PIC RICWHO?

For those of you who happened to be hanging around on Monday after school, you might have noticed something strange going on in E wing.

Well, I just happened to over-hear the story. At about 4:30 Monday, most of E wing on the first and second floors was cordoned off from student access.

I pursued the matter the next day with a reliable source and this is what happened. A highly volatile

chemical was to be removed from the Chemistry wing, G wing and taken to a place outside of NAIT. To do this, the administration decided to block off the removal route to keep students from just wandering around the operation. The dreaded chemical removed was Pic Ric acid.

After some extensive research, I found that Pic Ric acid (which closely resembles nitro-glycerin in structure and in explosiveness) is a secondary explosive. This organic acid (which constitutes 3 nitro groups situated on a phenol ring) when activated by a initial reaction will produce a small

compact little explosion with the kick of a mule. After asking myself what they were doing with this type of chemical around NAIT I inquired and this is what I found.

Pic Ric acid is used by the janitors and custodial staff to remove skid marks off the sides and bottom of the toilet bowl. (Dry cleaners also use it in a similar fashion to remove embarrassing stains) (off our undergarments). In fact my source says it is used just as extensively in the ladies washrooms if not the mens.

The process is to simply tape a milligram vial of pic ric acid or equivalent weight of pic ric putty, and place it on top of the stain. A detonator cap is then attached to the vial and wired to a power source. A flick of the switch and poof, even the toughest stains come out.

During the slight explosion the nitrogen, oxygen, carbon, and hydrogen break away from their various functional groups and some of it disperses into the air while the rest attaches itself to the

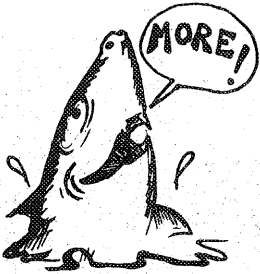


cellulose waste and becomes residue. The violent action of these molecules ups the stain away from the toilet bowl leaving the porcelain intact.

This explosion effect itself is similar to that of throwing a pebble into a puddle of water coupled with a little dry ice vapour. Special goggles are required by the

janitorial staff to protect themselves from the splash up and any loose debris. The loosened residue from the now non-existent stain can be flushed down the drain and our stain specialist can breath a sigh of relief for a job well done.

EAGLES-- "THE LONG RUN"

It's been three years since the Eagles put out their last album, "Hotel California". Since that time, they have gone out on tour, recorded an album, scrapped it, and started over. No matter how you may feel about any group who leaves a three year gap in between record releases, you have got to respect a band that can put out such a high quality product as "The Long Run". The Eagles aren't getting older, they're getting better.

This record seems to be stronger than "Hotel California"; the music has been stripped down to something more basic. The vocals sound as sweet as ever; the harmonies as tight. There has also been a change in personnel since the last album-- the bass player, Randy Meisner, has been replaced by Tim Schmit, formerly of Poco. Schmit does a fine debut job of lead vocals on a love ballad which he helped to write, entitled "I Can't

Tell You Why".

Of course, the band must keep up their "L.A. decadence" image --which they do on "Heartache Tonight", "Those Shoes", and "King of Hollywood"-- the tale of a movie producer whose "jacuzzi runneth over". A cut entitled "The Greeks Don't Want No Freaks" pokes fun at fraternity life; in addition, Joe Walsh's "In The City", which was included in the soundtrack for the movie "The Warriors", has been redone for this album.

Perhaps "The Long Run's" most powerful song is entitled "The Disco Strangler". Don Henley sings lead vocals over a stinging guitar, building an ominous tale of a psychopath who preys on beautiful women he meets in discos:

"Look at me, baby/
Look at me
I'm beautiful/I'm
beautiful
I'm so ready /to slip into

the arms of

The Disco Strangler." The Eagles have been through a lot of changes since the days of "Take It Easy", both in terms of personnel and format. They've left a lot of the country sound behind and adopted more of a rock style (Joe Walsh must have wielded some influence here). But change can be healthy, and this is one group that has certainly benefitted from it-- just look at the phenomenal success of "Hotel California". Despite all the changes, the band has managed to keep their image which Henley describes as, "sons of the desert". They have definitely proved they can "go the distance-- in the long run".

THE ONION FIELD-- RIALTO THEATRE

The scene is Los Angeles in 1963. Cruising the streets are two cops on the beat, and two crooks on their way to a robbery. The cops happen to pull the crooks over on a routine check. It does not stay routine for long. What follows is a tragic and horrible set of circumstances.

The crooks, Greg Powell and Jimmy Smith, drive the cops to an onion field, where one is brutally shot, while the other manages to escape. A horrid crime has been committed, but the real crime, (and the gist of the story), is in the long, slow legal system, and character assassination of Carl Hettinger, the surviving cop.

Faced with the guilt he feels for his friends death, Hettinger's mental stability diminishes to the point where he shoplifts, has nightmares and recurring

headaches, nearly beats his baby, and, in a very tense moment, comes close to shooting himself in the mouth.

'The Onion Field' is a true story written by Joseph Wambaugh, who formed the script from his book. Wambaugh has created a screenplay, that, combined with Harold Becker's direction, makes an intense and gripping movie.

Greg Powell, the cold-blooded murderer, is played exceptionally well by James Woods. Woods was perfectly cast for this part. Not only did he look the part, but he played it with a very compelling sense of feeling for the character.

Franklyn Seales as Smith was good, as was John Savage as Hettinger. My only reservation with Savage was a slight lack of convincing character transition from mentally stable to mentally

unstable. He seemed to have geared his performance more for the latter, and missed out on defining his initial character.

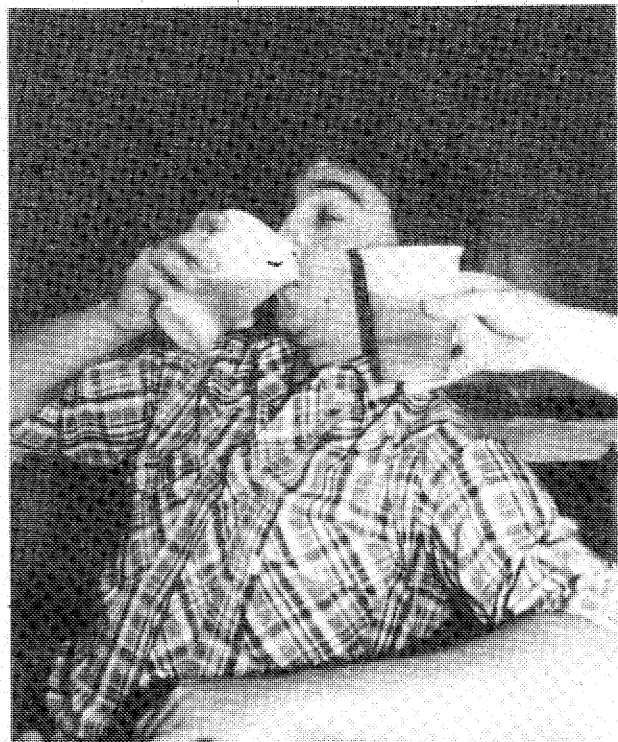
Wambaugh has pumped a lot of depth out of what sounds like a simple story. He obviously feels for these true life people. He must also have some rather strong feelings against the American judicial system, for it is here where he makes his biggest point. A man is going crazy in the name of justice.

The scenes were not always consistent. Some were too long, others too short. The narrative occasionally lost some cohesion as it jumped from one train of thought to another. But in the long run, 'The Onion Field' makes its point, and its effect is almost everything this story warrants.

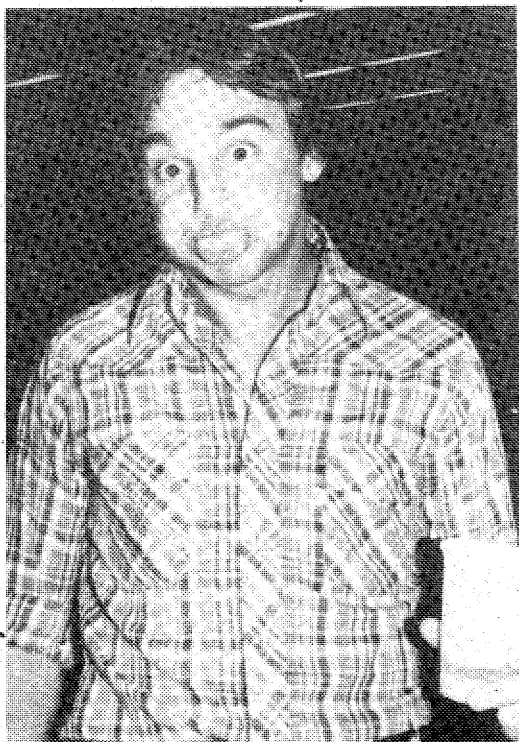

Being a student and the price of the food the way it is you are probably very conservative, and save most of

your left-overs. Ah Ha, then comes the problem of what to do with them. This recipe, I admit, may not sound too great, but I have tried it and it's pretty good. If you have a cream soup, cream of chicken, or cream cheddar, and meat and vegetable left-

overs your ingredients are all ready. Add only half a can of milk or water to your soup, instead of the recommended full can. Cut up your meat, ham, chicken, beef, (not hamburger) into small chunks and throw them in with your soup. Your other left-overs, cauliflower, carrots, chunks of potatoes, etc can be added also. To fancy it up add green peppers and mushrooms if you have them. Let the soup, meat and vegetables heat until you have a soup, or after the soup is heated, simmer it on a low heat till it thickens, for a sauce. The soup will not thicken if you use water, so you can either eat it as a soup, or on toast. So it doesn't sound too exciting, well neither does your grocery list.
