The Nugget Lament

The NAIT Athletic's Board and NAITSA held their joint annual awards night banquet last Friday night. The members of all NAIT athletic teams are introduced and receive an athletic pin, special awards to individual stars are also announced and the winners of intramurals are named. NAITSA gets its chance to thank those who helped them and to pat themselves on the back. Each of the executive receive nice hundred dollar plus rings, and lapel pins are given to those deserving students who helped NAITSA in some capacity during the year; except the Nugget and the Yearbook staff. They got kicked in the teeth.

Early in the evening when most people were still talking to those across the table from them, David Whalen who was the M.C. of this awards ceremony, mentioned the work that the Nugget and Yearbook had done. That was it. A few mumbled lines when no one was listening is all that the Nugget staff gets for the work done to put out 28 issues. Given what the Nugget has to work with; the amount of cooperation NAITSA gives, the low level of student participation, the small staff, it is quite an accomplishment to have a weekly newspaper, no matter how mediocre some people may think it is. Certainly those people who put the Nugget together deserve more than mumbled words.

The Nugget staff labours all year long with little recognition. The students take us for granted, never stopping to pat us on the back. They complain when there is no paper and bitch about what is in it. If there is little in the paper it is a reflection of the student body and not of the Nugget staff. The only people who patted us on the back was the NAIT administration. They realized the work and effort we were doing. Although I got the spinoffs of that recognition the staff also deserves some.

The Nugget staff was invited to the Awards Night. We went under the delusion that NAITSA would pat us on the back, that finally we could stand up in front of our peers and get a round of applause and if we were really lucky, a few thank yous. Instead NAITSA set us up to kick us in the teeth. Thank you very much, it was a most stimulating experience.

The Nugget staff along with the Yearbook were not overlooked because of some bureaucratic bunglings. We were overlooked because NAITSA decided, that since the Nugget staff is paid for what it does, they deserve no special recognition. Now that the cat is out of the bag there should be a veritable flood of students coming in to the Nugget to help out hoping that they will get in on the money that is thrown to the Nugget. As the editor, I get paid \$135 per month for about 80 hours of work over the month. The typesetters get \$75 each and their time spent at the Nugget is almost as high. The other editors receive \$50 per month. They also spend a large amount of time putting out the paper. Get the picture. We work for almost nothing in the monetary sense. Yet the student representative to the Board of Governors received \$25 per hour for the length of the biweekly Interim Governing Authority meetings. He received a service award from NAITSA.

The money the Nugget staff receives is a pittance and is not the reason why the staff shows up each week to put out a quality paper for this institution. If we were after money, a part time job at the Rock and Jalks would have been more appropriate. The reason why we were putting out a paper is that we had embarked on a journey at the beginning of the year to do something for the students of NAIT. Along the way we found out that it was the journey that was important and the experiences it allowed us to have. But we just got torpedoed and now we are abandoning ship. It is not an easy thing to do because, much as this newspaper caused us grief and frustration, it also gave us friendship. And that is more important than anything that was done to us or not done to us all year long and NAITSA's ambushing will not take that away.

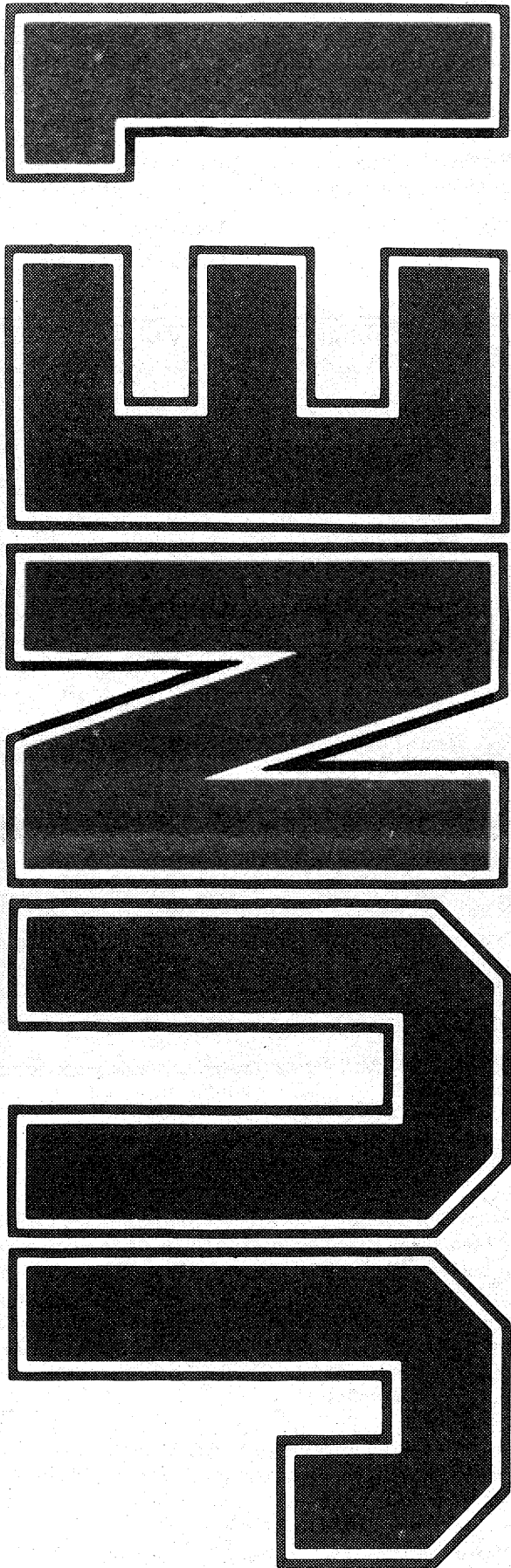

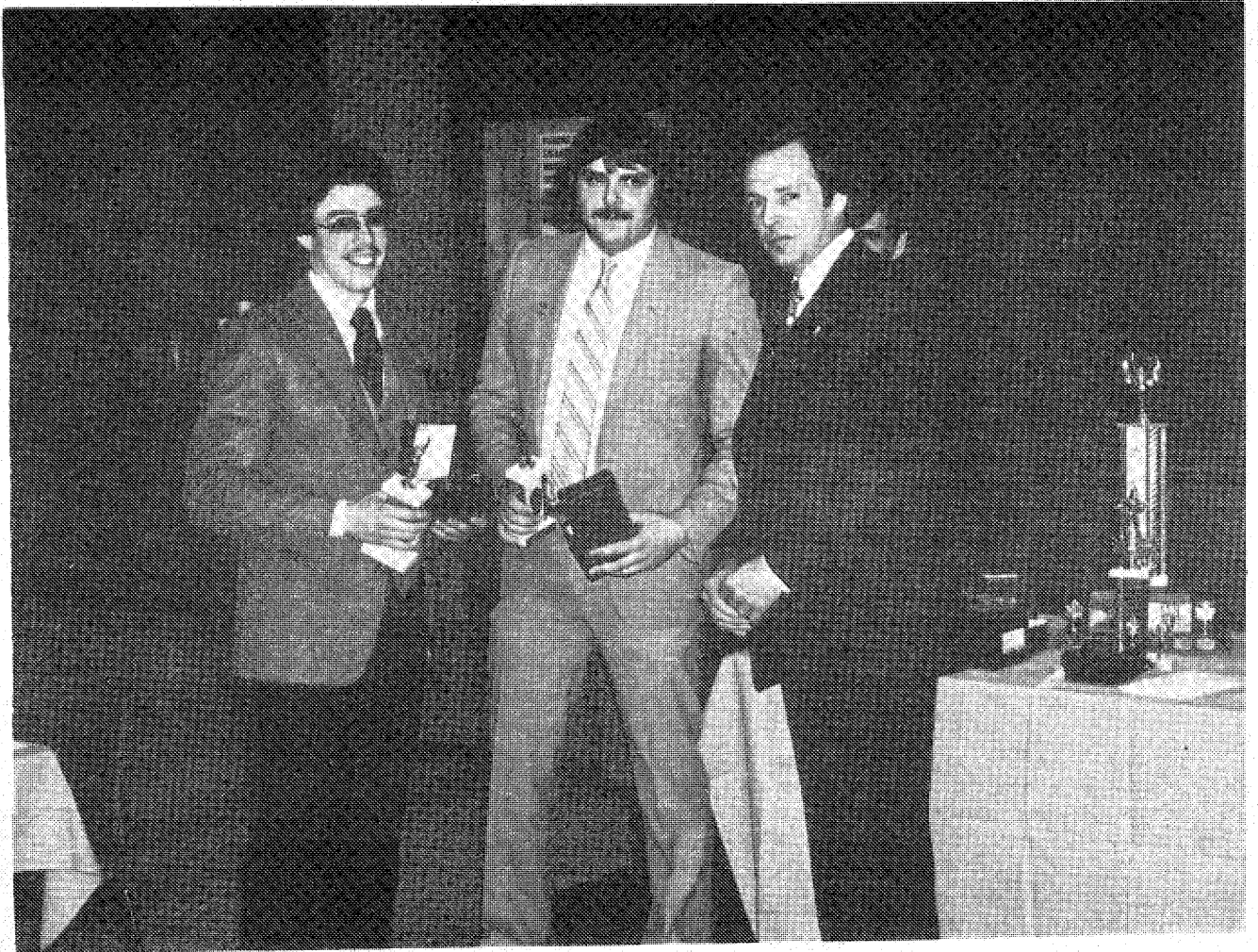

President's Message

Once again I would like to bring up the issue of a students' building.

As many of you know, we now have a Building Development Fund. Starting next September we will be receiving ten dollars from all full-time day students which will be directed to the fund. The funds that we raise (from students, raffles, donations from business and industry) will be matched by the provincial government 1980's Advanced Education Endowment Fund. To speed the fund raising process up a little, the Students' General Council has agreed that we withdraw \$40,000 from our term deposits and invest it to our building fund. So once the term deposit matures, we will withdraw the \$40,000 and deposit it into the building fund and it will then be matched and we will receive interest on \$80,000.

Financially this will be an expensive venture for our association. To alleviate some of the costs we have decided to employ our funds in the construction of a joint Students Association/NAIT Administration Facility. This will save us a lot of money in both capital and operating costs. So far it appears the NAIT is interested in such a proposal.

In order for us to develop such a project we must first have a plan. To make such a plan we need a planning committee. In the month of February such a committee was formed and it is called the Building Development Advisory Committee. The members of this committee are: John Huk, Barry Guenette, Ken Buchanan, Charles Tiemstra, Ken Williams, Wayne Hassay, Hans Mausolf, Michael, Cava, Cory Don, Walter Verhulst, Jim Duczyski and myself. These students represent the Industrial, Business, and Technology Students. As a team we will do an assessment of our needs, but we will need everyone's co-operation. For example, within the next couple of weeks we will distribute a questionnaire to your program's Student President, who will distribute it to your room rep. Once the survey is completed by you it will then be passed back along the line to the committee. Time is of the essence.

For the record, I have agreed to publish a letter received from the Honorable James D. Horsman, The Minister of Advanced Education & Manpower.

I wish to acknowledge with thanks your letter dated December 21, 1981 forwarding to me the December 2, 1981 NAIT Students' Association referendum results and purposes.

I appreciate very much your informing me of the outcome of the four referenda you Students' Association has successfully conducted.

I was particularly interested to note that the student body supported the referendum to increase student association membership dues by an additional \$10 for the purpose of contributions to a Building Development Fund. I am very pleased to learn of your intention to employ these additional funds in the construction of a joint Students' Association/NAIT Administration facility. Indeed, I am impressed and pleased that the Students' Association is favourable towards a project which would be conducive to fostering a healthy collegial environment at NAIT.

Thank you for advising me that your Students' Association intends to begin a drive in 1982 to raise

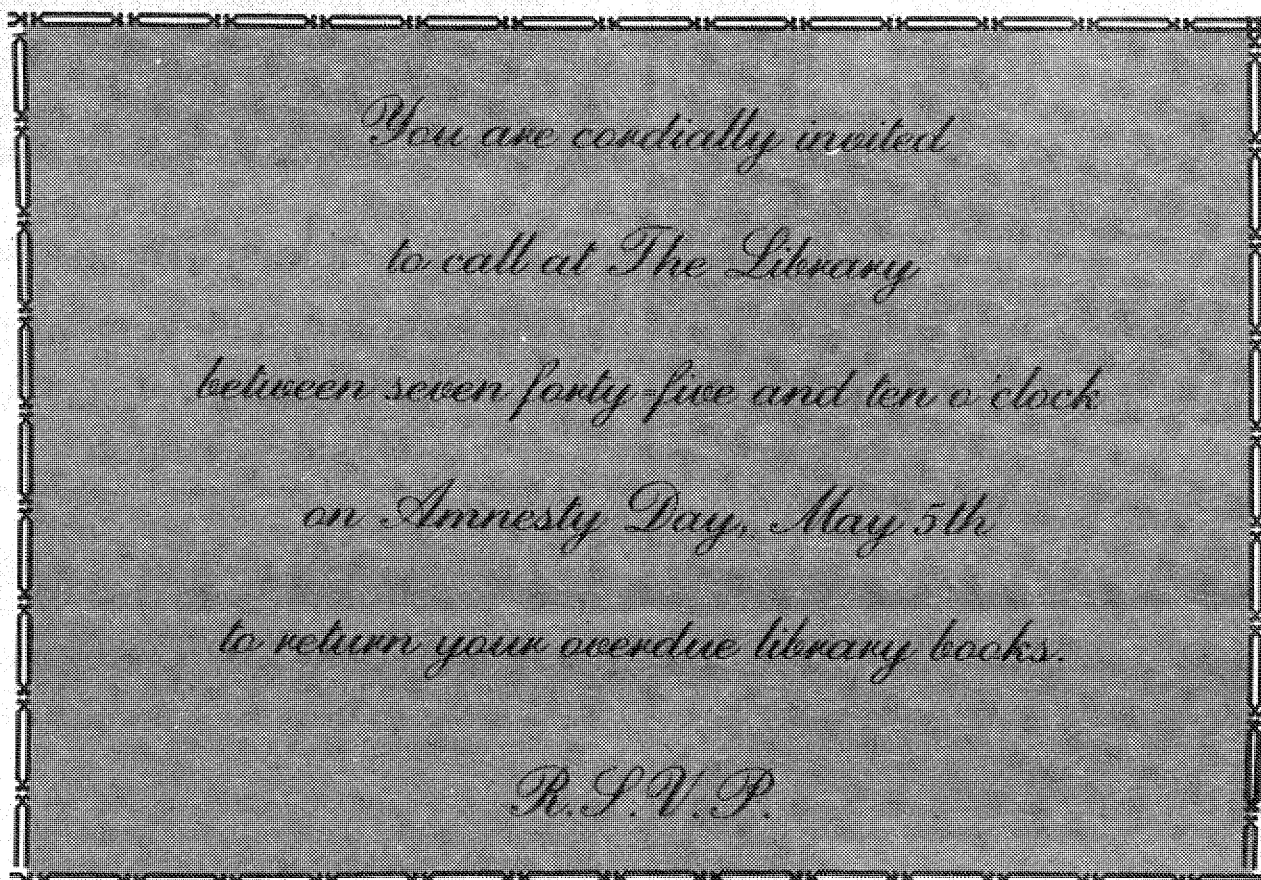
additional funds through the private sector for the students portion of the building. I would strongly encourage you to pursue this route and I wish you every success in this drive.

With respect to the utilization of the 1980's Advanced Education Endowment Fund, I would certainly wish to confirm at this time that I would view the Endowment Fund as an entirely appropriate source of matching funds for any monies you can raise directly from the students combined with those funds from the private sector which would be donated towards the construction of an appropriate new facility at NAIT.

Congratulations on your excellent efforts to date towards your goal of construction of a new facility for NAIT students and I would appreciate your keeping me of further developments in this regard.

Finally, I would encourage you to utilize my office staff should you require any assistance in your efforts.

Repaying Your Student Loan

Attention: Students completing their program

For those of you who have a student loan you MUST start repaying your student loan 6 months after your period of study ends. You benefit from a six month grace period within which you are not charged interest on the amount owing. Interest rate at the present time is 15 3/8 percent. A new rate comes into effect every July 1. Therefore, within this six-month period you must go to the bank which holds your loan and complete a repayment agreement called A consolidated Guaranteed Student Loan Agreement. The agreement must be signed within this 6 month period even though you may feel you are not able to make payments at that time. Payments need only start at the end of the 6 month grace period. However, if you so choose you may repay the entire amount within the six-month period with no inter-

est being charged. If you fail to complete a consolidated loan agreement within the 6 month period, your loan will be declared in default. Defaulting on your loan without cause will deny you any future provincial grants and/or loans. In addition your file will be placed in the hands of a collection agent who will monitor your account and arrange a mutually acceptable repayment schedule. If a student refuses to comply with the agreed commitment to make payments, his account is sent to the department of Justice (monies borrowed are federal and provincial funds) which will proceed to register a judgement in the courts, and garnishee of wages or salary may follow. Therefore, it is in your best interest to make the necessary arrangements with your bank.

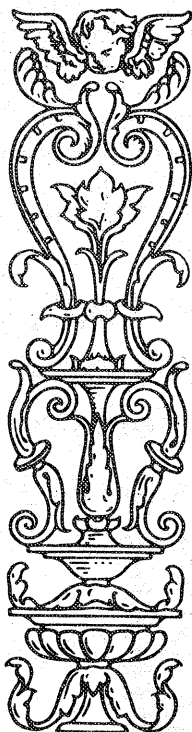


Noreen Humble, this year's female athlete, receives her trophy from President Souch.

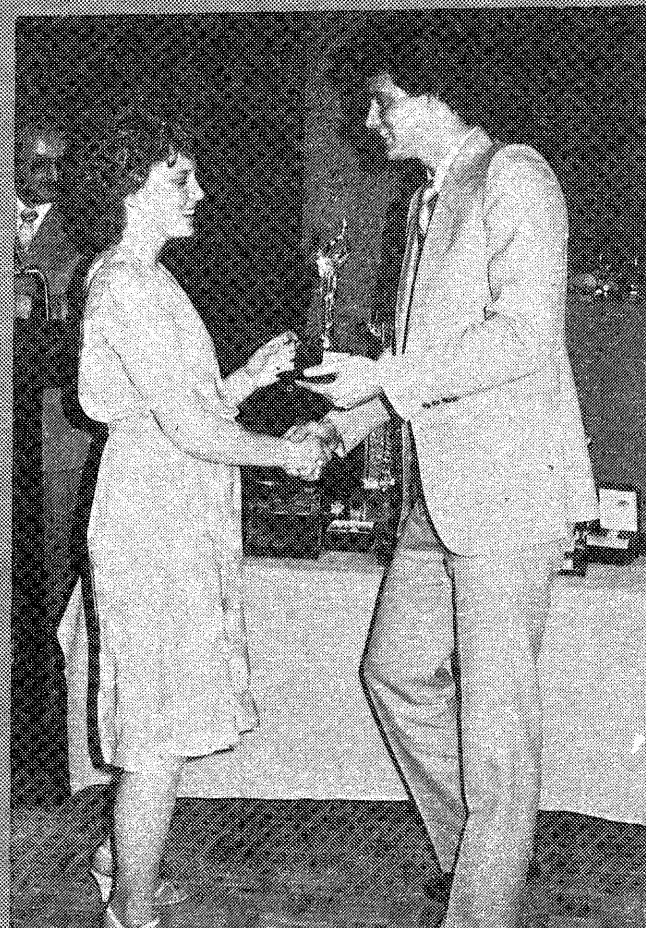

The Wheel

Inertia means a lot to the bicyclist. Maintaining a rate of speed is a lot easier on the body than a constant stopping accelerating. There are times when the bicyclist must stop suddenly, usually to prevent a bone crunching accident, or to turn sharply to avoid some obstruction. Yet the sudden stop or turn could in turn precipitate a somersault unless done correctly.

Too much pressure on the front brakes could result in a somersault. The front brake offers 2½ times the rear braking power of a bicycle.

The first stage is to practise braking with the rear wheel only. Enough pressure should be applied to lock the rear wheel. This point should be noted and pressure applied to almost lock the rear wheel. Once this is practised and understood then the front brake can be used simultaneously. Using the front brake will change the locking point on the rear wheel causing it to lock easier.

The second stage involves applying more pressure to the front brake while simultaneously relieving some of the back brake pressure to avoid locking.

The third stage is the most critical and dangerous. Enough pressure is applied to the front brake to cause it to lock. It is at this point that somersaulting can occur. The fine tuning at this stage involves applying pressure to the front and rear brakes to where they almost lock the wheels. Once this stage is learned quick stages are possible when needed to avoid an accident.

There are situations that braking could not be used and to avoid an obstruction a fast turn is needed. The bicycle maintains balance on its own. If weight is shifted to one side the bicycle follows and puts itself under the rider. It is this inherent following of weight that can be used to make a fast turn.

To turn, one leans to one side and turns the bicycle. This is the normal procedure but it takes time to lean your weight and you may not have that time. Thus one has to move the bicycle out from under the weight to create an artificial lean. This is done by wiggling the bicycle to the opposite side one is turning to. If one turns without shifting weight, his center of gravity is over on the wrong side of the turn. This is used to advantage in a quick turn. The fast right turn will be used more than a fast left turn. Here is how it is done.

Turn the wheel to the left slightly. This shifts the weight to the right causing an off balance situation. Now snap the wheel to the right and it will follow naturally the shifted weight is shifted to the right allowing for quick right turns. Happy Trails.

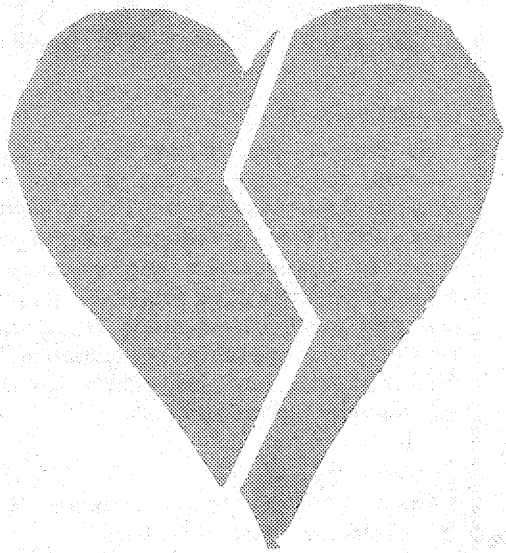

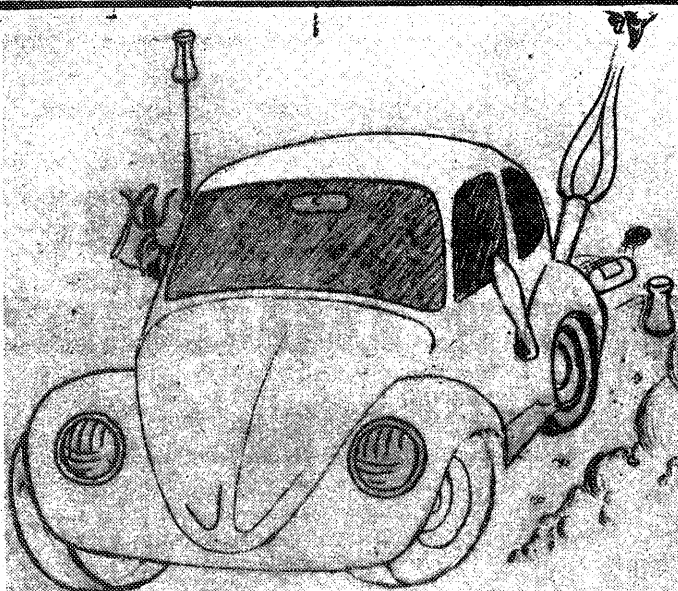
