

MELIORIST CALLS FOR investigation

LETHBRIDGE (CUP) — The staff of the Meliorist, the student paper at the University of Lethbridge, have decided to quit publication of the paper until negotiations with the student union concerning the paper's autonomy are completed.

In a motion passed at a recent staff meeting, the decision was made to call for a commission of investigation to be conducted by Canadian University Press, a news service to which the Mel -iorist is a member.

Staff member Eugene Plawuik said the staff members were utterly demoralized by the negotiations with the student union concerning the funding of the paper. Originally the Meliorist was to receive \$3.50 per student, but the student union withheld that money in the fall.

The student union decided to hold a referendum on funding but Plawuik claims they did not consult with the paper's staff over the wording of the motion. So the referendum called for a \$2.75 per student grant to the paper. That referendum failed to achieve forum

Since then Plawiuk says the students' union had unconstitutionally dissolved the Meliorist's publishing board on which there were representatives from both the paper and the student union,

along with representatives from the residence association, the support staff and student body at large.

Plawiuk said in the fall there had been a great deal of sent-iment for some sort of confront-ation with the student union but now he says: "Most of us are just too burnt out". He said on Friday the paper will publish its last issue with a front - page editorial explaining why they are taking this action.

Plawiuk also said the battles with the student union had led to a loss of more than three quarters of the staff since most of them did not have the energy to put out a paper, deal with the actions of the student union and keep up with their school work.

The staff are also asking that the \$20,000 that the student union has of the Melior be put in a trust fund to be controlled by CUP. He said the student union is in a deficit position and he was afraid they would spend the money that could be the Meliorist's.

CUP National President John Wilson said in Ottawa the executive would take the Meliorist request under serious consideration, but would seek other ways of mediating the dispute before calling an investigation commission.



Lunch ain't Cheap

"HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN WITH THE BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS ?.."

Due to the overwhelming response to the previous article on Cafeteria food price increases; the Nugget once again follows up on the story with more news on the high cost of eating in the cafeteria.

The search for info into cost dilema led me to the office of Art Nixon. Mr. Nixon, Director of Division of Business and Applied Arts was kind enough to spill a few beans for us.

Apparently without the cost increase of 20% the cafeteria would of stood to lose about \$180,000 over the year. This was after last year's increase of 5%.

The food price increases were decided upon by a committee composed of Nixon, Vice - President of Administration, Jack Stuart, head of food services, Doug Gray, head of food Production, Peter O'neil, and NAIT's acting Bursar, Earnie Sandstron.

Since the NAIT cafeteria isn't government subsidized like the University and college cafeterias, the total income depends on you, the customer.

The annual budget for the four NAIT cafeterias (Plaza II, Alberta Vocational Centre, Patricia Campus, and the main campus) is about \$1,200,000.

Nixon said "We are very concerned about pricing the food beyond an affordable range for the students. He also stated the students haven't been eating less in the cafeteria since the price increases went into effect.

All facts point towards pressure on the government to subsidize

the cafeteria will be the only way prices will be cut. So if you don't feel like fighting the government or paying the high price of eating, drop by the Nugget. We have a large supply of newspaper to wrap your lunch in.

athletes sue university for poor education

LOS ANGELES (ZNS - CUP) -Eight black college athletes -- in
what is expected to be a precedent - setting case -- have filed
a multi - million dollar suit
against the California state University system, alleging they did
not receive the education that was
promised them.

The athletes, who attended California State University at Los Angeles during the early 1970's, allege they were lured into that university's athletic program on the promises of being fully educated and awarded college degrees.

One of the eight, basketball player Dwight Slaughter, claims he was promised tutors, counselors and a complete educational package leading to a four - year degree in criminology.

Slaughter tells pacific news service that, instead, he and other athletes were encouraged by their coaches and advisors to take such "toughies" as beginning baseball, badminton, rugby, golf, backpacking, and water polo.

When his four years of college eligibility were exhausted, Slaughter says, he was denied a degree. He and the others are suing for a loss of education.

A growing number of podiatrists have expressed concdern about the possibility of permanent foot damage suffered by women who frequent discos.


According to those foot specialists, many women run the risk of chronic foot problems because they insist on wearing platform shoes or spiked heels while dancing.




EVERYBODY HAD FUN.







second half that score balooned to a twelve point lead for the Viking squad. NAIT's high point getters were Uldis Celenski with 10 and Wayne Squires with 8.


MOMENT OF GLORY

Last Friday, the two teams travelled to Red Deer to play the Red Deer Kings and Queens.



A tip of the hat goes to the Bio - Sci ladies who played an excellent game.


