NAIT BLOOD DONOR CLINIC

Last Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday was NAIT's chance to donate to the Red Cross' blood drive, and people, you definately showed what you're made of.

A total of 634 units of blood was collected -- a truly impressive volume-- and that from 4000 students is a percentage of 16% --three times the national average.

Of those 634 donors, over 200 were first time donations. That statistic could stem from the fact that a large percentage of us have just turned the age of majority, but nonetheless, it still is something to be proud of.

To show how much we surpassed our mark, the Red Cross set themselves a quota of 125 maximum per day and expected 100. Well, you hot-blooded NAIT students, 210 of you gave your precious lifeblood per day. Congratulations.

Now, for you students who didn't give, this is what you missed.

When you first enter the door, you are recorded by a NAITSA representative who records the technology you are from. Then, a Red Cross member registers you and you stand in line for half an hour till you can have your finger pricked. That's the most painful part of the whole ordeal. As the blood spurts out, the attending nurse sucks it up into an eyedropper and deposits it into a divoted tray containing all sorts of coloured liquids. By a complex chemical process, which I won't go into, they determine your blood type and iron content, give you a little sticker and a wad of cotton for your lacerated finger, and tell you to go sit on a bench. So there you sit, holding the wad of cotton on your finger and the sticker in your hand, watching your fellow students lying on the eouches with hoses stuck in their arms. You start to wonder if you really want to go through with it all. You shift positions and ponder some more. By this time your hands have secreted so much that the sticker is now unsticky. You wonder if the nurse will be mad at you.

Just as you are about to get up and sneak out the door, a nurse with a big threatening grin looks you in the eye and waggles her finger as if to say, "Come on over and we'll have some fun". In a state of hypnosis, (probably due to the blood you lost from your finger) you succumb. She takes you over to a couch and says "Relax, it won't hurt a bit." You believe it the same way

the Americans believed Hitler when he said, "I don't want anything more than Poland.'

Before you know it, she's got you trussed up in a blood pressure unit and she's busy putting straps across your legs and chest. Now you REALLY want to go home but it's too late now. There you sit like a pig at the butcher about to be bled. You look up mournfully at the nurse and say, "Am I going to make it, Doc?" and she responds with a creased brow and a single side to side motion of her head. Now, there's no doubt of it --you're REALLY REALLY worried. Just as you're contemplating doing something drastic, like swallowing your tongue, a nurse in what looks like a butcher's apron approaches you and withdraws a fifteen centimeter needle with a 35 cm hose from her smock. She approaches you, teeth gleaming, and muscles bulging. You give up all hope of ever seeing your instructors and fellow students again and slump back in your couch, despair pouring off the edges of the couch. You close your eyes, hoping it will be a quick and painless

Suddenly, it's all over, you look down at your arm and the nurse is holding a cotton batting in the crook of your elbow. She throws back the straps and tells you to get up -slowly. She leads you over to another couch and tells you to relax for awhile. So there you sit --this time holding cotton on your elbow. You laugh as you watch your terrified fellow students going through the same traumas of blood donating. Now the nurse leads you to: table and you enjoy a nice bottle of coke and a few cookies. This is the best part of the whole ordeal. As a matter of fact, it makes it worth it all. You leave feeling great knowing that your generosity may save someone else in a car accident or other catastrophe where blood is needed. The next thing you know, you're trying to convince your friend to go. You say, "It's great first they.....'

The NAIT blood drive was an overwhelming success due to the generosity of our students. We are planning another drive in about three month's time so come on. people, let's get those red cells growing. Let's go! Breath -in, out, in, out...

The 200 odd people who were at the NAITSA Referendum on December fifth made a big mistake on behalf of the total NAIT population -- one we will all pay for. They gave NAITSA a change in the constitution, they gave NAITSA an over 58% increase in pay. Why? The reason doesn't make any sense. Before that fateful day section 13 of the NAIT constitution read "Two hundred members in good standing shall constitute a quorum at any general meeting of the society." This seems to be a very reasonable quorum, it's only about 4% of the total student body.

As of December 5th the words "if a quorum cannot be assembled, voting will take place at three consecutive council meetings," were added. Convenient, isn't it? Now, when ever NAITSA feels that the constitution doesn't suit their needs they will simply change it, behind closed doors. NAITSA is now no longer responsible to the student body -the same people who voted them in! Oh sure, students can still go to the council meetings, speak their opinions about future changes. The only difference now is that that's exactly what they will speak -opinions, the students voice is no longer binding on NAITSA. If NAITSA can't even get 4% of the student body out to hear what they have to say you don't change the constitution, you change NAITSA. If 96% of the population are apathetic towards NAITSA it leads this writer to believe that they are not doing their jobs right.

Their 58% wage increase (from \$85 to \$135 month) for the Vice President, Athletics Chairman, Publications Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer and the Activities Chairman (The President's wage stayed the same --\$4000 per year) was completely unjustified. Let's look at a few of the benefits that the NAITSA Executive receives;

Free Tuition

Free Parking

Free Tickets to ALL NAITSA functions **Private Office**

All this plus many other benefits that they don't want us to know about and are keeping silently quiet.

Now, on top of all this, they had the nerve to ask the assembled students for an extra \$50 a month and the students actually gave it to them, with full knowledge of the above benefits. What will they ask for next year? Another 58% wage increase? Or better yet, how about company cars! NAITSA Executive is like all other elected parties -- get in and get out with as much as they possibly can, because they won't be there for very long.

In future years when the full impact of these changes take effect the only people who will suffer will be the students -vou and me. Sad. isn't it.

"The MTBF, Is impressive you'll see, Because this thing will run for years, Completely error free".


"Forget about service, CE's, PM's, and all those aches, There's no sense in messing, With a machine that never breaks".





crude comedy acts than the music which they had originally began with. So they soon dropped the straight material and became a fine comedy team. McLean & McLean first


came to NAIT in 1974. Since then, they have entertained NAIT audiences on eight separate occasions. Each time they have been met with a warm welcome.


Their different style of comedy can be found on two record albums, Toilet Rock and Bitter Reality. There has been some controversy re-


garding the title of their new album to be released. Titles such as "Take the O out of Country" and "McLean & McLean Suck Their Way to the Top" have been given thought,


Building Construction, who pride themselves on superior participation and athletic prowess, met defeat at the hands of the Secretaries on Wednesday at 12:45 in the North Gym.

This term, Wilderness Skills, Winter Camping, and Cross Country Skiing are being offered.

Built-Up Teflon Coating Improved Lunar Orbiters'

UNIQUE TECHNICAL PROBLEMS were solved to develop the extremely durable expulsion tanks required by the Lunar Orbiter program. The tanks had to store propellants for long periods of time—aboard Lunar Orbiter 2, for example, the tanks were not called upon to deliver propellants for a final firing until the spacecraft had been orbiting the Moon for more than 11 months. Never before did a spacecraft's positive-expulsion devices have such a long wait

between expulsion cycles.

An impenetrable barrier between propellant and expulsion gas in the oxidizer tanks proved to be the key. High-strength Teflon was sprayed on both sides of a ½-mil-thick aluminum "bag." In separate coats from 1.4 to 1.3 mil, the Teflon was built up to a 3-mil thickness on each side of the aluminum.

"Teflon alone," said an assistant chief engineer, "allows pressurizing gas to permeate into the propellant during long periods of

"Teflon alone," said an assistant chief engineer, "allows pressurizing gas to permeate into the propellant during long periods of storage." Without the aluminum barrier, the pressurizing gas would have formed gas bubbles in the oxidizer and could have shortened life of the Lunar Orbiters.
