Among the guests were George's son, daughter, and his 82 year old mother. know. All the tables were covered with white tablecloths and there was a single carnation in a vase on the centre of every table. It really looked impressive. But the most eye-catching things of all were the two tables in the centre of the room. The rest of the length of the tables was devoted to food which was superbly prepared by Food Services. A job well done!! There were glazed turkeys, glazed whole salmon, and many tasty delicacies. And they were delicious!

After dinner a "roast" was put on for President Carter. Each person at the head table gave a short and peppy

speech about George's accomplishments and activities during his 11 years as President of NAIT. (These included the times that George seemed to vanish from his office, which faces the airport. Surprisingly enough it happened every time a Pacific Western Boeing 737 took off.)

Between the speeches George was presented with various gifts. They weren't ordinary retirement gifts, either. He presented them to NAIT as something we can remember him by. We will, George.



PICRIC ACID. THAT'S WHO!

and for those who don't, we would like to set the record straight on last weeks article PICRIC WHO?

Oh, it's true such a thing did happen in the G-wing on Monday, but it is not quite conceivable that the rest of the article could be believed.

To start things off the acid mentioned in the title and all through the column, is spelled wrong. Correctly it should be written as on word --picric. And although it is volatile, it in no way resembles nitro-glycerin in structure. Nitro-glycerin is a trinitroglycerin molecule (CH2NO3CHNO3CH2NO3) or to put it simply a 3 carbon molecule. But picric acid is a trinitrophenol (C6H2(NO2)3 OH) compound composed of three nitrite ions NO2 attached to 2,4,6 of a phenol

Like nitro-glycerin, picric acid is aprimary explosive (not secondary) used in just such a manner. Its yellow crystals are very poisonous and, as you all know, is highly explosive especially when in contact with metals or metal oxides. Despite picric acids explosive tendancies it has a wide range of uses. Not one; incidentally,


Along with being explosive picric acid as also used in the manufacturing of external medicine; dyes (starting point in manufacturing of ink, shoepolishes and leather, wood, textile dyes); matches; electric batteries; and etching copper. As for why such a chemical was kept at NAIT, is something of no great concern, for the chemical has been kept in storage since the institute opened some fifteen years ago and during that time the acid has been utilized some five odd times in experiments like the above. Due to the acids age and, probably, general uselessness it was in the best interests of all that the chemical be removed by the RCMP Bombsquad. And that is the truth about what really occured on that Monday afternoon.

And a note to the alias Mr. Ness, the next time you get the urge to do some analytical writing on a similar topic come down to the Chemistry wing. There is always someone around you could ask. After all, that's what we are being trained for.



our subjects were taken on an airplace ride to New York.


Fortunately, the supposed forces didn't cause anyone to reach for an air sickness bag!




have all dreamed for, a day when it rains money. These situations were perceived an acted out by the volunteers in such a way that almost put the audience on the floor in tears of laughter.

It's a shame that more people couldn't find time to attend this mystifying event. Romane is definitely a different entertaining experience. Well worth the time and money.





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



"Eat to the Beat"

There is a common misconception about this band than "Parallel Lines" exthat irks all of its members--Blondie is not Deborah Harry, Blondie is a group, or on the title cut, and on which Harry is the central figure. Her unique look, which can be innocent at times and harsh at others, has contributed to the group's present level of success; but, musically speaking, the single that really proke ground for them was 'Heart of Glass'', with its pulsating synthesizers and spacey vocals, from their last rel ase, "Parallel Lines". Cn "Eat to the Beat", that

same pulsating effect can be hear1 on a couple of cuts, such as "Atomic" and "The Hardest Part". But this album also branches off in some different directions plored. Some of it works; some of it doesn't. It works "Living in the Real World", both high-energy rockers. But things fall flat on 'Victor''--Harry sounds like she is being stabbed to death and is screaming in pain, backed by a male chorus from a horror movie. She also has trouble carrying off slow ballads, in particular "Sound-a-Sleep"--a combination of insipid lyrics and a simplistic melody make this sound like a children's lullabye. (Or maybe that was the desired effect?)

The albums's new single, "Dreaming", is an adequate song but there is stronger

material here to be heard. The recommended cut is "The Hardest Part",--a bouncy tune about an armoured car heist that makes crime sound like fun.

With the exception of drummer Clem Burke, everyone in the band contributed material, which makes for an interesting variation in song styles. But will it be as successful as "Parallel Lines"? My guess is it will fare even better, and I think it's a superior album for the most part. The true answer, however, remains to be seen.
