

FRIDAY-ELECTION DAY!

Last year the number of NAIT students that placed their vote in the ballot box for the NAITSA election was 800. Though this number was sufficient to elect certain officials, it made up a small percentage of the total able voters--4,900.

Apathy is only one of the few reasons why NAIT students do not place their vote. A big portion of the non-voting student body comes from students graduating the coming spring.

There are certain reasons why second year students do not vote. One of these is that many feel that they do not

want to be responsible to next year's students if they vote in the wrong council. Another is that they will not be here so why should they care.

Second year students are encouraged to vote, since their time at NAIT has given them the opportunity to see two previous councils come and go. This gives them the upper hand, as far as recognizing suitable electives, and understanding what happens at NAIT. As quoted from

NAITSA president Kees Kusveller, second year students "have been around for two years so they know what

they're looking for." There are 3,800 students enrolled in two year programs. The attitude of not wishing to vote is also found in one year enrollments. Students only spending one year at NAIT don't feel they understand

enough about the way the institute runs. The constitution about 2000 of the eligible voters.

By subtracting the number of students in their second year or enrolled in a single year program, the total number of possible voters is 2000. There are around 2000 students enrolled in their first year in a two year program. The same as last year, and

800 students used the election to state their opinions. That means that over 1000 students didn't vote, and I'm sorry but I haven't been able to think up a good excuse to place you in a special category.

Could it be that, AGAIN, you really don't care? Not again. This year make an effort to listen to the candidates, and cast your vote. Your single vote may not seem like much but each single little vote decides who represents you and who spends your money.

If you don't cast your minute, little ballot, then you don't have the right to state your loud complaints.

STUDENT LOBBY

EDMONTON (CUP) -- Alberta students will gather at the provincial legislature March 27 to conduct a mass lobby against proposed tuition fee increases.

The student action is the second in Canada announced for March 27. In Ontario, thousands of students will march on the legislature that day to show opposition to fee hikes.

But the Alberta protest will not be a demonstration, student organizers say.

"A lot of people think this means a demonstration--it doesn't," explained Tema Frank, University of Alberta student union vice president. Frank said the lobby, organized by the Federation of Alberta Students, is not going to be a rerun of a 1977 march on the legislature by 5,000 students.

The federation also decided to begin a community awareness program to inform the public about student financial problems. The organization's members will contact community groups and church organizations for letters of support that will be sent to the provincial Conservative government.

"We have to get out to the community to explain why students are concerned," Frank says. "There may be a feeling in the public that students just want a free ride. There's much more to it than that."

A community edition of the FAS newspaper, the Alberta Student Voice, will also be distributed in mid-March as part of the campaign.

The lobby and community awareness program are in response to probable tuition fee increases of 10 percent across the province.

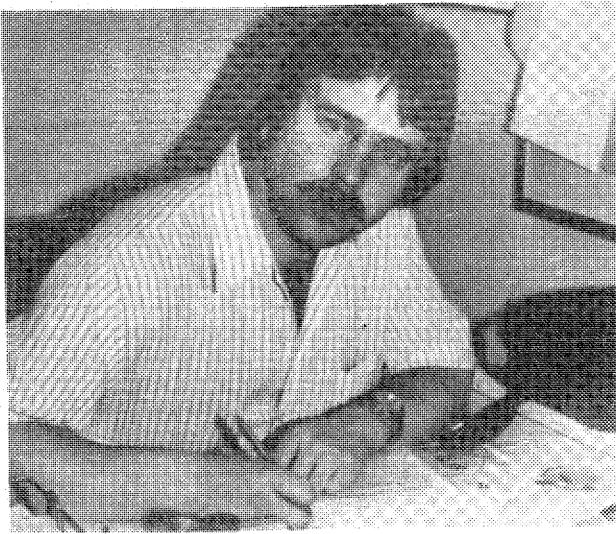

Once more, as is every year at this time. NAITSA elections are upon us. It seems as though only a short time ago when our present council was elected to hopefully make life at NAIT more tolerable by broadening social and cultural horizons through activities such as:

Over the past twelve months, I have had an excellent opportunity to watch our council in action. As a result, I have come to some very definite opinioins about this extremely unique group of individuals. I call them unique for lack of a more descriptive word. We as students elect these people to play with one quarter of a million dollars in student fees every year. It is their responsibility to see that this money is spent in the best interest of the students. Executive council must fulfill all of the above mentioned tasks to the best of their ability while remaining flexible enough to deal with changing student demands. Clearly this is not as easy job for any group of people.

Reflecting over the past academic year, I have watched some members of council work many long hours. While, on the other hand I have looked on with disappointment to see other council executives get away with doing very little. This in my opinion, is mainly due to lack of direction and proper leadership.

Starting from the top, President Kees Cusveller has faced a major problem all year. How do you bring together a group of grossly mismatched personalities and mold them into a well organized, smooth running, coordinated team? Its been a year now and Kees still hasn't figured that one out yet. Consequently, he has had to pick up the slack himself. His many late nights at NAIT depict an obvious problem to delegate. Or does it? Perhaps it is not his inability to delegate but rather a lack of cooperation from other council members.

Vice President Diana Piquette, whose face is rarely seen in the NAITSA offices functions as an internal and external P.R. person for NAITSA and should act as the president's right hand person. Why is it that she is never in her office and is so hard to contact. Could it be that other council members have made it so difficult for her to function as Vice President that she has half given up and only comes in to work when she has to?

Athletics Chairperson Brett Smith, who is known to fly off the handle at times, has been a consistant and hard working influence on council. I have spoken to many people who have found his work over the past year to be outstanding. Brett has also picked up the slack left by some members of council. However, Bretts aggressive attitude led him into many conflicts with other members of council. As a result, these conflicts left his associates at times feeling intimidated and frustrated.

A fellow by the name of Paul Joly has acted as Activities Chairperson over the last year. His abrasive personality has led him into many disputes with council and student alike. Although I find Paul hard to take at times, I'm the first to admit that he had done a first rate job. Through his determined efforts NAIT students have been able to enjoy some of the best socials ever staged in NAIT's history. Whoever is elected to take this position has a hard act to follow.

The position of Secretary has been filled by Laureen Wovk. She is yet another member of council who contributed very little to teamwork and unity. Although Laureen has fulfilled her position adequately, I feel that she should have spent less time arguing and more time accepting her responsibilities.

Treasurer, Ken Young, is one member of council who shines with accomplishment. Not only has Ken functioned as an excellent accountant, he has also tried to promote unity within council. A job well done.

Last and least Richard Pittet, Publications Chairperson, has functioned very little as a council member. His presence in the NAITSA offices has been on par with Diana Piquette, rare. The point that really irritates me is that Richard has received between \$85-\$135 per month, has had his tuition paid, has received a staff parking stall and various other freebies, which have all been paid with student money. Other council members reap the same rewards as Richard, but then other council members have earned it. As far as Richard is concerned, the Publications Chairperson is responsible for four major publications, the frosh book, the student directory, the yearbook and the Nugget. Firstly, the frosh book was put together by Richard during the month of August. Next, the directory which I sold advertising for and which duplicating did the layout should not be credited to Pittet. Further, the yearbook and the Nugget have functioned on their own all year, with very little assistance from Richard. In fact, president Kees Cusveller has been the active link between NAITSA and the Nugget. Besides acting as a disrupting force on council and taking student money under false pretense (i.e. not working for the students) I fail to see why Richard has been on council for the past year. I sincerely hope that next year's publications chairperson is more active in not only publications but also the many other unwritten responsibilities of a council member.

The purpose of this editorial is not to put down our executive council. Nor is it to in anyway defame these individuals. In fact, compared to past years, our council has performed quite well. (Although some members have performed far better than others).

The point I am trying to make is through cooperation, understanding, patience and dedicated team work, our new council can excell for both themselves and for the students. Constant bickering, fighting, and name-calling does not lay firm foundation for growth and trust.

Over the past year I've come to know and respect each member of council. As individuals, they are pretty good people. However, as a working team, I feel they came nowhere near their full potential. After all, working together for the students is what executive council is all about.

1. I realize that the position of Vice President carries with it some set duties such as organizing Shinerama, Santa's Anonymous and other charitable events as well as doing most of the promotional work for NAITSA. But I feel that it is also the Vice President's duty to see to it that there is open communication between the student body and student council and that all grievances are dealt with promptly.

1. Why am I running? Simple. I am already a part of the Publications Committee, which I will be chairman of once elected. I understand the purpose of the committee and where we stand right now in forming it. Apart from the Publications Committee, I am a yearbook and Nugget photographer, and understand the workings of these two publications. As Publications Chairman, my duties would be to act as chairman for the newly-formed Publications Committee, to find editors for the
2. AS Publications Chairman to be, I feel that my big issue for 80-81 will be the establishing of the functioning of the new-founded publications committee, and the setting up of committee guidelines for our publications. I doubt if any one candidate is aware of all the key 80-81 issues to be dealt with, but if each of us is aware of them, we can all put our heads together once the new council is formed and perform what we are all working for.
3. Asked to comment on student fees, I'd like to say this: I feel that, as yet we do not have to concern ourselves with the student fees for schools such as NAIT. I have many friends who are University students, and their fees are much, much higher, in the order of \$800, and increasing. What do they get for that stiff fee? Very little, if anything. They have to buy all their books at a very high price--a lot more books than we would ever need. Here at NAIT, tuition is in the \$300 range (excluding student association fees). For that we get handouts for

every class, and consequently, we need to buy a lot fewer books. I feel that as yet, we need not take action against fees for schools such as NAIT.

4. One main issue I will be working on is the Nugget editor-Pub. Chairman relationship. Publications Chairpersons from the past have felt that their position is one superior to that of both editors. This has caused much conflict between the editors-mainly the Nugget editor and the pub. chairman. I intend to change this by working WITH the editors, assisting with articles, projects, photographs, etc. This will make a great difference to editor-Publications Chairperson relations, and NAITSA-Nugget relations as a whole.

5. Other relations that need improving are those of the council and student body--not so much as far attitudes go, but more, communications. I feel that council-student body relations are lacking, not due to any fault of the council, but more because the students do not sufficiently represent themselves through their techs. The course of action I would take would be to urge the tech clubs to represent themselves better at NAITSA meetings.

6. So far, I haven't looked at this position from the point of view of personal gain, but I feel that the benefit I will receive will be satisfaction more than anything else. The satisfaction of working for people and with people; the satisfaction of getting the job done; of accepting the responsibility of the job and carrying it through successfully.

7. As Publications Chairman my duties would be to act as chairman for the newly-formed Publications committee, to find editors for the yearbook and Nugget, to produce the Frosh Book for September, to compile the phone directory, to sell the advertising for the directory, the Nugget, and the Northern Torch (if the yearbook editor wants it) and to assist both editors with the production of their publications.

1. My reasons for running for President are simple: to improve the much needed communication between the Student Body and the Student's Association to increase student awareness and among the different technologies. Currently my position with the Administrative Management Society is in public relations. Coupled with my dedication, enthusiasm, and experience in the business community will enable me to put forth my best effort for you.
2. Some of the key issues will firstly centre around our increasing student awareness towards the student councils past, present and future performance or the lack of performance.
3. Of course I could say there will be no increase in tuition

fees; but let's look at the situation in a realistic way. First of all consider the number of hours divided by the total tuition which is, totally tax deductible. The cost is really not that great. While on the other hand if there were to be any unreasonable increases in tuition fees there will get my immediate attention and full attention.

With the increase in demand for better qualified students, the government will follow suit in its increase in supply on monies and technical hardware.

4. My predecessor has had some weaknesses, but if he didn't, he would not be human. I feel that all problems cannot be put on the shoulders of one person. My proposal to solve this situation in the future is in effective communication between the Council members and input from the students.

1. I am running for the position of NAITSA Secretary because I feel I am well qualified for the clerical aspects of the job (being in Secretarial Arts and having had work experience) as well as for the aspects of the position involving the students directly.

I am a typesetter for the NAIT Nugget. This duty requires a great deal of perseverance and dedication as we are often here on production night until the wee hours of the morning. In my tech, I am Social Convenor and have been an avid participant in nearly every intramural sports offered.

During the past year, I have become familiar with the internal workings of NAITSA and I feel that I could contribute a great deal to the executive and to NAIT students.

2. The key issues to be dealt with in 80-81 will probably be basically the same ones that are of concern now. Rising tuition fees, a licensed lounge, parking, student residences, and lack of communication are among the many issues that are presently of concern to NAIT students. Hopefully, the council will be able to work together, along with NAIT administration, to alleviate these problems or at least come to an understanding with the students.

3. Rising tuition is inevitable, and as long as it doesn't get out of control, I feel many students have come to expect it. My main function, however, would be not to deal with external affairs, but rather with happenings within NAIT.

4. I feel that one of the weaknesses of my predecessors has been the lack of involvement of the secretary in NAIT events. The secretary should be just as visible to the students as the rest of council. If elected, I don't plan to sit in my office and ward of visitors, but rather to remain involved in sports and my tech, as well as NAITSA.

5. Lack of communication between council and the student body is definitely an important issue in this elec-

tion and in the coming year. In my first year at NAIT, I didn't even know where the executive offices were or who occupied them. The only way to remedy this situation is to become more visible to the students and keep you informed of the goings on within the council.

6. If elected, the benefits I feel I will receive are 1) valuable experience as a member of council and 2) a chance to meet a variety of NAIT students in various techs. These two reasons are also the factors that influenced me to run for secretary.

7. The duties of the secretary will be, of course, to take minutes of the meetings, prepare correspondence and the other duties that go hand in hand with the term "secretary". But there is more to the job description than that. NAITSA secretary is required to be a sort of right-hand person to the other members of the executive and to help alleviate as much of their work load as possible.

Because of increasing enrollment from year to year, it is quite easy to loose contact between the students and their representatives. This is not a weakness of my predecessors as much as it is simply an issue failed to be reviewed. If the purpose of a council is for representation and the council is not in touch with the people they are to be representing, why is there a council?

5. Communication is the most important factor regarding the position I intend to hold. As Vice-President, my responsibility will lie in the Public Relations aspect of NAIT. After the opening opus of 2112, Rush free-willed their way through such songs as "By Tor and the Snow Dog",

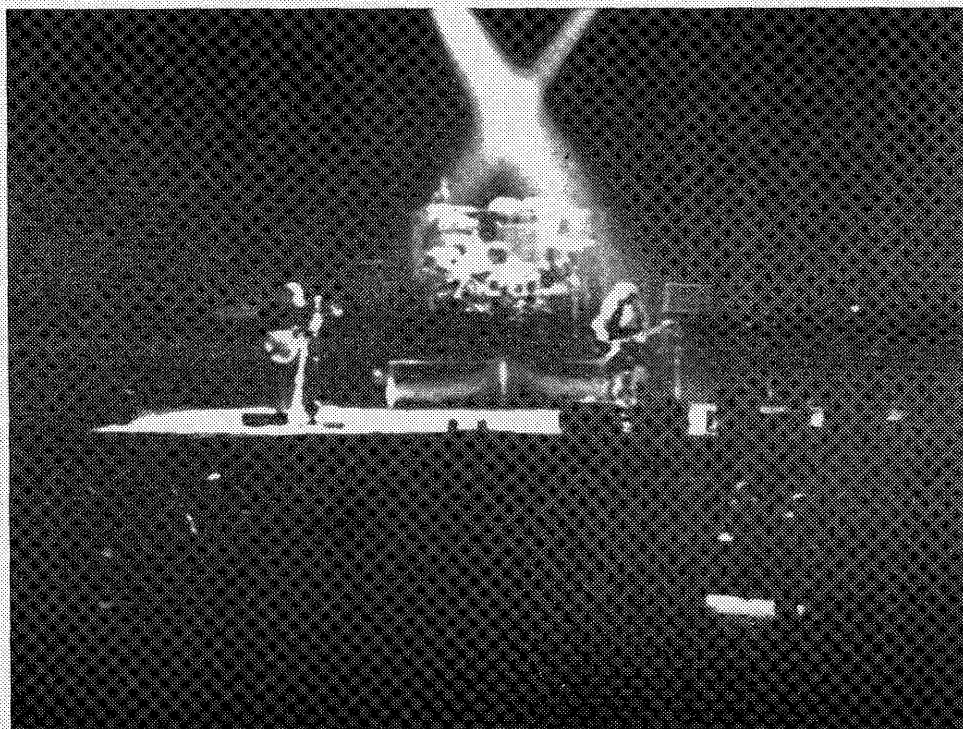
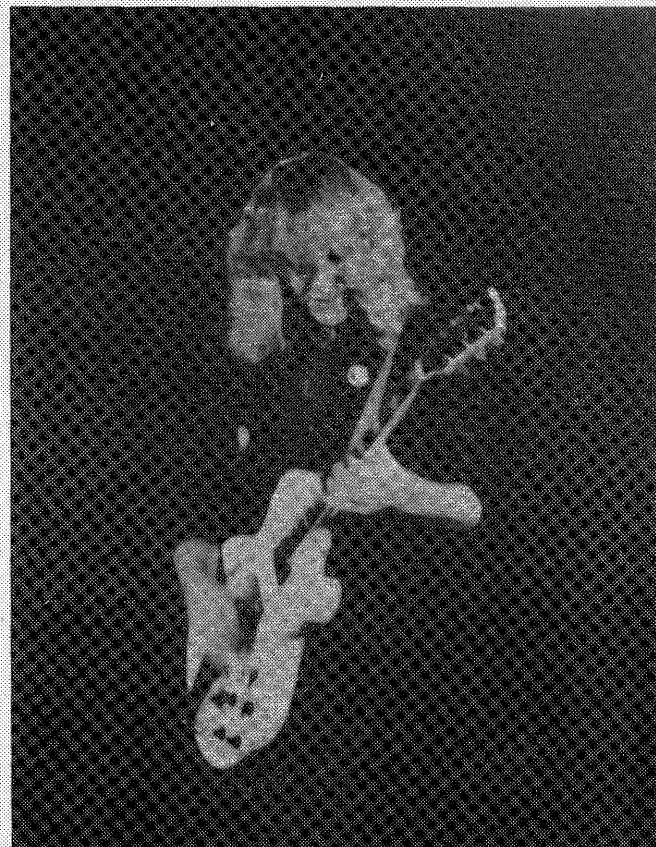

PINK FLOYD--THE WALL

First of all, let me introduce myself. I'm Mike Parkin and I will be writing this column now, in place of CarolAnn Retallack. I hope that I can do as good a job as she has.

In the future I hope the feature a great deal of Canadian talent, as well as new and big name groups. For you this week, I've got one of the all-time great British groups, *Pink Floyd*.

I often find myself wondering why groups wait so long between album releases. I can see it is because those groups wish to produce quality albums, not quantity. This album is no exception, it is quite simply, classic Pink Floyd.

The Wall might be termed a concept album by many, but I believe it to be just a tight, cohesive collection of works. The entire album has no gaps between songs, but relies

upon the idea of running each song into the one following it. This results in a very pleasing, listenable album. The part of the album most people are familiar with is probably "Another Brick in the Wall, Part 2". This is a good example of the type of music to be expected throughout the 2 record set. In "Part 1 of Another Brick in the Wall", the guitar work would make you think that you were listening to Dire Straits, nothing but tight, fast guitar-picking.

The band intermingles the problems of education, sexuality, growing up and the very real threat of an Orwellian, 1984-type existence. It is, quite simply stated, a critique of man's existence and presence in the world that we know. One song in particular, "Good bye Blue Sky", seems

especially critical of what man has done to the world through war and fear. "Young Lust" reveals the portrait of young man in a strange town, hoping to confirm his manhood through some intimate female companionship.

In the end, we find ourselves face to face with someone who wants to escape to a Utopia, and cut himself off from this mess of a world we live in. He speaks of building himself a wall, to seal himself off from reality. Then in the end our escapee is caught and put on trial, for being "Caught red-handed showing feelings, showing feelings of an almost human nature." Can the spectre of 1984 get much more obvious than that?

Relying upon the brilliant writing abilities of Roger Waters, might I suggest that

this album will be one of the biggest sellers in 1980? It is not commercial, because very few cuts will make any sense, unless they are heard in the context of the rest of the album. All in all, a fine effort by some old men of the business.

One side will be, "MacLean & MacLean Suck their way to the Top," while the other will read "MacLean & MacLean take the 'O' out of Country". I heard they did this so that record store managers could display the least offensive side.

Keyboardist Terry Watkinson has left Max Webster because of "musical differences", while the Rolling Stones planned tour of Canada and the U.S. is in jeopardy because of Ron Wood's cocaine bust on St. Maarten; in the Dutch Antilles.

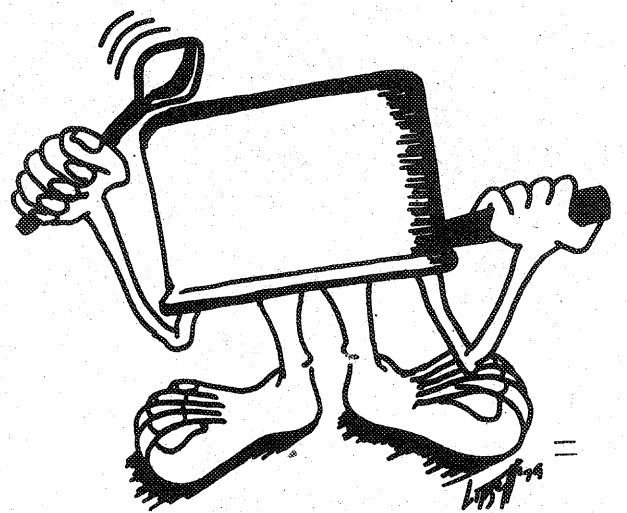
Paul Joly decided he wanted another band, so he called Calgary early in February.

This recipe can really stretch your food dollar and is a great way to use leftover chicken. It serves six but can be reduced. The secret to success with this recipe is not to over cook the vegetables.

4 cups of cooked rice
3 tbsp. salad oil
1 1/2 cups chopped green pepper
3/4 cup thinly sliced onions
1/4 cup cornstarch
2 cups chicken stock
3 tbsp. soy sauce
2 cups slivered cooked chicken
3 ripe tomatoes, cut in wedges

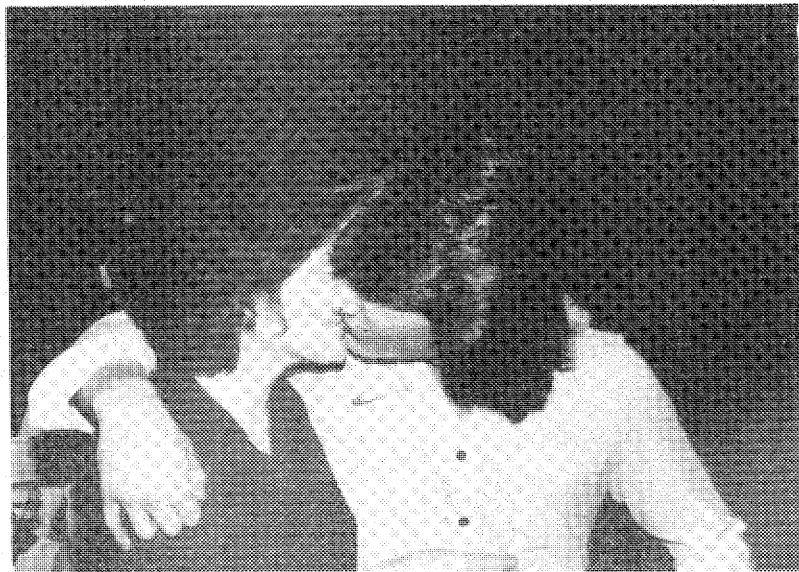
Cook rice as directed, remove from heat and let stand 5 minutes. Fluff with fork. Heat oil in skillet. Add green pepper and onions, cover and cook over low heat until vegetables are just tender, not browned. Meanwhile, mix cornstarch and small amount of chicken stock, then add remaining stock and soy sauce. Add chicken to vegetables. Next add stock, stirring constantly. Stir over medium heat until sauce is clear and thickened. Add tomatoes, continue cooking until tomatoes are heated. Spoon over rice.

Those secretaries are the ones that really make these good times roll. Congratulations on another success.



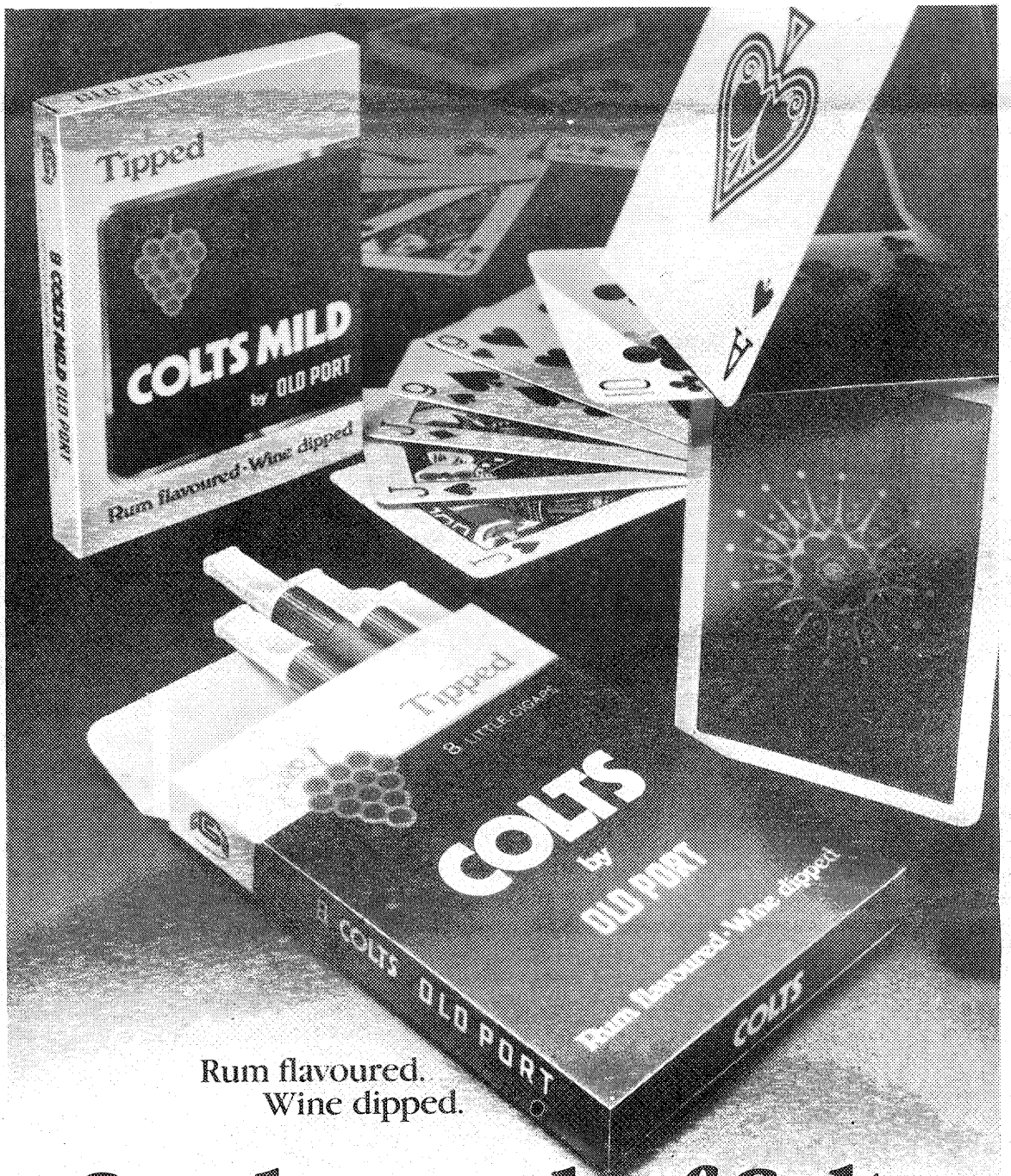
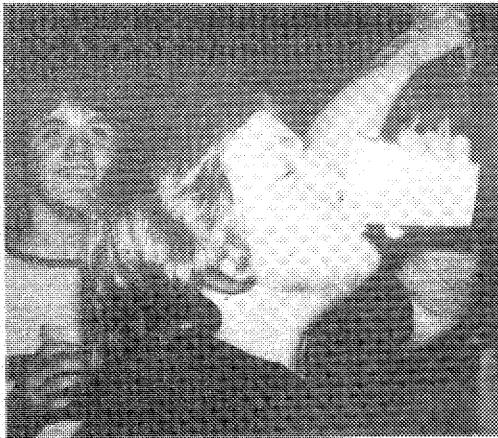

KELLY'S KORNER

"WORK OUTS FOR SWIMMERS AND NON SWIMMERS"

Nothing does more for your body more efficiently than water: It keeps you cool. Its resistance makes every move you make more effective. Its buoyancy makes you feel weightless (and even makes a klutz feel graceful.) If you love swimming, all you need to know to get the most out of water is how to design the best swim program for your. But if swimming laps bores you, there are intriguing alternatives that add resistance, cut workout time, and up challenge. Even if you don't swim, you're still in luck. The first thing you'll have to know in both cases is how to design your own swimming program.

A good swimming workout should combine different strokes, increase endurance and improve skills. Of course, you will start out SLOWLY and not overwork yourself. A few laps of each stroke is sufficient for the first while. If you find counting laps monotonous, swim for time. Begin with a 10-15 minute swim (alternating strokes) and add time as you build strength and stamina. If you are a beginner who needs to improve cardiovascular conditioning, swim a lap, get out of the pool, walk to the other side and then swim the next lap. Although a bit disconcerting at first, this system is better than resting between laps since it keeps you in constant motion. To improve overall condition, you should swim at least three times a week. To add a little resistance to your work outs, U.S. swimming champion Nancy Hogshead suggests wearing two thin nylon suits--the double layers make you work just a bit harder.

And watch your strokes! So much energy is wasted by beginners who are using energy in the wrong areas. A simple flutter kick should consist of only two to six beats per stroke. Avoid the impressive but exhausting and basically useless white wake behind. Kicking correctly not only helps you move more efficiently, it slims, tones and strengthens hips, calves, and ankles. Keep your body parallel to the bottom of the pool. Proper body position makes the difference between a good crawl and one that strains neck and back muscles. Keep your head LOW in the water and do not thrash it from side to side. Rhythm will come naturally with practice. It's not mandatory to breathe with every stroke; every other, or even every third stroke, is perfectly fine.

I have only mentioned a few of the most common problems. If you are still uncertain about your strokes, sign up for swimming lessons; most pools offer stroke improvement classes.



STUDENT OBSERVATION OF CANADIAN NATIONAL BADMINTON CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Canadian Collegiate Badminton Tournament served two main purposes. The first and most obvious was the competition itself. The Men's Double team came away with a 1 for 6 record. This score is not so much a reflection of the teams playing ability but rather of their experience. Most of the teams there were veterans of many such Canada-wide or Inter-Provincial competitions, whereas the NAIT players were experiencing their First National experience. It was a very worthwhile one. What the team learned here could not have been learned in a lifetime of Edmonton area Badminton. I feel that if teams from NAIT were sent to such Tournaments on a regular basis, there would be a definite and noticeable improvement in the calibre of play at our Institution. I only wish that everyone could have the experience of competing in such a Tournament.

The second purpose of this Tournament, although not so obvious until it is experienced, is the bringing together of Canadians. In particular, the East and West; the English and French speaking people. It is one thing to sit in the West and say "lets charge the East world prices for oil", but after watching the people on Yonge Street and on the subway, "roll in the aisles" with laughter at the antics of the B.C. team. (One 55 year old man actually missed his stop because he was laughing so hard and a television film crew stopped to record the entertainment on film) and

developing an instant sense of comradery with them. It is something else to then say, "Hey, I think you should pay more than I do for gasoline."

You suddenly realize that these people aren't just Quebecers or Ontarians, but rather warm friendly Canadians. Then the forementioned quotation becomes a little harder to say.

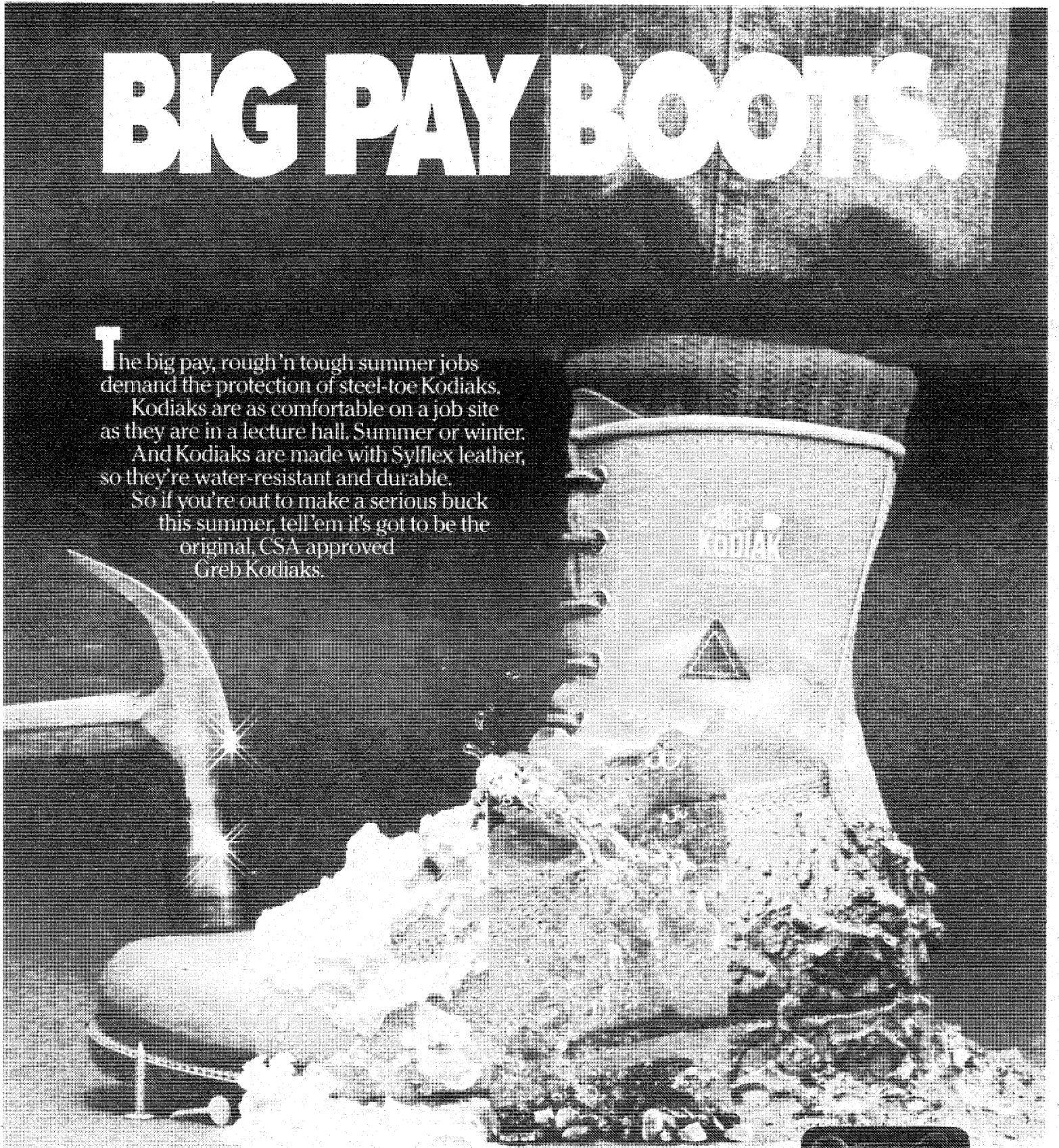

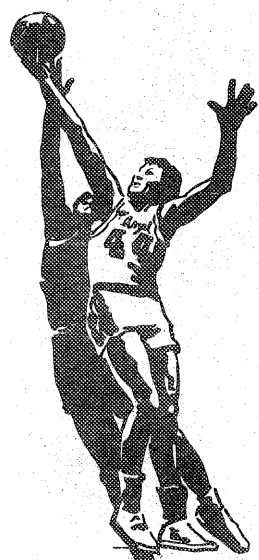
