
# APRIL FOOLS!

He continued to stare. Affair. Divorce. Alimony. House. He stared at her with amusement in his eves. A smile touched his lips.



When I attended your Open House (which, by the way I found very interesting and informative) I picked up The Nugget.







Powerhouse Drama at Theatre 3

Martin Sherman's hard hitting drama at Theatre 3, March 25 and runs until April llth. BENT is a powerfully moving drama of homosexual persecution under the Nazi regime in Germany.

Hitler's Germany was a dangerous place to be for many minorities. Nearly half a million homosexuals died in Nazi concentration camps because of their sexuality. #### **QUEBEC SUMMER** EXCHANGE

Due to success at last Jim vear's program, Horsman, minister of Advanced Education and Manpower, has announced the expansion of the Quebec Alberta Student Employment Exchange Program this year.

"Funding of approximately \$200,000 will be made available through Summer Temporary Employment Program for this worthwhile activity" said Mr. Horsman.

A variety of summer jobs within Alberta provincial government departments will be filled by 25 Quebec students. A reciprocal program will run simultaneously in Quebec for Alberta stud-The jobs will emphasize meaningful work experience and an opportunity for the students to develop their second language capabilities.

Jobs in Alberta will pay up will be in either the Edmonton or Calgary areas. Quebec City or Montreal.

Bicycle Maintenance

Across the street from where I live a corvette resided last summer. Almost every night the caretaker of the corvette would give it a bath and stroke it dry.

Bicycles need to be maintained and looked after although washing it every night and telling it bed time stories may be a bit extreme. Nevertheless, bicycles are machines and a certain amount of care is required to keep the bicycle in functioning condition. Some components such as hubs need more maintenance than a crank set or free wheel clusters. Bicycles are relatively simple machines and books are available to give detailed descriptions of maintenance procedures.

The moving parts of a bicycle need to be oiled at least once a month. The lubricant WD40 is excellent for bicycle use. Not only is it a penetrating oil, it also prevents rust and acts as a lubricator. Brakes, derailleurs and the chain require monthly shots of such a lubricant. Unlike the other parts the chain should be kept well lubricated, almost saturated with oil. It is a bit late but the chain should be removed and soaked in a medium weight oil over the


The rear gear cluster, over which the chain moves, requires a few drops of oil each month. The oil should enter into the interior of the cluster. This is accomplished by putting the bicycle on its side.

The components of the bicycle which are enclosed, the wheel hubs and crank sets, require a yearly overhall. Dirt and water penetrating into the hubs and crank destroys the grease pack causing a wearing of those parts. The wheel hubs should be taken apart, the bearings removed and cleaned and then the components repacked in grease. While at it, inspect the bearings and bearing races for wear or cracks.

Overhauling the crank set is not a difficult operation. It is a relatively simple precedure once understood and proper tools are used. A bike stand, if available or hanging the bicycle will facilitate such an undertaking. Depending on the amount of riding and in what type of weather conditions the riding occurs will necessitate the frequency of overhauling hubs and crank sits.

Adjustments to the various levers takes a little experience but in the end produces a trouble free bicycle. The ability to shift smoothly from gear to gear, large to small chain sprocket, hinges on the functioning of the derailleur systems. These will take a bit of study and time but are basically setting up of set screws.

There is a debate as to how well the brakes should grip the wheel: should they lock the wheel and throw the rider over the handle bars or should they be left loose so that the



rider is unable to stop coming down a hill. The grip of the brakes is extremely important and I would rather stop suddenly than not at all. Tighten the brakes till the wheel can be locked and then adjust yourself to that limiting pull.

Having a wheel running true, with no deviations, is the one adjustment that demands the most patience and experience of any encountered on the bicycle. The wheel gathers distortions from rough roads or other things such as NAIT's bicycle stands. A true wheel runs smoother and is more efficient. Adjustments to an 'out of plumb' wheel are accomplished by turning the spokes. Tightening or loosening the spokes will swing the rim from one side to the other. Always turn every second spoke when adjusting, since every second spoke connects to the same side of the rim. To true a wheel, the wheel can be left on the bicycle and the brake pad used as a guide.

It requires a lot of patience to true a wheel. It is an an art and requires a lot of practice but the end product is beautiful, the perfect wheel.

Each ride on the bicycle requires a quick check on all the parts to note if they are functioning and properly attached. It takes but a moment or two. It is like the airplane pilot who does a systematic check on all parts of the plane. When something checks out he is ready to fly. So it is with bicycling.



The correlation between a particular political party's platform and the number of seats attained by that party cannot be determined by simply comparing the party's policies with its success (or lack of success) in 'a certain election. However, judging by the importance, expense, and public pressure attached to the platforms offered by the various political parties, it is necessary to outline the policies of the major parties in the election

Since the 1980 election was held only seven months after the 1979 election, in which Joe Clark and his Conservative party emerged victorious, some consideration should be given to the 1979 election. Although there was considerable dissension "Joe Who" leadership bed, this discord switched to support by election time. Yet, the extremely cautious manner in which the Tories presented their leader, indicated at least some degree of uncertainty from the Tories who were concerned with maintaining the very

threatening voter support reported by several polls. Aside from blasting Trudeau and his government for their eleven year record, Tory policy included the dismantling of Petro-Can, and Israeli embassy switch, and the popular mortgage deductability scheme. The polls indicated a slight Tory lead. Indeed, the Tories became a minority government, although their victory was due not to the public support of the Tories, their leader, or their policies (promises), but rather to the rejection of Pierre Trudeau and his Liberal's eleven year record. Of course this was not the case in Liberal Quebec, but was especially true of Ontario, where most of the federal elections are won and lost.

The fresh, inexperienced Tory government made several mistakes in their within Tory ranks upon the short reign, (el. Israeli embassy, Petro-Can, interest rates) and were losing public support even though the Liberal opposition was leaderless. The climax occured, however, in the unveiling of John Crosbie's first budget. It called for an eighteen cent per gallon excise tax on domestic oil, put forward on

what was basically a pretext of future self-sufficiency; but mainly designed to provide funds for the mortgage deductibility plan. The N.D.P. party opposed the proposals. The Liberals, who on initial readings of the budget, indicated that they would allow it to be passed, were impressed with their increasing popularity in the polls, and the public discontent with the budget. The Socred's who previously back Clark's government, and who in effect held the balance of power, voiced their displeasure with the budget by stating that they would abstain from the vote. Suddenly, despite Trudeau's earlier resignation, the Liberal's decided to bring down the government. Was the government's subsequent defeat due to Clark's inability to govern with a minority, ot to the Power Politics displayed by the opposition? In fact, it was the combination of both of these events which caused the election. Yet, although very few Canadians could get excited over the prospect of another costly and seemingly unnecessary election, it soon became apparent that the Liberals had once again

demonstrated their political acumen.

Several interesting developments took place. First, there occurred a reversal of platforms in the Liberal and Tory campaigns. Under the renewed leadership of Trudeau, the Liberals seemed deeply content to say as little as possible in the hope of not disturbing their lead in popularity. Trudeaus refusal to participate in a televised debate, or to hold any press conferences are obvious testimonies of this. On the other hand, Clrk and his Tories engaged in joking insults at Trudeau in an attempt to force a confrontation between the two

leaders and their policies. Since most, if not all indicators, pointed towards a liberal victory, the essence of the election was whether or not the Liberals would from a minority or majority government. Barring any drastic reversal of traditional voting patterns, this election would once again be decided in Ontario, or more specifically, in Southern Ontario, the industrial and demographic nucleus of Canada. What then, brings people to make their final choice? Certainly,









