"In recognition of the growing needs for a highly qualified and skilled work force, the Government of Alberta has approved the allocation of additional operating and capital funds post-secondary institutions," Jim Horsman, minister of Alberta of Alberta minister

"Implementation of new program development is already underway. We expect 113 new programs to be in place by September,

1981 at an additional cost of \$19 million. Enrolment is expected to increase by 2500 to 3000 students depending on the timing of intakes. This significant decision by government provides the people of Alberta with an even greater range of educational and training opportunities," Mr. Horsman said.

Power Grab

NAITSA is making a grab for more power, wresting it away from the Technology Reps. So far they are making good their bid. NAITSA introduced a motion at the last General Council Meeting intended to change the constitution. This change would give them the power to fire at will any paid employee in the Publications area.

NAITSA already has the power to fire any paid employee except for the Publications area (Nugget and Yearbook). The change in the constitution would bring the Publications area into the same firing range. Presently, to fire these employees, a decision has to be made at a General Council Meeting. This little exercise will be taken out of the public realm.

The justification put forward by NAITSA was that since they deal regularly with the Nugget and Yearbook they would be in-the-know. They felt that it would be a waste of time to present all the intracaries of the publishing area to the General Council to enable them to make a decision. To save the Technology Reps the inconvenience of understanding how their newspaper works, NAITSA would make the decision.

It was pointed out that an employee who was fired still had recourse to an appeal. The Appeal Board is a three-person unit comprised of the Director of Student Services, one member of the NAITSA General Council, and the President of NAITSA. If NAITSA already relieved a publications employee of his job, then the Appeal Board is already loaded against his appeal.

The power grab is not a behind the back approach. They had advertised a General Student Meeting to hold a referendum on this constitutional change. Seventeen students showed up, five of whom were NAITSA. The citizens of a country receive in the end, directly proportional to their involvement with the democratic processes of their country. NAITSA council has to pass this motion three times. They have one out, two to go.



"We'll be fair and balanced," he says, "but not necessarily objective. We have to challenge readers to provoke debate on these issues."


As for club news, Michalyshun says he is considering a regular column of short articles on club activities, when they don't merit more complete coverage as news.

There must be changes in our system. I'm not just referring to the lack of participation on the paper or the somewhat dulled attitude that exists throughout the school, I am referring to NAITSA.

Each NAITSA member receives approximately \$135 a month, paid tuition fees, their own parking stall, and various other benefits. In most cases I would say this payment is not nearly enough for the amount of work they have to do. I have seen a lot of hard work put in towards shinerama, pubtime, and some sport activities, but there must be more. Most of NAITSA's work hasn't affected the students.

NAITSA says that they serve the students, but they don't listen to them, they don't talk to them and they don't relate to them.

Many times questions have been avoided by council members with answers such as "I don't know'," couldn't really tell you," or "such information will be released later." "Released Later" information often becomes useless, outdated, and if there is a problem, it's usually too late to do anything.

To put it simply, NAITSA members have at times stated some concern, but rarely is there anything ever done to keep the student body (their voters) informed. On one occasion NAITSA did do something to remedy this information gap by making sure the technology representatives attend general council meetings. NAITSA came to the conclusion that through these meetings all the students in all the technologies will know everything there is to know. So to encourage attendance to the pit of knowledge, NAITSA threatened to take away each techs liquor license. Threats don't work. NAITSA could have tried to make the meetings more interesting by worrying about the students problems and not their own.

At one time NAITSA expressed a wish to print pages of material dealing with NAITSA, but the Nugget felt that this would show political bias and add boredom for the readers. But because the Nugget has already felt the importance of informing the student, we have left one page for NAITSA to use. NAITSA has never used the page. They have never informed us as to what is happening, they have only placed advertisements for

upcoming events. NAITSA has often used poor judgement in many issues such as the dismissal of CUP (Canadian University Press). CUP provided assistance in journalistic skills, vast quantities of interesting material, and a means of communication with other institutes across Canada. CUP also reduced the student tuition fees by adding another source of income to pay for the paper. But NAITSA saw these advantages as an extra expense and a waste of time.

I state my concern about our council because a better job could have been done and I hope the situation will improve in the future. Gene Thiel

"Alfie, would you buy a bicycle that had dropped handle bars?"

Jeez if you "No way. drove it long enough you'd end up looking like the hunchback of Notre Dame."

I held views similar to Alfie for a number of years. I would peddle around on my five speed bicycle feeling smug and uppity. My bike had a nice soft seat and with the raised handlebars I could sit up and view all the other plebians stuck with feeble attempts at bicycles. bicycle had nice wide tires which took up the shocks from the road and shiny fenders to keep the road water away from me. I had a cadillac, what fools these others were.

Research into the bicycle is constantly going on in an attempt to make it even more efficient. The following are a number of ways the bicycle is designed to increase effici-

WEIGHT - the lighter the bicycle is, the easier it is to peddle. A few pounds make a tremendous difference.

Alloys are being used to replace heavier steel. There are \$4000 bikes on the market because of the weight reduction in the frames. But the most important place to keep weight down is in the wheels. Due to centrifugal force the weight of the wheel increases the faster it turns. By keeping the weight down the effort required to propel the bicycle is lessened.

THE HANDLEBARS - the basic difference between the dropped handle bar and the Texas Long Horn style is that the dropped gives the rider three basic positions to place The down his hands. position is used mostly for

A consideration to make when purchasing a bike with dropped handled bars is safety levers. These levers allow the rider to brake while

sitting up. TIRES - Tires which are thinner and contain more pressure are more efficient than the wide all terrain tire. It is an argument about friction. If more of the tire touches the road the friction increases. Granted there is a trade off between smooth ride and less friction, but watching the road a bit more carefully could make up for the increase in shock. But if you don't plan on going off curbs then the thin tire is comparable to riding on cement on a hot summer day as versus riding on soft

THE SEAT - As strange as it may seem, the soft padded bicycle seat is actually more painful than the hard leather seat. There is a constant rubbing and chaffing because of the give in the seat. The soft bouncy seat takes up some of the force used in driving the peddles.

The bicycle seat acts like a fulcrum from which force is directed; if this fulcrum is quasi-stationary then much of the force shape of the riders posterior. This may take a few months, but its end is well worth it.

The bicycle is designed to be efficient, it has to be. To that end many experiments are being tried with bicycle many of which are beyond the cost capability of the casual bicyclist. However. there are still many simple ways to increase the ease of riding a bicycle. If you have a bicycle or are considering one, the above examples should be prominent in your selection. Spend a couple hundred dollars and get a decent bicycle. Go to the bike stores and shop around. Ask the salespeople about the bicycle. Try to stay away from department store specials.

The hockey Ooks put an abrupt end to any thoughts of a third consecutive National Championship for the Red Deer College Kings in A.C.A.C. semi-final playoff action. The Ooks won the opening game of the best of three series 5 on 4 on February 26 at NAIT and then humbled the defending A.C.A.C. and Canadian Champions 10-1 at Red Deer on February 27.

The Ooks completely dominated the last 4 periods of the series. They took control in the third period of the home opener. The Ooks trailed 4-3 entering the third period, but completely outplayed the Kings in the final 20 minutes. Outshooting them 16 to 5, while scoring twice.

Wayne Perkins opened the scoring for the Ooks with a shorthanded goal at 6:38 of the opening period. Al Hough and Rob Dyck shot Red Deer up 2-1 until the Ooks powerplay took over late in the period. Wayne Perkins scored first from Mike Schneider and Daryl Holmguist, then Rick Carriche put the Ooks in front again from Perkins and Dave Souch.

The second period of game one was the Kings only high point as they outscored the Ooks 2 to zero and took a 4-3 lead into the third period. The third period however, saw that Ray Anderson, Mike Schneider, Darrell Slupek unit take over for NAIT. Schneider scored from Anderson at 1:22 to tie the score and then Slupek sunk the winner on passes from Schneider and Anderson.

The Ooks outshot Red Deer 36-31 and took 9 of 15 minor


penalties called.


"Pretty Rough" was formed about a year and a half ago





One of the best country music shows of the year waspresented at the Jubilee Auditorium on Sunday, March 1. The show featured Johnny Lee, Mickey Gilley, and the Urban Cowboy Band. The night started with the Grammy Award Winning Instrumental Group of 1980, the Urban Cowboy Band and their rendition of the 'Orange Blossom Special.'' The Urban Cowboy Band is the successor to Mickey Gilley's original back up band, the Red Rose Express, and has many of its members. The standouts in the group are steel guitarist Ely Nelson, keyboard man Ed Hill and Boston's own Rocky Stone on the bass guitar. Throughout the night, the Urban Cowboy Band showed its versatility and was very entertaining with its music and its humor. Leading off with his latest Canadian release "Fools for Love" was Johnny Lee. Ironically, his latest release stateside "Picking Up Strangers" was performed later in the set. An experienced performer, the Natchez, Mississippi native plays the keyboards in the same style of his cousin "The Killer" Jerry Lee Lewis. Whether it was a slow song like "Stand By Me" or one of an up tempo beat such as "The Girls Get Prettier at Closing Time," Gilley's talent shined. Mickey also has that skill of making the audience feel apart of the show through letting them to sing the chorus in t' George Jones song "Watching You" or through being a part of the crazy antics on stage. "Here Comes that Hurt Again" and 'A Headace Tomorrow and a Heartache Tonight" and the countless other selections were well received. The showmanship of Gilley and Band sparkled throughout the performance.

The highlight of the show was when Johnny Lee and Mickey Gilley shared the stage. It was during his second appearance that Lee sang "Lookin' for Love," the crossover hit that has catapulted him to stardom. Gilley and Lee did a magnificient duet on the Ed Bruce composition "Mamas Don't Let Your Babies Grov Up to be Cowboys." The Doug Kershaw hit "Diggy Diggy Lo" was also performed to perfection by the duo of Lee and Gilley.
