EDITOR'S NOTE

Seven students will administer the day to day affairs of the society set up to benefit the student population at NAIT. It is a democratic society but this year there were no elections. It is ridiculous to have an election when there are no candidates to choose from. Only two candidates had stepped forward to say they would like to serve the students for the coming year; only two. When the deadline for applications passed only the position for president and publications chairperson had been spoken for. What happened to the rest?

The position for treasurer and for secretary of NAITSA was not open for voting. They are decided on the basis of ability to handle the job. The other positions are decided by voting on the one who puts on the best show. Yet no show was given to the NAIT students this year. They were circumvented by the new NAITSA council. It was a council formed behind the scenes.

After the application deadline had been passed and a plea gone out to interested students, a veritable flood of interested students came forward to claim to position. Whereas prior to the deadline, only two people applied, after the deadline was extended, eight students clamored for the remaining three positions. It is ironic, but three students did apply for those three positions but were refused because of poor marks or a failed course. They were unable to get the approval of their program heads. The only three interested students out of 2000 plus students (2 year programs) and they are barred from running. So the positions remained unfilled. Why did they show up late? But then one must not be too harsh for at least they showed up.

The deadline for applications was extended. An because of that election week was scrapped. Why couldn't elections be pushed back so that the general students could play and practise their democratic upbringing? Instead the general council was given the honor of choosing the individuals who desired to serve their fellow students. Those fellow students went blissfully along the hallways of NAIT never missing a step.

Possibly the bottom has been reached and student interest and involvement will be on the upswing. Since there are few jobs on the outside and the rest of the picture also looks bleak, maybe students will turn their attention back to their own community and make their stay here interesting. Memories and good times are made; they cannot be bought at the store or turned into on television.

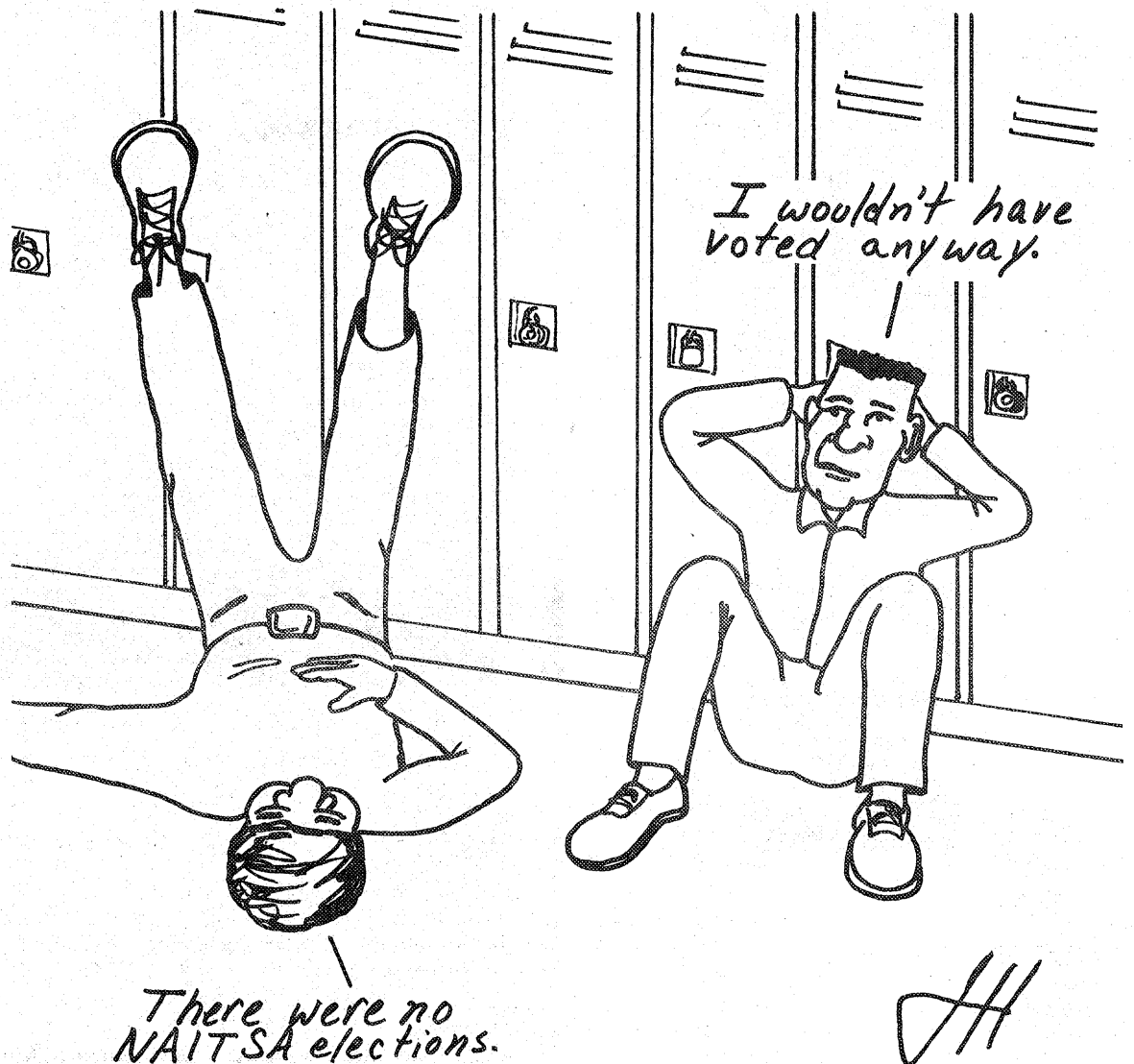

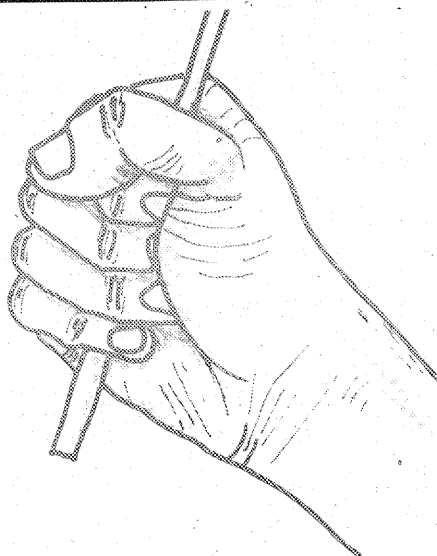

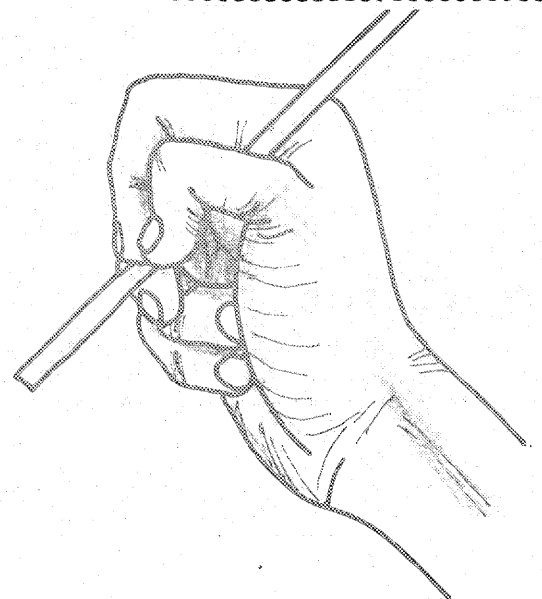

Cafeteria Completion

After a year and a half of renovations, changes, replacements and a few delays tossed in, the old cafeteria will be ready for use in May. However, students will not be able to obtain food in the new old cafeteria until next September.

Renovations, changes and replacements to be started in May to the present administration area, will force them to relocate in the cafeteria so that their 'redone area' will be completed by August. GETTING FROM POINT START TO POINT DESTINATION

ROAD RIGHTS

Bicycles have the same right to use the roads as do motorized vehicles. The laws do not restrict bicycles from using the streets; there are no laws stating where a bicycle is to travel. The bicycle can get out into the stream of traffic and mingle with impunity, legal that is.

A bicycle is no match with a car in a one to one encounter. Although a bicycle has the same right to use the road as a car does, a car carries a lot of clout and every bicyclist must bear this in mind as he or she tries to assert their right to use the road. The only advantage a bicyclist can use is to be aware of other vehicular traffic on the road, follow certain procedures for riding and always drive defensively.. Drive in a manner to be seen. At the same time drive cautiously. It may be slower but it is much safer.

ROAD RIDING

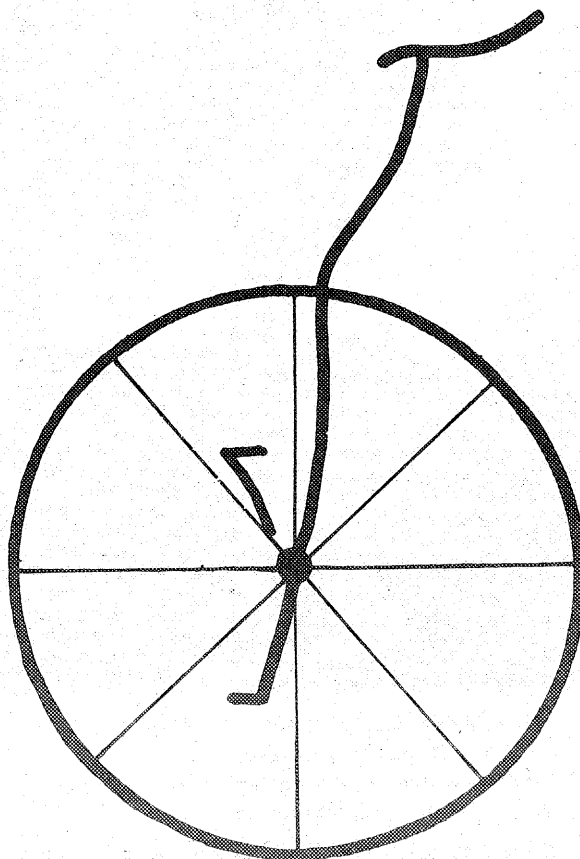
The side streets offer the safest haven for a bicyclist who wants to get from one point to another with the fewest hazards. These side streets may be slower but at the same time they are much quieter and also more scenic. The cyclist need not divert all attention to watch for cars and potholes but can subdivide his awareness to what is off the streets.

At times it may be inconvenient to use side roads that parallel major routes. The cyclist maybe baraged with a variety of stop signs, yield signs and other traffic paraphernalia that is too frustrating to put up with. In such instances the rider decides to use the major route. Do not be intimidated by cars and their impatience. Try not to be forced to hug the gutter or ride in the parking lane. If the parking lane is clear of parked cars, use it and ride to the left of center in that lane. When parked cars make use difficult, ride out in the traffic lane. Take up enough of that lane so that cars have to maneuver around you. Riding too far to the right encourages car drivers to push you farther to the right and into the parked cars.

A bicyclist should try to avoid being a magician around parked cars. Weaving in and out of intermittent parked cars can make a cyclist invisible to a car driver. It also gives the impression to the driver that the cyclist is yielding to the cars and assumes the bicyclist will stay out of his way.

ROAD RULES

Just as the cyclist has a right to use the road he must also obey the rules and bylaws of the roads. The bicyclist is not exempted from having to stop at stop signs nor can he go the wrong way on one way streets. There is a spin off to obeying the laws, it gives credence to the bicyclist and his desire to use the roads. A bicyclist who obeys traffic laws leaves a good impression on motorists. The car driver finds such riders predictable on the road and will put up with them rather than trying to run them off into the curb.



ROAD RUNNING

The safest way to ride the roads is to watch traffic. The size differential makes this a necessity. Various vehicles and certain situations warrant special attention.

Left turning vehicles that will cross in front of the cyclist are especially hazardous. They are also difficult to detect before they actually cross in front. The cyclist can defend against this to a certain extent by being in the open so that the opposing vehicles will see him. Contingent to being seen is the judgement the driver has of the bicyclist's speed. Car speed is easier judged (through practise) than bicycle speed. If the bicycle is out in the stream moving with traffic his speed can be more easily estimated.

Right turning vehicles also pose a hazard in that they may not see the cyclist and turn into his lane just before an intersection. Avoid riding just to the rear of a vehicle. This is a blind spot to the motorist. A cyclist has to hope that the drivers are courteous, that they will not try to get in front of him then brake to turn a corner.

Intersections also pose another hazard, cars that inch out to see if the way is clear. They come out enough to stop a cyclist, suddenly at times. Again, riding out in traffic will prevent this because a car is more hesitant to move out into the line of vehicular traffic. The car is the enemy but simultaneously it poses protection. Happy trails.

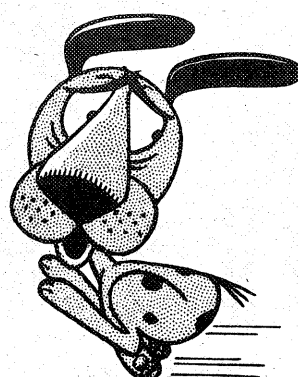

The highlight of the show was when Merle replaced his guitar with a fiddle to do a tribute to Bob Wills and Western Swing.

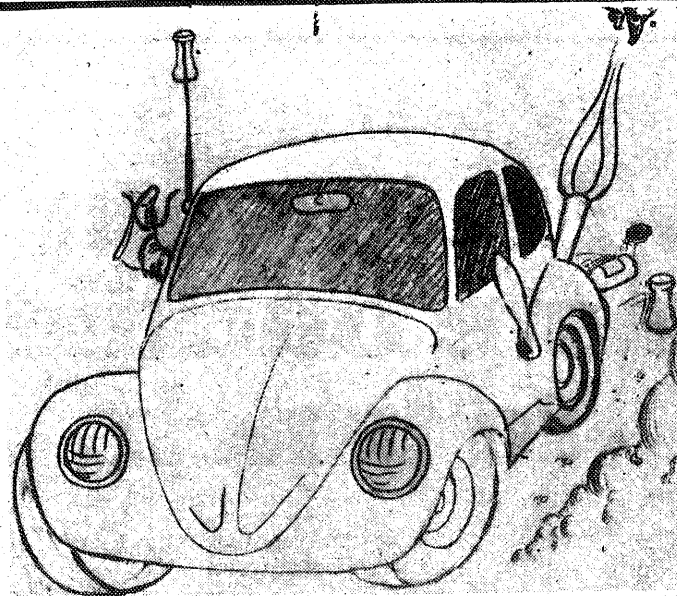
The Bakersfield, California native then brought to life his release from the summer past, Rainbow Stew.

There were only a couple of minor drawbacks to the performance. Although Merle and the Strangers were excellent, their performance could have been improved in a place like the Jubilee where a proper combination of sound systems would not be restricted and where better acoustics are present. In addition, the show could have rose to greater heights with a medley of hits the fans did not hear (Sing Me Back Home, It's Not Love, Daddy Frank, and I Take a Lot of Pride in What I Am)

BACKSTAGE NOTES: Merle and the Strangers came to Edmonton on a two week tour that encompassed Western Canada, Washington, and Oregon. Before appearing at the Stockyard South, Hag and the Strangers were in Saskatoon. After the two shows in Edmonton, the group travelled south to perform at the Jubilee in Calgary on Monday night.

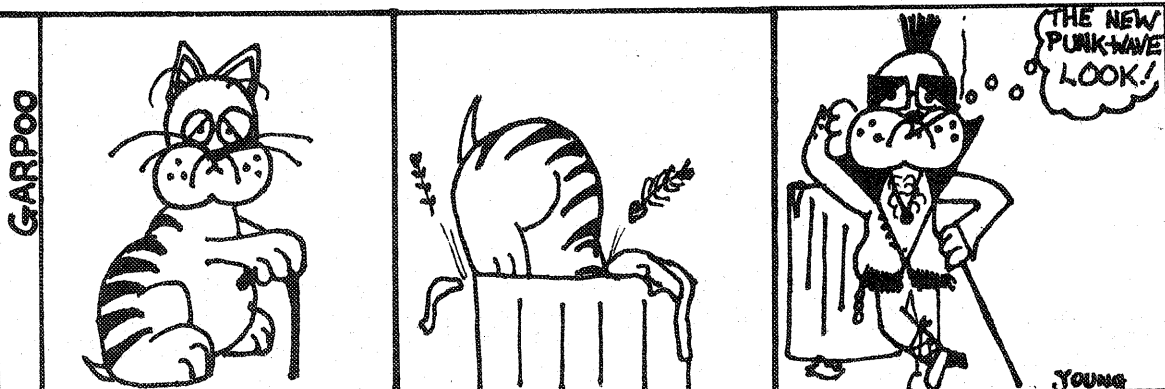
RTA's triple 'S' club

in shorts and Hawaiian shirts, and one was clad in snorkels and diving suit, and of course there were beach balls. The sun and surf party

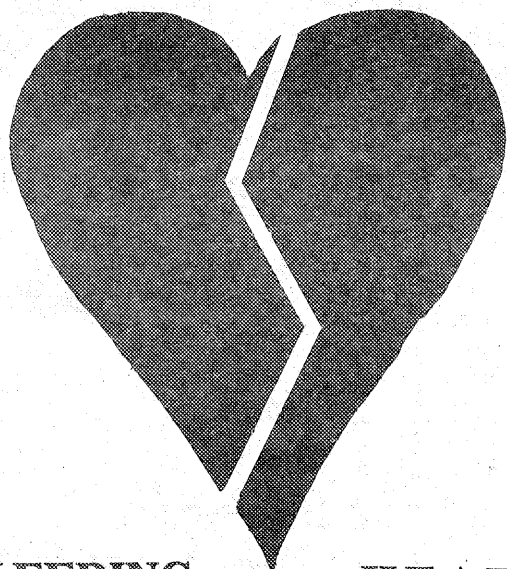
