

EDITOR'S NOTE

The transit strike was a pain for students who relied on the bus to get to and from NAIT. Suddenly they had to regulate their hours to accommodate those who were giving them rides. The halls of NAIT were conspicuously quiet after 5 pm. And those students who had to stay late were forced to bring their own vehicles and try to find parking space close to NAIT.

The city saw a good thing in the parking situation at NAIT and started raking in \$20 fines. Not only was the city saving on the operating costs of running the buses but it was collecting loads of money as it bled students green for parking in 2 hour parking zones. There should have been a coordinated effort to refuse to pay parking fines received during the transit strike. Let the city also be inconvenienced by the strike.

Now that the strike is over the demand for parking space at NAIT will lessen only slightly. People will have found that walking four or five blocks is better than waiting for a bus. The biggest loser of the transit strike was the system itself. At a time when it needed to increase its rider volume to prove its necessity to this city it will now be faced with lower patronage and poor public attitude towards it.

The transit system in comparison to the automobile is slow, inconvenient and unpredicatable. One usually arrives at a transfer point 2 minutes after the desired bus has gone off down its route. Or one waits 20 minutes while a downed trolley bus is being revived. The car is so convenient, so personal, so sinister in it takeover as the only viable menas of transportation.

Large urban centers need mass transit systems as an alternative form of transportation to the automobile. The automobile, multiplied endlessly, puts too nuch pressure on city streets, has too great a demand on resources and does too much damage to the environment. The transit system of Edmonton will no longer be viewed as an alternative by the majority of people. The elderly will still use it because it is all they have. But the riders needed by the system to prove its worth will not view the buses as an alternative to urban travel but only as a supplement, a fringe thing at best.

Financial

The Nugget has received a copy of the following memo. It was intercepted on its way to Dr. Stan Souch, President of NAIT, from the Board of Governors.

CHANGES EFFECTIVE APRIL 1, 1982

Because the Federal Government has terminated all grants to Advanced Education the following changes will be implemented:

Student fees will rise by 30 percent effective immediately. These fees will be prorated and technology students will be billed \$21.04 for the last two enonths of this school year. $(2/9 \pm 30 \text{ percent} = 6.7)$ percent). Similar calculations will be made for the trade students. Students will not be given their term marks and/or receive their diplomas until these tees have been

ii) Staff salaries will be reduced by lit percent as of April 15, 1982. The institute will simply not be able to pay exorbitant salaries any longer. However, to minimize the griping by the instructors they will be allowed to balance bill. It is suggested that they bill the students two to four times per quarter to keep each bill relatively small and thereby minimize the probability of the formation of student protest groups. A memo outlining the services that may be changed for and a suggested schedule of fees is to follow.

iii) Each instructor must keep track of the number of sheets printed by Dunileating Services, for each class. The cost of duplicating for each individual student will be calculated at the end of the Academic Year. Each student will be billed for the calculated amount whether or not they were in class to receive the printed material.

Also involved in elections this year were positions for student members on the Board of Governors and on the Academic Council. One application was received for the Board Hans Mausolf, a student in Instrumentation and who has a University of Alberta engineering degreee, will be the only sure member of the Board. Applications for it and the Academic Coiuncil are still being sought.


Basketball

When the NAIT Ookpiks skated onto the ice for Friday's contest, an observer could see the Ooks were ready for the opposition. And ready they were. The Ooks entered the first intermission with a 4-0 advantage and never looked back en route to a 10-3 victory over the Limoilou College Titans of Limoilou, Quebec.


In the first frame, Brian Hermanutz gave the Ooks a 1-0 lead on a setup from Dave Souch. With 33 seconds left in the period, Brian Hermanutz completed a set up from Ron Chorney and Greg Tennant to put the Ooks ahead by four.



NAIT PLAYERS TAKE THREE INDIVIDUAL AWARDS






