

The need for a program to provide a male image to boys lacking a father's influence has long been realized within the North American community. In the Edmonton area more than 320 boys currently have "Uncles at Large" who provide the friendship which is considered desirable for normal healthy development. The Uncles program is preventive in nature, helping reduce the social maladjustments which may occur through lack of a male influence.

A prospective Uncle who applies is both interviewed and asked to write a person-

ality profile, primarily to determine his suitability for the program. The applicant is asked to share with us information with regard to interests, preferences and personality. This assists our staff counsellors in selecting a Nephew who is best suited to him as an individual. The prospective Uncle attends an orientation seminar primarily to learn perspectives on his involvement from experienced Uncles and from

Mothers whose sons are enrolled in the program. After much information on the families and potential Uncles is accumulated and studied, a MATCH is set up and the participants - mother, Uncle and Nephew meet. Follow-up interviews are conducted by staff counsellors to ensure strong, long-lasting relationships.

Uncles and boys share experiences through weekly

outings which they mutually decide upon. Ordinary things such as changing the oil in the car, building a model, or visiting a farm can be very valuable experiences for a boy when they are shared with his Uncle. An Uncle learns much about himself during 3-4 hours a week which he spends with his Nephew.

Uncles come from all walks of life - professional people,

students, tradesmen, etc. They may be married, may have children of their own, or they may be single. Uncles can be as young as 18 years or they can be older men whose children are grown up. The major criteria for being an Uncle is caring for children. Nephews in the program range in age from 6 - 16.

The six Canadian Progress Clubs in the Edmonton area provide the entire funding

for this valuable program. Progress members raise funds through ticket sales for events such as the Cheechako Breakfast, the Gentlemen's Dinner, the Fun 'N Fur Ladies Dinner, bingos, casinos, variety shows, etc.

"SAY UNCLE NOW" is a recruiting campaign which takes place January 26th - February 7th, 1981. The goal of this campaign is to find Uncles for over 160 boys on the waiting list. Any man who is interested in getting involved in this very rewarding program may call 423-1160 for more information.

David Schamber, who had initiated the writing competition was disappointed in the turn out. As it stands now, the contest can be viewed as a success given close to a hundred entries, but I was expecting entries from all parts of NAIT. That is what I wanted. I appreciate what the English instructors in the Business Department did, but to me that does not signal a successful contest."

Very few of the technologies were represented by their students submitting any of their writing. This competition was not designed to pit technology against technology, and it is doubtful that such a ploy could have affected the overall submission. Writing is not geared to team activities.

Schamber went on to express his disappointment. "I overestimated the attitude of NAIT students. I believed that just the challenge would be enough. But no one seemed to care. Maybe I

could even call them names and they wouldn't care. Maybe they only do things for money."

Hearsay that circulated around NAIT seemed to imply that the prizes were too cheap to be worth the effort of writing. "If that's the case, that money is the motivator, then all I can say is that I'm out of touch with what is going on. I'm stuck with a sixties attitude in an eighties environment. If they want money to write, to do any thing extracurricular, then we're in trouble. And if they didn't submit any writings because they are ashamed of their writing ability then they shouldn't tell anyone they graduated from high school."

The judging will take place over the next two weeks.

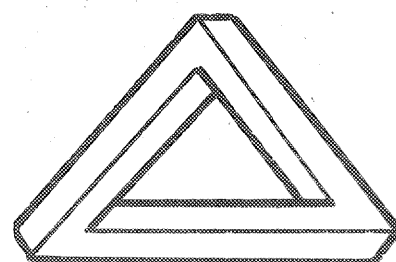

Prez sez

I hope by now you have heard if your technology representative misses two consecutive NAITSA general council meetings then your technology loses its good standing in the Students Association. When a technology loses good standing, all privileges that normally accrue to that technology are lost. This means your technology will have a difficult time in performing the tasks they were elected for or else chose to do.

First I believe it is necessary to inform you of the organizational objectives of the technology representative system. Each of you should have a class representative. That person attends technology meetings in the hopes he or she will keep you informed of what your technology executive is planning in the way of activities and cabarets. It is the responsibility of your technology executive to call these meetings and the room representative should carry your meetings. Ideas and comments forward there.

The next link in the chain is the person your technology executive appoints as your technology representative at general council.

The technology representative has the same function as the room representative. The only difference is that the technology representative carries information to and from general council and the technology room rep-

resentatives meetings.

This chain is our major source of receiving and disseminating information. This link is vital if we are to adequately serve the students that elected us.

Of course when you feel the need you can bypass the system and talk directly to anyone of us.

If you are like most students you probably think all your technology representatives do is plan social events like cabarets and for you second years, arrange the graduation dinner. This is where we get back on the topic of good standing.

The privileges of good standing are not many in number but they do include the privileges of a technology loan as per our guidelines and the NAITSA approval of liquor permits. When in good standing a technology can, if it needs, obtain a loan up to \$200 per event. This money can be used for a hall or band deposit when the technology is low on funds and needs to hold a cabaret or anything to raise money.

Also, the Students Association has had some problems this year in dealing with the A.L.C.B. Combination of new technology executives and a poor information transfer from last year is what, I believe, caused the problem. However, the A.L.C.B. made it clear NAITSA was responsible for all special liquor permits granted to

anyone connected with NAIT.

In light of this we have prepared and distributed a manual for your technology representatives. The manual includes information on holding cabarets and also on how to function as a part of the Student Association. Now we know that the knowledge is out in the hands of the technology executives.

This enforcement of good standing now is as device to weed out irresponsible technology representatives. They must at least attempt to function within the system by attending one meeting per month. A person who attends our council meetings regularly should be responsible enough to hold a cabaret properly. This should improve our relationship with the A.L.C.B.

So in weeding out all this information into what matters, is this comment. Your NAITSA Executive has made a managerial decision to enforce the good standing rule in order to achieve these goals. First, to improve relation with technologies. Second, to improve relations with the A.L.C.B. And third, to give you the "student on the street" a reason to monitor your technology executive and ensure you receive all the benefits during your time at NAIT.

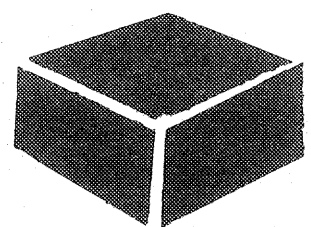

OOKPICKS Falter at BCIT

On the weekend of January 9th, 10th & 11th the Ooks basketball team travelled to Burnaby B.C. to participate in B.C.I.T.'S "Cougar Classic". The men found the going tough as they lost a pair of games; 68 - 63 to B.C.I.T. and 57 - 45 to Cariboo College of B.C.

The Ooks first game was Thursday night against B.C.I.T. where they lost a close one by a score of 68 - 63. A combination of travelling and the time of game seemed to affect the players. The game started at 10:30 B.C. time and finished at 12:30 our time. The first half was very close with the teams tied at 38 points a piece. In the second half the travelling took its toll as the players got tired. B.C.I.T. took advantage of this and rolled on to a 68 - 63 victory. High scorer for the Ooks was Pat Gangl with 18 points followed by Doug Zutz

with 14 and Len Parsons with 8. Talking to coach Dave Hoy about the game, he had this to say; "we seemed to lose our pose and concentration as the game went on, plus we didn't rebound well."

On Friday, the game was much like Thursdays game, as they lost 57 - 45 to B.C.'S Cariboo College. Cariboo came out strong in the first half and assumed a 33 - 16 half time lead. The men seemed to lack intensity with many players not concentrating during the game. Actually the game was a lot closer than the score indicated. Cariboo scored 5 - 6 free throws near the end of the game to make the point spread wider. High scorer for the Ooks was Doug Zutz with 14 points followed by Rick Davidson with 12 and Roger Poon with 7.

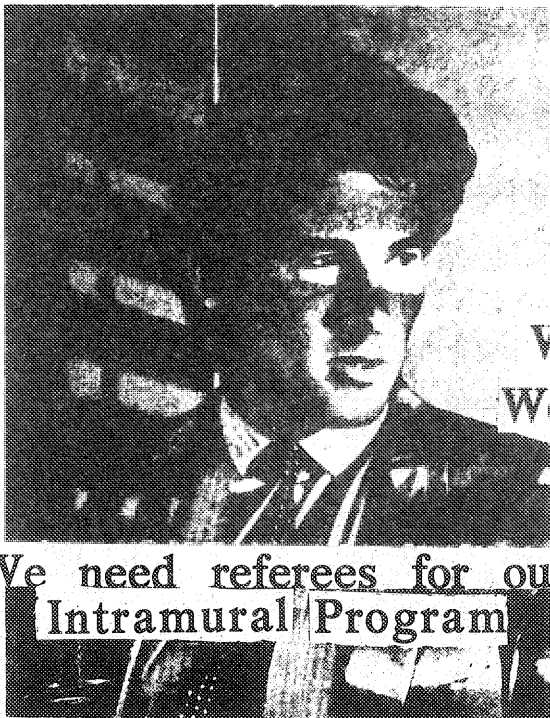

THE FAR PAVILLIONS

C. Kiss

Hot on the heels of "Conan the Warrior" and "Shogun" comes The Far Pavillions, wonderful epic fantasy based on the campaigns of the British Indian Army at the turn of the century.

The main character, Ash, is an Englishman born in India who loses his parents at an early age and is subsequently raised as a Hindu. By the time he is twelve he becomes aware of his heredity and is shipped off to England where he is trained for Her Majesty Victoria's service.

When he returns to India with the army, he becomes the victim of a double edged sword, in that he is unacceptable to his fellow Englishmen for "ACTING A LITTLE TOO NATIVE," as well as to the Hindu's because he has no caste. This is similar to the dilemma faced by Captain Blackthorne of "Shogun", and it provides an excellent medium in which to familiarize the reader with the contrasting customs of

British and Indian Society.

Fortunately, Ash speaks many Indian dialects, so when the movie comes out they'll hopefully all speak English as there will be no value in alienating the audience to better relate to the main character as they did in Shogun.

Like Conan, this book is chalk-full of palace & intrigues, coincidental escapes, wild chases on horseback and comically evil types, always ready to thrust

a dagger in our hero's back, or drop poison in his cup for some act of valour.

There are even black-hooded palace guards in one particularly vile kingdom, as well as beautiful princesses to be rescued.

"The Far Pavillions" is a nicely written and well researched novel on the attitudes and history of India. It is also 100 percent entertainment. Don't start it until the weekend if you have midterms. It is impossible to put down.

"ONCE" - A FAMILY AFFAIR

Multi-talented Gordon Pinsent is directing his second film drama for CBC-TV, entitled "ONCE." Pinsent directs his wife Charmion King and newcomer Stephen Toth in the starring roles. "ONCE" is a 90-minute film about a young country boy who comes to the city and forms an unusual friendship with an older woman. The original script by Don Harron, well-known writer, actor, comedian and host of CBC Radio's Morningside, gives Pinsent and Charmion King their first opportunity of working together as director and actress. "We've acted together before," says Ms. King, "but I've never been in a film Gordon directed."

And yes, I think he's a terrific director!" Executive producer is Bill Freedman and co-stars include his wife, Toby Robins, Flo Paterson, Norman Jewison's daughter Jennifer Jewison, radio personality Don Daynard from Toronto's CKFM, and former radio personality and actor Larry Solway. This summer, Pinsent directed A Far Cry From Home, the opening drama of this season's For the Record series, to debut February 1, 1981.

FILM EDITOR WINS AWARD

Myrtle Virgo is the winner of a 1980 Film Craft Award for TV drama editing, for her work on the CBC production War Brides, seen on the network last September. The craft awards are bestowed in various categories by the Canadian Film Editors' Guild, the Canadian Society of Cinematographers, and the Canadian Film Sound Society. The winners were presented at a recent event at Toronto's Casa Loma. Mrs. Virgo, a CBC film editor of some 15 years' standing, was singled out last season for a Genie Award for her work on Certain Practices, a for the Record drama. She is currently editing a 90-minute drama, Passengers, and a one-hour For the Record production, A Far Cry From Home, both to be seen on CBC-TV in future months.

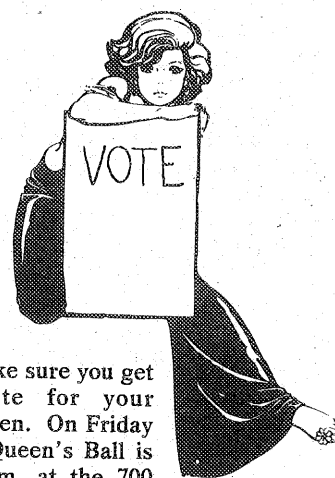
My hobbies include oil painting and reading. Since I have my instructors in swimming I teach whenever possible.


