 out-of-court settlement and reportedly asked for several million dollars in damages. exact amount awarded was not disclosed and the judge declined to discuss the case. Attempts to reach Michael were unsuccessful. It could not be learned if the marriage took place.

In May 1974, Michael. then 21, was admitted to North Hills Passavant Hospital for surgery to correct an undescended testicle.

At a pre-trial hearing on the case, Michail was offered \$300,000 to settle the case.



Did You Know of 20-30 Hostels in the Province



Hostels in Alberta were started by two school teachers, Catherine & Mary Barclay, in 1933. The first hostel being in *Bragg Creek*, thirty miles south west of Calgary.

Since then, Bragg Creek Youth Hostel has gone through two facitities and is now a brand new complex of 65 beds. The facility consists of indoor plumbing and heating, with shower stalls, a common kitchen with all cooking utensils and propane stoves. The hostel is carpeted throughout and is built with an open beam cedar ceiling and has a lounge area or common room with a fantastic wood-burning fireplace. After a good day of hiking or cross-country skiing, light the fire and just do nothing but relax!

Along with Bragg Creek, a chain of hostels were produced and are still being developed. Areas included are: Medicine Hat, Calgary, Ribbon Creek, Spray River, Eishenhower Junction, Corral Creek, Beauty Creek, Eidth Cavel, Athabasca Falls, Maligne Canyon and Edmonton along with more.

Proposed developments in the next five years are: three more modern hostels on the Eastern Slopes and upgrading of the existing hostels. The modern hostel proposals are designed to feature smaller, more private dorms and showers. They are to be located near recreational areas for hiking, canoeing, cycling, rock climbing, cross-country and downhill skiing.

As far as cost goes, your looking at anywhere from \$1.50 to \$4.00 per night per member. That's pretty darn cheap considering an annual card will cost you \$12.00. Did you say you were going to stay in a motel, that might offer you less, for \$35.00 per night??

Where are you going to find a motel away from the big trucks? (The ones that just woke you up, or those 18 wheelers that constantly interrupt a peaceful chat. Possibly with your newly-found him (or her) friend that you bumped into, out on the trail that afternoon.)

To stay at the hostels, simply bring your food, a sleeping bag and your equipment for whatever activity you're into. Some hostels will supply you with a blanket or pillow, if you forgot to bring one along. Some hostels provide cooking utensils as well as selling you the eggs you forgot to buy at the super-market on the way out. And, if you talk nicely to the houseparent, she may even take you on a guided tour of the area.

Any holiday involves meeting people, and the hostel provides an opportunity to meet people from all corners of the world: Germany, France, Australia, Japan or from any other direction.

The Alberta Hostels are only part of 150 permanent and summer hostels in Canada. The Canadian Hostelling Association is a member of the International Youth Hostelling Federation, which offers you 4500 hostels in 50 different countries. All of these are non-profit and rely on a lot of volunteer support.

Purchasing a Senior Membership for \$12.00 offers: an International Membership, outdoor recreational programs, discounts on recreational equipment rentals, as well as a 10% discount at any affiliated Sort Shop; but most of all, your membership guarantees a better appreciation of the unsmogged countryside.

No, there is no real age limit in a youth hostel and the hippies of the sixties have been cleaned out and sent on there way!!

Finally, the hostels of this province are here to stay and are growing to meet the demands of the traveller and the recreationalist.



# "ENDANGERED HABITAT — WILDLIFE IN DANGER"

Imagine your and on a spaceship about to blast off for a distant planet. The spaceship would be carrying all the food you were going to use on the journey. It would carry all the water you would need, all the air that you would breathe and it would have to be heated so that you could survive the sub-zero temperatures of outer space. It would have to contain means of storing all the wastes that were produced enroute, and if the trip was to be a long one, the wastes would have to be recycled or used again, to help grow additional food. The spaceship, in short, would have to contain a complete system for supporting life. Needless to say, if anything went wrong, the lives of all the people on the spaceship would be in danger.

Does this seem far fetched? Does it seem unlikely that you will ever take a space voyage? If, at first thought, your answer is yes, it would be wise to think about it again. For you are on a spaceship and we call it the planet earth. It contains all the air we need to breathe, all the water we will use for drinking and for many other purposes, and it is a complete life support system. Furthermore, if anything goes wrong with this system, the lives of all the passengers on Spaceship Earth will be in danger.

When we think of the planet earth as a system that supports life, we must realize that various kinds of life exist on earth. Each type of life has certain requirements for its own survival. Wherever these requirements may be found, we can say that there is a suitable environment for that type of life.

As a people, we are one of many species inhabiting earth. It is our "habitat" -- a "habitat" is a place where something lives. As Canadians, we inhabit Canada, but we cannot divorce ourselves from the rest of the world. If out habitat deteriorates, everyone suffers. In a narrower sense, some plants and animals are totally dependent on habitats threatened now with destructive changes, even with annihilation. We all share in the responsibility of doing something to correct this situation.

After little more than a century, Canada has built a modern society based on abundance, freedom, and enterprise. Yet during the last decade, we have awakened to a deteriorating environment, shortages, pollution, and high cost resources to supply our

After little more than a century, Canada has built a modern society based on abundance, freedom, and enterprise. Yet during the last decade, we have awakened to a deteriorating environment, shortages, pollution, and high cost resources. We thought "it couldn't happen here".

The irony is that we are the second largest country on earth, a richly diverse land with supposedly inexhaustible resources to supply our small population. How could this paradox come about?

The answer is that the environment has always been taken for granted as infinite, free, and forgiving. We now know that environments are more like bank accounts. No matter how large, there is only so much. Some environments are like savings accounts and bear interest. If we use only the productivity of renewable resources like interest, we can continue to do so forever. If we use more, some day the capital will have vanished.

Other environments are like current accounts. Nonrenewable resources bear no interest. What is used is gone, forever.

When Europeans first came to Canada, it was a land rich with life. Forests stretched coast to coast. Huge herds of bison and caribou roamed open land. Lakes and streams were full of fish. The air was sometimes dark with birds.

Now the passenger pigeon is gone along with the great auk, Labrador duck and sweet chestnut tree. Bison and muskoxen barely survived, caribou remain in jeopardy and are not likely ever again to darken the landscape with their numbers.

The forests, once thought inexhaustable, are depleted. Some forest types persist only in farm woodlots or as parkland samples. It is authoritively stated that one third of all native plant species are now seriously depleted, rare or endangered.

Oceans have been heavily exploited for about one century. As recently as a decade ago, their productivity was touted as the great hope of abundant food for mankind. Now, fish stocks are depleted, and some of the great sea mammals, whales, are threatened with extinction. We are consuming the bank balance itself instead of living on its sustainable productivity.

New automobiles are now equipped to reduce air pollution. Yet the industries that produce raw materials, the car and the gasoline to run them still lack adequate emission controls. Some cities may have cleaner air but industrially polluted air may be affecting distant lives and landscapes, even in other countries.

Little fresh water in settled parts of Canada is fit to dring in its natural state. Raw sewage still enters major waterways and mercury contamination renders fish in some water sheds unfit for human consumption. International waters are affected. In a country that controls more than ten percent of all fresh water in the world, yet has only half of one percent of total world population, such conditions are inexcusable.


## FENCING NEWS







## WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL




