Marijuana to be legalized


OTTAWA (CUP) -- It may only be a few more months until the penalties for possession of marijuana are removed.

Representatives of all three major parties said Feb. 7 they would be willing to give speedy passage to a bill proposed by Justice Minister Marc Lalonde to decriminalize marijuana.

The bill, promised for several year, is expected to be similar to one passed by the Senate a few years ago which died on the order paper before the Commons had a chance to study it. That bill would have brought marijuana and hashish under the Food and Drug Act from the Narcotics Control Act, abolishing jail sentences and criminal records for those convicted of simple possession.

FAS loses referendum at Grant MacEwan

EDMONTON (CUP) -- Grant MacEwan Community College (GMCC) students voted by a razor-thin margin to support withdrawal from the Federation of Alberta Students (FAS) Monday. The final vote was 178 in favor, 173 opposed, with three spoiled ballots.

But the Gateway was told at press time on Wednesday that the GMCC Students' Council may decide not to act upon the result of the referendum. Their decision will not be made until the end of this week.

Because of the narrow margin and the confusing wording of the question of the referendum ballot, there is concern about the validity of the result. Final results were delayed for a day when the collected ballots from one of the five polling stations temporarily disappeared in transit.

FAS executive member Tom Barrett expressed concern about the events surrounding the referendum but declined comment until the final Council decision is known.

An unidentified member of the GMCC student newspaper said she was optimistic about the future of FAS at Grant MacEwen.

"I think the general feeling is that FAS doesn't want to lose GMCC," she said. She added the Council would probably adopt a wait - and - see attitude and refuse to take formal steps to withdraw.

The current maximum penalty for possession is seven years in iail.

Lalonde has emphasized, however, the government believes possession should still remain an offence.

Both the Conservative and the New Democratic Parties said they would be willing to cooperate in passing the bill as quickly as possible after Lalonde told the Commons Feb. 7 he wanted to consult with the Opposition as to whether such a bill could be guaranteed speedy passage.

Pressed by Conservative youth critic Paul Dick on why the government had failed to act on the question, Lalonde said that if the opposition parties promised cooperation "we will be very

happy to consult and see how fast we can proceed."

The executive director of the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws (NORMAL), Andy Rapoch, said he was "overjoyed" at the announcement. "Our reaction is one of a huge sigh of relief."

While he was waiting for the exact form of the bill before giving any final comment, Rapoch said he was fairly satisfied. "Removing simple possession was our main objective. The decriminalization of the individual user is 90% of the solution."

In January, NORMAL launched a campaign for immediate decriminalization. At that time, Rapoch estimated 40,000 people a year were convicted "for what it is clearly not a crime".

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

Govt. tries again to raise loan limits

OTTAWA (CUP) -- Another government attempt to raise the Canada Student Loan ceiling will simply mean higher student debts, according to the National Union of Students (NUS).

The loan ceiling increase, part of a bill introduced Feb. 8 revising several aspects of the federal Canada Student Loans program, will mean students will be able to borrow up to \$2,240 per academic year, up from the current \$1,800.

But, according to NUS executive member Bryan Bedford, this means students in most provinces will simply receive more loans and less grants.

"What will happen is that most provinces (not Ontario or Quebec) will cut back the grants and give more loans."

Canada Student Loans are administered through provincial student aid systems in all provinces except Quebec. The provinces may, if they wish, supplement the loan money with provin-

This year, NUS representatives said NUS was not consulted before the bill was introduced.

According to Ministry spokesperson Joan Potvin, the bill was introduced because the ministry felt the act was no longer current and "to make more money available to students in longer courses.'

'It will go somewhat to meeting higher costs."

NUS Prsident John Tuzyk disagreed. "Although student costs have increased, it is hardly rational to increase the burden with greater indebtedness after graduation."

When questioned about the NUS objection, Potvin said it was up to the provinces to decide if they wished to use loan money to displace grants.

"If they need extra money, at least they'll have some extra money from this encrease even if the province won't give them

The proposed changes include:

--calculating the loan limits on a weekly rather than yearly basis, permitting students in longer courses to receive greater maximum aid to meet higher costs;

--raising the loan limit from \$1,800/yr to \$2,240/yr.






As my eyes pondered at the winner, I could not help but notice the obvious emotions of defeat and sorrow which were painted on the other contestant's faces. I



NAIT Wrestlers: just short of excellence

It appears that the NAIT wrestlers are showing a definate improvement at every tournament they attend.

On Jan. 20, the NAIT team barely missed taking the team title by a mere 1 point! With MRC taking the overall pt. standing with 48, NAIT placed a very close 2nd with 47 total points.

This reflected an excellent effort since SAIT (this years fall ACAC winners) placed 3rd way down with 36, Camrose 4th with 30, RDC 5th at 11 pts, and Vermillion rounding out the total with 5 pts for 6th place.

NAIT without a doubt would have walked away with the team standing had co - captain Bob Lemmon been able to attend. Bob who won the fall ACAC's and Rocky Mountain takedown tourney at 167 lbs this yr., injured his back at the U of A wrestling classic a wk. previous, and was unable to attend.

Even so, co - captain Keith Lockhart led the team with his 1st place at 142 lbs, despite a shoulder injury which almost caused him to default. An excellent effort on Keith's part.

Also an honourable mention is due to Dean Hallum, new to the team, but who took 2nd place in the 134 lb wt class. Also despite a bad injury.

Due to a mix - up Ron Janzen who weighed in at 187 lbs was placed in the next higher wt class

Even with a 30 lb disadvantage, Ron won the wt class with a good show of speed and agility over his heavier opponents.

Also notable among the team, ere Gary Thornton and Earryl Harrison who placed 3rd at 158 and 118 lbs respectively.

And to round out the roster was wrestling coach Paul Gibeault and Harold Peacock who finished 1st and 4th respectively in the hotly contested 150 lb wt class.

Although NAIT narrowly missed the team award, it was offset with the tournament's most outstanding wrestler who was voted to be NAIT's Paul Gibeault.

Although NAIT has always been shy on numbers, there is no doubt from the results that some high quality wrestlers are

Coach Paul Bibeault figures that most of his wrestlers are just about ready to peak. With most of the season's tournaments under their belts, they should really come on for the ACAC finals. The championships are to be held in Lethbridge on Feb. 16 - 18.

Gibeault states that quite a few injuries have been incurred over the season which really hampers progress. "It shows especially in tournament standings, when you've got to leave a couple guys home on tounaments; and when they start missing practices". He says "Unfortunately, any sport has its risks so there's no getting away from them really, it's just a matter of keeping them to a minimum".

However, with the ACAC finals coming up, coach Gibeault is expecting strong performances from everybody. Especially Lemmon, Lockhart, and Janzen who have excellent chances to take their respective wt divisions.

To end the interview, coach Gibeault was asked to tell us just what it takes to win at wrestling.

"Well, like any other sport it takes many things; hard work and lots of it. It also takes a quality called agressiveness, inner toughness, grit, whatever you want to call it, but it seems all champions have it in great quantities.

I have seen many matches lost, not to lack of skill but lack of desire. Many a bout has been won when the superior desire has shone over the superior skill. It's a case of trying not to get psyched out by your opponents name or reputation. Instead you've got to psych yourself up to win. A match is 6 minutes and you've got to give all you've got, and actually a bit more (105%) for the entire match.

Also, unlike other sports wrestling involves a close watch of one's weight. And if one wants to reach the highest levels of competition, it usually involves "cutting weight" to make a given wt division. It takes a strong individual to be able to trim his calorie intake and still workout hard to make the wt class.

Although sometimes "cutting wt" is difficult, depending on how much the individual has to lose it also has its positive side.

For one, all of us carry a certain amount of extra wt (flab) usually over the entire body. It is especially noticeable around the stomach.


Also most of us eat a lot of "junk food", "empty calorie" foods and stuff that is plain not nutritional. Usually wt loss involves simply cutting out your junk foods and snacks and eating more leafy green vegtables and fruit. Coupled with hard workouts and a supplemental vitamin or two the weight comes off. And in no sport is the term "mean and lean" more applicable.

You also see changes, when your trimming down for a tournament. For example, that fatty waistline drops in size and firms up and usually "cuts" start developing across the midsection and upper chest where fat used to

Although you may not particularily notice it, studies have shown that you speed increases and reaction drill time decreases slightly.

Although as much as 10% body wt can be lost with little or no adverse effects, I only have my wrestlers lose wt when absolutely necessary and if they can and want to do it. I like to offer them the choice. They know however, that it may well mean the difference of winning the lower wt class or losing in the higher division.


Ladies Doubles:
