TAYLOR CHARGES PREMIER SELLING ALBERTA SHORT ON OIL PRICES

Alberta Liberal Leader Nick Taylor charges that Premier Lougheed is selling Alberta short by asking for world prices in cash for Alberta oil rather than taking a portion in cash and the rest in changes in the Constitution and transportation system plus an option to buy back oil and gas at less than world prices from the Canadian frontiers as they come on stream over the next 20-30 years (a swap).

The Alberta Liberal Leader

claims that because the oil companies are doing quite well, increased cash receipts for oil means more dollars into government pockets but less into Alberta citizen's pockets as it is highly unlikely that the Alberta government would implement any significant shielding of the Alberta consumer.

"This will be particularly crippling for the farmer who cannot easily pass on the increased costs in fuel and fertilizer".

Taylor said that any OPEC country can tell the Premier that extra dollars are of little use as their value erodes so rapidly and this is doubly true in Alberta where we already have 5 billion dollars that the Premier and his cabinet cannot think of any use for.

"I cannot understand why the Premier was prepared to swap Alberta gas for Alaska gas down the road in order to get quick exports to the United States and yet he will

not swap with fellow Canadians for later deliveries down the road".

Taylor maintains that a swap of Alberta gas and oil for gas and oil from Canada's frontiers down the road would preserve farm incomes, give Eastern Canadians time to adjust to world prices and finally, be a better investment for the Heritage Trust Fund than "Piling up depreciating dollars which the cabinet cannot invest wisely".

### society needs change

OTTAWA(CUP)--Despite numerous claims that students today are more conservative than their radical predecessors of the turbulent 1960s, a recent survey shows that most students believe our society needs fundamental changes.

Major oil companies, major corporations, political parties and the current economic system all need fundamental reform, according to more than 70% of the university and college students polled in one of the most comprehensive surveys of student attitudes ever conducted.

J. Richard Finlay, who supervised the study, says the major difference between students of the 1960s and those of today is that now students are more able to manage and cope with their frustration internally.

"At the heart of today's student mood is a deep and abiding skepticism for our principal economic and political institutions, and especially for their leaders," Finlay wrote in Saturday Night magazine.

An amazing 87% support the nationalization of Canada's major oil companies, Finlay reports, and 91% feel that "we are a democracy in name only, that special interests run the country, and that ordinary people really don't count."

While 84% of the 840 students from 10 Ontario campuses that were interviewed claim to be happy with the way their personal lives are going, 94% say that they have become more skeptical about large organizations in the past two years and 89% say they have become more disillusioned with the "system" in the same period.

Only seven percent of the students said they have a great deal or fair amount of confidence in major corporations, with oil companies picking up the support of a mere 6% and advertising agencies only 4 percent.

Those who the students believe contribute more harm than good to society also make an interesting list. Oil company presidents, with a negative rating of 95%, are

closely followed by bank presidents and corporate executives at 92%. Only public relations experts, advertising executives and the traditional bad guy, the bill collector, are thought worse of.

What's in store for the future? While 67 % of the students are confused about the rest of this country, 79% think North American society is at an historical turning point.

have been a hypnotist for over 20 years and have an honours degree in Psychology. I have helped many patients under psychiatric referral.



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## AWARDS NIGHT 1979 ..

### A MISERABLE FAILURE



The purpose of the Awards Night is to honour NAIT's top students. It also offers those students the opportunity to meet and thank those who sponsored their awards. It is hoped that this will impress the sponsors. In this way they will both continue their support, and offer these students future employment. Was this accomplished?

Awards night 1979 started with long line ups for dinner tickets. Also, no coat check. Sponsors and guests were expected to leave their coats in the open or sit on them and be uncomfortable.

Next they journeyed to another part of the campus. Again, they were uncomfortable as they searched for their tables.

### Teacher Shortage Projected

CALGARY (CUP) The current drop in the number of education graduates in Alberta indicates that the province may face a shortage of teachers in the near future.

The drop in Alberta graduates comes in the wake of reports from the University of British Columbia suggesting that province may soon face similar shortages.

The University of Calgary graduated 540 qualified teachers last year but expects to turn out up to 100 fewer in the next 12 months, according to associate dean of education (student affairs) Roy Conklin.

The current decline in graduations, which Conklin believes will reverse and level off in a year or two, is due to the drop in enrollment which occurred 4 to 5 years ago. At that time the Alberta teaching market was flooded with both Alberta university grads and with out-of-province teachers to pick up the slack.

A half hour later the Master of Ceremonies rose, spoke, and quickly sat down. The sound system was so poor you were left wondering what happened.

The food and service was inadequate.

Meeting your sponsor is important, so table introductions were quickly passed around. It was soon realized that at most tables there were no sponsors, instructors, people with similar awards or even from common programs. The result was little conversation.

Eventually it was time for the evenings highlight --the awards. Everyone was sitting in anticipation, only to be told that to get things over with the awards would not be

given out. After the evening you were to return to the first auditorium and pick up an envelope. The winners of the Queen Elizabeth Awards were asked to stand in mass, followed by all other winners. A polite applause was given both.

Do you think they felt honoured?

The job of locating your sponsor was made impossible without the help of name tags and/or binoculars. As each representative's name was called, they stood up. You were expected to spot and recognize your representative from across a room, filled with over 700 people. It was very poor. Do you think the sponsors were impressed?

Nine hundred out-of-province teachers were hired three years ago, and Conklin estimates a similar number will be required this year and in the near future.

An Alberta teacher shortage could occur at any time if out-of-province applications were to fall off. Even now, rural areas and smaller school districts have difficulty attracting quality teachers.

Next, the Deputy Minister of the Dept of Advanced Education & Manpower, Dr. H. Kolesar, gave his interpretation of a speech.

What then could have

been the main purpose of the evening? Ask for more money? The anti-climax came when a few award winners were handed empty envelopes.

This years Awards Night was a miserable failure. It was too large, too impersonal and very poorly organized.

In future if the representatives must be individually recognized, at least have two speakers alternately call their names. Also, if we are going to impress the business community, their secretaries should be contacted first to learn how to pronounce their names. But, even more important, don't miss any representatives, as was done this year.

I sincerely recommend that, before another awards night is held, those who are responsible should first set priorities. And second, reduce the size to a number that will allow those priorities to be accomplished with some class. If not, I recommend that the Awards Night be cancelled.

## BENZENE STILL USED

WINNIPEG (CUP)--A chemical, known to induce leukemia-cancer of the blood-is being used by University of Winnipeg science students in numerous laboratory assignments.

Several students who have been working with the chemical benzene, said they had never been warned as to the potential harm it could cause.

Benzene is used in at least two first-year organic chemistry assignments, and also in one physical chemistry assignment.

According to Dave Hatcher, who teaches 11 sections of the 1st year organic chemistry class, the chemistry dept. has been trying to phase out the use of benzene over the past few years "because it is carcinogenic (a cancer causing agent)."

Fred Barth, chairperson of the chemistry dept., said benzene was used frequently in the past, but now is used "only in limited quantities". He added the amount of benzene students are exposed to is not in sufficient quantities to be harmful.

However, Michael Archer, a Princess Margaret Hospital chemist and cancer researcher in Toronto, told a Toronto Globe and Mail reporter last month, "There shouldn't be any contact with it (benzene) by students. It is prudent to eliminate or reduce any exposures" because it is known to cause leukemia. Archer was commenting on the decision by the Toronto School Board to ban benzene from use in high school classrooms.

Six students who have taken the first-year organic chemistry classes said they were never alerted to the dangers of the chemical.

One student, Erol Genik, said if the liquid benzene was ever spilled, "there was no big concern on anybody's part." He said because benzene does not cause a visible reaction with the skin or any surface, people tend to treat it like "water".

Benzene is used mostly as a solvent and is most dangerous when its vapours are inhaled.

The lab manual for introductory organic chemistry contains no warning that benzene vapours are extremely toxic. One experiment involves taking an open-faced container of benzene and lighting it with a match to test its flammability.

The introductory physical chemistry manual warns that benzene is "very flammable", and warns students not to go near it with the flame of a burner.

Fred Barth said, "usually we try to let them (students) know about the dangers involved," but, he added, "I can't say we accomplish this aim too well."

The dangers associated with benzene have been known for years although it has only been in the last few years that it has been linked to causing cancer.

The Textbook of Organic Chemistry, extracted from the university library, and published in 1951, states that benzene causes "the destruction of red blood corpuscles, and even in very low concentrations is dangerous". The book adds that benzene should only be used with proper precautions because it is highly toxic.

Both Genik and another student, Gary Krutish, said they are not impressed with precautions being taken in the science dept. Besides not being warned about benzene's dangers, the pair said the lab would sometimes be supervised by teaching assistants whose only qualifications were that they had taken the course previously.

This problem may not be the professors' fault since instructors like Dave Hatcher are forced to teach two labs sessions at once in some instances.

Wayne Anderson, student association president, and also a science student, feels there are other factors at work which prevent proper precautions from being taken. Anderson said the amount of time given to complete lab assignments (three hours) is far too short. He said students are forced to work quickly to complete their assignments and when this happens "all caution is thrown to the wind".

In Ontario high schools, benzene was replaced by a substitute product found to be just as good and far less toxic. Benzene is not used in Manitoba high schools after a warning was issued by the dept. of education about the chemical's dangers. The University of Winnipeg sets its own regulations and does not have to comply with directives from the dept. of education.

Dr. Chandler, dean of Chemistry at the University of Regina, said benzene has been phased out in first- and second- year lab experiments here. "It has been replaced with poluenene," which has basically the same properties as benzene but is not carcinogenic.

## NAITSA REFERENDUM

On Wednesday, December 5, 1979 during common hour (1:15 p.m.) the NAIT Students' Association will, by order of council, be holding a referendum in order to amend and update our Constitution. You will be asked to vote on three (3) separate issues, with lots of opportunity to ask questions. Here are the Proposed Amendments and our reasons for backing them.

### Proposal #1

An amendment to the constitution can be held in one of two ways:

- ☐ a referendum with a quorum of 200 people or,
- ☐ as council sees fit, brought forth and passed at 3 consecutive council meetings.

Our reasons for backing this proposal are as follows:

-in the past 5 years, a quorum has only been met once, making it extremely difficult for the NAITSA council to update and modify the constitution as needed.

-council meetings are open to any student thereby still allowing anyone with an interest in the matter to speak forth.

-there will still be the required 10 days notice of any proposed amendments giving anyone concerned ample opportunity to prepare and present their viewpoints.

### Proposal #2

A \$10 increase in Student Fees to take effect Sept. 1, 1980 to be divided up as follows:

- \$5 to the Athletic Board,
- \$5 to the NAITSA council

Our reason for backing this proposal are as follows:

-The Athletic Board has had to make severe budget cuts due to the lack of funds, because:

- I Intercollegiate
  - i) Major & minor officials rates have increased
  - ii) equipment and supplies are up 200%
  - iii) travel, accomadation and meal money have increased at a rate of 15% per year.
  - iv) medical supplies and examination costs have increased.

II Intramural

- i) intramural refs pay increased 20% over the past 4 years.
- ii) equipment and supplies have increased 200%
- iii) rentals for intramurals such as green fees, curling ice rentals have increased 15%

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iv) printing and promotional costs have also increased.

-NAIT has one of the best intramural sport programs available and we would like to see it continued with an improved quality of equipment, referees, and at the same pace as last year.

-the NAITSA funds is still around the break-even mark financially, but would like to set up a building fund for a Students' Union Building in the near future which should have, among other things, a lounge where we could go after class for a couple of cheap beer.

-The Nugget and Yearbook are much improved this year, requiring greater subsidy from NAITSA.

-In addition to this year's Frosh Week, Queen Week, Shinerama Week, NAITSA is hosting the 1980 Greater Northern Toboggan Race, which will, to a large extent, be subsidized by us.

-Common hour events have been increased as well as Friday afternoon pubtimes this year.

-Money is needed to counter ever increasing inflation and operating expenses.

### Proposal #3

A salary increase for the following NAITSA Executive positions to take effect December 1, 1979:

Vice-President	from \$85 to \$135 per month
Athletics Chairman	from \$85 to \$135 per month
Publications Chairman	from \$85 to \$135 per month
Secretary	from \$85 to \$135 per month
Treasurer	from \$85 to \$135 per month
Activities Chairman	from \$85 to \$135 per month

Our reasons for backing this proposal are as follows:


-Salaries have not been increased since the early 1970's while inflation has pretty well doubled the cost of living since that time.

-The amount of time and work that is involved in these positions should more than justify the increase, and if calculated on an hourly basis, earnings would still be, even with the increase, well below the national minimum wage.

-When compared to other institutions, it would still be on the lower end of the scale.

WALTER ZWOL  
EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY

This is Zwol's second album since leaving his former group, Brutus. It is receiving a fair amount of FM airplay right now, which makes for a refreshing alternative to the more widely-heard music other Canadian groups such as Trooper and Prism.

There is nothing unique about "Effective Immediately"; it dishes up some fairly standard rock and roll, with the usual lyrical themes (*the boys, love, heartache*, etc.). But the music sounds fresh and clean; it's the kind of

A couple of cuts that stand out are "Try It (You'll Like It)" and "Cheerleader".





Playing the part of good hosts, NAIT bowed out of the tournament Friday night, losing 62-51 to Grant McEwan.



Leading scorers in the game for the Oaks were Gene Gerwing and Wayne Squires, both ending up with 16


points on the night.
