F.A.S.

F.A.S. is an organization over four years old, helping student's from day to day. It deals with items involving student financial problems, housing, student aid, beer-fests, etc.

The provincial government is responsible for loans, financing of the Institute, residence, etc. In order to get anything from the government, F.A.S. has established an organization (Federation of Alberta Students), that presents any problems brought forth by the various institutes, colleges, universities, etc., by acting as a liaison between the government and the students. Student representatives attend meetings, conference acts, after a skill training every September, where new members in the organization learn the art of writing up constitutions, public speaking, and other aspects of social activities.

FEES - Due to increased ideas, F.A.S. has increased their fees from \$.50 to \$1.50 per year, totalling between \$6000 - \$7000, taken from

Student fees directly. Their ideas include, in order of priority:

- 1) working on cut backs
- 1) day care centers
- 3) student aid

The priorities are set by the delegation, and are subject to change in their order, when members meet at the major two conferences per year.

The problems with cut backs, was due to a lack of funds, a problem with every campus. Day Care new regulations, threaten students, with a decrease in the number of them, resulting in a decrease of the number of jobs, and student's who will be consequently unable to attend classes.

Other topics discussed by Lake Sagris, include fee increases, entrance requirements, facilities available in the institutes, and many more. At present the increase of fees is 65% of those of the University. In 1971, they were \$195, in 1978-\$220 and in 1979, they will rise to \$320.

NUS - SWAP BRITAIN

1,000 STUDENT JOBS IN HOTELS IN BRITAIN

The Association of Student Councils (AOSC) and the National Union of Students (NUS/UNE) have developed a Student Work Abroad Programme (SWAP) in Britain whereby Canadian students may obtain temporary employment in British hotels.

Many positions are available in the following categories:

Assistant Housekeeper	Linen maid/steward
Centremaid/man	Day Porter
Barmaid/man	Night Porter
Banqueting Steward	Wages Clerk
Kitchenmaid/man	Secretary

These positions are available at various locations throughout Britain including:

London	Birmingham	Cardiff	Glasgow	Edinburgh
Hull	Leicester	Liverpool	York	Newcastle
Portsmouth				

The salary range is from 43 -63 (approx. CDN \$100 - 150 per week depending upon the position). Wages are slightly lower outside the London area. Accommodation at the place of employment is available at a minimal weekly charge (9 - 10).

Successful applicants will be required to submit to an interview in London to determine the exact position and location of employment.

Students must agree to accept employment for a minimum of 2 months (preferable 3) and cannot be employed for more than 6 months.

A registration fee of \$80 (payable to AOSC) must accompany each application. This fee is refunded in full if the applicant is not accepted for the programme by AOSC.

The Registration Fee includes:

1. A transfer from the London arrival airport to downtown London.
2. Two nights accommodation (twin and/or quadruple occupancy) in London prior to the employee's interview.
3. Administrative and service fees of AOSC and its agents in London.

All transatlantic travel arrangements for this programme must be made through Canadian Universities Travel Service Limited. The cost of these arrangements will be borne by the applicant.

On the 20th of April, there will be a pub-nite (free) from 4:30p.m. 'till 8:00p.m., with Foxglove playing.

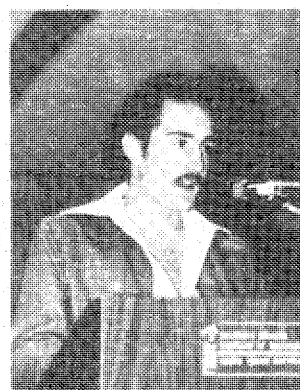

Oh, we will be having another BEERFEST. It will be on May 5, a Saturday, no definite band has been picked just yet.

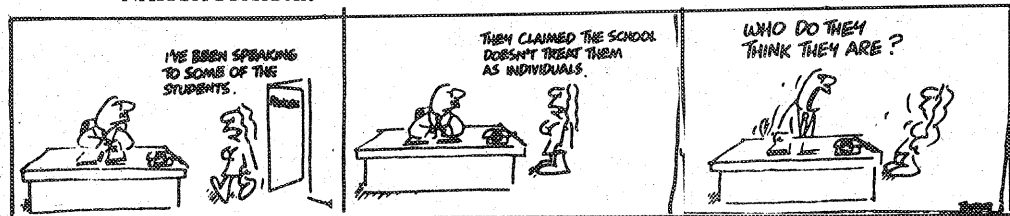

THE DEER HUNTER



"The Deer Hunter" is a big picture, three hours long, and it tries to cover a lot of ground. It doesn't quite achieve all it wanted to, and some of its symbolism is inconsistent, but I wouldn't have missed it for anything. I have a weakness for great over-reachers, and this one goes for all the marbles. It tries to show us all the effects of the United States' involvement in Vietnam, both literally and figuratively. It's about lasting values. It's about lost ideals. It's about friendship. It's about fate. But mostly, it's about accepting reality.

Three friends, Michael (Robert de Niro), Nick (Christopher Walken), and Steve (John Savage) go off to fight in the war. The three, along with two other buddies, live and work in a steel town in Pennsylvania. For relaxation, these guys travel up into the mountains to hunt deer. Michael believes in bringing down his game with one shot. It's clean, the perfect culmination of the mystical experience the hunt is for him. He also believes in accepting a thing for what it is. In a moment of irritation, Michael complains that one friend, Stanley (John Cazale), is never prepared for the hunt. Holding up a bullet, Michael says to him, "Do you see this, Stanley? This is this. This is not something else. This is this." It is one of the major dialogue scenes in a film not packed with dialogue, so pay attention when it shows up.

Neither Michael, Nick or Steve have any doubts about going off to a foreign war. They see it as a banner at Steve's wedding puts it: "Serving God and country proudly". No political stance is taken. It's just patriotism. But some spilled wine at the wedding tells us of the blood we'll be seeing very shortly, and it tells us -- but only us -- of a future that no one

can see. A chance meeting with a Green Beret back from the war gives us a further warning of what to expect, but again none of the characters see it. Fate.

A reflective moment in a bar gives us a long, long look at the buddies all together for the last time. Director Michael Cimino has spent the last hour or so building up a picture of these men and their everyday lives and values. But even as we take in the group portrait we can hear the sound of helicopters on the soundtrack. Then Cimino blasts us with Vietnam.

It is only two cuts from Michael in the town bar to Michael lying in the tall grass, covered in dirt and blood, hiding from a Viet-Cong soldier, then burning him alive with a flame thrower. The point is taken. No moment of reality is any less valid than any other. But fear makes everything that much more real. The war moves fast, with its own crazy, incredibly callous logic, so we accept it when we next see Michael, Nick, and Steve in a Viet-Cong prison camp. The prisoners are forced to play Russian Roulette as their captors gamble on them. Fate and reality are combined in one image: a man forced to hold a loaded gun to his head and then pull the trigger. Gambling. The luck of the draw. Somewhere out there is a bullet with your name on it. Staring hard at a couple of deuces isn't going to turn them into aces. Accept reality.

Michael does, and he helps Steve accept it too. But Michael doesn't accept fate, and that's what saves them all. They manage to escape, but then become separated. Nick disappears into the 24 hour night world of Saigon. John, and then Michael return home. But Russian Roulette goes on, and it's everywhere. It's in Vietnam,

in a back room. It's in America too, in a log cabin. And it's fate that brings Michael back to Saigon to find Nick.

If ever there was a movie that made its audience work, this is it. "The Deer Hunter" refuses to spell things out for us. It tells its story by way of Vilmos Zsigmond's photography and Peter Zinner's razor-sharp editing. Pure cinema. We're constantly forced to make connections between images sometimes hours apart. And it takes its time about it. I don't think I've seen such a leisurely approach to an epic since "The Godfather, Part II", or maybe "Barry Lyndon".

Robert de Niro gives his best performance since that other film about a returning Vietnam vet, "Taxi Driver". He's matched by just about everyone else in the cast, especially Christopher Walken ("I like starving myself. Keeps the fear up.") De Niro is also well served by director Michael Cimino. Cimino has both a good eye for staging massive scenes (the attack on the Saigon US Embassy) and for detail (the stack of Kentucky Fried Chicken boxes on Michael's refrigerator). And he can confuse us, emotionally.

In the final scene, the film's main characters sing "God Bless America" at a funeral breakfast. It's meant as a definite contrast to the final scene before Vietnam. We see a group of friends who'll never be the same again. Maimed, but not beaten. Like the ending of Robert Altman's "Nashville", this final scene hits us a number of different ways. Michael, the realist, sings along. Is he finally fooling himself? Or is it a decision to face what has happened and try to carry on? I wish I could tell you.

Groans, "Oh No's", and "Impossible" were some of the comments made. "Naming a car takes days, not hours", said one man.

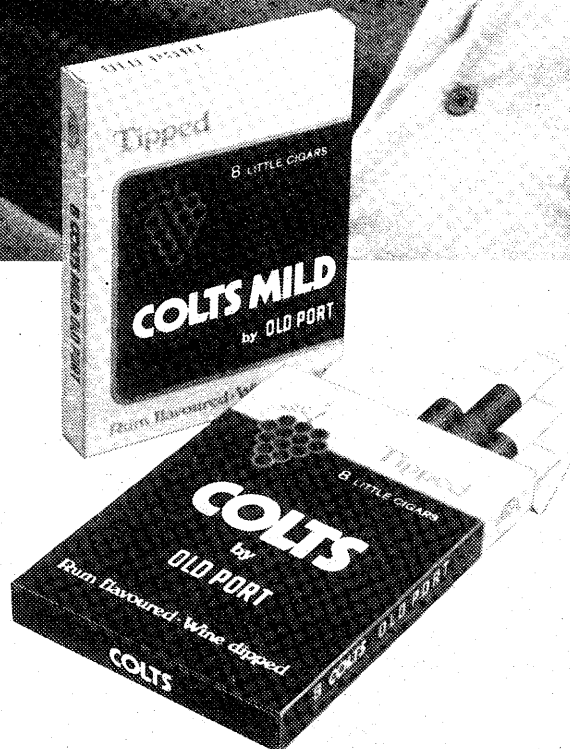

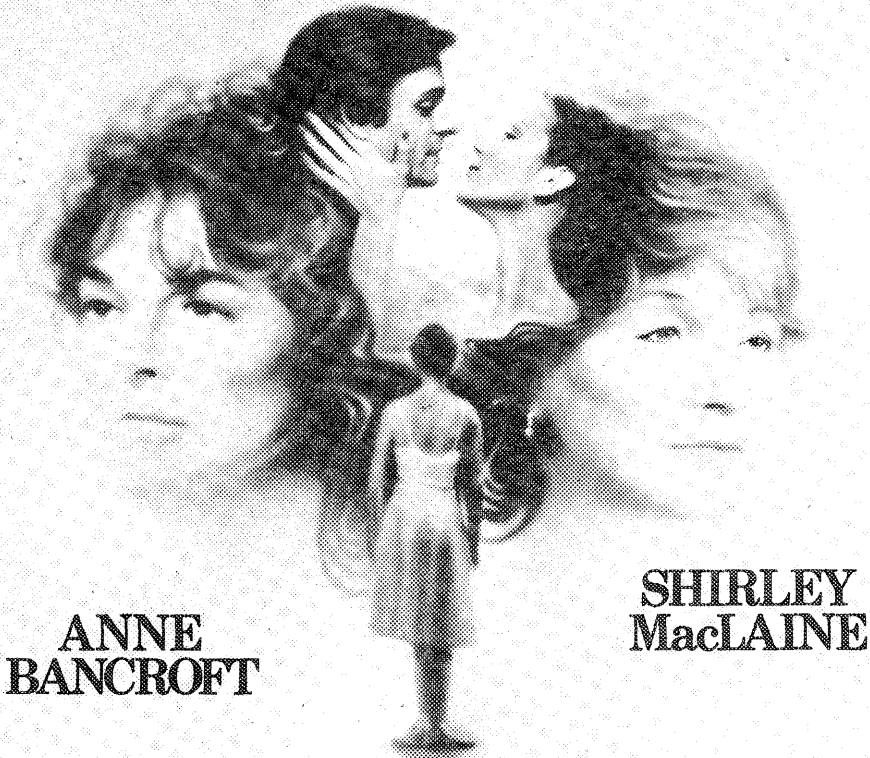

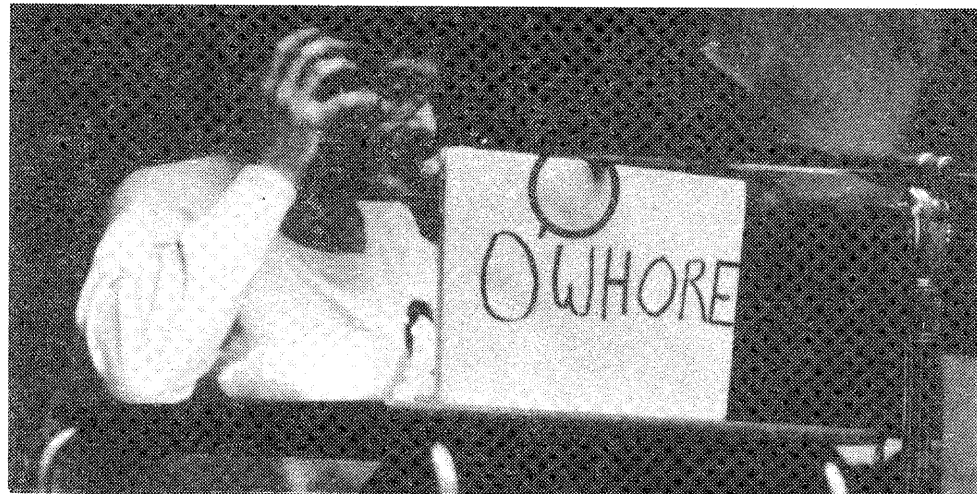

wrestler of the tournament held back on Jan. 20.

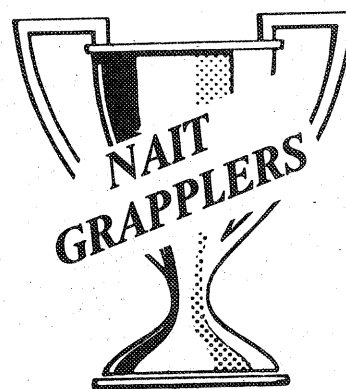

NAIT Ladies Place Third in Canada

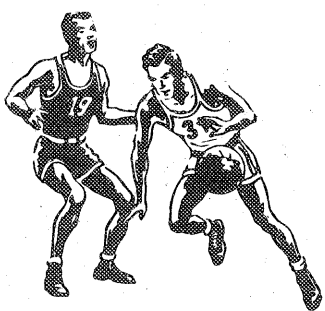
