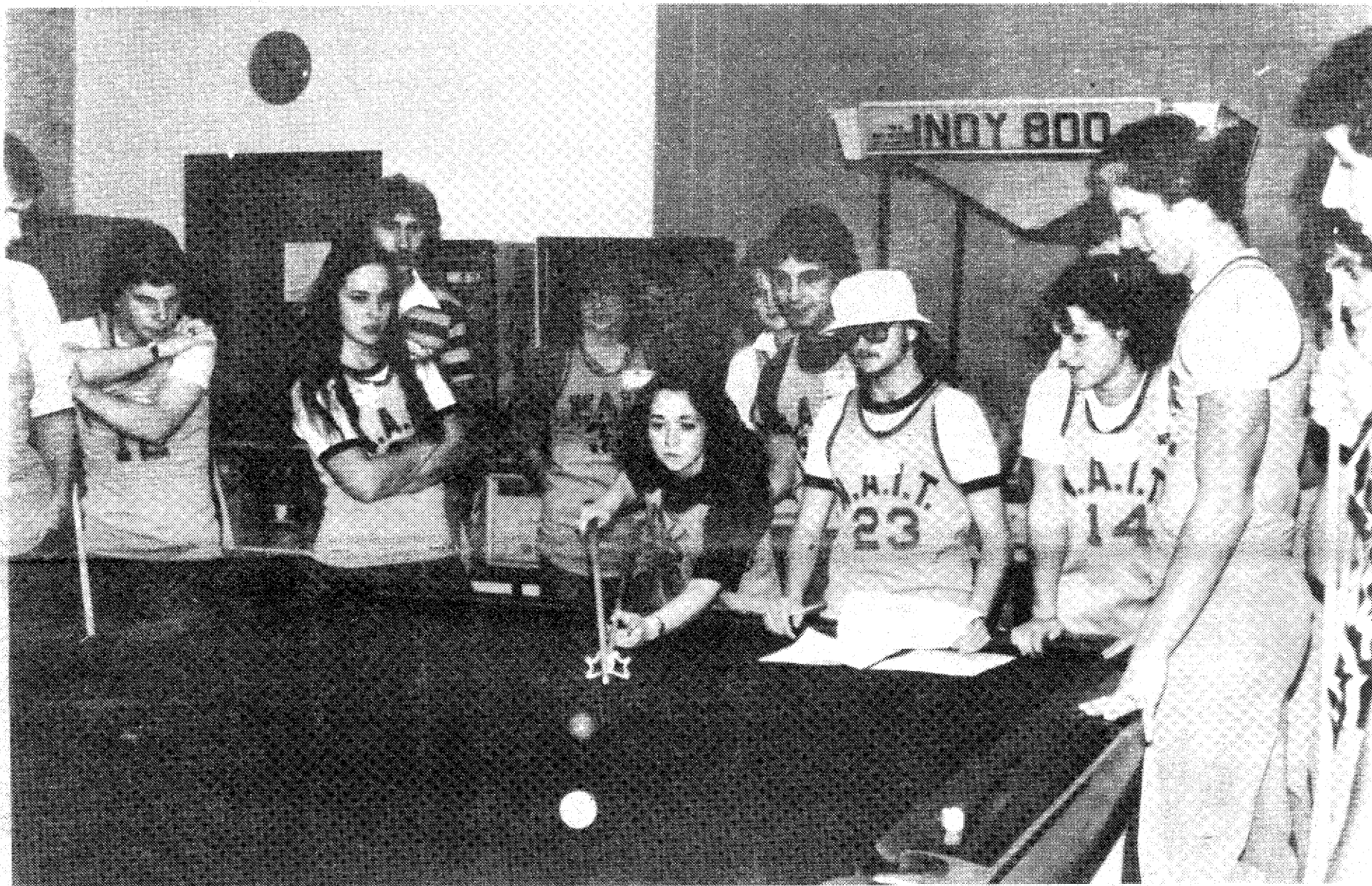

COLLEGE PAPER FACES CLOSURE

SARNIA(CUP)--The Lambton College student newspaper, *The Other Side*, faces a possible closure or amalgamation with the college's journalism school newspaper because of a student council decision made Tuesday, October 16.

Council, in a close vote, decided to force the paper to merge with the journalism newspaper, which is controlled by the administration, if the journalism department agrees to the move, *Other Side* editor, Bob Lawrence said.

"If they get approval from the journalism department that would effectively end the student newspaper," Lawrence said.

Lawrence added that he thinks the administration will not agree with the student

council play but fears that council may simply kill the paper anyway because of strong hostility towards it.

To fight the council, Lawrence and supporters of *The Other Side* have started circulating a petition calling for a general meeting of students at the college, at which the council motion could be overruled by a majority vote of those attending.

Lawrence said the paper has the support of many students and also the student council president and treasurer, who voted against the motion. He said *The Other Side* will argue strongly that the students need an independent, student-controlled newspaper on campus and that the paper avoid closure if students voice their concern about the council action.

COCAINE

NEW YORK (ZNS) In the wake of the success of groups such as "Alcoholics Anonymous" and "Pot-Smokers Anonymous", a New York drug counselor has launched (what else but?) "cocaine anonymous".

John Burrell says he has organized a special treat-

ment group for coke users after finding that thousands of people fear they are abusing the drug, yet have nowhere to turn.

Burrell says he does not believe that the use of cocaine is addictive, but adds that--in his words--"psychologically it can be habit-form-

ing and cause people a lot of trouble".

According to Burrell, the problems that arise from the excessive use of cocaine can be as simple as burning nostrils or as complex as complete psychological dependence.

BIRD BEATS OUT JET

SAN FRANCISCO (ZNS) - The editors of Chemical and Engineering News - usually known for their unerring mathematical prowess-- are probably a bit red-faced after equating the speed of a woodpecker with that of a Concorde jet.

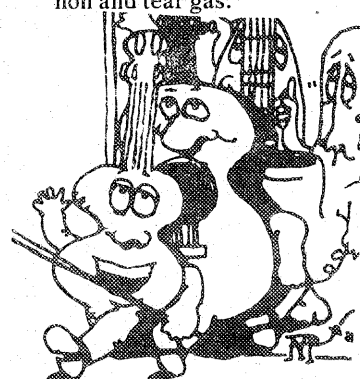
It seems that they made a slight error in their arithmetic when they recently tried to compute the force exerted by a woodpecker as its beak strikes the tree.

They had reported that the hard-headed bird struck the tree at a rather

impressive impact velocity of 1,300 miles an hour.

Engineering readers of the magazine became suspicious when they realized that 1,300 miles per hour is twice the speed of sound; this would require the woodpecker's little head to break the sound barrier twice as it bounced back and forth against a tree.

It turns out the true impact was 13 miles an hour, not 1,300. The research was all part of experiments into what causes whiplash injuries.

EDUCATION: GRANTHAM REPORT ON STUDENT SECONDARY EDUCATION ATTACKED BY ACADEMIC TASK FORCE MEMBER

EDMONTON(CUP) --A member of the Grantham Task Force has attacked many of the recommendations of student contributions to the cost of post-secondary education that the task force made to the provincial government.

"I don't feel the task force really thought about rationales, things like social equity, societal benefits and individual benefits and costs," says Steve Hunka, a task force member from the University of Alberta's educational research services.

Hunka issued a counter report which discusses the beneficiaries of post-secondary education, compares post-secondary education in other countries with Alberta's system and analyses the Alberta Student Loan program. Some of his conclusions:

--Post-secondary education is as valuable to society as it is to the individual; a fact the government of Alberta and the Grantham report tend to under-emphasize.

--The level of tuition fees affects accessibility to post-secondary institutions. In Europe, this problem of social equity has been recognized, and attempts have been made to solve it.

--The advancement and utilization of knowledge should be considered an important part of a province's economic growth.

--Tuition fees are only a small part of a student's

investment in an education. --The operating costs of universities are less than other post-secondary institutions and these operating costs have remained nearly constant in the face of mounting inflation.

--The provincial government should increase its financial commitment to university funding.

--Alberta's government is side-stepping its financial commitment to the Alberta Student Loan program.

Ron Grantham, chairman of the task force says he is pleased a member of the task force chose to investigate the subject further.

"I'm rather glad that Dr. Hunka apparently has the time to do this...he was a valued member of the Task Force.

"I've scanned the report, and what I've seen is very learned, studied, and intellectual...He speaks of the need for greater study, but there are limitations on the time any group of ten could spend. We spent a year and did the best we could."

However, Grantham said the report was only a personal assessment by Hunka.

Minister of advanced education and manpower James Horsman said he had been unable to review Hunka's report yet. However, he said the report would be reviewed in connection with the overall look at student finances.

"I wouldn't like to comment before I've reviewed the whole situation."

STUDENT AID: GOVERNMENT GETTING TOUGH WITH STUDENTS WHO DEFAULT ON STUDENT LOANS

OTTAWA(CUP) --You won't get kneecapped but the federal government has become very tough on people who default on their student loans.

"The RCMP will knock on your door, they can garnish your wages and you will be blacklisted from further government assistance," says Bryce Bell, a student assistance officer at Algonquin College.

Bell says if the person cannot make full payments and shows good faith by talking HIS financial problems over with his or her bank, no problems should arise. But those who skip town will have their case given to a collection agency, he said.

At one time these DEBTS were neglected by former students and the government alike. Bell says the new measures have resulted in about a seven per cent retrieval rate.

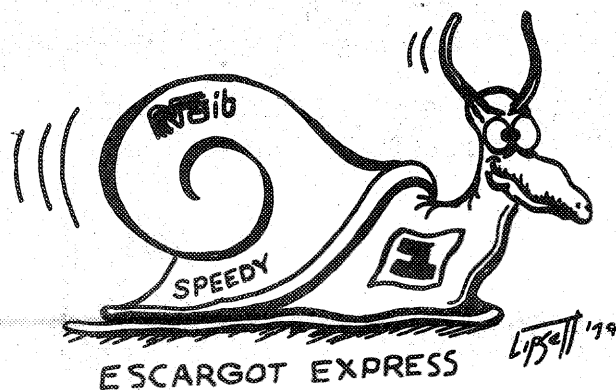

QUEBEC CITY (CUP) — Researchers at the Centre Hospitalier de l'Université Laval are working on a contraceptive that promises to be simpler to use than a condom and more effective than the Pill, with fewer side effects.

It's a contraceptive nose spray.

The contraceptive is a synthetic hormone which is said to substantially reduce the formation of sex hormones in men and women. The researchers hope that this new method will be 100 per cent effective, with fewer side effects than current birth control pills.

But Dr. Fernand Labrie, director of the centre's Molecular Endocrinology Laboratory, said the spray won't be on the market for at least five years.

To begin with, I'd like to ask you to answer three simple questions. Here goes- 1) Who's the most important person in your life? 2) Who's welfare should you be most concerned with? 3) Who's sanity would you most like to see preserved?

Healthy self-concern is one of the most fundamental aspects of positive mental health and is basic to any positive stress reduction program.

There are certain characteristics shown by persons who are "well balanced" and can cope with problems. These persons show:

- 1) a positive self-concern and self-interest
- 2) respect for others
- 3) an inner purpose; they are goal-oriented
- 4) a positive mental attitude
- 5) energy; they manage time effectively
- 6) an ability to prevent and reduce stress

Stress is desirable under many circumstances; stress promotes growth and is a driving force. What is important, is that you have control of stress. There are a multitude of physical and psychological illnesses that can be attributed to stress. You don't have to be middle-aged either, even young adults are adversely affected by stress.

To make stress work effectively for you there are four steps or rules that you must learn to employ.

You must develop an inner purpose; knowledge of a goal will give you a sense of achievement. Don't be afraid to make decisions and realize that you'll have to make some effort, otherwise you are risking frustration. You must choose and set priorities in your life and in your relations

SEXISM: ALBERTA WOMEN'S BUREAU DIRECTOR ONE OF JUDGES FOR TECHNICAL INSTITUTE BEAUTY CONTEST

EDMONTON(CUP) --Beauty pageants may be becoming a thing of the past, but the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT) still tries hard to entertain its students annually with a "Miss NAIT" contest.

with other people. Failure to establish goals leads to depression, lowered self-confidence and the abandoning of your dreams. When you have set goals and have begun working towards them, you are rewarded with increased self-respect and feelings of achievement and fulfillment.

Next, you must limit stress; you must reduce those interpersonal demands that take you away from your goals. You must learn to analyze a situation and ask if it is something you want to do. You will have to learn to say no, to stand up for yourself (no one else will) and to assert yourself in behaviour as well as by your words. This step involves unlearning many concepts from childhood: "Don't say no", "Don't ask for things" and "Don't accept compliments". Now as an adult, you must realize this step as a positive affirmation of your worth.

The third step actually develops with the first two. You will become enthusiastic and will develop a positive mental attitude. These qualities will result in success, self-confidence, self-reliance and the excitement that come from a challenge.

These three rules will not eliminate stress from your life but will channel stress so that it will work for you.

The fourth step is the need for exercise--the benefits from complete physical exertion several times a week are pronounced. Exercise acts as a sort of safety valve--excess stress will be blown off.

Other factors in establishment of a positive stress reduction program include a well-balanced diet and the practise of some form of relaxation exercise. These relaxation exercises might range from just sitting by yourself for several minutes daily, enjoying a favourite past-time or engaging in formal meditation.

Watch for signs of increased stress in yourself and others. These signs include increased anxiety, lowered productivity, increased worry, increasing use of nicotine, alcohol or coffee, increased withdrawal or increased fussiness.

In summary, stress can be positive and you can learn to develop skills to make stress work for you; to gain control of your life. Steps that you can follow to become self-confident, enthusiastic and motivated are:

- 1) practise goal-setting
- 2) learn to say no
- 3) cultivate a positive mental attitude
- 4) exercise regularly

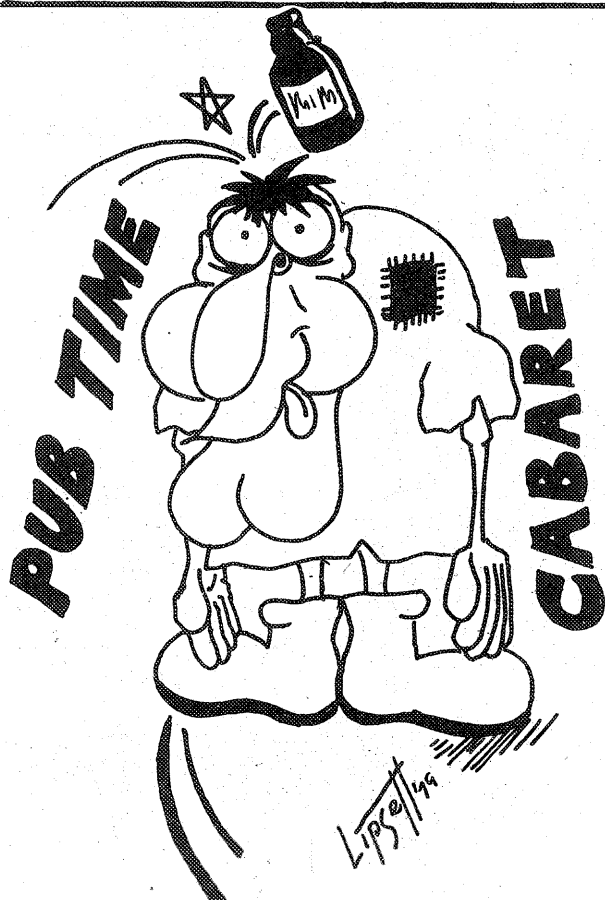

Being a student you probably can't afford number one quality hamburger. This means, that in order to keep away from, fatty meat for supper, hamburger tastes better in a casserole, or hash. In order to make up burgers, which is undoubtedly the fastest way to cook hamburger, this is what I suggest:

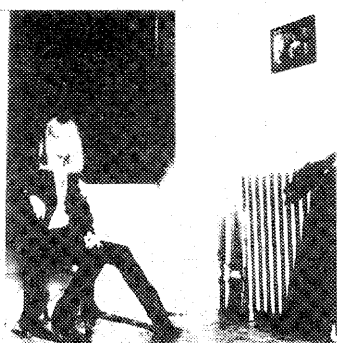

ELLEN FOLEY--
"NIGHTOUT"

Remember that strong female voice singing along with Meat Loaf on his "Bat Out of Hell" album? Well, that was Ellen Foley. Now she's striking out on her own with her first solo record, "Nightout".

Ellen's voice certainly hasn't weakened any since she sang tunes such as "Paradise by the Dashboard Light" with Mr. Loaf. On "Nightout" she belts out song after song, surrounded by a wall of sound erected by producers Ian Hunter and Mick Ronson. (Hunter recently released an excellent solo album entitled "You're Never Alone With a Schizophrenic"; you may also remember him as the driving force behind Mott the Hoople. Ronson was David Bowie's lead guitarist for several years back in his

superb "Ziggy Stardust" era.) On this album, Hunter on keyboards and Ronson on guitar, give Ellen the powerful sound she needs to complement her voice.

Foley has picked a good variety of songs for her album--from "We Belong to the Night", which is somewhat reminiscent of Bruce Springsteen's style; to an old Jagger-Richards tune, "Stupid Girl", which she sings with an appropriate amount of contempt. The only time she ever really reverts to the annoying "Bat Out of Hell" style is during "What's a Matter Baby". But she makes up for this with a moving vocal rendition on "Don't Let Go", a song written by Hunter.

I like the title cut from this album--it sports unusual

backup vocals and interesting lyrics, telling of the insecurity of a girl alone on a night out at a New Wave club.

This lady is not for everyone--she has a very powerful, dramatic style. It's a bit too dramatic for me, I'm afraid; I liked the album better for its talented backup musicians than for Foley herself. She may also have trouble getting out from under the huge shadow of Meat Loaf. Associating with him may have done her credibility some harm, since there are some of us who don't care for him all that much. However, Foley should be judged on her own merit; she certainly is a talented singer.

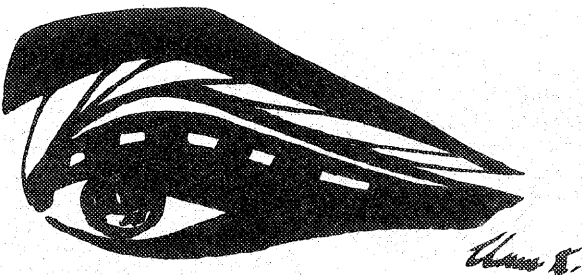

liantly, as the Oaks buzzed the Camrose goaltender in the final five minutes of the second period.

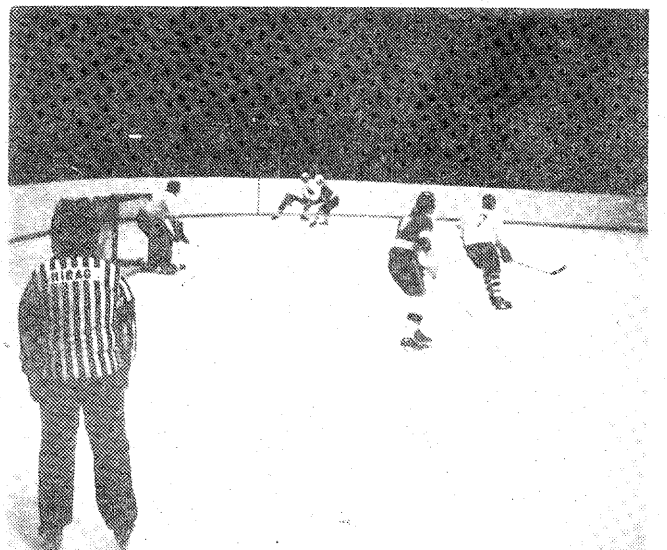

NAIT's defence fell victim again on Camroses seventh goal, when Don French was left all alone in front of helpless Rene Brodeur.

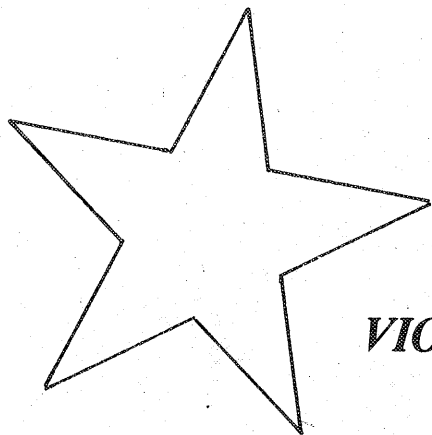
