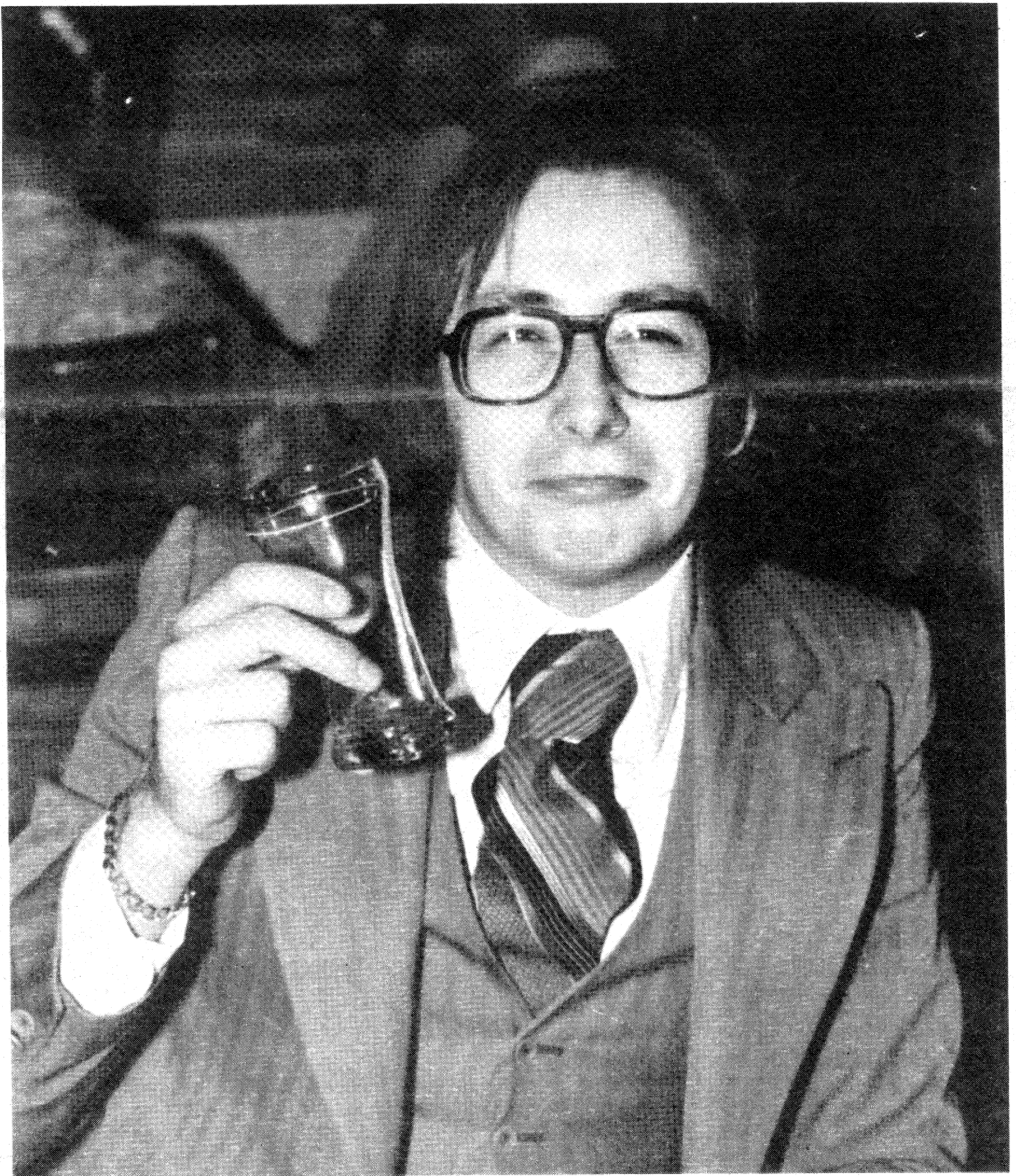

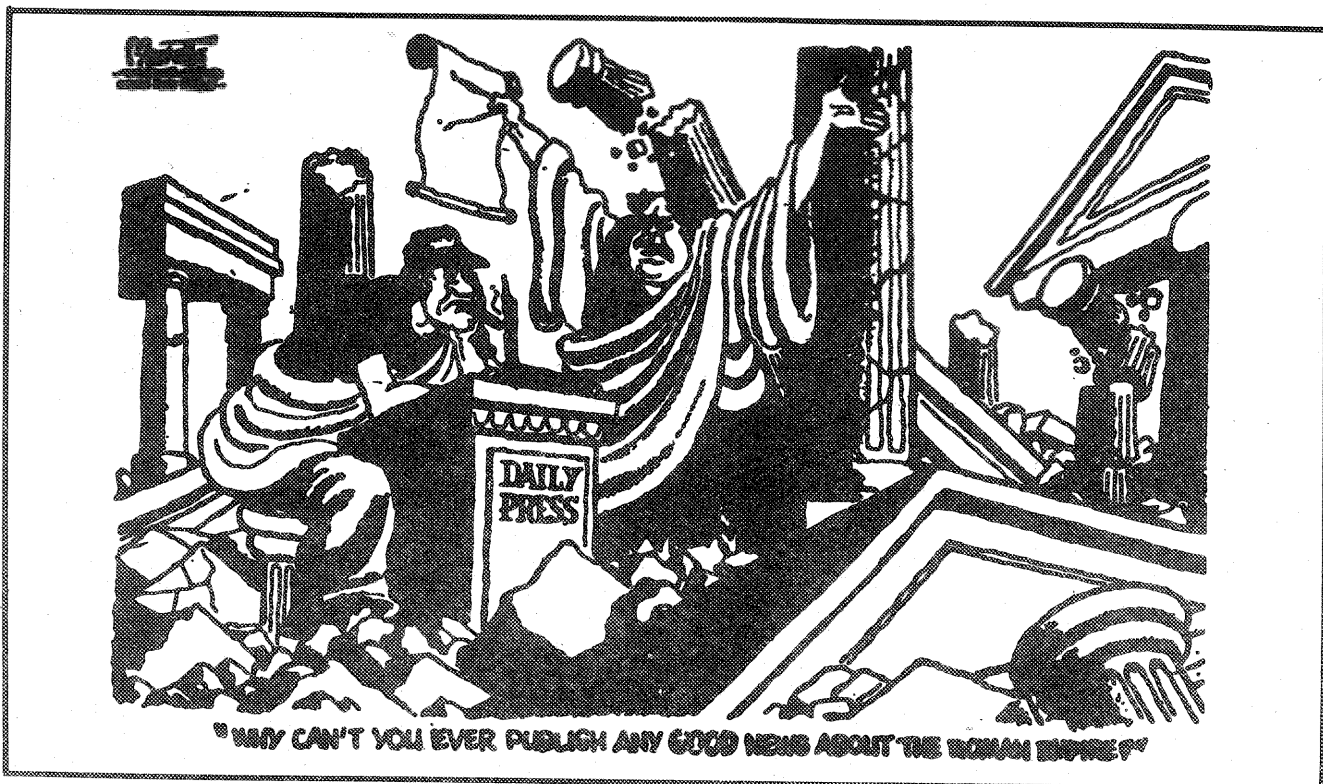

WHAT HIRE A STUDENT

Edmonton Hire-a-Student is a co-operative program designed to satisfy the employment needs of both the student and business community.

Part of this program consists of trained counsellors who make employer visits to encourage employers to hire students, and also to find out the employers summer employment needs. This is how Hire-a-Student receives the thousands of job requests.

Some of the job requirements placed by the employers, may need student businesses to fulfill their job requests. This is what you as a student may be interested in! Hire-a-Student will give professional advice and help to any student wanting to start their own business. The student will be referred to legal counsel and also given any information on income tax procedures and financial support. Then once the business becomes licensed and registers with Hire-a-Student; the employment opportunities are referred to this company. Last year the student had to phone to the office to see if any work was available. This year if the student has not phoned the office in the last while, and a job becomes available the Hire-a-Student office will phone the student. The experience gained from these student run businesses has proven to be valuable to any student in their future careers.

A new feature in the Hire-a-Student program is that employers can phone in job requests two weeks before the office actually opens.

This means when students begin to register, jobs will already be available for these students. The students will not have to wait for the job orders to be phoned in after they have registered.

The day that student registration will begin is April 23. The place to register for these summer jobs is 9943-109 Street, any weekday between 8:30a.m. to 4:30p.m. This location will be where: all job orders are received and posted; student registrations will be placed; prescreening and referral activity will be done for the employer and where telephone activity will occur.

The Edmonton Hire-a-Student Society has been tremendously successful in satisfying thousands of employment needs of both students and the Edmonton community. The 1979 program goals are set to be just

as successful. The society hopes to receive 3,750 job orders and to place 6,600 students in summer jobs. So you see, Hire-a-Student will do a lot for you, the students.

ARE MALES MUTANTS?

(ZNS - CUP) -- Is maleness a type of birth defect?

The Chicago Tribune reports that scientists investigating what determines maleness and femaleness have come to the startling conclusion that nature has an almost overpowering tendency to want to make all babies female.

The newspaper says that if it weren't for a newly discovered molecule, called the "ultimate determinant of maleness," which is added

to an embryo several weeks after conception, all babies would be girls.

According to The Tribune, Dr. Stephen Wachtel of Cornell University discovered the determining male molecule. The fact that fetuses are female until the male molecule is added has been dubbed the "Eve Principle," and is reportedly part of a major upset going on in embryology and genetics circles.

The Tribune quotes one doctor as saying "It sort of makes the biblical story of creation somewhat backward. A female may have been created first." Doctor Wachtel adds, "you can think of maleness as a type of birth defect. In the beginning we are all headed toward female ness."

(HS - CUP) -- Children in the United States apparently are not adversely affected by the fact that their mothers are working.

Stanford Professor Robert Sears reports that more than half of the mothers of school aged children now have jobs outside the home, and that the vast majority of these women make adequate arrangements for the care of their children while they are away from home.

Professor Sears reports that working women are happier and create a more relaxed environment, which

has a good effect on children. Sears stresses that it's important for an older adult to be with a child up to the age of 2, or, he warns, there is a greater probability of future sexual and social problems.

The child, the professor says, may be unable to control anger and have a slow or even permanently inadequate moral development.

Sears, however, says that the older person does not have to be the child's mother.

RAPE & THE CRIMINAL CODE

OTTAWA (CUP) -- The federal government is proposing to eliminate the charge of rape and replace it with two new charges for sexual offences.

The proposed changes were introduced in Parliament by justice minister Marc Lalonde, March 7 as part of the government's "five - year plan" promoting equality for women.

One of the new charges would be sexual interference classified as touching a person for a sexual purpose without the person's consent and would be punishable by up to five years in jail. The other would be sexual aggression, which would be punishable by up to 10 years, for using or threatening to use violence for the purpose of sexual interference.

Currently rape is punishable by life imprisonment but rape convictions are hard to obtain in court because of the detailed physical evidence required. According to justice department officials, the new charges, which are much broader in scope, would eliminate this problem.

Except for the early shut down, the evening was an all out success.

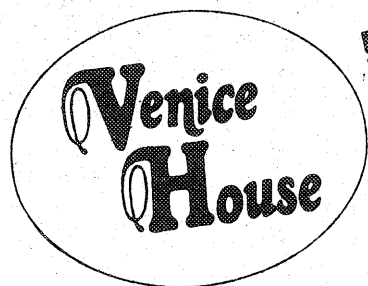

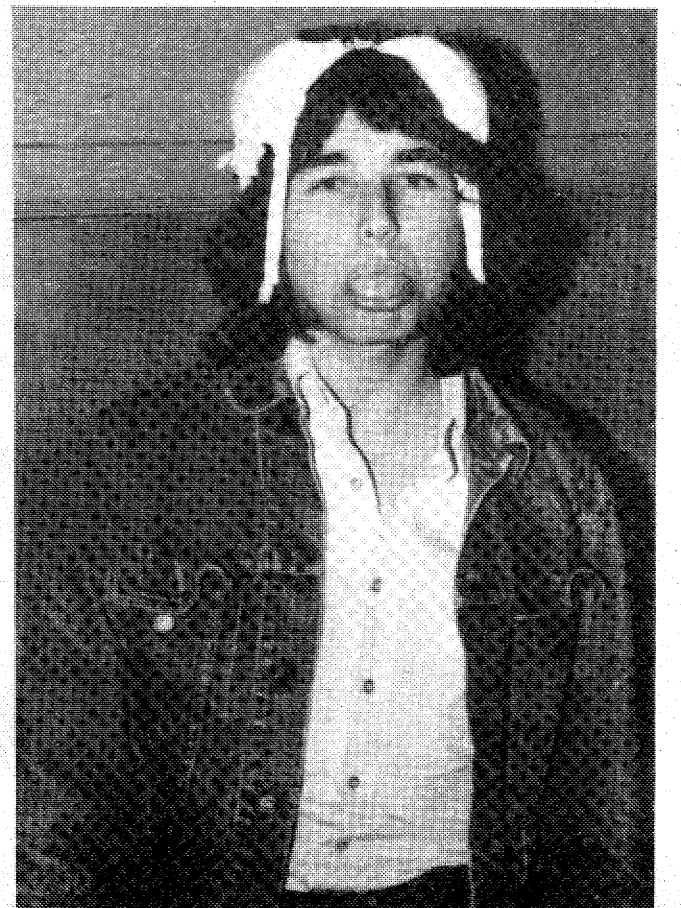
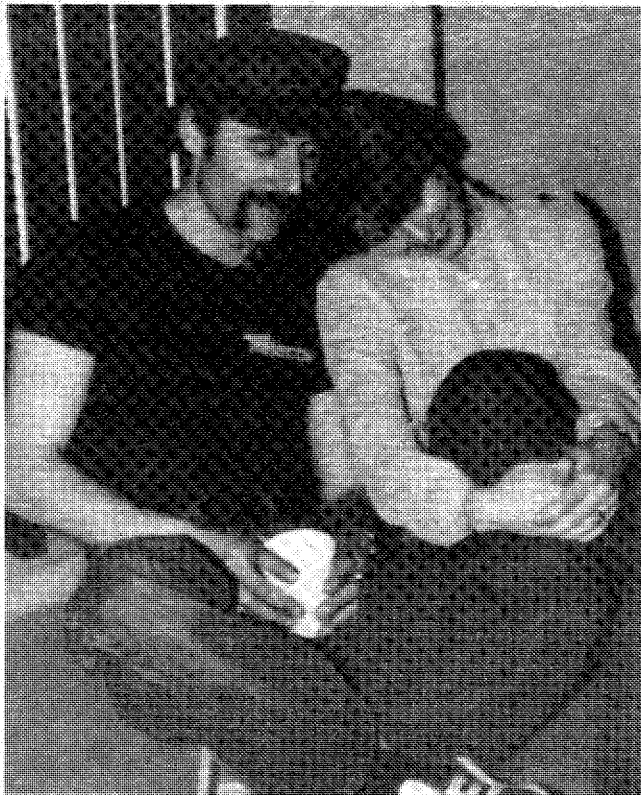
ciative audience always brings out the best in any band and the best is what we got. The likes of Frampton, Zeplin, Foreigner and Costello were heard most of the evening.

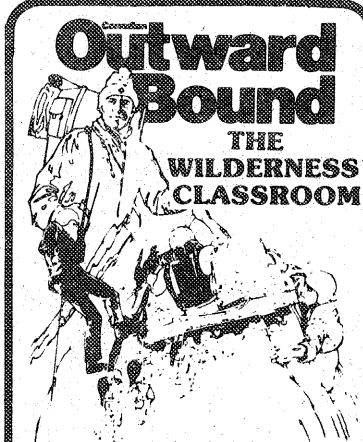

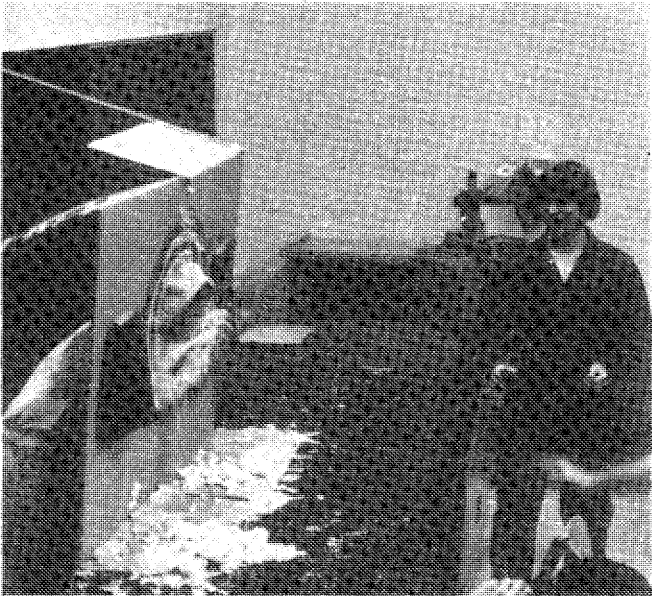

The same incentive brings "Preacher" (MIKE WARREN) into David's fold. A teenage evangelist, Preacher has seduced the daughter of a self-styled spiritual leader known as Father Celestial. When Preacher is shot at in mid-sermon, he knows it's time to leave town. Fast.

Huster takes David to a high school gymnasium where they watch "Swish", a youngster with a fabulous jump shot, in action. David is elated until he discovers that Swish is really Roberta James (MAVIS WASHINGTON); in other words, a girl. David decides that with a headband hiding her hair, a bandage taped around her torso and a pledge never to shower with the rest of the team, no one will know the difference.

David is next led to a tenement loft where D. C. Dacey (HAROLD SYLVESTER), a near-legendary high school star who mysteriously dropped out of sight, is hiding. It seems that D. That, David realizes, is Bo's Achilles heel. He invites the opposing coach to see his team in action, followed by a "friendly" game of pool. When Hustler drops in, Bo's fate is sealed. He can either pay staggering losses to Hustler or add Cadwallader to his school's schedule.

The game is on and now all David has to do -- to satisfy his obsession -- is defeat one of the top-ranked teams in America. It will be even a tougher challenge than he suspects. Waiting on the sidelines, as his squad arrives at the Nevada State arena, is a plainclothesman with a warrant for D. C.'s arrest. Somewhere in the crowd is a hit man with a "contract" on Preacher's handsome head. Deeply in love with D. C., Swish is determined to end her masquerade. And David's wife and mother are en route from the airport.

The referee blows his whistle, the opposing centers jump for the ball, and a delicatessen clerk from downtown Manhattan is about to find out whether he's really a basketball coach.

Mary sat on the bench a little more than she should have. She has excellent skills and was often used when things were not working out on the court.

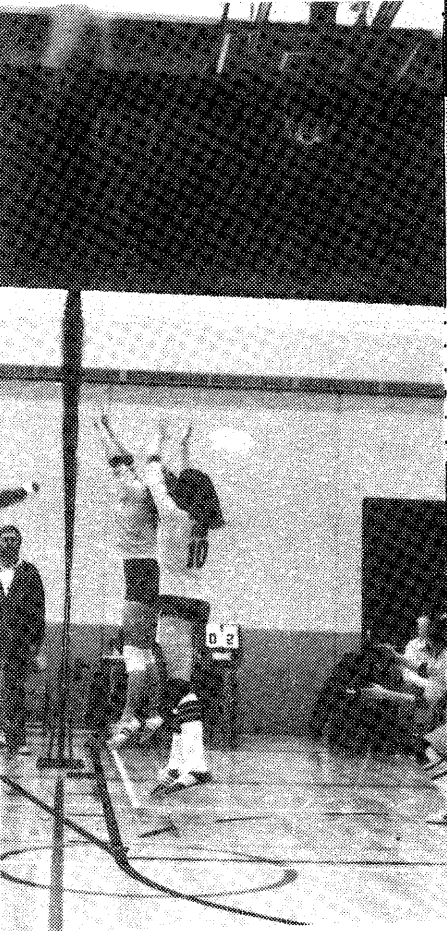
