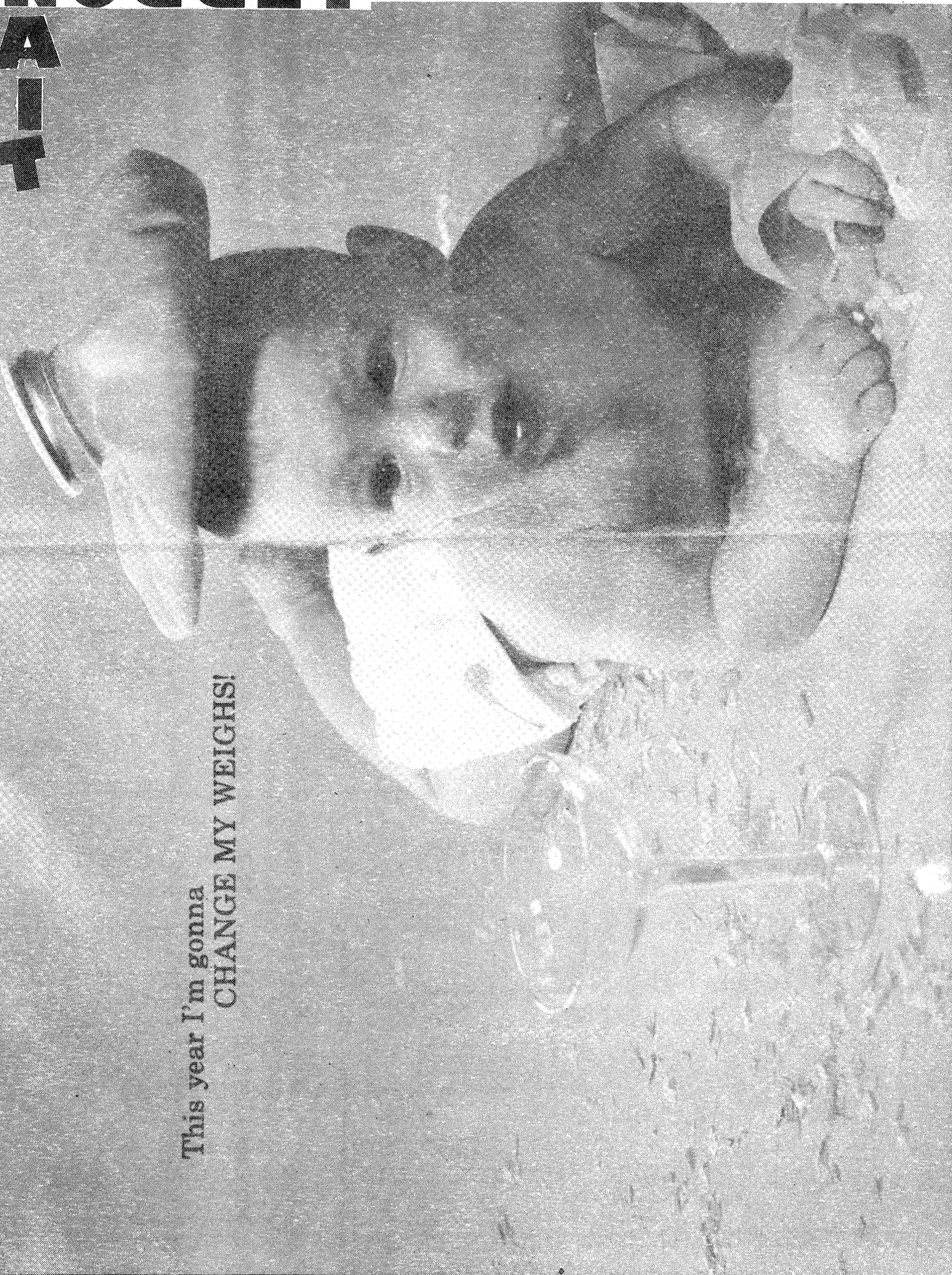

EXPANSION — PHASE I

The new NAIT building you see here is going to be a combination 1, 2, and 3 story building.

The first floor will consist of a new Book Store (approx. 310 sq. metres), a Bank, and an Auditorium. It will also contain the following:

- a) Food Services: training for commercial cooking, relocation of staff dining room (to be served by students); production for cafeteria — serving students — only 204 sq. metres, which will connect to the auditorium for larger serving facilities.
- b) addition to the continuing education facilities.
- c) access area to second and third levels.

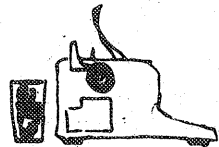
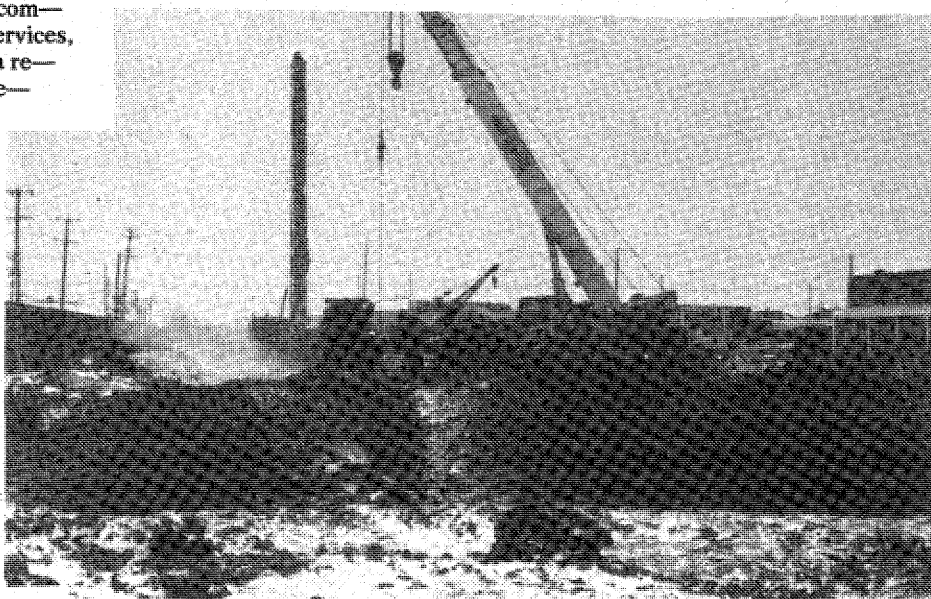
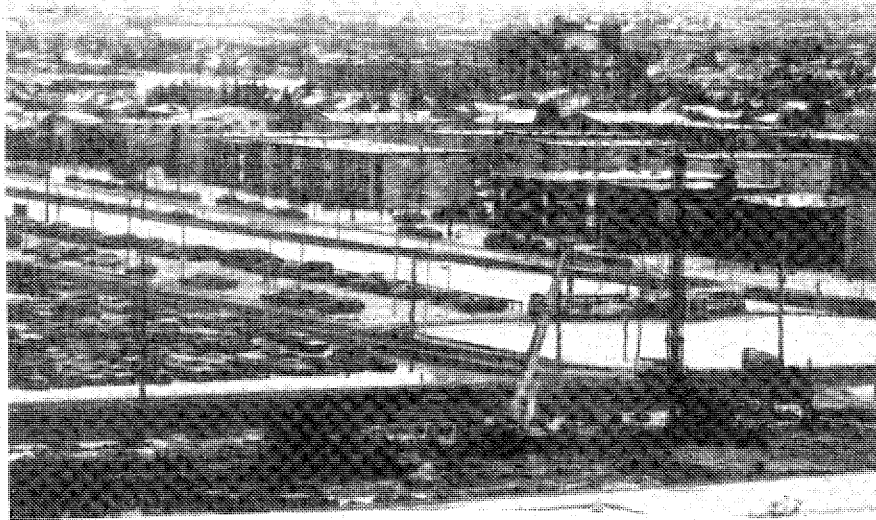
The second floor will be comprised of Audio Visual Services, Duplicating Services, and a reception area to Learning Resources (Library).

On the third floor will be the rest of the Learning Resources Area (stacks — book shelves and study areas).

Phase I also consists of a pedway crossing 118th Ave. to Phase II, located on the second level.

Phase II of the new building is presently out for tender with plans to commence in February, 1979.

It will also be a combination 1, 2, and 3 level building and will house Radio, Television & Arts, and Forestry and parts of the Millwork and Carpentry and Automotives courses.

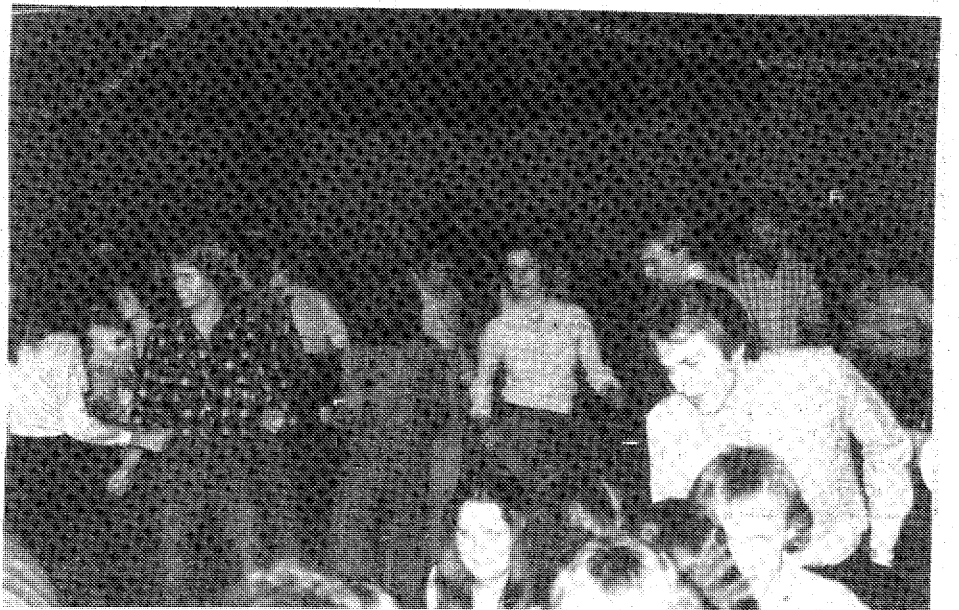

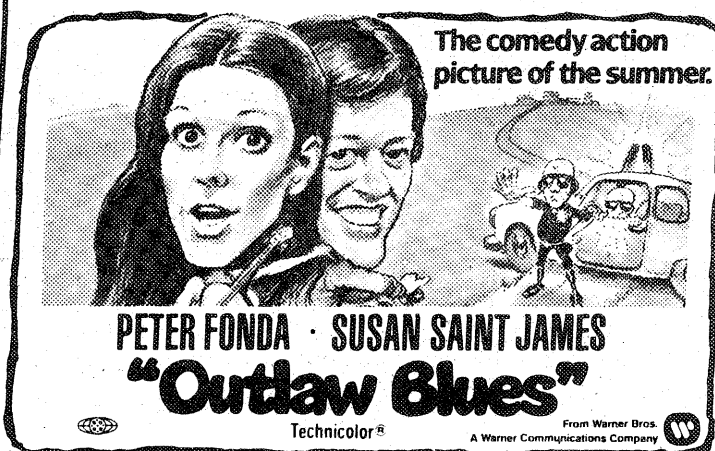

BASKETBALL TEAM WINS CONSOLATION

The NAIT OOKS Men's Basketball team participated in the Grant McKuen Happy Pop Invitational Tournament over the Christmas break and finished winning the consolation prize of 3rd.

NAIT's first loss of that tournament was to the hosting Grant Ewen team — Griffins. It was a well fought 1st half, with a score of 39—31, but NAIT folded in the second half because of poor passes and lack of oxygen.

The OOK's second game and loss of that tournament was to a team from Prince George, B.C. called the College of New Caledonia. Final score of that game was 62—60 for New Caledonia. NAIT played that game without a coach and team breakdown as a unit was responsible.

NAIT's 3rd game and final loss of the tournament was to an Ontario team called the St. Clair Saints. St. Clairs is ranked among the top 10 college teams in Canada. Again a close score in the first half: 29—23 for St. Clair, but NAIT couldn't quite hang in as they lost 63—54 in the final half.

NAIT's final game against the College of New Caledonia was for the consolation final of the tournament. The changed OOKS manhandled the CLC team 84—60 for a final score.

Dave Hoy, the Men's Basketball coach was unable to make it to the tournament due to Christmas commitments so the director of intramural and scholastic sports, Irwin Strifler, took over the coaching duties.

The winners of the Grant McEwen Happy Pop Tournament were the St. Clair Saints from Ontario. They defeated the previously unbeaten Grant McEwen Griffins in the final game.

The NAIT OOKS have played about half of their games this season and you can be sure to look for a stronger comeback by them this next half season.

The NAIT OOK CHICKS coached by Greg Meropoulos were inactive over the Christmas break but will see action, as well as the OOK PIKS, January 13 & 14, Sat. & Sun. as they host the Grande Prairie Regional College Grizzly's.

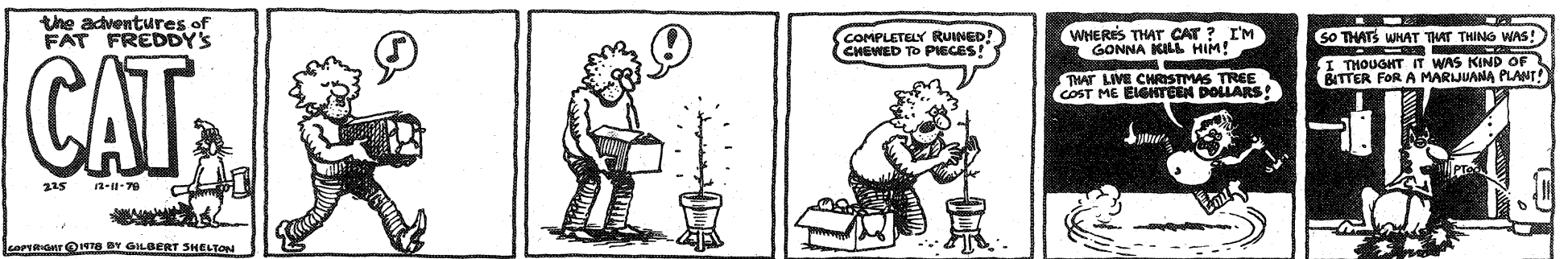
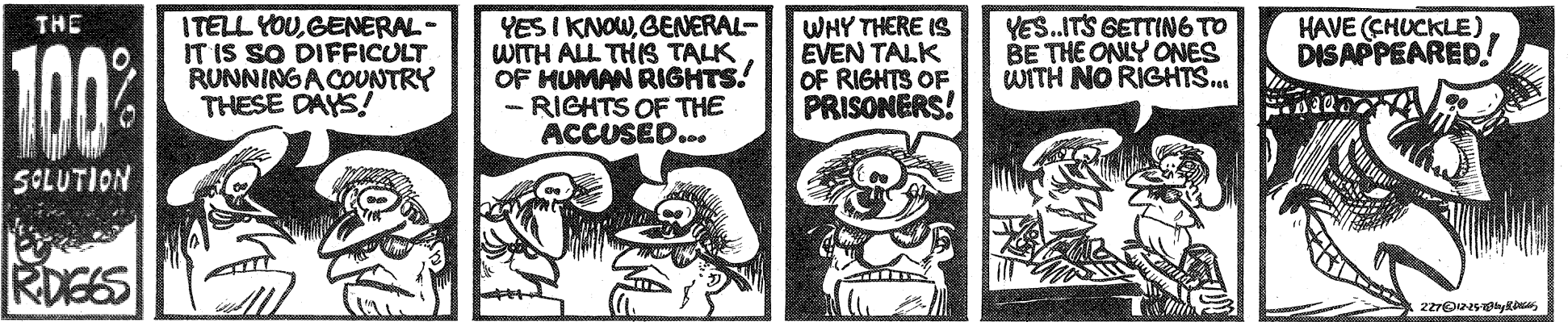

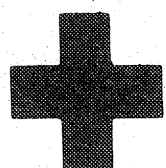
