Policing Plaza Parking

Unlike the parking areas at NAIT, the Plaza Cinema Theatre parking lot which was leased by NAITSA will have to be policed by the police. The NAIT parking areas which belong to NAIT and ultimately to the Alberta Government are supervised and patrolled by commissionaires under the guidance of Alberta Government Serv-

David Whalen, president of NAITSA, had assumed that it would be AGS doing the supervision of Plaza The-

atre. AGS, a government department which gives service support to other government departments, has its own act in which is delineated where they are supposed to act. Crown property or property occupied by the Crown in AGS's territory.

In negotiation for the leasing of Plaza Theatre it was mentioned by Whalen that AGS was to do the supervision and snow removal. He was not told different. In exchange for this service NAITSA would go to City Hall and have a couple

vacant lots on 117 th Ave. between Plaza 11 and the main campus rezoned for parking. Everyone thought this was a good idea.

Unfortuneately someone forgot to tell AGS about this. Stan Hryniuk who is director of AGS, NAIT said no when asked if AGS had been consulted about supervision of Plaza Theatre. Mr. Proudfoot, Director of Physical Plant, said he doubted that AGS was asked. Physical Plant is the buffer between AGS and NAIT. Proudfoot offered the excuse that he only took over the position on September 1 and therefore couldn't say much about consulting AGS. Certainly Proudfoot's predecescor should have been aware of the limitations of AGS.

NAITSA must now turn to the police if they want order to prevail in the Plaza Theatre parking lot. The lease stipulates that there are 51 stalls for use by NAIT students. There are currently 70 some cars nudging and bumping each other. Reports have circulated that some of these cars belong to downtown commutters who drive to NAIT, park and then take a bus downtown. Unless the land was Crown owned, AGS cannot help. Patricia Campus suffers the same fate with its parking. It too is on leased land.

Hryniuk offered the solution that possibly in this sitting of the Alberta Legislature or the next one, the Alberta Government Services Act may be changed to include leased land. But so is NAIT changing and when it does change to a self governing institute, AGS becomes superfluous.

In the meantime AGS continues maintaining and preserving NAIT. It is through their work and dedication that students are able to get through their tenure at NAIT AGS makes sure that there is always toilet paper in the toilet paper dispensers. They polish the floors every night so that students will have a new shiny floor to scuff up each morning. They pull the flowers up each September so that the students will not be exposed to death.

The crowding of students and staff into the Cafetorium will not be alleviated until well into next year. The latest ready date for occupation of the old cafeteria is schedculed for May 1, 1982. A series of delays has pushed this date to almost nine months behind sched-

The old cafeteria, located west and between the north and south lobbies was intended for opening last September. Tendering delays, structural problems and extensive renovation has resulted in the Cafetorium having to handle four to five times the number it was originally intended to hand-

The areas adjacent to the kitchen of the Cafetorium, rooms U118 and U120, were designed for food handling. It was to serve 96 places continuously and in peak periods and additional 140 places would be opened. The area has been expanded to seat over 600. The present conditions force food services to serve almost 700 full course meals during lunch hour. Another 200 meals are served at supper. The short order bar cooks up between 500 - 600 hamburgers and almost 300 lbs. of french fries

Not only is a kitchen designed to serve 240 places taxed by a adding a couple thousand places but staffing of the area is crowded. The old cafeteria was to house 2nd year cooking and dietary with only 1rst year cooking in the cafetorium. Presently they are all in the one area.

According to Peter O'Neil, of Food Services, the one saving factor of the Cafetorium in keeping the whole system from collapsing is a good dishwashing facility. In the original blueprints, the Bank of Commerce was to be an occupant in the new building. When they backed out O'Neil stepped in and asked for the space to be used for dishwashing. Without this area students would now be eating off of paper plates. The aisles would be crowded with dishes and the Fire Marshal would be screaming.

There is no way out of this mess until the old cafeteria comes back on stream. It will be able to seat five hundred. It will have five line, varying from a soup and sandwiches line to an instructional specialty. Crowded conditions do not make for the most enjoyable meal. Although Plaza II produces as much food as the Cafe torium, it ships to Patricia Campus, the quality seems better because of the lack of crowding. A definate drop in food quality occurs when it is placed into warmers. Peter O'Neil voted that anytime fast foods, such as fries and gravy are placed into warmers, it is only a short time till the taste begins to deteriorate.



Food services is doing all they can withing their limits to accomodate staff and students. John Pidhirniak, head of Food Services, says that the cafeteria is an important part of an institute. "It is the heartbeat because it is of immediate concern to the individual". When you are hungry you want to eat now. Sadly this is a problem with the Cafetorium.

The heartbeat of the Cafetorium pumps three times during the lunch hours. If you want to get into the Cafetorium without lineups, avoid these waves. The first wave occurs between 10:30 and 11:30 AM. The second wave doesn't hit until 12:05 and lasts till 12:30. A final influx of students occurs after 1 PM.

At the last NAITSA General Council meeting it was brought to the attention of the technologies represented there that they cannot sell food on campus in an effort to raise money. Only certain technologies related to food handling are legally allowed to sell food.

Since that notice was made at least one technology has continued to sell food. This technology is not among the four allowed to sell which are Dietary, Commercial Cooking, Commercial Baking, and Food Processing.

Health regulations restrict the movement of food between peoples because of possible contamination of handling. The food must be protected from sneezers and droolers or pokers. This means the food must be packaged and kept away from germs.

Another reason for restric-

tion in food sales is the uncertaintly towards ingredients in the finished products. Law requires all food to be labelled as to what goes

Editor's Note

The design and layout of NAIT places the student in a secondary consideration. Efficiency rode roughshod over the planning. There are very few places in NAIT specifically designed with the social needs of the student in mind. Gathering and socializing areas are kept to a minimum to be found only at the ends as if put in as afterthoughts.

It would house NAITSA and its presently limited services. Films could be shown there, ice cream could be sold there, music could be played their. Specialized areas could be designed into it for meetings, study, or games.

The prospect of students having their own building removes a need to go in search of halls for cabarets and partys. A cabaret type area would be part of the design and possibly with it would come a pub. No longer would one have to bow down to hall owners and the ALCB. With their own building students regain a large portion of control over their own lives.

The problem with all this is that those of us here at NAIT today will not be able to enjoy such a building. By the time it is completed we will be long gone. The initiative will come from us but the benefit will go to those who come after us. That is the way it goes for anyone who sets out to correct an imbalance. That the imbalance must be rectified is obvious. We must start now with the persuading, cajoling, and irritating of those who can help NAIT students get their own



A reply to a parking complaint

Dear Sir:

"To whoever is Responsible for Parking" by David Schroeder (The Nugget, September 24th) prompts a reply from the one who is responsible.

Rather than attempting to deal with the many remarks in that somewhat rambling article, I will confine myself to three main points:

1. Student Population in Relation to Parking Stalls Available.

It may be true that during the entire year, 37,000 students attend NAIT (actually, almost 39,000 in 1980/81). But, to say, as Mr. Schroeder did, that they all seek parking space at the same time is wildly erroneous. The great majority of that number are Continuing Education Students (roughly 23,500) and Apprentices (roughly 10,500). Almost all of the former attend during the evenings, and in fractions of that number at various times in the year; the latter attend in "groups" of about 2,000 in each of five intakes during the year. Thus, the number of day-time students at NAIT is not more than about 7,000 and on the main campus (including Plaza II), not more than about 6,500.

To use Mr. Schroeder's reasoning (but not his figures), if all 6,500 students were to use car pools, at four to a car, then 1,625 stalls would be needed to accommodate them. Since we now have 1,236, we are short 389, not 8,014 as alleged by your writer. But what does all this prove anyway? Many students use the transit system, some ar dropped off and picked up by drivers headed elsewhere, some even walk.

Incidently, of the stalls underground near Plaza II, only ll or 12 were available last year to students, not half of them.

2. Regulations

The whole point of these, contrary to what is implied in the article, is to put into practice the Institute's relevant principles: that its students should be treated equitably according to their needs, and that the most efficient use should be made of its resources. Thus those who have the greatest need for parking - i.e., the handicapped and those who live out of town or far from bus routes - and those who use car pools are given highest priority. After they have been served, a random choice is made of all other applicants. This system is surely more equitable than the previous first-come, first-served system (where students with real need frequently failed to get stalls, and where fights broke out in the line-ups for permits).

3. The Future

Mr. Shcroeder suggests that another parkade be built on one of the present lots. Although somewhat skeptical that it could be paid for by the fines now incurred by students who lack permits, I would advise that such a proposal might well be appropriately raised with the Board of Governors when it is formed in April 1982.

In conclusion, we believe tht the students with genuine need are being served and the others treated fairly, and that the space available is used efficiently. It would be nice to have more parking space, of course, but we still have more per capita than the University of Alberta does. (It charges nearly twice as much for a stall, too.)



nugget survey results





Billy Joel's latest release is a live album called Songs in the Attic. It is more than just a re-hash of the popular songs he has released in recent years. In fact all of the songs on the record were written and performed long before Billy Joel gained very

Captain Jack, have as much if not more impact in this album than they did in their studio versions of years ago The album is well packaged with lots of photos liner notes and lyrics.
