Task Force Disappointed

By Mike Walker (Gateway) The recently released Federal Provincial Task Force report on Student Assitance is a disappointment to Alberta students, and does not answer their concerns, Federation of Alberta Students representatives said yesterday.

The task force was formed last year by the Council of Ministers of Education of Canada, which consists of all ten provincial ministers. It was to investigate and review the student aid program in Canada and report back by last fall.

However, the report does not address many of the aspects of student aid that it was supposed to, according to FAS. In addition, it does not judge the success of the various provincial student aid programs, FAS said.

"We are disappointed," said Lorraine Mitchell, FAS executive member.

"It doesn't recommend any specific funding arrangements," she said. "It Doesn't specifically review the provincial programs.'

Alberta Advanced Education minister Jim Horsman, as well as most of his counterparts, has been changes to delaying Alberta's student program until seeing the task force report. But since the report does not make any recommendations, Horsman will not be able to base changes on it.

"Now we'll be pressing for action." said Kris Farkas, FAS executive member of U

of A SU vp external. "Since the report doesn't address anything, I guess he'll have

Mitchell also complained that neither the Alberta government nor the Student Finance Board made a submission to the task force.

"On the one hand, they said they would wait for the results of the task force (before making student aid changes)," she said. "And then we find out they haven't even submitted a brief."

Horsman was in Britain and unable to comment.

FAS is planning to intensify its lobby for a province-wide access study to determine what factors dictate whether students continue from high school to university.

In the past, Horsman has called this idea "An airy-fairy mushy access thing." However, he has moderated his position recently, according to FAS fieldworker Anne McGrath.

"Now he's been talking about it being under review," McGrath said.
"Our lobby has been effective."

Summer Job Situation

Employment Minister Lloyd Axworthy indicated the government had budgeted \$100 million for the program, a figure which mirrors the \$100 million spent last year. "This means we have a real dollar decrease in funding for youth employment projects for this year," said Small.

program last year. Small noted that during the

"Students who expected

program to pick up this slack in job opportunities are going to be badly disappointed,' said Small. "Clearly the Minister's commitment to promoting summer jobs is consistent with the government's employment policies since its election."



The lack of daycare standards and facilities in Alberta is doing its part in creating a barrier between students with children and post-secondary education. Daycare waiting lists in Calgary range from a few months to three years.

Jean Munn, a University of Calgary History student, applied to the U of C daycare when she was three months pregnant--her child is now 13 months old and they are both still waiting.

Facilities in Calgary just aren't keeping up with the demand. Debbie Weir, senior worker at the Mount Royal College Daycare, commented that phone calls are "just pouring in all the time and the daycare just connot accommodate all the students looking daycare."

Provincial standards have also come under severe criticism from parents with children in daycare centres as well as those waiting to get their children in.

'It's not just the standards, it's more the lack of standards," observed Amal Umak, mother of two preschool children. Umak noted there are often no standards for good nutrition, programs, space requirements and training level for staff. Where these standards exist in some form they are less than adequate.

Today in Alberta there is a phase-in program for higher worker/child ratios with daycares adhering to these standards receiving an additional \$55 per child from the government. Weir from MRC agreed that there is a need for more such standards as they benefit the children who spend a large portion of their days in the centres.

According to the women interviewed, it is not difficult for students with children to qualify for daycare subsidies as very few of them make over the required minimum. The main problem lies in getting one's child into a centre in the first place.

With a government subsidy, a child may miss 21 days a year without a doctor's certificate. This means that many students cannot have their children at home over the Christmas or spring breaks without losing their subsidy. Unfortunately the special circumstances faced by students are not considered by government regulations regarding subsidies.

Presenlty in Calgary both U of C and Mount Royal College have daycare facilities which, although well run, are too small to meet the demand from students, faculty staff and the public.

All efforts to set up daycare facilities at SAIT have been unsuccessful so far but in the last two years there have been several attempts to get one going.

Elsewhere in the province the story is much the same: limited facilities concerned parents.

As Jean Munn put it, "the lack of daycare imposes a real deterrent to single and married parents going back to school. How is a woman to make money to live or attend school when she can't be sure her child is being adequately cared for, or when it's so hard to find a vacancy in the first place?"

On a brighter note, a Student Union member of U of C said it was too bad there is a waiting list at the U of C daycare, otherwise he would sign himself up, "Because those little kids always seem to have so much fun; it's a lot better looking than classes.'

Donna Baines, organizer of a special conference for campus women which will take place next Friday said: 'Daycare will be an important item at the conference. We hope to discuss problems, but also to plan coordiated action around getting some solutions."

"Too often, women who face problems with childcare simply drop out of school or the workforce because they feel all alone with the One important problem. purpose of the conference is to set up contracts between campus women from all over the province," she said.

Altered States

Altered States devels six million years into the minc using an isolation tank. William Hurt, who plays Eddie Jessup, a psychology proffessor, studies the effect of being sumbersed in an issolation tank.

The issolation tank is half filled with a 10 percent solution of magnesium sulfate in water heated to 93 degrees F, the temperature at which a floating body feels minimal gravity. 


Instead, they emulate their peers by duplicating the sound and style of existing music. Long term leadership is only a memory. Presley & Berry in the 50s, Dylan & the Beatles in the 60s - all innovators, leaders. With the exception of Chuck Berry and Bob Dylan those listed above are dead & gone.

The Beatles as a group can never return, the King has passed on, while Berry & Dylan are sad parodies of their past selves. Rock music hasn't seen a leader since the fab four's demise in 1970. Fortunately, a pair of established veterans from England seem interested in filling the vacancy, Nick Lowe & Dave Edmunds have been making music for over 10 years, yet in all that time, neither of them achieved star status or received proper recognition for their work. Edmunds saw a brief blaze of glory with two hit singles, a rock interpretation of Katchurians Sabre Dance & a fine cover version of a rock standard called "I Hear You Knockin".

As for Lowe, his first taste of fame arrived with a 1979 single from his Labour of Lust L.P. called 'Cruel to Be Kind'. From 1977 to 1979 both men released solo albums within months of each other for three years. They performed on each others L.P.s and toured together with a set of studio

musicians under the name of Rockpile. the band has been in existence for four years. Until very recently they were a touring band performing on four of five solo L.P.s released by Dave and Nick. In November 1980 the Rockpile touring ensemble became a full fledged rock band. They adopted "Rockpile" as the official band name and released a 'debut' album titled Seconds of Pleasure. One half of the others are a collection of obscure rock gems. Overall, this is one of the best albums to come along in quite a while. Each song is delivered with high energy and good fun. Some cuts are hard to classify in terms of capturing a "Rockpile" style as they could be a part of either one of Nick or Dave's Solo L.P.s. Lead vocals are split between Edmunds and Lowe with an odd solo by Guitarist Billy Bremner. I can't recommend a particular song because the entire effort works as a whole. Seconds of Pleasure is straight, no nonsense rock and roll. It is an album that can be savored again and again. Overall, this is an excellent record by two of rocks semi legends. With some luck, Nick, Dave and the rest of Rockpile will attain the status of legend which they so richly deserve.

CAMPUS RADIO

What is campus radio?

Campus radio started in the 1920's with the licensing of a radio station at Queen's University in Kingston by the Department of Fisheries. Since then campus radio has grown to include more than eight stations. Campus radio stations can now be found in every province in the

country. There are now ten campus radio stations with on-air licenses (FM and AM) and there are a number of applications for on-air pending. In addition, dozens of campus radio stations can

be picked up on cable FM systems across the country. As well, a large percentage of campus radio stations reach their audiences through carrier current and closed circuit systems.

Campus radio stations are as diverse as they are numberous. Programming covers the complete spectrum of music as well as dealing into public affairs, news, radio theatre, entertainment, religion, sports, and multicultural gramming.

In a number of communities campus radio fills a dual role and stations exist as campus/community stations providing access to air time for community organizations.

The scale of campus radio varies greatly. Budgets now range from \$50.00 to \$150,000.00. Operating Operating practices often show a few similarities and a lot of differences.

Campus and Community broadcasters from across Canada will be meeting at Carleton University in Ottawa for the first National Campus Radio Conference. CKCU-FM will be hosting this bilingual conference to be held between February 28th and March 1st, 1981

The gathering will be the first time campus and community broadcasters will havethe opportunity to meet as a collective body before members of the Canadian Radio-Televsion and Telecommunications Commission and the Department of Communications.

Other topics to be covered over the three-day period include a setting up of a National Radio-Campus Organization as well as an exchange of ideas and information which cover the broad spectrum of Campus-Community Broadcasting.

To date favourable response has been received from stations across the country, including stations in the province of Quebec.

The organization of this conference has already proven to be a milestone in campus radio history. The outcome of this gathering should prove to be even more so. Truly a moment in Canadian broadcasting history.


