ALBERTA NUMBER ONE FOR APPRENTICES

NAIT, being a trade school, enrolls many students under the apprenticeship programs. Their term varies from 6-12 weeks. This way, they work on the job, on practical studies and come to school to obtain a credit and a license to perform their trade. These large groups of new students, enrolling in the middle of the year go unnoticed by NAIT full-time students.

The book store is avoided because of the masses of new purchasers, and many young females avoid the rug room. Then again, the rug room becomes a ever more popular area of studying as well. NAIT at most times is predominantly male enrollment, and when the apprenticeship programs start up, one becomes lost amongst the welders and mechanics, plumbers.

In this last school term, over 12 thousand apprentices have studied their trades at NAIT. The programs are registered as "Recognized Ticketed Trades", "Ticketed Trades". The difference between the two is that a "Recognized Ticketed Trade" is one which needs a license in order to work a trade.

At any one time, there can be over 2,200 apprentices enrolled at NAIT. Last Monday, you may have noticed a new batch, and in fact, 800 tradesmen did enroll. In Edmonton, there are six locations where apprenticeship programs are offered: Plaza, Bonaventure, Patricia Campus, Alta. Vocational College, Westmount, and Scona.

In the past few years we have been told that Canada does not have enough skilled workers and thousands have had to been brought in from out of the country. According to Mr. Rob Meuller of the Apprenticeship Board here at NAIT, this is incorrect. He says that Canada has many recognized ticketed tradesmen and more are enrolling into programs every year. Meuller stated that over 23 thousand enrollments in

your status and classification. In order to work outside the province with an Alberta ticket you must register with that province's apprenticeship board. It is also manditory in certain cases to write a provincial examination. Working your trade in another province without following these steps is illegal. There are certain trades that fall under the category of international equality. Here you would receive an Interprovincial ticket which makes you eligible to work anywhere in the country under your license.

In talking with the ap-prenticeship board representative at NAIT, I was told that courses follow strict attendance rules and the material studied is heavily condensed. Students are guaranteed a wage of between \$60 and \$156 while at school. An employee may pay part or whole of the amount and the government will subsidize the rest. In many cases the normal wage continued by employer, while their "hired employee" is at school.

HEALTH HAZARD

CALGARY (CUP) -- A twoyear old health hazard problem caused by poor ventilation at the Alberta College of Art is still in the "investigative stage," according to officials.

The problem arose in silkscreening labs at the college when toxic fumes could not be effectively removed from the air. Students were becoming nauseated, dizzy and suffering impaired vision

because of the fumes, which were produced by chemicals used in the silk-screening process.

"The potential for quite an explosion was there as well considering the level of toxicity in the room," said Bill Perochnuk, assistant director of physical facilities for the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology.

Investigations into the situation began seriously last fall although the problem has existed for at least two years.

"We have no definite date for when the actual work will begin on the ventilation. We hope that the work will be completed by the end of Perochnuk September," said.

Silkscreening classes for the 1980 semester were cancelled because of the danger involved. More than 40 students taking the course were forced to choose alternate courses.

The institute needs additional funding from the Alberta government to pay for the repairs, Perochnuk said, but no problems are anticipated in getting the

For instance, did you know that your international student I.D card will entitle you to cut rate accommodation in student hotels throughout Europe, 50 - 100 percent discounts on museum entrances, cheaper rides on trains, buses, and boats, entrance to student cafes that give you cheap munchles and much more? Simply send proof of current student status (High school or post secondary) - a xeroxed copy of the card will do, name, address, birthdate, and \$3.50 to C.U.T.S., S.U.B., University of Alberta, Edmonton, Alberta. Do enclose a photo, a 4/\$.50 machine photo will suffice, or a passport photo. Ask them about Inter-Eurpoean student flights and local discounts while you're at it.

Or, did you know that chaning you money at the border is like shopping at a convenience store; you use it for an emergency when nothing else is open, and lose a fair bit in the transaction. It's best to carry your funds in small denominations or travellers cheques (Americ an Express or Thomas Cook), and try to do your large currency exchanges at a large bank or American Express office (you can get a free list of their offices by calling the local American Express office). And don't lug all those bills around in your back pocket; try to devise a money bag or belt for you necessities: passport, student I.D. car travellers chéques, cash, etc.

Do you know the differences between charter flights, apex, vouth standby, laker skytrain, one way economy tickets, or a student fare on a boat from the East coast to Europe? If you don't, you may not be getting the best money value for the length and destination of your trip. I'll attempt to explain these differences during the talk, or, if you're anxious, you can head to your local travel agent. He's got all the prices, a world of information at his fingertips, and his service is free (a poor joke-"Travel agents do it for

a membership with the Canadian Hostelling Association will entitle you to clean accommodation in 50 odd countries throughout he world at a nightly cost of under \$10. What a deal for \$12 and, there's no age limit in hostels, except in Bavaria, Germany where preference is given to people under 26 years. Call the Local C. H.A. office for details 439-3089, or drop into the office at 10922 - 88 Avenue.

So, even if your trip is wishful thinking or you're a longtime traveller, come by and enjoy the talk. This is the fifth annual talk and it's become a spring tradition in Edmonton-pass the word around.



OUT OF BODY EXPERIENCE

As its name indicates, out of body experiences are those experiences realized by an individual without the intervention of the usual physical sense and, more importantly, in a state in which the physical body is dissociated from the phychic body in such a way that the physical body is in one place while the psychic body is in another place, usually united by what is popularly known as the "silver cord."

There are various forms of out of body experiences, the most popular being astral projection or astral travel and psychic projection, sometimes used synonymously. Whatever the form of out of body experiences being considered, they are generally classified under two headings, namely, spontaneous out of body experiences and controlled out of body exper-The difference iences. between the two is very vast. TUITION HIKE

CALGARY)cup) -- Students at Alberta colleges may be paying a 10 percent higher tuition fee if the provincial government accepts a recommendation from the college's board of governors.

The Mount Royal College board of governors proposed the increase to Jim Horsman, advanced education and manpower minister, after consulting with other colleges.

MRC BOG member Ed Schmidt said other colleges were likely to propose the same increase. Schmidt said he had contacted college boards at Lethbridge, Red Deer and Grant MacEwan in Edmonton.

The Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT) was the only post-secondary institution not to recommend an increase.

MRC board chair Gerry Burden justified the increase saying the costs of education had risen with inflation.

'Staff salaries and other operating costs have all gone up," he said. He said money from tuition fees account for approximately 9 percent of the education costs while the government provides the other 91 percent.

If costs continue to rise and tuition remains stable the government's share would increase. This would be contrary, he said, to established practice of the education system in Alberta.

Pam Patten, MRC student president, said she supported the proposal. "Because the costs of education have risen, I feel the government would be justified in this increase,'

The increase would raise tuition from the present \$179.50 per semester to \$193.25 for full-time students.

Student Representation on Task Force OTTAWA (CUP) -- The status of the federal-provincial task force on student aid is up in the air because of the Conservative government's defeat Feb. 18.

question mark. A joint announcement Feb. 15 by the federal secretary of state's office and the provincial Council of Ministers of Education Canada (CMEC) said that there would not be student representation on the task force. But the victorious Liberal party said before the election that it supported the participation of students on the task force,

And student participation in the task force is also now a

National Union of Students (NUS) researcher Jeff Parr said Feb. 19 it remains unclear what will happen to the task force or whether the Liberals will keep their promise on student representation.

Obviously it's not something we can take for granted,"

Parr had angry words for the way the CMEC and secretary of state handled the announcement of the task force's mandate and the decision to exclude students.

'I learned about the decision when I got a call from an Edmonton newspaper asking for NUS' reaction," said Parr. NUS had been pressuring the governments for a student representative on the task force and had been assured that it would be kept informed about any task force decisions," he said.

Parr said the governments' attitude towards student representation bodes ill for the way student concerns will be considered by the task force.

"I don't think it's a very good sign at all. I'm skeptical about their commitments to student input to the task force." he said.

Parr also said NUS is concerned that student input will be minimal because the task force report is due in the fall of this year, meaning much of its deliberations must be done this summer, without students on campus.

The task force, composed of secretary of state and education ministry officials, will not examine the student aid situation in Quebec because the province administers it own student loan program.

The mandate given the task force orders it to:

-Review existing federal and provincial priniciples and objectives concerning such public financial assistance with a view to determining those principles and objectives which should underlie the provision of such assistance.

-Review the adequacy and appropriateness of existing federal and provincial programs of assistance, including such concerns as accessibility to post-secondary education, the financial needs of students, student debt load, and portability and compatibility of the various forms of

-Formulate alternatives for the continuation, modification or replacement of the existing federal and provincial government policies and programs.

-Report both to the Council of Ministers of Education Canada and to the Secretary of State by the fall of 1980.

The mandate also states that: "In carrying out its work, the task force shall take into account demographic and student participation projections, jurisdictional and special regional considerations, provincial and federal fiscal and financial realities and other matters relating to the operation of student assistant programs.'

Lockers Hit Again



IN THE GROOVES



Marianne Faithfull -- "Broken English"

Out of the pack of sweet-voiced female singers crooning songs of love comes something totally different--a bitchy, tough-sounding woman with an abrasive voice, named Marianne Faithfull.

Faithfull has been through a lot in her lifetime—she has survived a broken marriage, a rocky romance with Rolling Stone Mick Jagger, a miscarriage, suicide attempts, and heroin addiction. Somehow, she came through it all intact; this album signals her victorious emergence back into the public eye (she was a recording star and popular English socialite back in the early '60's).

There are no saccharin love songs on "Broken English"; Faithfull injects a piece of her life into every tune, letting all her disillusionment and bitterness be released through the medium of her voice. She is backed up by a very competent band, expertly using synthesizers and guitars to accentuate the angry mood.

There is a lot of strong material on this album; included are "Ballad of Lucy Jordan," Shel Silverstein's tale of a despondent housewife; as well as John Lennon's "Working Class Hero." But by far the most important song is one of the three that Faithfull co-wrote, entitled "Why D'Ya Do It." This cut is fast gaining notoriety because of all the "naughty" language that is used in it. But the song is no Zappa-esque joke, using obscenity for shock value; every word is entirely necessary and dead serious, used to illustrate the depths of outrage and hatred directed at a sexually unfaithful lover. Backed by a stinging guitar, Faithfull spits out all the resentment she has ever known and the result is devastating:

"Why d'ya do it?" she said,
Ain't nothin' to laugh-You just tore all our kisses
Right in half!

This is a brilliant album, and hopefully its success will give birth to a new trend for female vocalists. It's about time they broke away from their stereotyped image of softness--even Janis Joplin, for her raspy voice and gut-wrenching delivery, had an underlying vulnerability. One gets the feeling while listening to Marianne Faithfull, that she is completely her own person--and that's good to hear.

Tired of making supper at night? After a hard day at the office, who can bring themselves to slave over a hot stove for an hour only to go back and hit the books Here's a simple again. recipe that's an old favourite and most of the work is done in the morning before you go to school.

BAKED BEANS

Start by setting out about 1/3 the volume you can eat of White Pea Beans. Soak them in 3 times that volume of water the night before. The next morning at about 6:45, cook the beans in the same water on top of the stove for approx. 20 minutes. they're cooking, add 1 large chopped onion, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 3/4 tbsp salt, 11/2 tbsp dry mustard and about 1/2 lb of chopped bacon. At this point, do not salt to taste as a

lot of water will evapourate during cooking leaving you with salty beans.

N.B. Put in large pot and cover with 3 inches of water. If it is possible to return at noon, add a can of mushroom soup and more water. If impossible, add soup and more water before you leave for school. Leave at 175 degrees till about 5:00 pm. Invite a friend for supper and later on you can make beautiful music together.

Aside from the lousy music, the Red Barn was still a



The NAIT teams ended up winning 12 games and losing only 4. The members of the teams are as follows:







NAIT's next team game is on Sunday the 9th of March at Kinsman Fieldhouse against Victoria at 10:00 p.m.





TROJAN TROUBLE **SPELLS END FOR** NAIT OOKS

Just as in last year's play-offs, the SAIT Trojans spelled the demise of the NAIT OOKS. The Trojans swept two straight in the best of three A.C.A.C. Semi-Finals.

It became apparent right from the start that things were not to be for the OOKS. Even though the OOKS outshot the Trojans 18 to 10 in the opening period, they found themselves down three to nothing. Lyle Stokotelny opened the scoring at 4:09, Brydon Rempal scored at 12:36 and Jamie Hodgins completed the damage at 15:50.

The OOKS missed numberous scoring opportunities as they buzzed around the SAIT end. It simply appeared to be a cse of NAIT not being sharpe when near the net. "I felt we did a lot of things right but that we were not mentally prepared for the first period. I noticed it in the dressing room before the game", were the comments of Assistant Coach, John Phelan.

The second period saw the Trojans take complete command of the game as Hodgins with his second, Kim Hilkewich and Dennis Connelly put the Trojans ahead 6 to 0. Peter Skrabyk, on a beautiful individual effort finally put NAIT on the scoreboard as the period ended 6 to 1. SAIT again picked up three goals in the third as Connelly got his second and Gord Pattison picked up a pair. The OOKS seemed to breakdown defensively time and again through-out the game as the Trojans had 2 on 1, 3 on 1 and 3 on 2 breaks continually. The OOKS did outshoot the Trojans 48 to 35 but were not sharpe when in good scoring position. SAIT picked up 9 of 14 minor penalties called referee Eric Patterson.

Game two saw the beleaguered OOKS head into Foothills Arena with a mere 10 skaters and two goaltenders. The depletion in the ranks were caused by several things; Mike Schneider did not go as he was busy seeing his wife through the birth of their daughter (Congratulations Mike), Larry LeBalnc was still sitting out a suspension. It seems Harvey Teske had so little respect for his fellow teammates and the coaching staff, he simply didn't show up. Dale Miller decided that a Friday night practice was too much of a sacrifice to make after the 9 - 1 shellacking and simply quit.

Given those type of circumstance, the OOKS were given little chance of bing in the game, let alone giving SAIT a challenge: However, the "Dirty Dozen" gave the full

staffed Trojans all they could handle.

The OOKS came ready to play and were ahead 1 - 0 at the 31 second mark as Wayne Perkins scored on a pass from Doug Bogda and Peter Skrabyk. The Trojans pulled even at the 10:07 mark when Bob Deschamps scored. Just over one minute later, Kim Hilkewich scored to give SAIT a 2 - 1 lead. The OOks did not let up however, and while continuing to press, Rob Morrison tied it at 2 when he scored from Dwayne Rausch and Marv Johnson.

The second period featured tight play-off hockey for the first 7 minutes. Then suddenly in a span of 2 minutes and 30 seconds in some wild end to end action, 4 goals were scored. SAIT's Kim Hilkewich scored first at 7:05, then NAIT's Gerard Jubinville scored after an excellent lead break away pass from Rob Morrison at 8:27. SAIT bounced back at 8:56 with Lyle Stokotelny scoring and finally SAIT scored again when Bob Deschamps dented the twine at 9:35. "We got caught playing wide open against a team with a little more fire pwoer, it cost us," said Coach Perry Pearn.

The Trojans decided the issue in the last five minutes of the second period when the OOKS made several mistakes as a result of just being too tired. "We let the tempo of the game get away from us in that second period, we played it too wide open" said Pearn. Stokotelny with a pair and Deschamps scored for SAIT to make it 8 - 3.

This gutsy bunch of 12 hockey players however, refused to quit and once again took tghe play to he Trojans in the third period. SAIT made it 9 - 3 on a goal by Jamie Hodgins but the OOKS still refused to die. Mary Johnson scored at 9:47 after Doug Bogda and Wayne Perkins provided the leg work. Gerard Jubinville scored unassisted at 12:59 as the OOKS carried the play. Peter Skrabyk made it 9 - 6 on a slap shot and the OOKS were still pressing when SAIT scored in the last minutes to make the final 10 - 6. Shots on goal were 43 - 41 in favor of SAIT, while in the penalty department SAIT took 11 of 18 minors and NAIT picked up the lone major penalty.

Despite some problems, I enjoyed very much working with a core of dedicated and hard working athletes". What about the play-offs Coach Pearn? "I think we met a team with more depth and a potent offensive attack and that proved to be our downfall. We did not play particularily well in game one but in game two we played well but just id not finish plays as well as SAIT." Pearn went on to add, "I honestly feel going into the play-offs, we had 16 guys with the ability to upset SAIT but we need to be at the top of our game, we weren't.
