

ASSASSINATION

(ZNS-CUP) -- The final report drafted by the House **Assassinations Committee** concludes that President Kennedy's murder in Dallas more than 15 years ago was the result of a conspiracy, and that the plot may have involved high members of organized crime.

The draft report, which is not scheduled for public release until May 1, says that the Warren Commission investigation into the Kennedy murder was -- in the report's words -- "seriously flawed"

The Committee concludes the Warren Commission "was in fact wrong" about Ruby associated prior to the assassination.

JOBS NOT ALL THAT **IMPORTANT** says Trudeau

OTTAWA (CUP) - Jobs are not all that important, according to Prime Minister Pierre Trudeay.

Trudeau told an audience in Sydney, Nova Scotioa, April 4 that, while the problems of the economy are sugnificant, "dollars and jobs are not all that important for human beings".

He preferred to emphasize national unity and developing "feelings of self-worth" in Canadians, he said.

But representatives of students and the unemployed denounced Trudeau's statement as a cynical election

gesture.
"Trudeau is creating false issues in the election because he realizes he and his government haven't dealt with the problem of unemployment," said Bev Crossman of the National Union of Students.

Doug Coupar, speaking for the Ottawa Coalition for Full Employment, said the statement exemplified the "whole Liberal strategy -- a rather cynical masking of a real tragedy they got us into."

And both said it was completely untrue.

'Unemployment is the number one issue, not national unity," said Coupar. "For any unemployed person, jobs and dollars come above any other considera-

"Dollars and jobs are the essence of being able to develop as a human being rather than just as pieces of flesh," Crossman said.

She said Trudeau's statement clearly reflected his government's previous they could provide a ment of national unity.

"They've clearly abdicated all responsibility for that. This is only putting into words what his practice ha been for years."

She said Trudeau's statement was clearly linked to one he made at the University of Toronto in March, 1977, where he told students, 'If it's just a job you want my heart does not bleed for you", and "If they don't like it here, let them find another country.

"In moments of stress, when he's put on the spot about jobs or unemployment, he clearly cannot deal with it in a rational sense," she said. "The real sentiments that he and his party hold come through.'

"The Leberals consistently make 'blunders' which are blunders to them but which are seen to us who have been unemployed for a long time to be statements of policy."

Coupar said Trudeau would not get away with trying to minimize unemployment because workers. students and the unemployed are all determined to make it an issue. With the groups all organized, he said, the Liberal strategy won't work.

"Working people will be raising the issue of enemployment despite Trudeau's attempt to ignore it. won't let the Liberals get away with this."

Interestingly enough, Coupar said, when the coalition tried to learn the Liberal positions on unemployment and jobs, the National Liberal Press Office said they could not provide statements on either topic. But they said they could provide a state-

On Apr. 2, he brought the container to the radiobiology lab at the Finch Campus of the college where it was tested by two teachers. There it was confirmed that it was indeed radioactive.

"It's hot radioactive material" said one teacher. Without the 1/8 inch lead lined case, he said, the waste gives off 11 REMs per hour. A REM is a measure of the amount of damage radioactivity does to animal tissues. A dangerous dose is 120 REMs; a fatal dose is 250 REMs.

There seems to be a misunderstanding about the last beerfest, in that it was not NAITSA, but the bouncers who shut the place down.






Double Bandstand turns out To be a Fair Single



As a result, there were people standing in the middle of the dance floor, which made lining up for beer and liquor tickets impossible.



The challenge was enjoyed by all.







