Locker Room blues are back

Bicycles and lockers are easy prey to anyone with bolt cutters. A couple seconds and the lock is in the grip of an undesirable, bicycle is removed or locker is cleaned out.

The locker rooms in the Activities Center and under the gymnasiums have been easy picking for NAIT's Locker Room Bandits. They have roamed at will through the locker rooms, cutting off locks and making off with small stuff.

The Bandits mode of operation is their unpredictability. There is no certain time of day they will strike, what is certain is what they will hit. The tall lockers are the ones the locks are cut off of. It is into these lockers that staff and students place their clothes, wallet and jewelry.

Unlike the regular lockers the coin ops are much more difficult to get into. Satre noted that the staff had to break into one of the coin ops last year when it jammed. It took them 1 1/2 hrs. to get it open. A bit too long for thievery to occur.

The Locker Room Bandits work in a buddy system, one working the locks, the other watching. They take the locks with them. So sure of themselves are they that last year while the police were investigating cut locks in the Activities Center, the Bandits were under the gymnasium cutting locks.

The coin ops are the only way to deter the cutting of locks. Coin ops were installed below the gym during the summer and are now in easy access from any of the locker rooms. Last year at least a hundred locks were cut, one time a basketball team went down to the Bandits. It is up to you to stop this by putting your valuable somewhere else.

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Editor's Note

In the battle between the car and the pedestrian, very few cars ever get wasted. The pedestrian rarely inflicts as much damage onto a car as the car inflicts onto the person. Even if the pedestrian has a bicycle the disparity is still great. It is just how the game works out.

One thing that a pedestrian does have in his or her favor is the crosswalk. That marked part of a road allows a person the right to cross the street. The person also has the right of way any place on the road if he is bold enough to challenge cars. It is hard to get a car to stop there, this year it is exceedingly difficult for noone is stopping. It must be something in the air that is causing the impatience of drivers this year.

NAIT has a difficult situation in regards to pedestrians. NAIT does not have a campus with restricted car movement. Students going from Plaza 11 to the main campus have to cross 106 st. and 104 st. There are a set of flashing lights on 106 St. In the future it may take more than that to stop traffic for the city is already widening that road to allow access to YellowHead Trail from downtown. The only thing that stops traffic on 104 St is driver awareness that there is a crosswalk on the street.

During the summer a crosswalk was marked out on 104 St. just west of Plaza 11. A crosswalk was necessary on that road to slow down the traffic. However the signs that were posted on each side of the street barely peek above the vehicles and are easily missed. Lines were painted on the street but are already fading. Cars ignore the crosswalk markings and still park in the pedestrian right of way.

Traffic has a habit of moving quickly along that street. Students want to get away from Plaza 11 or NAIT. It is the pedestrian that has to wait to cross the street, not the car. Students have to be careful when they cross that street because they know what a car can do to them; cars don't seem to remember.

Pedestrians are falling right and left this year. NAIT remains accident free but it remains so only if students and staff give the pedestrian a break. It takes only a few moments of their time whereas they could waste a pedestrian's life.

A few people have pointed out the number of misprints on our pages. We are aware of them too. The solution is to either spend a couple more hours correcting them or to have a couple people come in and help the Nugget out. I favor the later.

To Whoever is Responsible for Parking;

All students here will undoubtedly have memories of NAIT for many years to come. Many students' thoughts will be dominated by memories of driving up one street, and down the next, trying to find a parking stall which probably is non-existent.

In the NAIT area, there are 1,236 parking stalls which are for student use. Attending NAIT annually, are 37,000 students.

In the past several years at least three large parking lots have been removed to make way for expansion of NAIT. This means more students must share fewer parking stalls.

Also, unknown to most students, very shortly, there may be no parking available on the streets! The City of Edmonton last year began studying the feasibility of "Resident Only" parking in several areas of Edmonton which are known for parking problems. The NAIT area topped their list. Should this occur, one would need a permit similar to those held by residents near the Commonwealth Stadium, in order to park on the roads near here.

Contrary to these points, in a short article in the September 10 Nugget, David Whalen said concerning

parking, "I am pleased to say that this year, it will be in many people's eyes, much improved."

It has been improved in many peoples eyes, however these people are those with a parking permit. The greatest majority of the student body does not fit into this category though. (The improvement spoken of, is making all parking lots into reserved zones.)

This improvement however, is no improvement whatsoever, simply because it makes the well off students, (those with parking permits) better off; while making those without permits, far worse off. These students now cannot park in NAIT's parking lots, and therefore must go up to 4 to 6 blocks away to find a free section of curb.

While NAIT's enrollment annually increases, the number of parking stalls steadily decreases. Second year students will remember that last year, levels one to five of the parkade were for staff, and levels 6 to 14 for students. This year the staff get levels one to five, and seven, leaving the students with level 6 and levels 8 to 14. (Note the organized confusion, and the fact that there are less stalls available to students.) Also, last year half of the underground parking facilities near Plaza 11 were available for student use. Now none of it is. Also last year, but not this year, the students could use the parking stalls on the East Side of the Activities Centre.

As a result, many students simply park their cars anywhere, resulting in each student paying out \$75 to \$100 annually because of parking tickets. Many of these fines simply should not be dealt out because students who pay attend NAIT and whose parents pay taxes, should be entitled to a spot in which to store their vehicle while it is not in use.

The Solution?? A slogan of the Caterpillar Tractor Company says, "There are no simple solutions, only intelligent choices." This statement holds 100 percent true concerning parking at NAIT. It is hard, or even impossible, to outright state a solution.

Some ideas however are:

1. Do not impose resident only parking. While this may solve one problem, it will create another far greater one; specifically, what will we do with our cars while we are in class?
2. The parking lot, now Zone G, is large enough to hold a parkade almost equal in size to the one at the North end of NAIT. Surely all the payments from parking tickets distributed at NAIT could cover the cost of constructing another parking structure.
3. Most important, it is vital to not simply shrug off the issue, as has usually been done. Last December, it was brought to the attention of Jim Horseman, Minister of Advanced Education and Manpower, that improvements in parking were needed. His reply was: "Institutional space is a priority and not parking". He suggested "mor efforts by the students toward car pooling".

This is downright not facing the issue. Even if all students came four to a car, there would have to be 9250 parking stalls. (We are short by 8014 stalls). Anyone could have copped out by just making an elementary suggestion like that.

One must not expect that in time, parking problems will disappear. Despite the skyrocketing costs of operating an automobile, it is unlikely that the public ever will turn to 100 percent dependence on public transit, car pools, or motorcycles, all of which are seen by some dreamers, as the solution to all traffic - and parking - problems.

As for the Beerfest, it too was a great success. We had a few delays with the band, but overall, the students all controlled themselves very well and what better way to bring Orientation Week to an end.

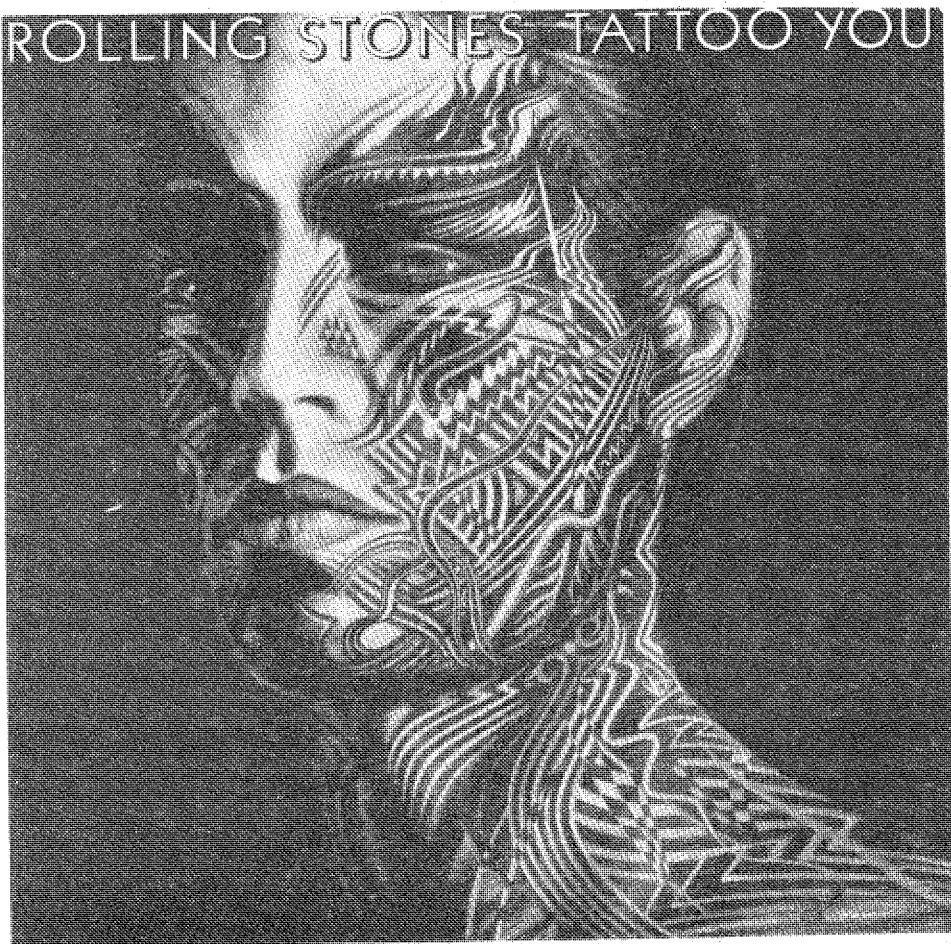
I would like to thank all of

Rock music fans have been waiting a long time for a really good album from the Rolling Stones. Few will be disappointed by the recently released record TATTOO YOU. In this album the Stones prove that they still remember how to create great rock music in a style which is all their own.

The musical talent of the Stones is evident throughout the album. The guitar work by Richards and Ron Wood

ranges from good to fantastic while Jagger often displays his vocals at their snarling best. Excellent saxophone playing is displayed on at least three cuts (Neighbors, Slave and Waiting on a Friend) while electric piano and harmonica are prominent on other tunes.

The songs on the album range in style from high energy rockers to fairly sedate ballads. Jagger and Richards haven't changed their writing style much over the years. Their songs still come across as sexist and

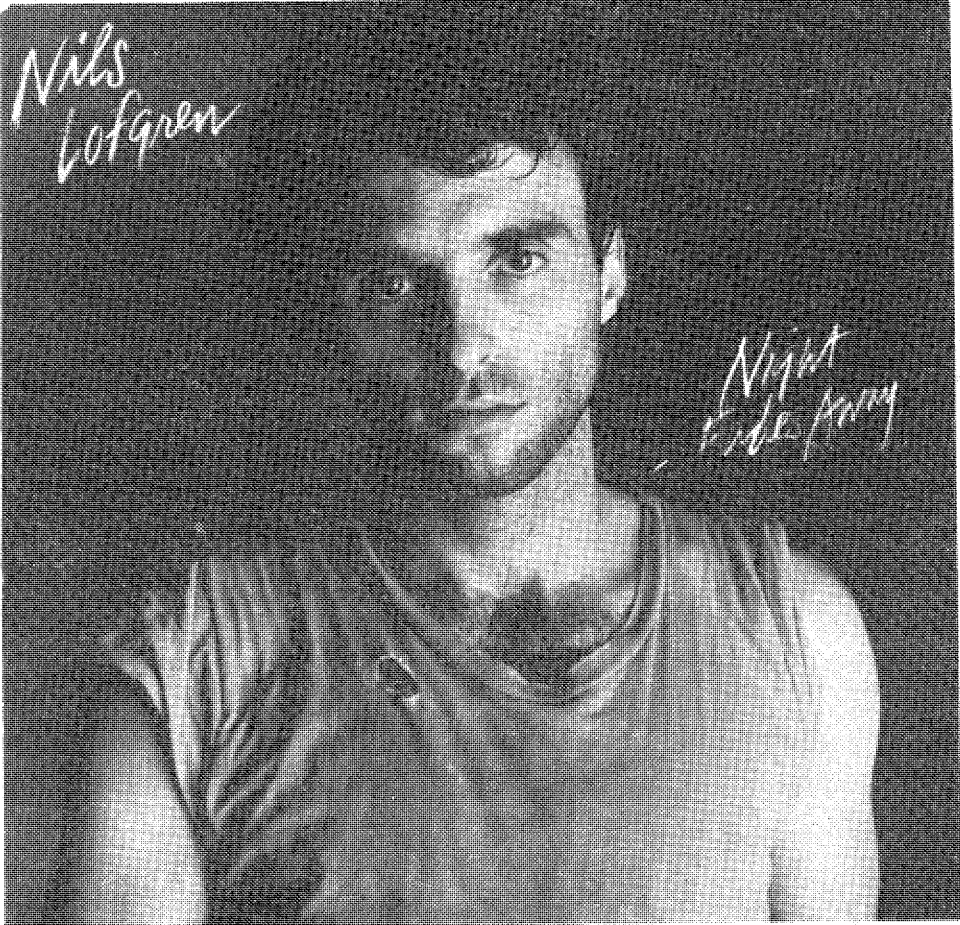

I must admit that I'm not familiar with the work of Nils Lofgren. Even after listening to his most recent album NIGHT FADES AWAY it is hard to judge what kind of musical talent he has.

The credits on the cover list fifteen different musicians as players on the album, along with a sizeable production team. It is obvious from the richness of the sound that there are many talented people amongst the

players but it is not very obvious how good Lofgren is.

Eight of the 10 songs on the album were written by Lofgren and he handles almost all of the vocal work by himself. His voice is fairly good, although weak at times, and his songs are O.K. (except for Sailor Boy and Streets Again on side 2).

The best aspect of the album is the number of excellent musical arrangements for the musicians in-

As Canadians we cannot hail having many renowned artists. David Milne was a Canadian painter from Paisley Ontario, who's legacy of paintings and unique style is very well known at home and in the U.S.A.

Presently at the Edmonton Art Gallery is a collection of the artists finest paintings. 'The New York years, 1903 - 1916.' This collection took immense planning and travelling to the U.S.A. where David Milne spent most of his early painting years. Donated paintings range from private collections, the National Museum of Canada, and the Milne family collection. Among these is the very famous 'Billboard' 1912 oil painting of a New York St., and also 'Alcove' 1914

influenced by Matisse.

David Milne had a great impression on Canadian art. He would always put his painting before any personal comforts. This devotion, and his poetic style of writing in which he always tries to explain how each painting came about, was his private battle against public ignorance.

The collection of paintings will travel to a few other museums in Canada, but unfortunately it will never appear again in any public galleries.

This is a rare opportunity and should definitely not be overlooked. The collection will remain in the gallery until Oct. 11. Sunday, Sept. 27, 3:00 PM will be a 13 minute film briefly introducing David Milne's world through paintings and writings.

Movie Review

Continental Divide

The movie Continental Divide is your classic case of "Don't go to a movie just because the advertisement looks promising." But how can you blame me with a credit list that reads: John (Animal House) Belushi, Blair (Altered States) Brown, Screenwriter Laurence (Empire Strikes Back) Kasdan and director Michael (Coal Miner's Daughter) Apted. I figured a guy couldn't go wrong with a line-up like that, but I was wrong.

The story is yet another rework of the old idea of throwing two people together under extreme circumstances (anybody see Back Roads?) and watch them transform absolutely hating each other to falling in love. John Belushi plays Ernie Souchak, a Sun-Times Columnist, who gets the crap

beat out of him for airing City council's shorts in public once too often. This prompts his editor (Allan Goorwitz) to send him out of town to do a story on an ornithologist who just happens to be secluded in the Rockies spending her life researching the American Bald Eagle.

They immediately detest each other. She hates journalists, he hates women who hate journalists but after miles of countless mountain shot footage and several petty arguments they decide they are made for each other and proceed to the inevitable make love in front of the fireplace in the log cabin scene. About the only twist in the story is when she rescues him off a mountain (how's that for role reversal) and nurses him back to health.

Now it's not that I dislike

love stories, I just don't like it when they telegraph the end to you half way through the second reel and you have to spend an hour wondering when they're going to tie the knot.

I must admit though the movie does plod along at a very slow and predictable pace; the acting does shine in several scenes. Belushi proves he can handle a romantic lead and can make people laugh without squeezing potatoes out of his mouth, and Brown is very believable as the intelligent and beautiful mountain woman who just happens to like short fat men. It's a shame to have wasted fine acting talent on such a structured love story that has already been done a dozen times. Continental Divide is showing at the Odeon and Capilano theatres.

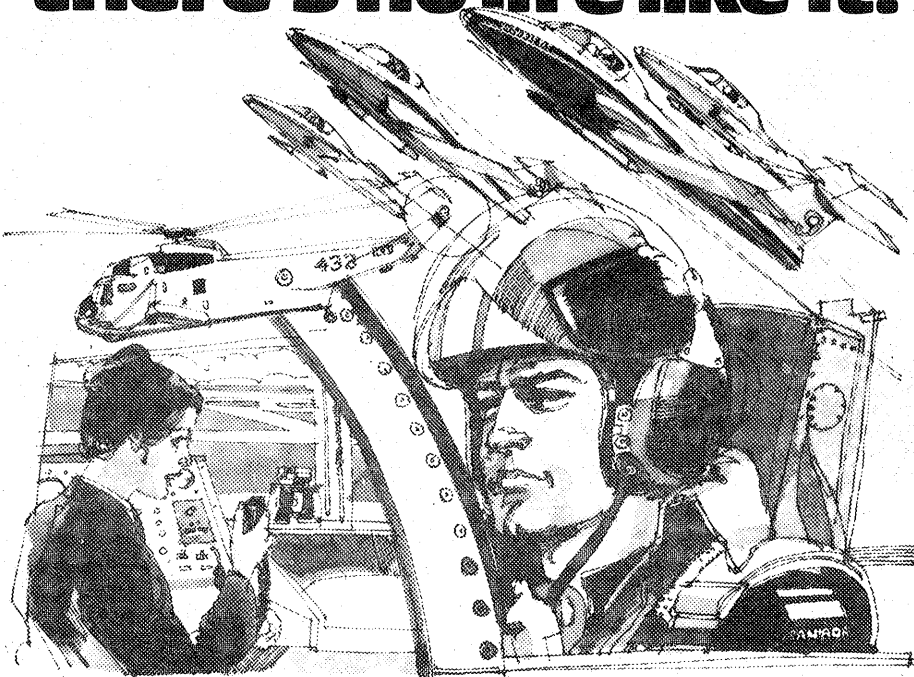

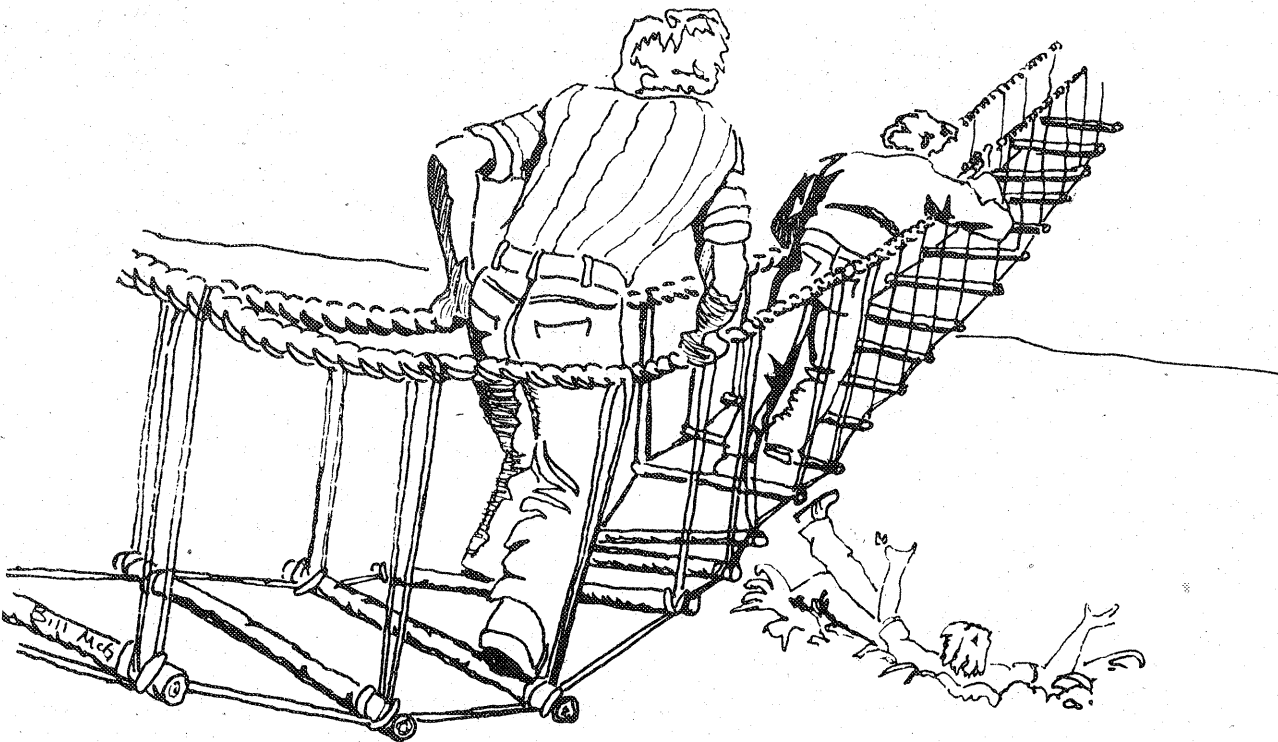

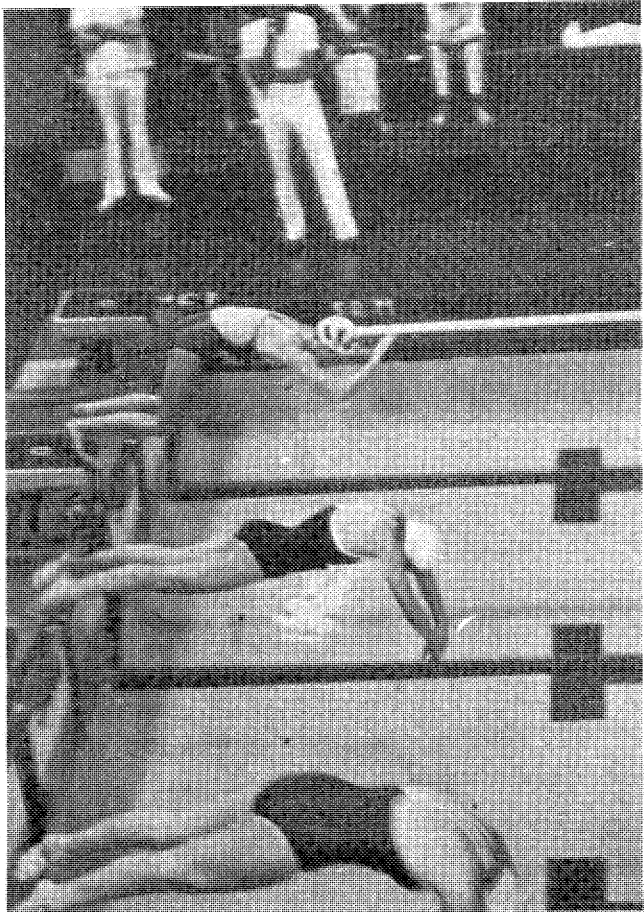
