Dear Editor:

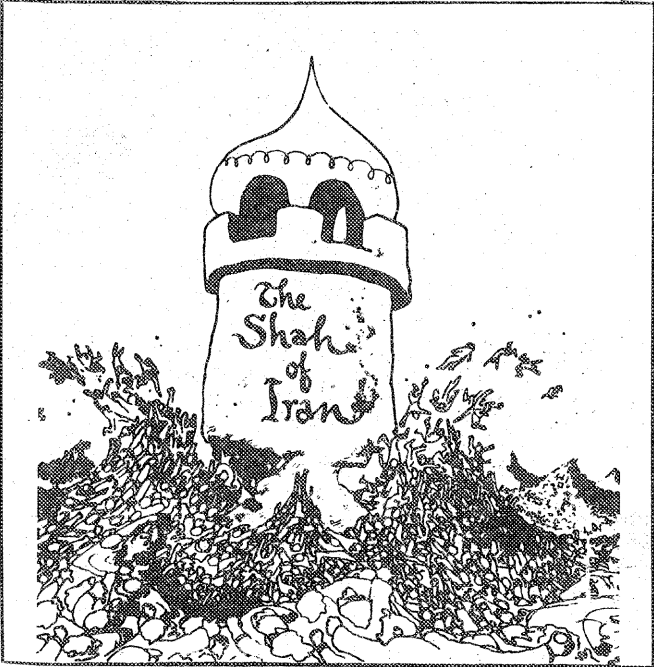
For those who are running for positions in election here are a few general rules about the campaigns.

## SUMMER employment

OTTAWA (CUP) -- The federal government will spend \$113.5 million this summer for job creation for youth, Employment Minister Bud Cullen announced Feb. 15.

But the National Union of Students (NUS) has said this will not solve the serious student summer unemployment program in Canada.

This year's budget for the federal Canada Summer Youth Employment Program

is up from last year's \$4.8 million, Cullen said, and will employ 64,000 young people through direct job creation and will place another 202,000 in private sector jobs.

Young Canada Works, the largest federal program, is expected to provide work for 35,000 youth at a cost of \$62 million.

However, the program does not go far enough in combatting student unemployment, which was 17% last summer and expected to be as high this year, according to NUS researcher Morna Ballantyne.

She noted that, last year, YCW could only fund about a third of the 14,300 project applications with its budget of \$48.8 million. To pay for all of the projects would require \$18 million, she said.

"Another problem with Young Canada Works is that it only provides short-term jobs," she said. "When that is added to the tightened UIC regulations, you are going to have many students unable to qualify for unem-

ployment insurance when they can't find work at the end of this summer or at the beginning of next summer."

Many other government job creation programs, such as the Youth Jobs Corps, suffer from the same problem, Ballantyne.

She also said the government's Canada Employment Center for Students, which are to place 202,000 students in private sector jobs while only directly 1,300 jobs, is a poor solution to unemployment.

"The centres help find jobs, which with current levels of unemployment are scarce, but don't create any new ones," Ballantyne said.

According to Statistics Canada, there are only approximately 40,000 job openings for the nearly one million out of work Canadians.

The government has also gone back on its promise to use the \$580 million cut from the UIC program last fall for job creation, Ballantyne said.

"This year's youth employment program is only

a fifth of what was cut," she said.

Ballantyne said the only way the government can seriously fight youth unemployment is through a program of large-scale direct job creation, she said.

## student loans

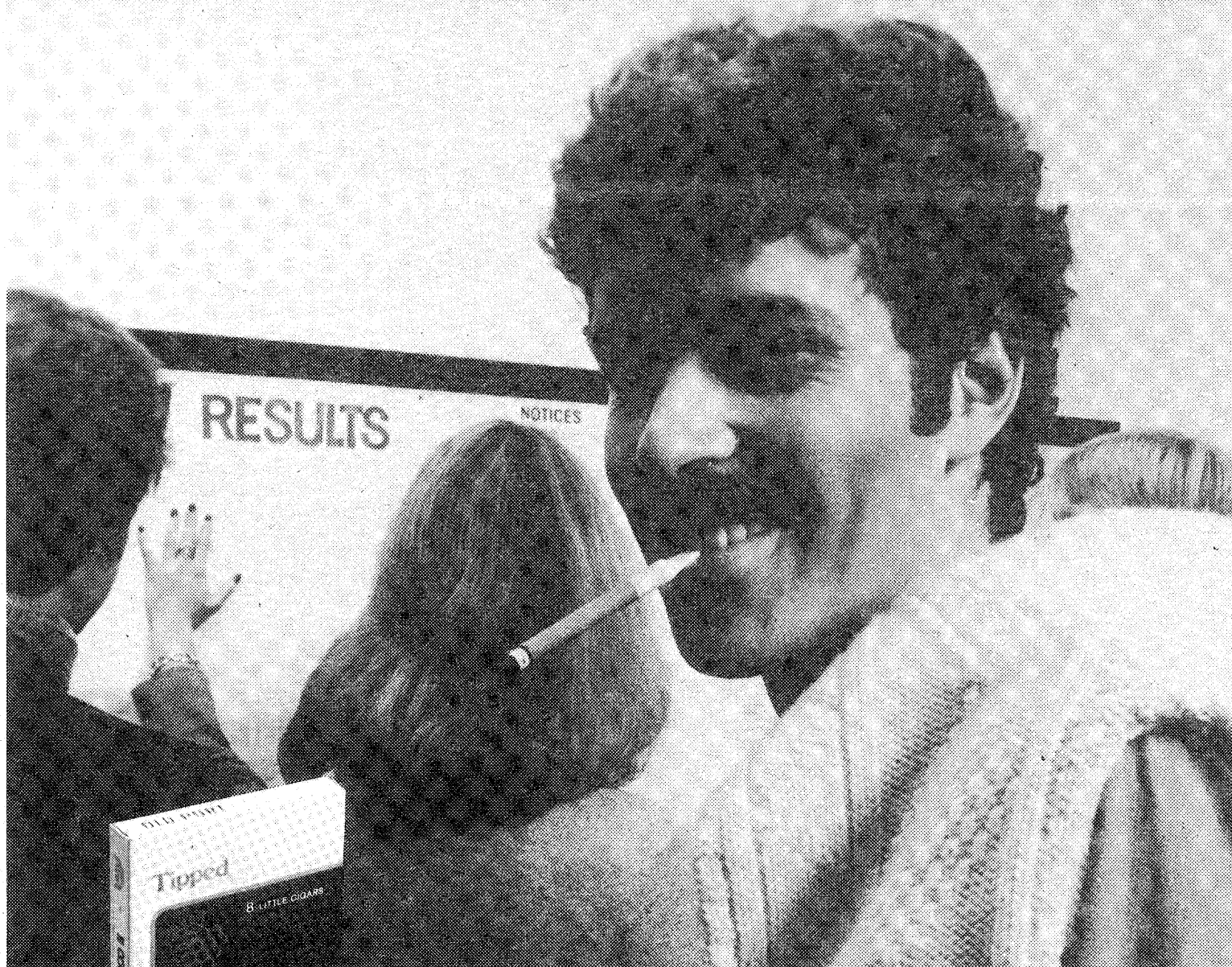
OTTAWA (CUP) -- The budget for the Canada Student Loans Plan (CSLP) will not be increased next year, even though the federal government said it will raise the ceiling for student loans.

According to federal budget estimates for 1979 - 80 released Feb. 19, \$97,796,000 will be allocated for student aid, the same as this year.

Earlier this month, however, the government introduced a bill to raise the current loan ceiling from \$1,800 to \$2,400 per year.

If the new loan ceiling is approved, it may mean fewer students will be able to get loans, according to National Union of Students spokesperson Len Taylor.

## "NORMA RAE"

Produced by Tamara Asseyev and Alex Rose from a screenplay by the distinguished husband - wife writing team of Irving Ravetch and Harriet Frank, Jr., the film is suffused with humor and glows with warmth, even though a clash between two fiercely opposing forces rages at its core.

The heroine of the film is an appealing worker in a Southern industrial town whose life is dramatically altered when circumstances bring about a relationship with a man unlike anyone she has ever known. Although his ways of thinking and living are foreign to her view of life, he becomes her mentor and guides her into an awakening sense of her dignity and worth as a human being. The bond which unites them, however, also involves them in an even larger drama with far-reaching implications which extend beyond their own lives.

In filming a screenplay in which the characters are so carefully delineated, the casting becomes particularly crucial and "NORMA RAE" draws much of its strength

from a brilliantly evolved central performance by Sally Field in the title role. She captures the pathos, the anger, the frustrations, the hundred - and - one complexities of character which make her Norma Rae fully dimensional; a brilliantly realized portrait of a woman in today's society who does not have the advantage of education and background.

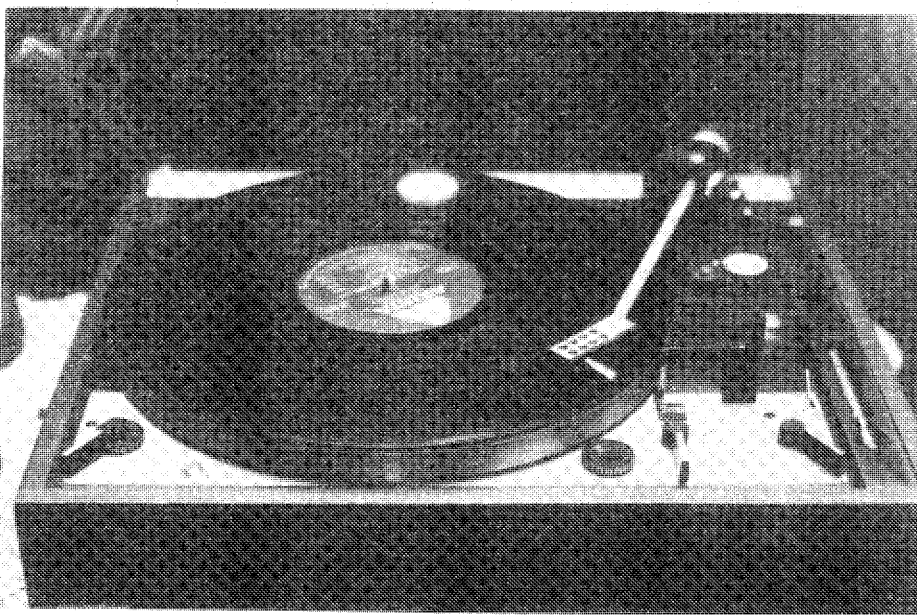
Norma Rae is married and in the role of her husband, sensitive beyond his power to articulate his feelings, Beau Bridges gives a finely etched performance, portraying a Southerner who acknowledges his wife's growth even though he himself cannot keep pace with her.

Ron Leibman brings his personal electricity to the brash New Yorker who acts as the catalyst in Norma Rae's transformation.

Under Ritt's direction, luminous performances by Pat Hingle and Barbara Baxley starring as Norma Rae's parents join in bringing to the film an integrity and humanity that makes "NORMA RAE" a powerfully moving motion picture experience.

After upsetting Red Deer in the semi-finals, NAIT lost three straight to SAIT in the ACAC final. The last game of the series was played at NAIT Friday night before a fairly large crowd.

SAIT scored the only goal of the first period. There were four goals scored in the second frame. Brian Goodfellow tallied twice to put NAIT on the scoreboard.

NAIT trailed 3 - 2 at the end of the second. With 28 seconds gone in the third period, Larry Leblanc, scoring his first goal in the play-offs, tied up the game 3 - 3. SAIT rebounded and scored again at 9:37. Ironically, NAIT's only scorers Brian Goodfellow and Larry Leblanc received a 2 minute minor and 10 minute misconduct each at 13:33. SAIT scored an insurance goal on the power play and later added an empty net goal.

The scores in the series can be misleading, the Ooks were very competitive against SAIT but unfortunately they played catch up hockey in all three games. Coach Perry Pearn stated if

- NAIT could have gotten a lead in any game the outcome may have been different...
- Why was NAIT able to defeat Red Deer and not SAIT? Three main factors:
1. NAIT didn't get the big goal against SAIT, but did against Red Deer.
  2. SAIT got good goaltending; big saves were made when the game could have turned around.
  3. There's a stronger rivalry between Red Deer and NAIT, the players were more intense and emotionally high in Red Deer series.

You have to be proud of the way the hockey team represented NAIT in the play-offs. The Ooks beat the odds in the Red Deer series and never quit in the final against SAIT.

As coach Perry Pearn sums it up, "...it's a good way to finish things, and a positive step towards next year."

On Saturday, Feb. 24, NAIT won the "World's Fastest Concrete Toboggan" race sponsored each year by the Alberta Chapter of the American Concrete Institute.

This year was the fifth annual competition as the races began in 1975 with SAIT the victors. SAIT won the competition again in 1976, University of British Columbia took the honors in 1977, SAIT again in 1978, and this was NAIT's year to carry home the trophy.

NAIT was represented by the the Building Construction Engineering Technology and Civil Engineering Technology. The team who brought home the laurels to NAIT was Building Construction, as they narrowly edged out Washington state by a scant 0.01 of a second. 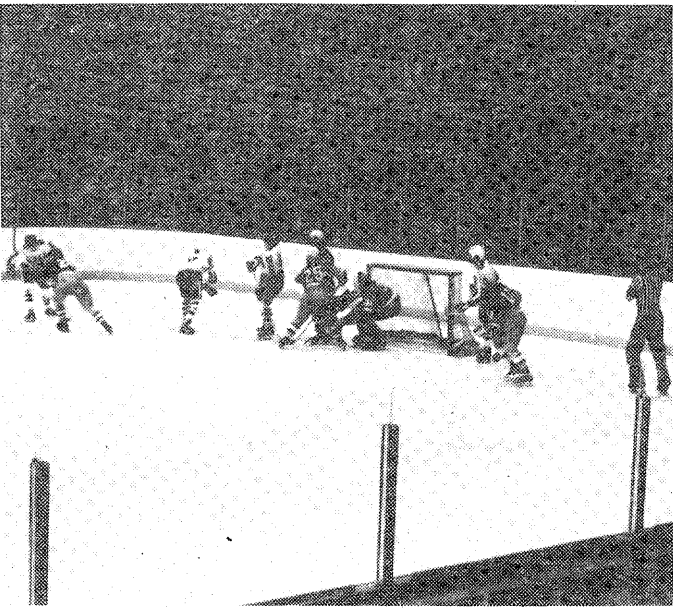
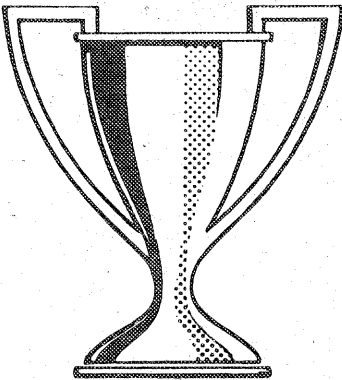
The wild frolic into United States was the 4th ski trip put on by the "In Search of

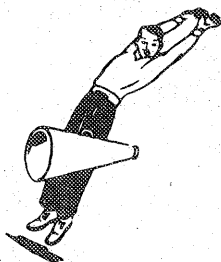
Anyway, we left Vernon and headed for Kamloops for supper. Two hours later, we left Vernon and Headed for Kamloops for supper.
