HIGHER TUITION FEES

EDMONTON (CUP)-- Tuition fees at Alberta universities will increase next year, but the provincial government has not yet decided the amount of the increase, according to Jim Horsman, Minister of Advanced Education and Manpower.

Horsman had few other answers to student questions about fee levels and the provincial student loans program at a recent forum at the University of Calgary.

Asked whether he thought the proportion of student contributions to the cost of their education was fair (currently about 15%), Horsman said he was "not in a position to say whether I support it or not".

He pointed out that the proportion had been declining over the years, but added that he had "a sort of feeling that the proportion should remain about the same".

Horsman fielded several questions by saying he had not had the opportunity to meet with the appropriate people, or that his department was still in the decision making process.

Horsman said the important aspects in the department's review of the student loan program are remissions and grants, the age of independence, inter-provincial coordination, and the loan level.

He did not say if the levels would increase or decrease for the next academic year.

The minister stated that his department has not released any conclusions about the recommendations in the Grantham report, which was released last spring.

The report recommended increased tuition fees, and changes in the student loan program.

When asked when students might expect to know what recommendations from the report have been rejected, Horsman would only say that he will be meeting with the Federation of Alberta Students later in November.

hash prices broadcast

Netherlands radio station broadcasts street price of hash in effort to keep costs down

AMSTERDAM(ZNS)-- Dutch hashish smokers, hit by spiralling inflation that has forced prices up to \$7.50 a gram from \$2.25, are looking to a radio station for help.

Radio Vara, a national Netherlands radio network, says it will return to broadcasting the street prices of

hashish in the country in an effort to halt the ballooning cost of the drug.

Hashish and marijuana smokers in Holland are subject only to a fine if arrested for possession.

For eight years Radio Vara has broadcast a 35-second spot each Saturday which quotes the week's prices for favourite brands of hashish. In January of last year, however, the network decided to suspend the program and prices zoomed skyward.

Radio Vara says it is confident that announcing prices will force greedy dealers to keep prices down.

MINISTERIAL STATEMENT

by HONOURABLE JAMES D. HORSMAN, Minister
Advanced Education and Manpower

Mr. Speaker, traditionally in Alberta, academic degrees have been awarded by universities only, and this right is granted by the Universities Act. During the past several years, however, there has been increasing interest on the part of private colleges to be granted the authority to confer their own degrees in areas other than Divinity.

In particular, Canadian Union College near Lacombe, Camrose Lutheran College, and Concordia College in Edmonton, have indicated their aspirations in this direction through submissions requesting amendments to their respective Acts. Subsequently, in October 1978, an amendment to the Universities Act which would have enabled private institutions to grant degrees was introduced. Mr. Speaker, since that time, our Government has received a variety of well-reasoned responses on the subject from the university community.

During recent months, the issue has been examined by a special Caucus and Cabinet Committee on Private Colleges Policy. After careful review and assessment of proposals and alternatives, a resolution of this issue can be proposed. Mr. Speaker, the Government believes that baccalaureate degree-granting opportunities for private colleges in Alberta should be enhanced.

Each of the three colleges, mentioned previously, currently has an affiliation agreement with the University of Alberta. The colleges offer courses at the first and second-year level which are recognized for credit when students transfer.

The proposed policy will encourage the private colleges and Alberta's universities to establish affiliation agreements which will extend credit courses at the colleges to the third and fourth year levels. Each private college will then recommend to the affiliate university candidates for baccalaureate degrees to be awarded to qualifying students who have completed their studies at the private college.

During the Spring session, Mr. Speaker, appropriate amendments to existing legislation will be introduced to enable students to pursue baccalaureate degree programs at private colleges in Alberta; and to ensure those students that the quality of their programs is maintained. As well, those private colleges acquiring extended affiliation will gain representation on the Universities Coordinating Council.

Mr. Speaker, private colleges will continue to be eligible for operating funds, including those associated with additional years of course-work under revised affiliation agreements, but not for capital support.

I would like to take this opportunity to recognize those who addressed this question --the private colleges for their commitment and enthusiasm; and the entire university community for its thoughtful deliberations and recommendations.

Mr. Speaker, this position represents a significant policy initiative in post-secondary education in Alberta. I look forward to its implementation and the diverse opportunities available to students wishing to pursue baccalaureate degrees in our province.

student residences-- u of c bids for 1988 winter olympics

CALGARY (CUP)--The University of Calgary may get a \$23 million student residence if Calgary is successful in its bid for the 1988 Winter Olympics.

Plans for the residence are awaiting the outcome of a university reort on student housing scheduled for completion at the end of next year.

The complex would hold 2,000 students and would probably be suitable for married couples. In addition, part of the \$23 million would be used to upgrade existing dining facilities and tunnels, according to Frank King, chair of the Calgary Olympic Development Association (CODA).

University president Norman Wagner cautioned that "nothing has been decided at all" on the project but says there have been talks between CODA and the board of governors.

Wagner feels one of the disadvantages of the proposal is the number of years it would take to implement the plan.

"It'll be several years and I'm not sure we can wait that long," he said.

He emphasized that the university is concerned with the housing needs of students. Referring to the CODA proposal and the university's needs he said, "if the two dovetail; that's fine. If they don't that's tough."

Advanced education minister Jim Horsman says that CODA has had limited contact with his department concerning the proposal.

"In fact, it is non-existent," Horsman told U of C students at a forum Nov. 1.

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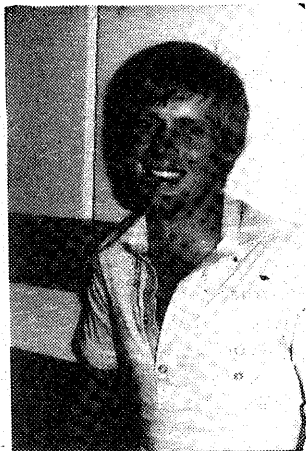

Only this issue of the Nugget is available for PUBLIC discussion before the day of the vote. This is due to no publishing next week because of the finals. However we feel that it is important to present our objections now to allow equal time to study both sides of the issues.

Our objections are as follows in point form.

Proposal #1

--the Amendment itself is not clearly defined. What are we amending?

--what is the present wording of the constitution so that we can accurately judge the proposed changed ourselves?

--does NAITSA propose that an amendment be made to the constitution at future amendments "as council see fit; forth and passed consecutive councilings?"

--does this really mean that NAITSA will successfully circumvent the use of a student referendum?

--with this amendment the only way of opposing a change, initiated by council, would be council "allowing anyone with an interest in the matter to speak forth."

This gives the students even less power than they presently have.

--is there no other possible method or recourse?

--may we suggest a proposal to lower the quorum to 100 people?

--some means for students participation is needed besides talk?!

COMMENTS REGARDING NAITSA'S REASONS

--what effort in the past, or for that matter the present, has NAITSA expended concerning informing students of the need, purpose and function of a referendum?

--finally is the notice to students of 10 days sufficient? It allows only one NUGGET issue in which to communicate publicly.

Proposal #2 INCREASE IN STUDENT FEES

Approx. 4250 full-time students (not counting apprentices)

-Tuition fees were \$320 of which \$35 go directly to NAITSA and \$10 towards Special Service fee.

The GRANTHUM REPORT on TUITION FEES expects an 8-9% increase in Gov't fees next year.

I know that the student council works hard to bring you these activities. So I feel that future events will not be subject to such wide spread disappointment.

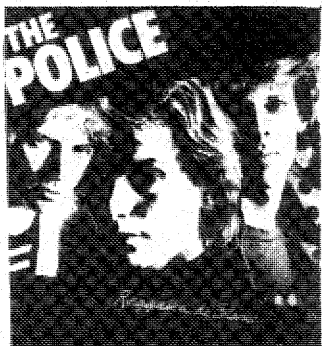

THE POLICE-- "Regatta de Blanc"

The Police's second album, *Regatta de Blanc*, follows hot on the heels of their debut release, *Outlandos d'Amour*. (You may remember the hit single "Roxanne" from that album) This talented group, consisting of Andy Summers on guitar, Stuart Copeland on drums, and Sting on bass and vocals, have taken new wave, rock, and reggae music and blended them into an interesting and unique style which stubbornly refuses to be slotted into any one category.

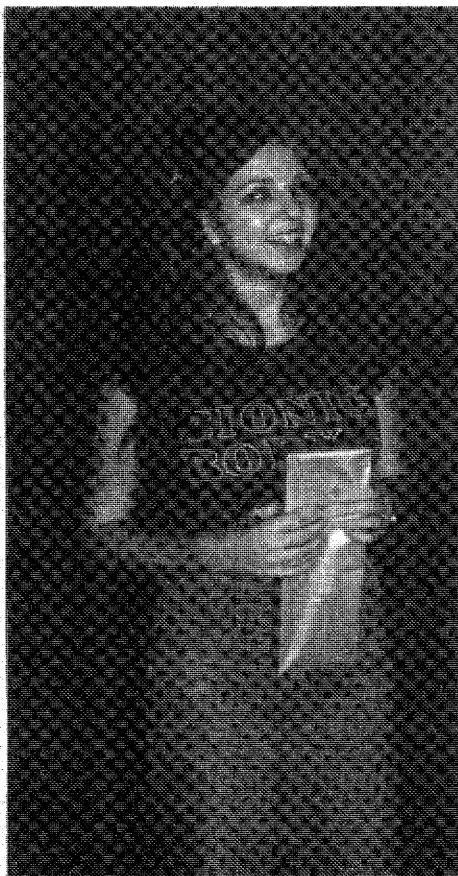
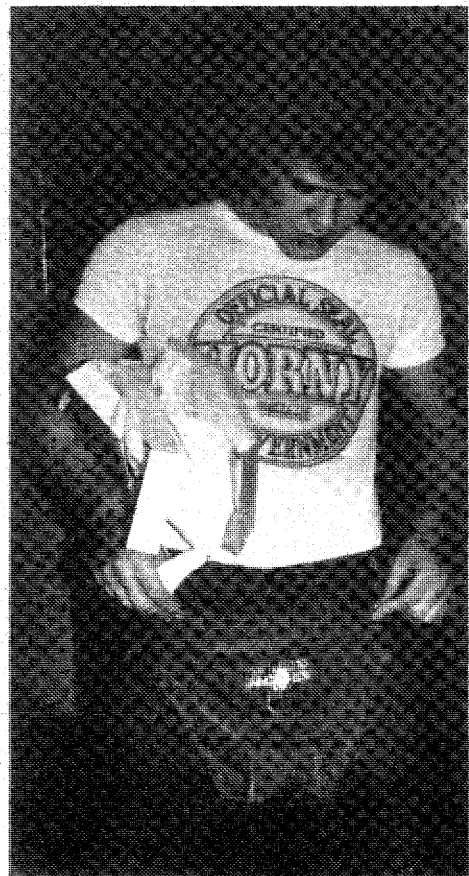
This album, although similar to their first one, is

generally stronger, both in terms of material and delivery. The drums and throbbing bass set down a strong rhythm, leaving Summer's guitar free to weave through the beat. This reggae feel with its unconventional emphasis on the second and fourth beats of each bar, is particularly evident on cuts such as "The Bed's Too Big Without You", and "Walking On the Moon" (which has a pleasant, spacey sound). The reggae gives way to rock on cuts such as "Contact" and "Message in a Bottle", the band's current single release.

Regatta de Blanc has a large share of fine tunes; my favourite cut is "Bring on the Night", a rich blend of guitars, bass and drums, featuring catchy vocal harmonies and that infectious reggae beat.

One small criticism--the band could tighten up their harmony a bit--in places it sounds a touch off-key. But on the whole, this is an album with an "arresting" sound.

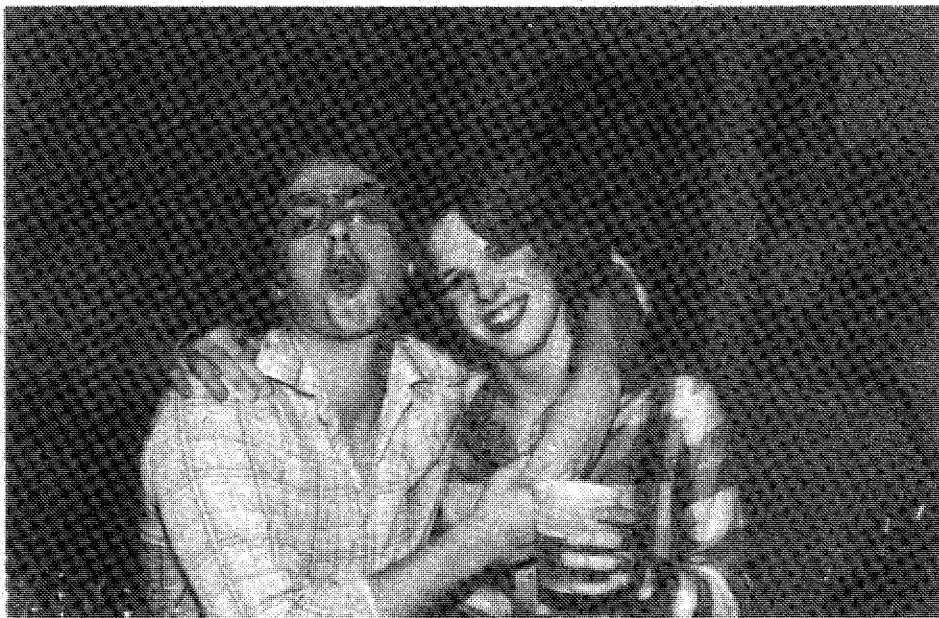

CORN BEEF DINNER

In a large pot full of cold water,

add: --corn beef, 2-3 lbs.
--1 clove garlic
--1 black pepper
--1 bay leaf

Bring to a boil, cover, and reduce heat. Simmer about 15 minutes longer or until meat is tender.

Now add:

--4 medium carrots
--4 medium potatoes
--1 medium onion

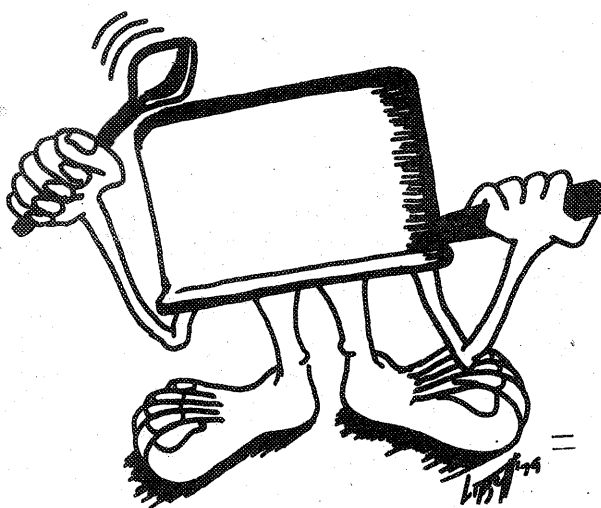
Continue cooking another 15 minutes. Finally add 1 medium cabbage cut into thin slices. (when buying cabbage keep an eye open for traces of worms. They can

be detected by little white spots on the leaves. Though there seldom are traces, it is still a good idea to practise smart shopping practises)

Continue cooking for another 15 minutes. Then serve your corn beef dish.

Cabbage is a good buy, for price and nutrition reasons in the winter time. It's a good idea to stay away from lettuce in the winter months, because of the high price, and lettuce is composed mostly of water, and contains little vitamin content. It's better to use cabbage for coleslaw, for your salads.

and he put me in a green garbage bag and stuffed me into a garbage can.

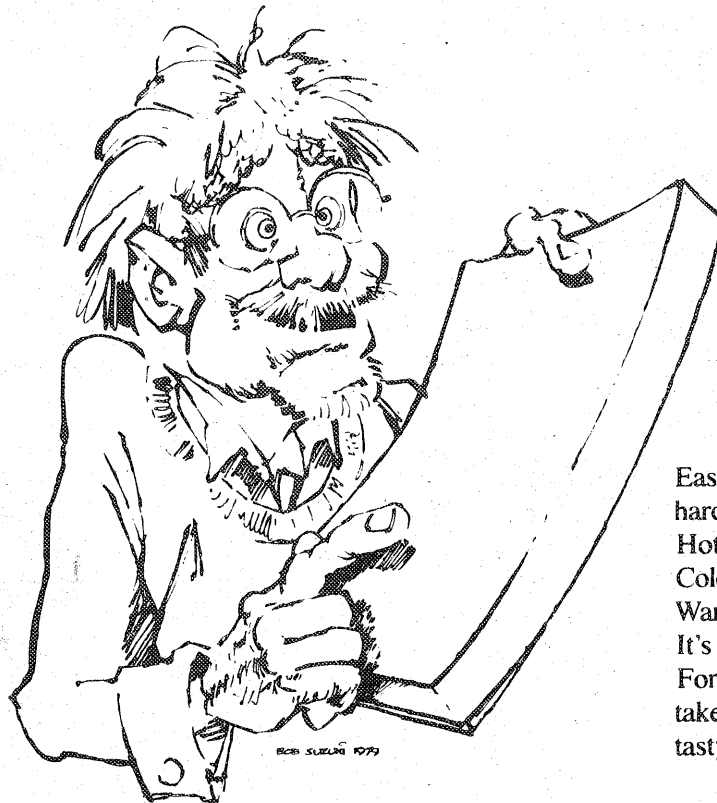
A bum came along that was garbage picking and said I was the most beautiful thing he had ever seen. Boy he must have been drunk.

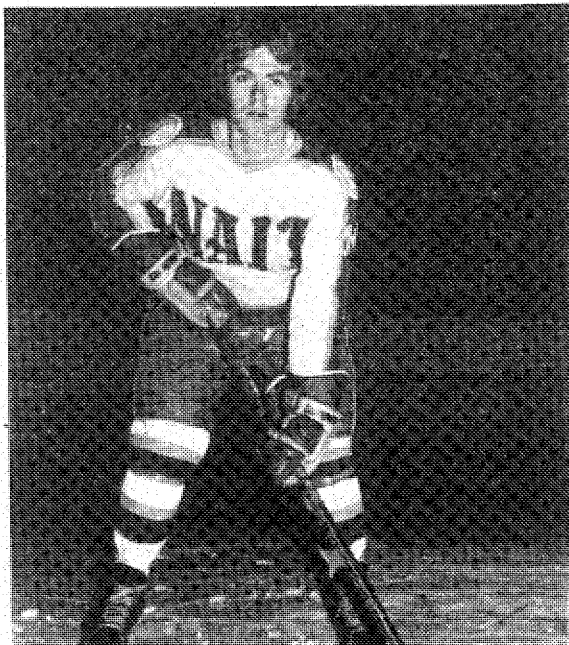
Secretaries Licked at Their Own Game

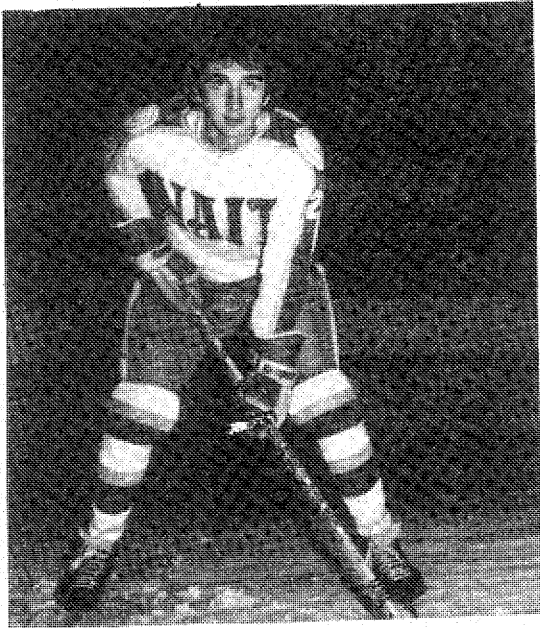

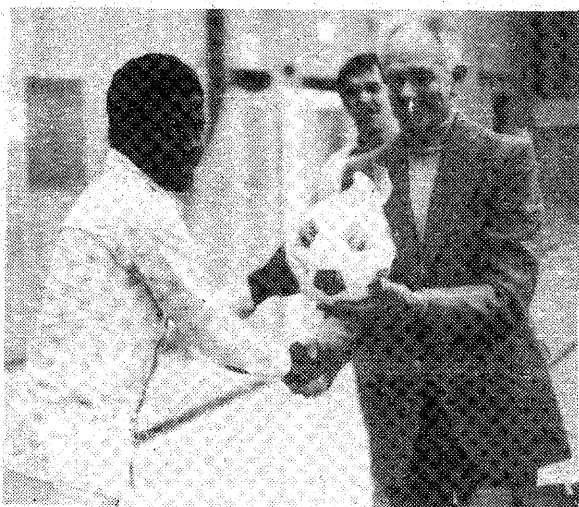
the rematch on January 18, here at NAIT.
