



NEWS BRIEFS



REPORT OPENS WAY FOR HIGHER FEES AT ALBERTA UNIVERSITIES

EDMONTON (CUP) -- A report recommending that tuition fees be kept at Alberta universities and colleges may also open the way for tuition increases of up to 119 per cent at some post-secondary institutions.

The Grantham report, released to the public Jan. 25, recommended equalizing tuition for all programs at any institution, and that there be a base fee level for universities, at colleges and technical institutes, and at vocation centers.

For university students the report recommends tuition be set

at \$590, up from the current \$550 for most undergraduate programs. However, there would be a 14-45 per cent drop in graduate studies, medicine, environmental design, engineering and dentistry.

At colleges and technical institutes, it suggests a base tuition of \$385, a 40-83 per cent increase for colleges and a whopping 119 per cent at technical schools.

The report proposes a 55 per cent fee hike at vocational sch-

While the province's education minister Bert Hohol was pleased

with the report, Blair Redlin, Federation of Alberta Students president and a student representative on the task force was not as congratulatory. "Although there are some pos-

itive aspects in the report, in the section concerning tuition fees there are confused, contradictory and unsubstantiated claims," Redlin said.

The report points out that the

total costs to the student reduces the accessibility to a post-secondary education, and that tuition is a factor in student costs.

"The facts presented to the

"The facts presented to the committee showed that tuition fees are a definite financial barrier to a post-secondary education, yet the committee chose to ignore those facts," said Redlin.

The task force, comprised of Edmonton engineer Ron Grantham, two students, two representatives of post-secondary institutions four members of the public and a department representative, was set up by Hohol in Jan. 1978 to review the role of student contributions toward paying the costs of higher education. Over 100 briefs and letters were presented to the task force by administrators, labor repre-

Friday, Feb. 9, 1979 PROFESSOR'S COMPETENCE **OUESTIONED**

VANCOUVER (CUP)

The University of British Columbia's political science department has unanimously agreed that one of its tenured professors is a "crackpot", shows contempt for students, and is "a total piece of deadwood".

A highly-placed department source recently said not one person within the department deems Professor W.J.Stankiewicz's behavior as acceptable and members are currently wondering what course of action to take.

"We're a very collective body. What the hell can we do?" the source said. "He's becomming embarressing. The word is slowly

seeping out."
"I'm ashamed of the department and the minimal standards of teaching.'

The source gave a long list of student complaints against Stankiewicz and the serious abuses of power he says the professor is

--habitually arriving 10 minutes late for class,

--giving students two assignments without handing back either before the Christmas exams and not handing back marks,

--assigning his own texts which deal remotely with course material as required reading,

-- cancelling classes and rescheduling a Christmas exam,

--handing out course evaluation sheets and declaring that he didn't care what students wrote because he wasn't going to look at --giving ''ridiculously low''

--creating an "utter inability" for students to communicate with him, and,

--promoting his own books in class and using names of prominent university administrators in his book forwards to add personal prestige.

The source said one possible solution would be to freeze Stankiewicz's current salary, but added this action wouldn't be accepted by the faculty association.

Department Head Al Cairns said he is not aware of any student complaints about Stankiewicz this academic year.

After some insistence from the Ubyssey, Stankiewicz carefully took down every allegation word for word over the telephone when contacted, and said he would comment on each item after giving it some thought. He refused to give his first name or spell it.

When he returned a call four hours later, he refused to comment on each allegation individually, but instead had prepared a blanket statement:

"Your allegations are a great surprise to me. I don't see how a 'questionnaire' of this sort can be of any benefit to my students. Should any student from any of my courses have any complaints, he or she should bring it in a proper manner to myself or the head of the department.

"And furthermore, before you put anything into print, you should be convinced of the accuracy of all you facts."

TUITION CONTINUATION sentatives, student organizations and private individuals.

Tuition levels should remain stable for the two years following the implementation of the report, if it is accepted. Subsequent change should be made on recommendations made by a standing committee on student costs, the report said.

The report also outlines major changes to the provinces student aid. Loan money would be made available to all students regardless of their parents' income and would be repaid as a percentage of student's annual income plus a 50 per cent surcharge.

The task force also recommended students be declared independent at 18 whether or not they still live with their parents.

No policy on differential fees for international students was reached as the task force was evenly split on the issue, the report said.

Those commission members favouring the removal of differential fees pointed out the extra revenue gained in charging the higher fees are exceeded by the cost of administering them. They also noted Alberta is one of the few jurisdictions to have such a

According to those who supported differential fees, Albertans should receive a greater benefit for their investment.

KNOW HOW **IMMIGRATION LAWS** AFFECT YOU

Under Canada's new Immigration Act, international students wishing to study in Canada must, in most cases, obtain visas and authorizations abroad before coming to Canada.* And they must also have an acceptance from a university, college or other institute of learning and be able to prove that they have enough money to support themselves in Canada while studying.

Once in Canada international students may not change schools or courses without first applying for an amended authorization. And although visiting students and their dependents may apply for work in Canada, they must obtain an employment authorization before accepting employment.

Students whose studies will continue beyond their authorized period must apply for an extension before their original authorization expires.

Any violation of these requirements could result in your having to

So if your course of study runs longer than the specified, or you plan to change your course or institution, or you want to accept employment of any kind, contact your nearest Canada Immigration Centre without delay.

In Edmonton your Immigration Centre is located at 10506 Jasper Avenue, telephone 425 - 7865.

Citizens and permanent residents of the United States and permanent residents of Greenland, St. Pierre and Miquelon may apply for authorizations at a Canadian port of entry, providing they already have a letter of acceptance from a Canadian school. However, because of the complexity of their cases, students from these four regions who will be staying in Canada for more than one year are advised to apply for authorizations at a Canadian government office in the country where they live rather than at a port of entry.





All around it is still mainly a modern kind of jazz and the vocals match the music well. Side two seems more conformist than side one which has a lot more ad lib.


The music is generally quite light and should keep you awake while studying.


Henri Tessier and Brad Stiles also picked up a goal each.



"Fencing is a very disciplined and demanding sport which requires a great deal of concentration, technical knowledge, and controlled reflexes." Somehow this does not match my idea of the dashing swashbuckler swinging into the castle on a chandlier, rescuing the fair maiden after running the villain through with his trusty sword.

Mr. Les Klar is the coach of the NAIT Fencing Club and he helped straighten out my popular misconception. "Unfortunately, you are not alone in your thinking. A great many people come out to the meetings and approach fencing with a pirate-like attitude and perhaps they were thinking that they would be given the costumes in which to act out their dream. Fencing involves a great deal of hard work and dedication, and many do not think that it is worth it but there are those who do.

At present there are about twenty plus members of the NAIT Fencing Club and not all are men either. In fact the most promising fencer is a young lady from business named Dawn Marie Messier. NAIT has earned a great deal of respect from the various other clubs in the province.

Unfortunately, just as a great many are ready to show themselves as a good fencer, they graduate from NAIT. Thus it is hard for the club to produce a steady medal winning team.

However, there is a major upset in almost every tournament when a NAIT fencer defeats an opponent who they were suppose to lose to. The club works very hard and takes the sport seriously enough to make sure that their opponents are not going to think them easy pickings.

As mentioned in the opening paragraph, it takes a great deal of concentration, technical knowledge and controlled reflexes. By controlled reflexes I mean that one has to react exactly and not over or under react as you may leave yourself open to a thrust from your opponent.

The tactics are similar to boxing. You probe for each others strengths and reflexes and try to lull the opponent into a smooth and monotonous routine and then move in for the hit.

What does one hit with or should I say thrust with? There are three different categories, foil, sabre and epee.

The most demanding is the foil where you try to maime or kill the opponent by stabbing him in the torso area. Points are scored by hitting the opponents target area, the trunk of his body, with the tip of the foil.

The epee is the modern version of the dueling sword. It is heavier than the foil and the target area is anywhere on the body from the toes to the head.

The sabre, a cut and thrust weapon, is the modern version of the slashing cavalry sword. The valid target area includes all the portions of the body above the hips. To win any of the above matches one has to score five hits.

If anyone is interested in this fast moving sport, just walk up to F206 and talk to Mr. Klar who will be happy to inform you of the sport and answer any of your questions. The next competition for the NAIT Fencing Club will be the Provincial Championships which will be held at the U. of A. gym on March 10-11.

Drop over and see for yourself just what fencing is all about.



The game was up and down the ice with Marketing holding a slight edge in play but were unable to score. Telecom had several chances as well but Marketing held them off.


After playing out the regular time the game was slated for sudden-death overtime with the teams playing five aside and no goalie.
