

PETITION **AGAINST EDUCATION CUTBACKS**

CALGARY (CUP) -- A petition against cutbacks and tuition hikes will be circulated by the Federation of Alberta Students (FAS) at Alberta colleges and universities this month.

provincial funding to keep up previously - provided services

among professors at the University of Calgary provided evidence that cutbacks have affected the quality of education of the U of C, according to U of C student union academic vice - president John Graham.

The petition asks for adequate instead of cutting them back.

A questionnaire distributed

The government has proposed tuition hikes in order that all post-



secondary institutions have similarily high fees.

FAS feels it should be everyone's right to go to school instead of a privilege, which seems to be what the government is working towards, Graham said.

The organization also feel the government should consider the amount of people who will not attend because of high fees.

The petition needs a lot of support. Without it, students will not be able to determine what is going to happen to them," said Mark Tatchell, editor of the U of C's Gauntlet.

Graham said 25,000 signatures and the participation of all FAS members will be needed for the petition.

BUSINESS STUDENTS FORM A.M.S. COLLEGE **CHAPTER**

On Feb. 14. 64 Business students became charter members of the Administrative Management Society (AMS) college chapter, by a unanimous vote approving their constitution. The constitution was drawn up by the newly elected executive who had accepted office only one week prior.

With chartering formalities concluded and memberships posted to the International headquarters the executive is now free to begin developing their organization.

The AMS was formed to enhance contact between students and local Administrative Managers, primarily through monthly dinner meetings with the Senior AMS chapter. The first such meeting was held on the evening of Feb. 14 at the Plaza Hotel with 31 NAIT members along with several members of the Grant MacEwen College chapter in attendence.

NAIT chapter president, Megan O'Hara, felt the students were very well received stating that "the senior members were pleased to see us." The next dinner meeting will be held on March 19 again at the

No further occupations have apparently occurred, although protes organizers did stay overnight that night in the Administration Building. Students in departments that had been closed down were expected to return to classes Feb. 9.

A student spokesperson said students in each department were holding studey sessions Feb. 8 on student aid problems and tuition increases.

Nearly 600 of the U de M's 2,400 students were not attending classes, Labelle said, including almost all students in Social Sciences.

"No one knows" what further direction the protest will take, he said. "The only thing certain is that the campus is chaotic. The whole university machine has been upset radically, drastically."

The entire student strategy committee was replaced Feb. 7 after its members collapsed under the vice - rector's "blackmail", he said. The replacements were new people "starting from ground zero again".

He expected the situation would be allowed to return to normal, with only a few incidents occurring to keep the campus "moving and upset". The next big push would come after the March break, he predicted.

Possible guerrila tactics in the interim could include blocking off the Administration Building, he said. "You could do it with only 30 people."

One of the protestors main objectives will be moving forward the next meeting of the university's Board of Governors, at which tuition increases will be discussed. The meeting is now scheduled for April, Labelle said, and the students hope to push it forward to "precipitate some action" and force the Board not to raise fees.

To do that, however, may require "more radical methods" than have been used so far, he

The protest, which started Jan. 30, has already included a boycott of classes, a march through downtown Moncton, and the sit - in. Its objectives include stopping tuition increases and rent increases, improving student aid, and removing recent cuts in unemployment insurance that effectively cut most students off UI.

The protest has not yet achieved any concrete concessions, Labelle said. However, the university administration has said it was "sympathetic with our demands", he said, although it did not agree with the "illegal occupation of buildings."

The New Brunswick government has responded to the requests for improvements in the student aid system, he said. "No one's responded to anything. I'm sure they're worried, though, because there's an election coming very soon."

He said he did not expect any immediate removal of the UI cuts, but said the protest had inspired a favorable editorial in the local daily on the effects of the cuts on students.

However, a local tenants' association now being formed with the aid of students is "going very well," he said. The students are trying to work with the association to stop yearly rent increases of \$50 - 75 imposed by the city's Landlords Association.

Present student union president Diane Wright said she didn't see anything dramatically wrong with the absence of a female candidate, although she felt it acted as a poor commentary on the interest taken in the university.

Candidate Frank Moran said he felt he was able to project an excellent image of the student body and the university, as well "as anything in a skirt."

Most students on campus don't appear to be bothered by the situation. Many see it as a swinging of the pendulum out of the dark ages and into the light of the fast approaching 80's. They think such a move may be the first step towards relaxing some of the school's tight residence rules, as well as the recognition of the Mount as a fully co - educational institution.

nuclear power

VANCOUVER (CUP) -- Canada should not supply underdeveloped nations with nuclear technology or fuel, Progressive Conservative MP Bob Wenman said Feb. 2.

"We should not at this time export technology or supplies because we can't be sure it won't be used for nuclear proliferation," Wenman told 30 people at the University of British Columbia.

"For example, India is using Canadian technology and fuel for purposes other than energy use," he said. Indian developed its first nuclear weapon with Canadian supplied technology a few years ago.

Wenman said Canada should have a moral obligation to have an international concern about nuclear supplies it releases. "We have a tendency to cover our eyes and ears after we supply nuclear reactors and fuel and say it's gone, we don't have to worry about it anymore."

He said he thought it deplorable that previous ministers of the Environment and of External Affairs have said that Canada has no responsibility for nuclear supplies after they leave the country.

There is a great need and demand for energy in the world today and Canada should perhaps be willing to supply nations who want nuclear energy, Wenman said. But he insisted some kind of control be established.

One obvious method of control was monitoring the return of spent fuel, he said, but Canada doesn't want it back because no safe method of disposal has yet to be found.

"One answer to disposal is regional repositories, but would you want such a repository in Canada?"


The lyrics via good male vocals were very important with the music making the overall

You wouldn't fit another body into the place. And everyone there really seemed to have a good time.







On the following Tuesday, the hoop teams ended their respective season by playing host to the crosstown rivals Grant McEwen.





Now that the season is offically over both the Ookchicks and the Ooks would like to thank all those fans who came out to all their games this past season. Next year perhaps...




volleyball blocks and spikes



Many people have asked about the tabulation procedure regarding the TOP MALE & FEMALE ATHLETE, and what criteria is used. Well here is the scoop on that.

There are three major catagories of sports in the Intramural program. There are the major sports like hockey, flag football, continental handball, etc., the intermediate which include volleyball, tug - o - war, 3 on 3 basketball, and finally the minor sports such as archery, cycle drag, marathon swim, etc. Now each individuals points are tabulated regarding participation and standing of there team in either of the three catagories. It breaks

If you play a major sport then you are automatically awarded 4 points for participating. Now if your team comes first in its league you get 2 more points. If it wins the playoffs you get another 2 points or if you second in the playoffs you get 1 point. Thus an athlete can get a maximum of 8 points for a major sport.

If you play an intermediate sport, you get 2 points for participating. Now if you are league champions you get another 2 points. If you go on to win the playoffs, then you receive yet another 2 points. However if you are on a team that finishes 2nd, 3rd, or 4th, you get one point. Thus if you go all the way in an intermediate sport you could get up to 6 points.

In the minor sports one receives 2 points for participation, another 2 points if your team wins and those finishing 2nd to 10th get one point. Therefore you can get up to 4 points.







Peter Skrabyk 3 Assists A Goals




