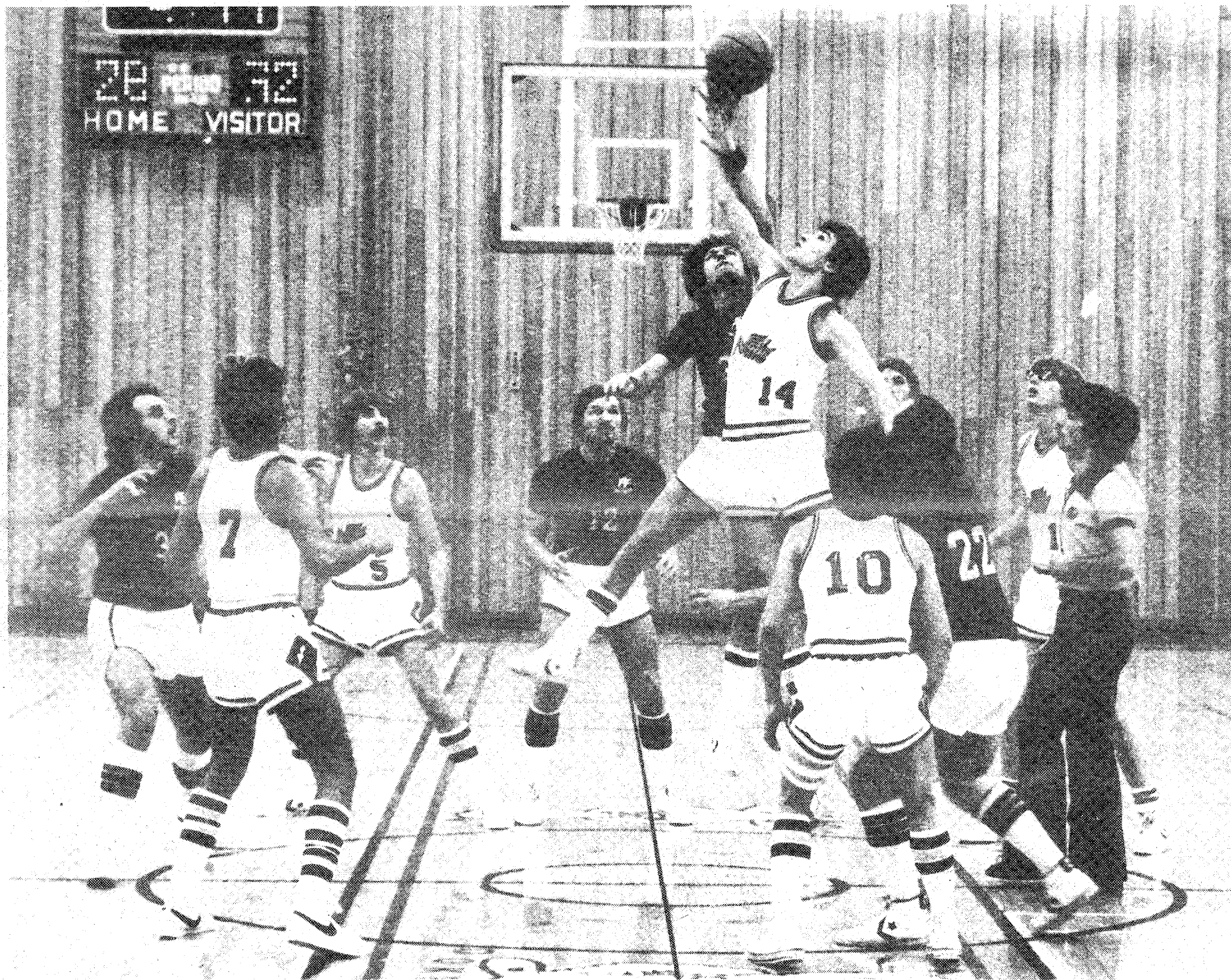

High in Edmonton; John Kostaras, a 6'1" guard from M.E.Lazerte High in Edmonton; Wayne Squires, a 6'5" forward from Queen Elizabeth High and Doug Zutz, a 6'3" forward from Stoney Plain.

These athletes bring an outstanding mixture of skill,

experience and hustle to the game and will give an excellent account of themselves on the court. Believe me, they are well worth watching. Although the season is young, the OOKS have won 3 games against no losses and are providing fans with lots of excitement.

"KEES CUSVELLER TO SIT ON BOARD"

Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT) Students Association president Kees Cusveller has been appointed to the Students Finance Board by Jim Horsman, minister of Alberta Advanced Education and Manpower.

Mr. Cusveller's three year appointment, which became effective October 20, fills the last available seat on the seven man board.

The board which serves as a financial counselling and advisory body, administers federal and provincial loans to students, and provides scholarships, bursaries, fellowships, grants and prizes covering a wide range

of purposes.

Mr. Cusveller, owner and manager of his own contracting company, has been President of NAIT Students Association since March of this year, and serves on several NAIT committees including the Student Finance Appeal Board, Safety Committee and the President's Committee.

The 20-year-old native of Amsterdam, who has lived in Calgary and Edmonton for the past ten years, is an honours second year student in NAIT's Building Construction and Engineering Technology course. (con't page 2)

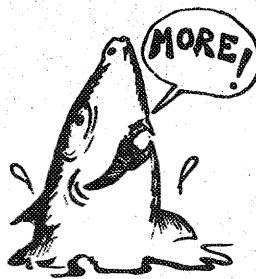
When dealing with staring men in the cafeteria, the previous strategy can also be used quite effectively to

VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN:

BATTERED WIVES BAND PLAYS AT UNIVERSITY OF CALGARY DESPITE DETERMINED PROTESTS

CALGARY (CUP) -- The Battered Wives played the University of Calgary Oct. 30 to the late but well-orchestrated chorus of local protest.

Protestors organized petitions, special council meetings and motions and door-front picketting, but the free Battered Wives concert went on as planned to a full house.

The U of C social welfare students society (SWSS) managed to force a student council emergency meeting Oct. 29 but a 10-0-1 vote against cancelling the concert squashed their immediate objective.

At the meeting, the SWSS presented a petition signed by 118 students, teachers, and administrative staff, which they claimed had been gathered in an hour and a half before the meeting. However, council did not feel the SWSS represented a large portion of the student body.

But council agreed to hold a seminar or awareness session at which the issue of violence against people could be discussed. The seminar will receive \$500 to match the \$500 paid out to the band.

About 50 protestors gathered in the students' union building about an hour before the concert began to ensure concert-goers were aware of the controversy surrounding the band's name.

Picket signs read "students' union capitalizes on Battered Wives, Battered Wives capitalizes on violence," and "Battered Wives profit from suffering," among others.

Protestors stressed that the organization was not opposed to the band, but they capitalized on a serious social problem.

When the band toured Canada last year, protests across the country succeeded in convincing the band to change their name to the 'Wives'. But the move was apparently a publicity gimmick and the band changed its name back to the Battered Wives soon after. A SWSS spokesperson, Kathy Sloman, did not feel the controversy spurred by protest action resulted in an increase of attendance.

The band packed the house to its 850 capacity, and turned about 100 people away.

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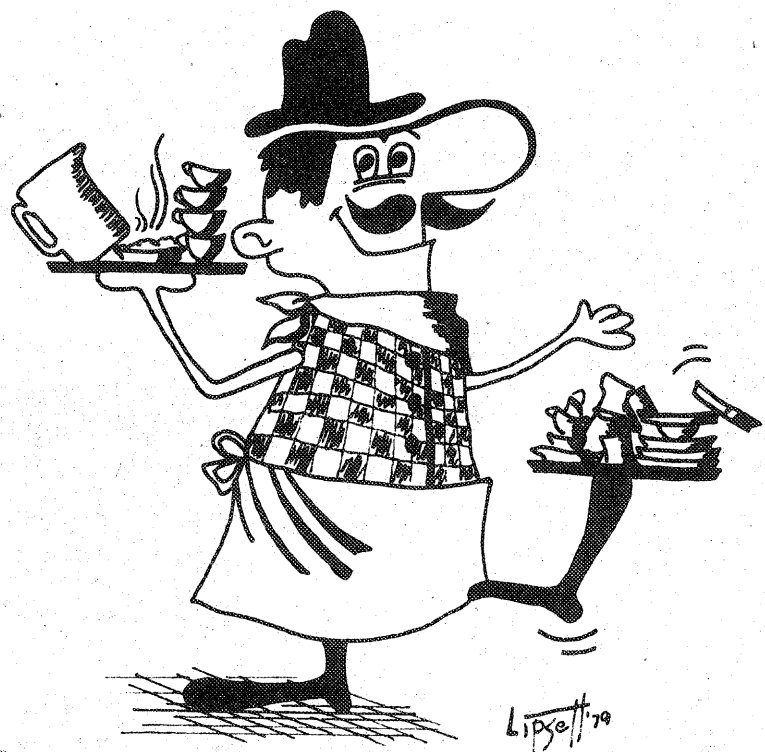

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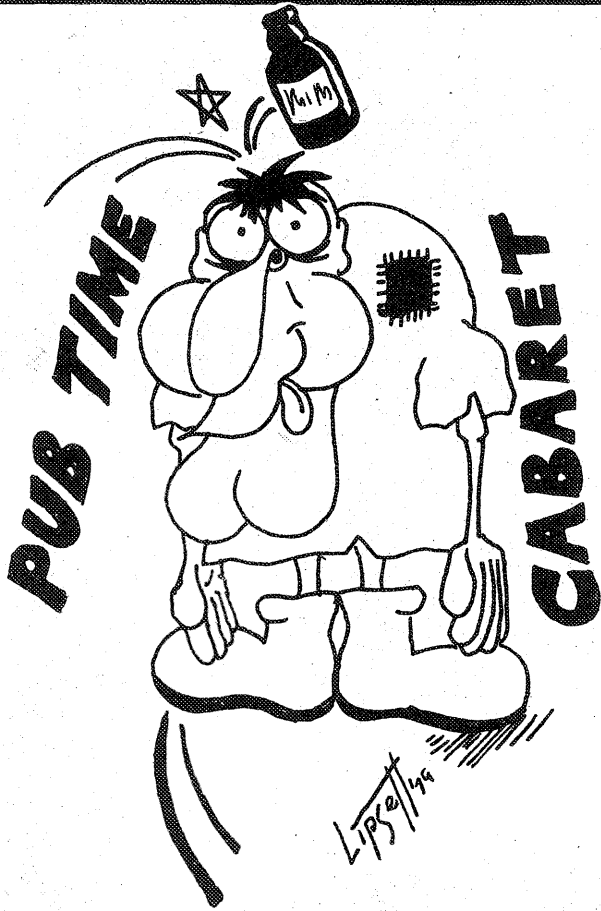

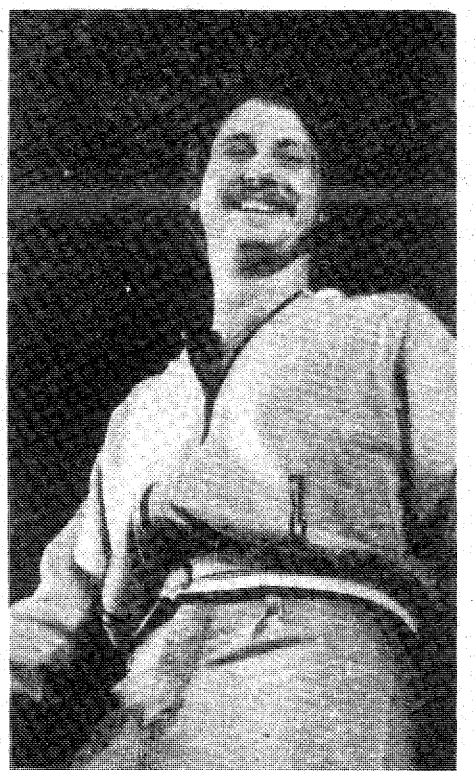

Chicken

Chicken is an economical and fast meal, which can be prepared in about half an hour. If you're not familiar with the gruesome task of cleaning a chicken, buy a frozen chicken already cut into pieces.

Heat your frying pan along with a little oil on the bottom, then place the chicken pieces in the pan when the oil is hot.

Let the chicken cook for about 20 minutes under medium or high heat. By this time your chicken should be almost done. To test it, poke it with a fork and when it feels tender and your fork can be pulled out of the chicken with ease, your chicken is almost cooked.

If there is any extra grease on the bottom of the frying pan, drain most of it out. Now your choice of cream of

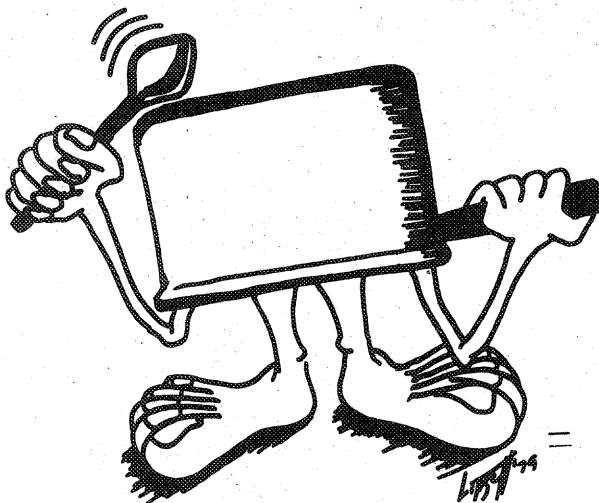
chicken or cream of mushroom soup over top of the chicken. Do not add milk to the soup. Cover the dish and let it simmer for about 15 minutes on medium or low heat.

If you want, add mushrooms, green pepper and other vegetables in with the dish. Serve the meat along with boiled potatoes and another vegetable for a well-balanced meal.

Make sure you cook all the chicken you have. What you don't eat you can use for left-overs for the next week. Chicken keeps better cooked rather than uncooked.

contest was held to determine the most original outfits, and the winners were "Aunt Jemima" and "The King and Queen of Hearts".

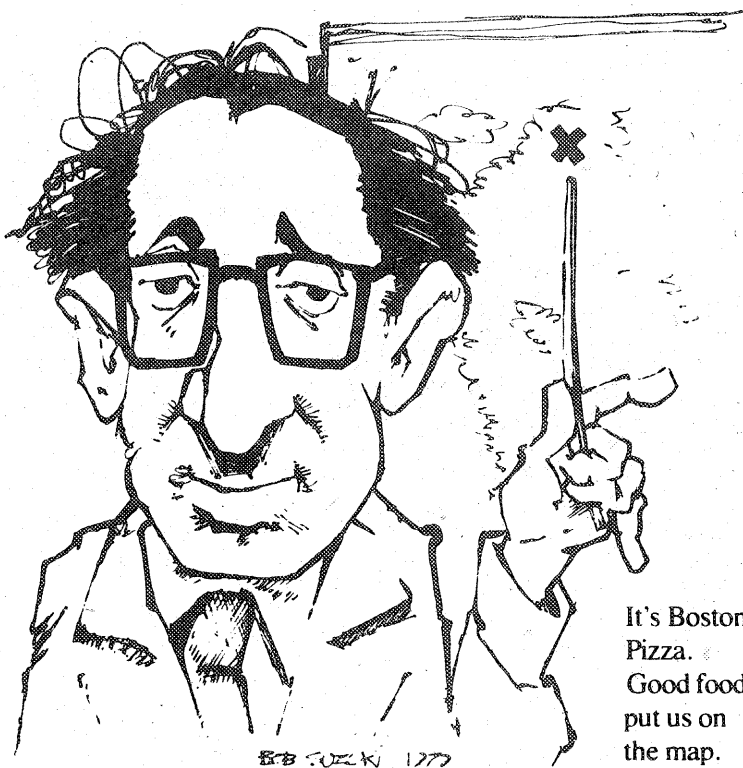

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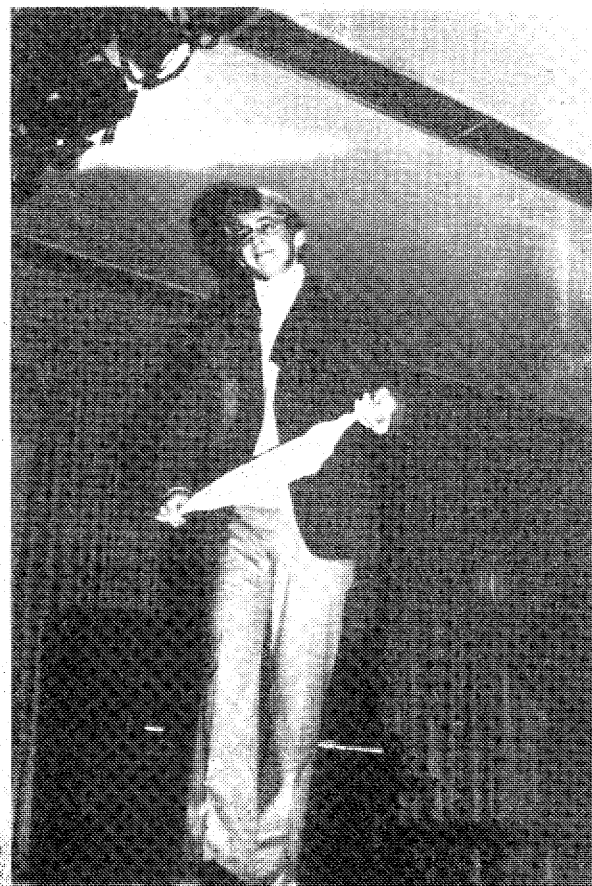
TALENT SHOW

IN THE GROOVES



JOE JACKSON- "I'M THE MAN"

It's always a challenge for a musician who has released one very good album to match that success a second time. Although there is nothing new here, Joe Jackson's second album "I'm the Man", has passed the test-it stands up to comparison with his excellent debut release, "Look Sharp".

For the most part, the material on this album is not as consistently strong as that of "Look Sharp", but there are a few songs that reach out and grab the listener. In "On Your Radio", Jackson verbally shakes his fist at all his enemies and adversaries. He tells them that they can't get to him now; "You can only hope to hear me on your radio". On the title track, he sings of the corporate executive who invests his time in people who are so easily fleeced into wasting their money on the executive makes a very comfortable living from manipulating these people.

The album's best song is "It's Different for Girls", a hauntingly beautiful tune about a woman who wants everything Joe has to offer--except his love. He has bared his soul to her; now, hurt, he lashes out in an accusatory tone, "You're all the same."

Most of what Jackson has to say on "I'm the Man" has been said before (a lot of it on his previous album), but he has a "knack" (if you'll pardon the expression) for saying it in a slightly unique way. He gets solid support from his backup band, consisting of Gary Sanford (guitar), Dave Houghton (drums), and Graham Maby (bass).

Joe Jackson is a breath of fresh air in today's stale music atmosphere. I recommend you give his new album a listen (and if you haven't heard "Look Sharp" yet, you're really missing something!)

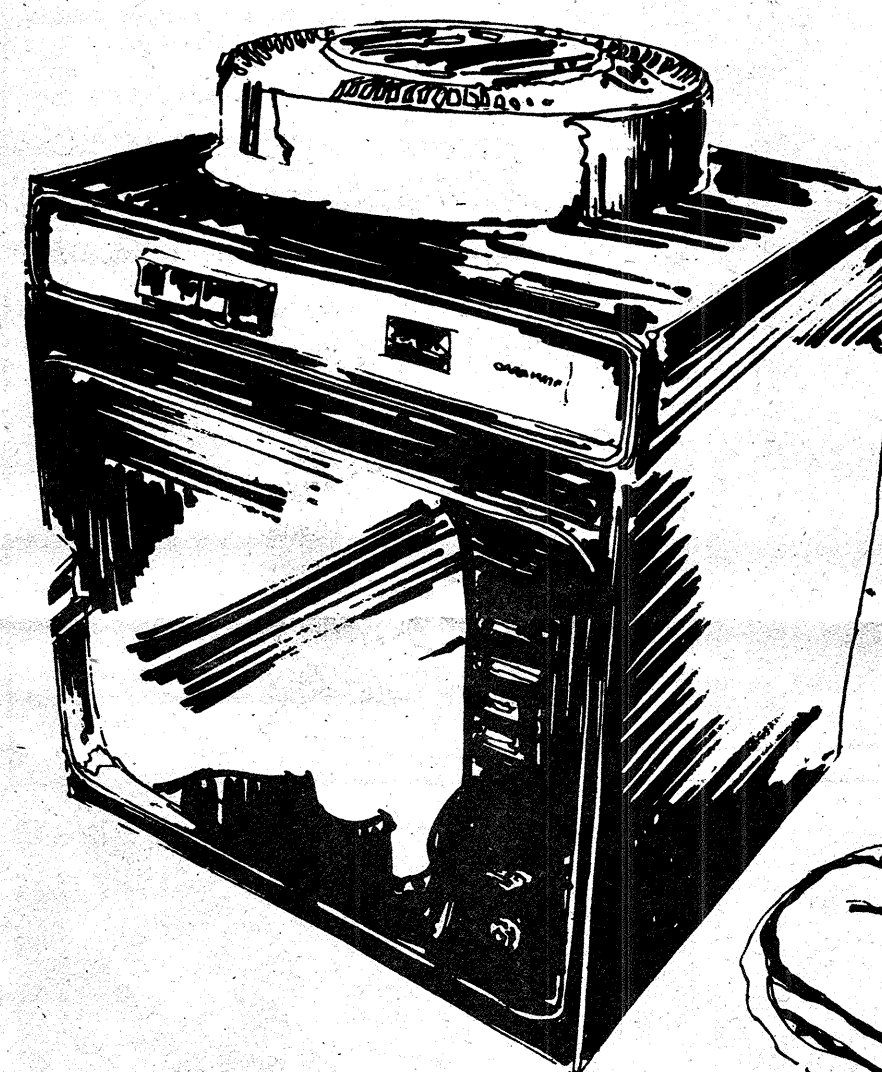
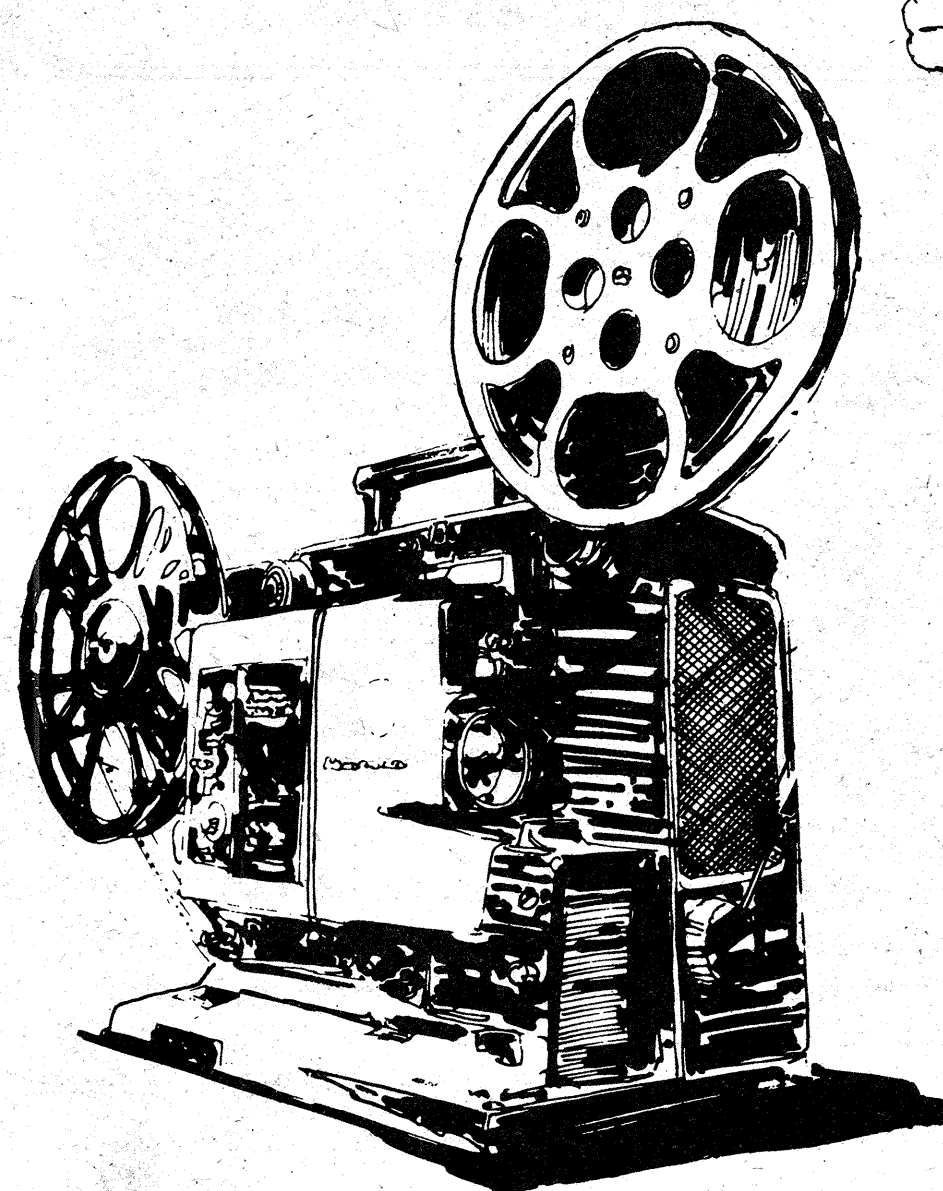

slide sets, transparencies, audio tapes, records, filmstrips and filmloops. All of these materials are available for the use of students.

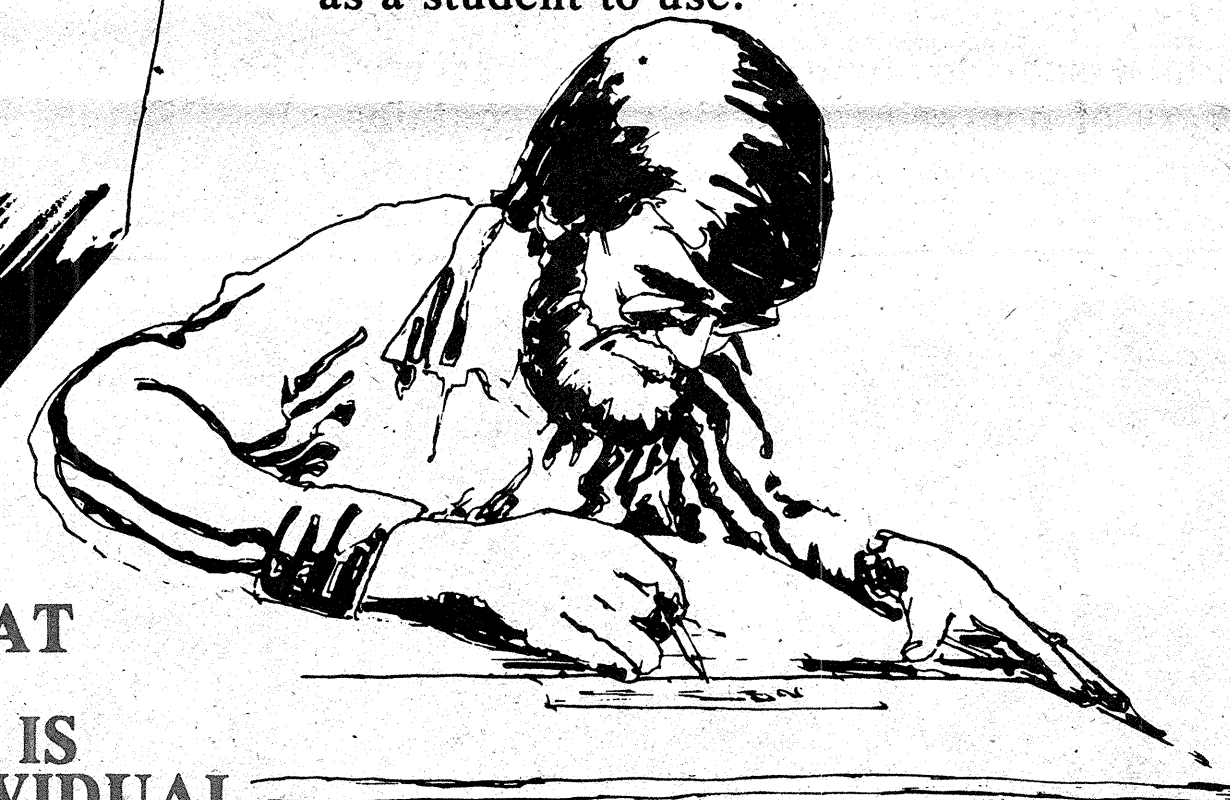


ARE YOU AWARE THAT STUDENTS ARE WELCOME TO USE THE NON-PRINT LIBRARY?

"WHEN YOU'RE WINNING YOU'RE HAPPY"

RENE BRODEUR

If Perry Pearn ever took a sales course, he'd probably pass with flying colours.

Fact is, he "sold" Rene Brodeur on the idea of playing hockey at NAIT. "He phoned me one night and talked to me for about half an hour... What a talker," states Rene. Perry heard about Rene's goaltending ability from a friend in St. Albert. And while Rene had enrolled in Air Conditioning here at NAIT, he fully intended to go back and play with the defending Provincial Champion Team the KC Pats. Perry says he explained the benefits of playing for NAIT. "I just told him he'd probably never have another opportunity to play college hockey. He'd done as much as he could in juvenile."

Not only did Perry acquire a goalie but he found a team man in Rene as well. "Excellent team player, gets along with everyone fairly comfortably." This is consistent with Rene's feelings. "I was always a team player, I could never really get involved in sports just for myself...I need the push from other players." In addition to this, Rene states his priorities aren't in achieving number one goalie status or having the lowest goals against average in the league. Rather, Rene's goal is to win games. "I don't care if we win 8-7 or 7-0, as long as we win and play our best."

Being a goalie isn't an easy position to play. For one thing a goalie's mistake is more apt to be noticed. Rene agrees, "If you're not on, everybody knows."

Naturally this adds a lot more pressure. But Rene states he likes it that way, "...the more pressure there is the better I play usually." Coach Perry Pearn believes the manner in which Rene deals with pressure is one of the goalie's biggest assets. "He seems to love the pressure. Makes him an intense competitor in tough situations. Certainly on the outside he never seems to show signs of cracking under pressure."



Like most things in life, your mental state is very important in goaltending. "As far as I'm concerned it's about 75% mental and 25% physical." Rene then adds a good attitude, enthusiasm to win and concentration are the main aspects of mental preparation that are important. Before a game the 5'10" netminder likes to keep things as normal as possible. In other words, Rene tries to maintain his regular daily routine. Rene states "I don't really like to think about the game too much, cause I get too hyper..." Coach Perry Pearn tries to let Rene and Jim Grant know a day in advance who's starting. Because in Perry's words, "there's quite a bit of psych in goaltending..." Rene wholeheartedly agrees, "It's good to know you're starting... it's hard to get up for the game if you don't know."

Goaltending is not something new to the Brodeur family. Rene's father had played goalie and that's what prompted Rene to choose that position. So at age 7, Rene made his first debut as a goaltender. Now having his own father as a private tutor must have helped the 19 year old netminder when he was growing up. "Most coaches don't know that much about goaltending. My dad worked with me a lot. I always had a skating rink in the backyard until I was about 14," says Rene.

Rene enjoys the excitement that goes with playing hockey, as well as the pure enjoyment of playing the sport. "I love it, if I didn't, I wouldn't do it. We have to give up a lot of spare time and it puts a little more strain on school work." And with that Rene mentions he's looking forward to the upcoming season. He feels the team has got excellent potential and the right guys for the Oaks Hockey Club to be a Champion team.

As the year progresses, I hope Rene wins his way into the hearts of many fans. And then maybe we'll hear the crowd chant "Rene-Rene" just for the added pressure...

Coach Eldon Galloway, feels that this team has the potential to win the Alberta Championships.

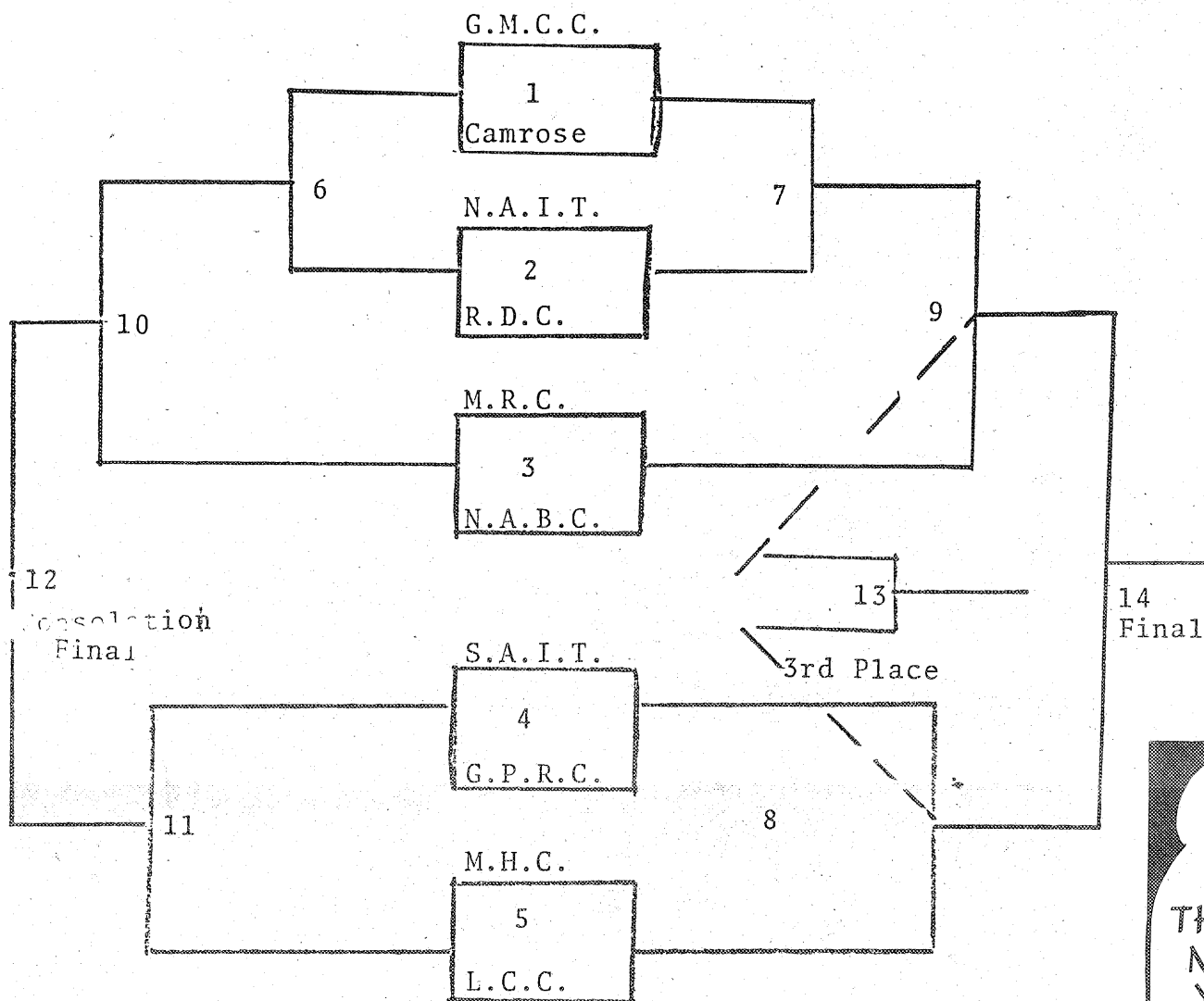

maining in the middle frame.

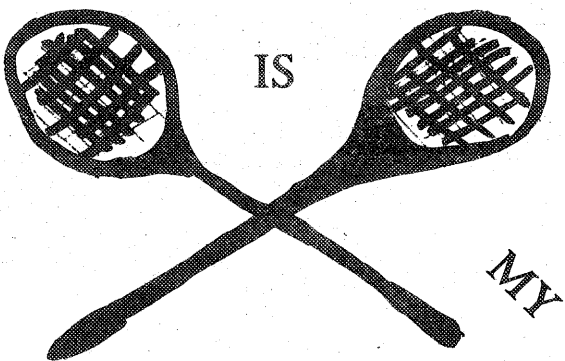

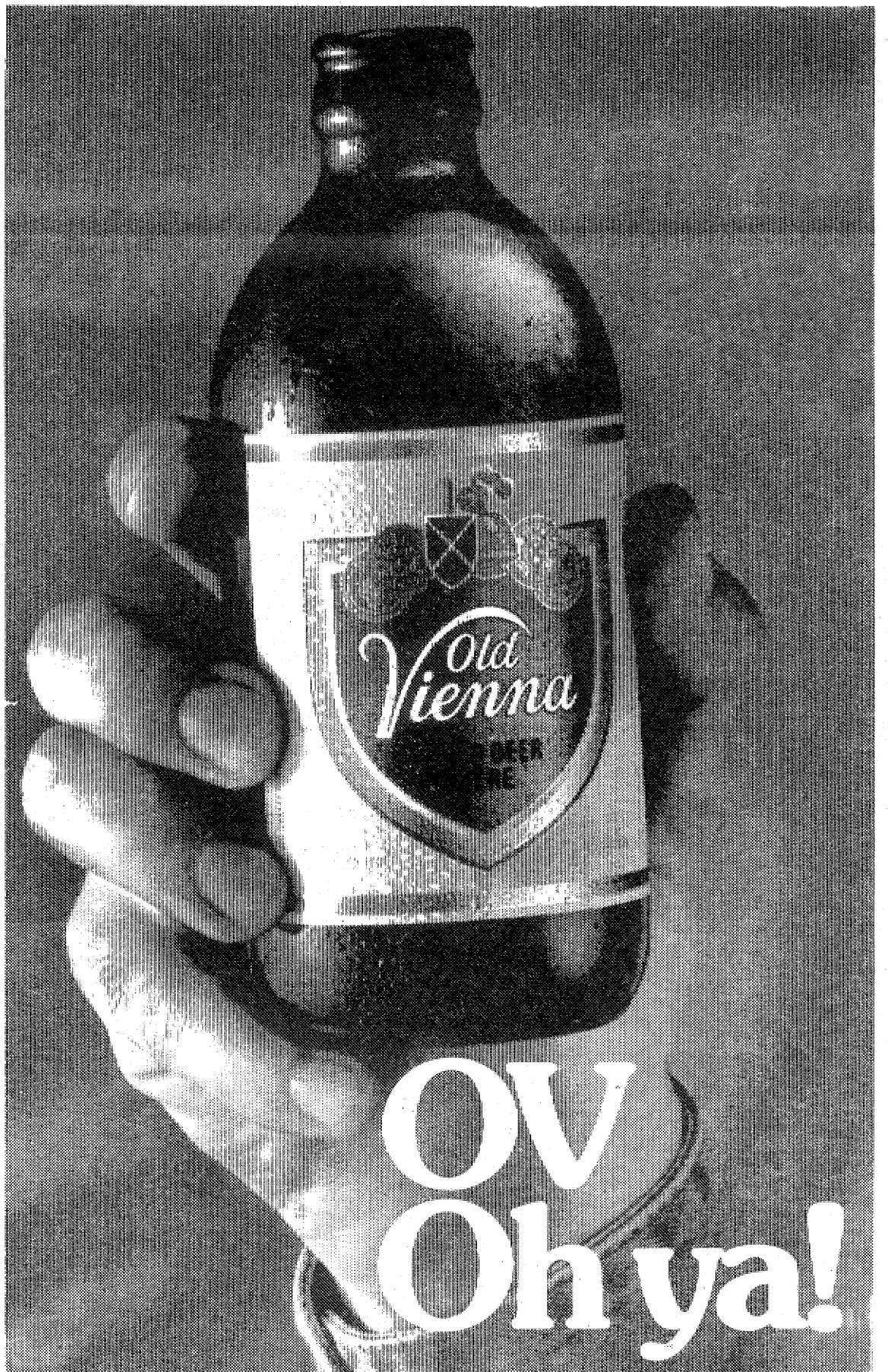

V.D.

Some straight talk from Julius Schmid

The purpose of this advertisement is to educate you about venereal diseases. If you think this subject is no concern of yours, we'd like to point out that V.D. has reached epidemic proportions in Canada. It cuts across all age, income, social and educational groups. A conservative estimate is that between 500,000 and 1 million Canadians suffer from V.D.

GONORRHEA

This particular disease has become rampant due to possible changing social and sexual attitudes. Despite the most advanced treatment methods medical science has been unable to check the spread of this condition.

STAGE I

Symptoms generally appear from two to six days after exposure to the bacterium *Neisseria gonorrhoea*, however, up to 20 percent of men and as high as 80 percent of women show no symptoms at all. In the male, the usual signs are pain when urinating and a discharge of pus from the penis. Women are likely to experience burning during urination, a yellowish vaginal discharge, abnormal menstrual bleeding, and swelling or abscess of the Bartholin's glands at the mouth of the vagina. (Symptoms of oral and anal infection may include, in the throat, a burning sensation, and, in the rectum, burning and itching, persistent urge to defecate, and a bloody discharge).

STAGE II

If allowed to progress untreated, gonorrhea can produce severe inflammation of the pelvic organs; blockage of the Fallopian tubes and sperm ducts and thus sterility; gonorrheal rheumatism or arthritis; inflammation of the heart valves; even blindness, particularly in newborn babies.

Up until a few years ago, penicillin was the standard treatment method, but today, several penicillin-resistant strains of the disease have appeared and other, stronger drugs—tetracycline, spectinomycin, ampicillin, amoxicillin—must sometimes be used. Cases in which pelvic inflammatory disease has developed may also require hospitalization.

SYPHILIS

First of all let's make one thing clear: you can't pick up syphilis from lavatory seats or public drinking fountains. Syphilis is transmitted only through sexual intercourse.

STAGE I

About three weeks after sexual relations, a lesion called a chancre (pronounced "shanker") develops at the site—usually the genitals or mouth—and nearby lymph nodes become enlarged. The chancre itself disappears within four to six weeks.

STAGE II

If syphilis is left untreated, more lymph nodes eventually become enlarged and a spotty red rash appears over most of the body. During this stage, fever, weight loss, general weakness, loss of appetite and headaches are typical. After several months, the rash subsides and syphilis enters a latent period lasting months or even years.

STAGE III

Blindness, insanity, impotence, heart disease.

Children born to syphilitic mothers are also infected. The earliest sign is sniffing, after which sores appear on the skin and the mucous membranes, and the disease starts to progress as in adults.

If caught early enough, syphilis can be easily treated with penicillin. Other antibiotics such as tetracycline, erythromycin, or chloramphenicol are also used.

GENITAL HERPES

This sexually transmitted disease was almost unknown until the late sixties. About 95 percent of all cases are due to infection with herpes simplex virus II, a virus affecting only the genital areas; while another 5 percent result from infection of the genital area with herpes simplex I, the cold-sore virus.

STAGE I

In women, tiny, painful blisters resembling oral cold sores appear on the labia, cervix or anus. Symptoms in men include similar lesions on the penis or anus, accompanied by burning urination and watery penile discharge. Fever is a possibility in both sexes. Within a day or so the blisters break, then form round, grey-white patches which generally heal spontaneously within two weeks. This may be the end of the problem, or genital herpes may reappear periodically as cold sores often do.

STAGE II

A possible serious complication: recent studies suggest that herpes II may play a role in the development of cervical cancer. The virus is reported to be present in 36 percent of cervical cancer patients, and parts of the herpes II virus have been extracted from cervical cancer cells. Because of this, women who've been infected should be especially careful to have regular Pap tests.

No totally effective cure for herpes exists. While some gynecologists paint the infected area with gentian violet, others maintain this treatment doesn't work. However, a promising new antiherpes drug, adenine arabinoside (Ara-A) is being tested and may soon be approved for general use.

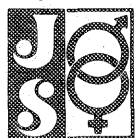

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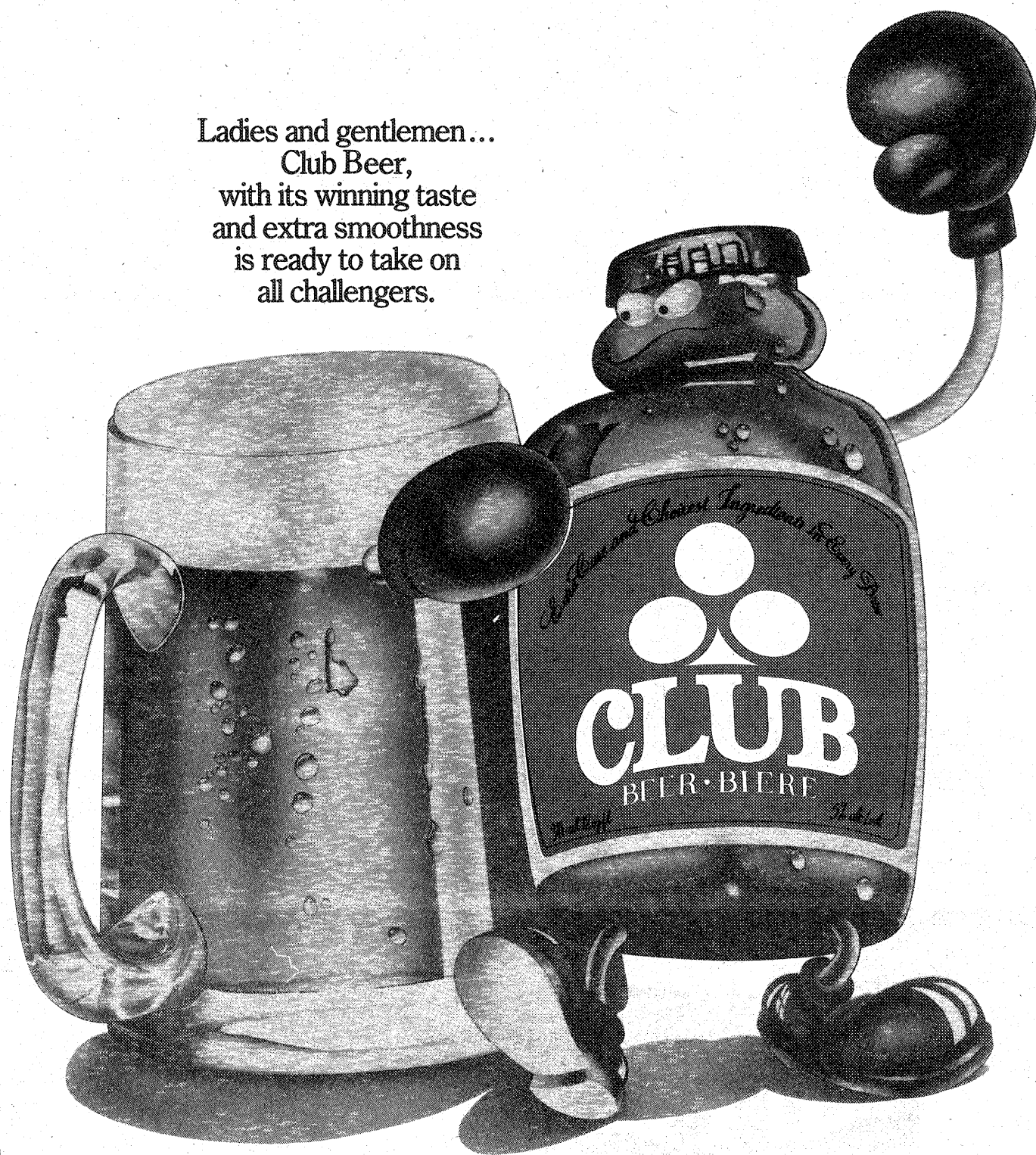
