Barnyard Notes

The Canadian economy is suffering because Canadians are spending too much time pursuing individual pursuits rather than helping each other. To help get the Canadian economy back on track and increase productivity, the Nugget must reduce its size from 8 pages to 4 pages. Time, that is better spent in servicing each other, is being spent reading the Nugget. Service type of industries denote an industrialized country and as Canada is one of the more industrialized countries in the world we find more and more Canadians spending their time servicing other Canadians. People should not be distracted from these ends and thus the Nugget will attempt to reduce its reading volume by going to 4 pages.

The reading of the Nugget takes too much time out of service production. To fully read the 8 pages of the Nugget and occasionally 12 pages, requires on the average 20 minutes. This is much too much time being spent away from service and into a form of productivity that does not benefit fellow Canadians. Reading the Nugget benefits only the individual and a nation is a social group not an accumulation of individuals.

Supposing that 3000 people read the Nugget each week with the average reading time of 20 minutes. Multiply the 3000 readers by the reading time of 20 minutes and one is confronted with the figure of 1000 hours a week spent reading the Nugget. This is time that will never show up on the GNP but it does show up in the reduced time people spend servicing each other.

The 1000 hours may seem insignificant till the weekly total is multiplied by the number of issues of the Nugget. Thirty-one issues will be printed this academic year. Thirty-one times 1000 hours is equal to the staggering total of 31000 hours spent reading the Nugget; 31000 hours taken out of the servicing bucket. Thirty-one thousand hours equals 1291.7 days (3875 eight hour days) or 3.54 years. That is a phenomenal amount of time spent reading the Nugget. The time spent reading the Nugget has to be reduced. It would be a small stone in getting the Canadian economy working again but it is a start.

The size of the Nugget should be reduced from 8 pages to 4 pages and much of that 4 pages confined to advertising. At most, 5 minutes should be the average time to read the Nugget. By reducing the time to 5 minutes, the total time spent reading the Nugget (reader x average time to read an issue x number of issues) would be only 0.88 years. This is a 75 percent reduction from the present 3.54 years. More time is put back into servicing each other and less time spent developing the individual.

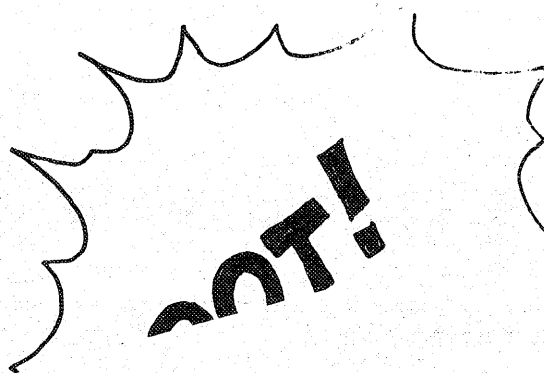

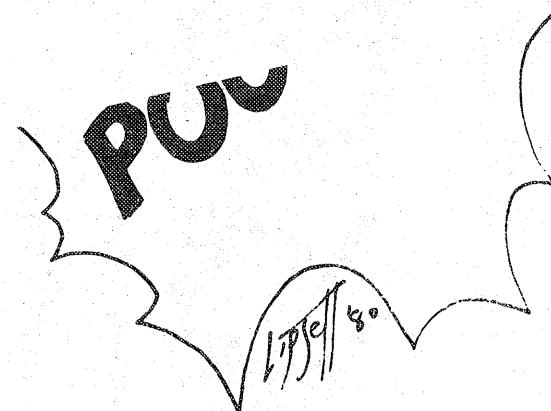

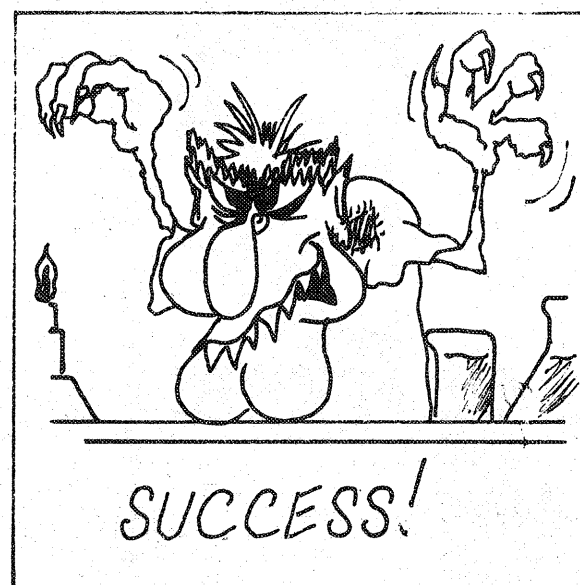

On Wednesday afternoon March 31, a ceremony was held in the Cafetorium to celebrate the change of status of NAIT. James Horsman, Minister of Advanced Education and Manpower handed over to Al McCagherty a key, symbolic of the transfer of control from direct government control of NAIT, to control by a Board of Governors. Al McCagherty is the Chairman of the Board of Governors and will be for the next three years.

The NAIT/SAIT Intramural Challenge was held down in Calgary at SAIT's gymnasium last Saturday, April 3rd.

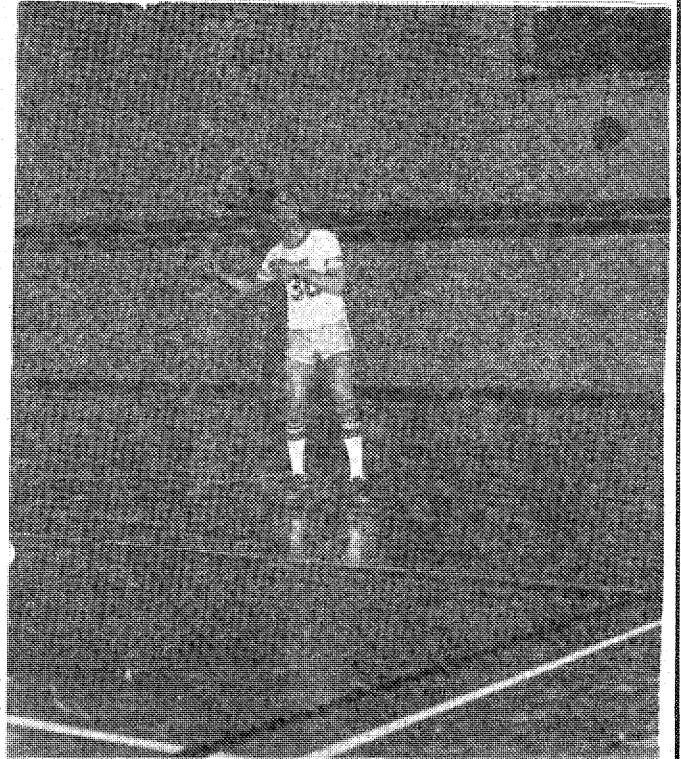
The winners of the intramural badminton, volleyball & hockey represented NAIT and all teams did extremely well.

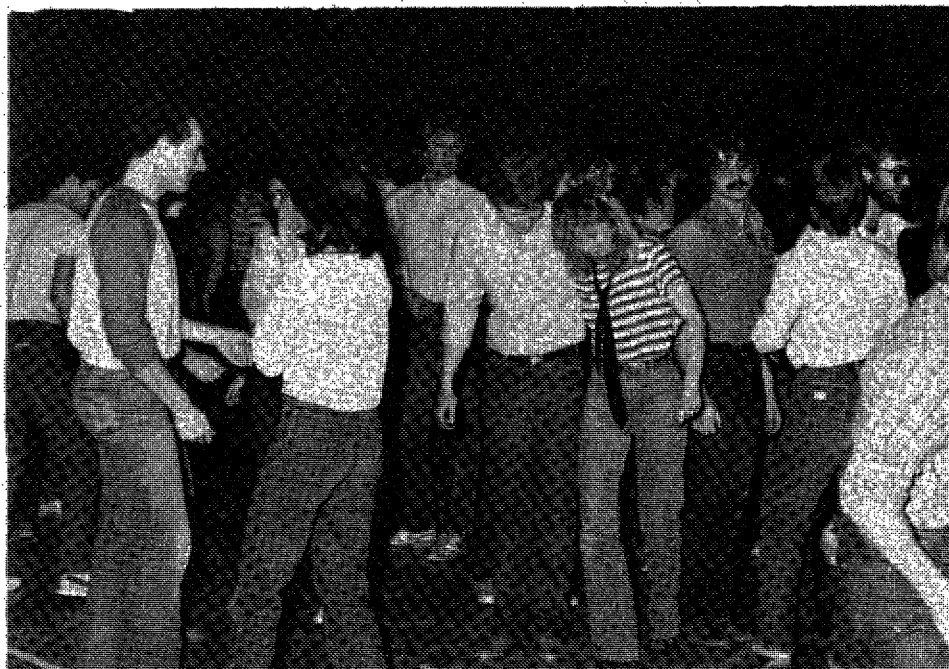
COOK COUNTY SALOON

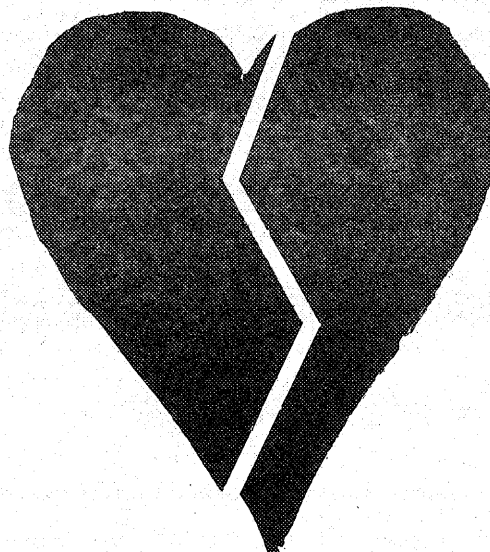

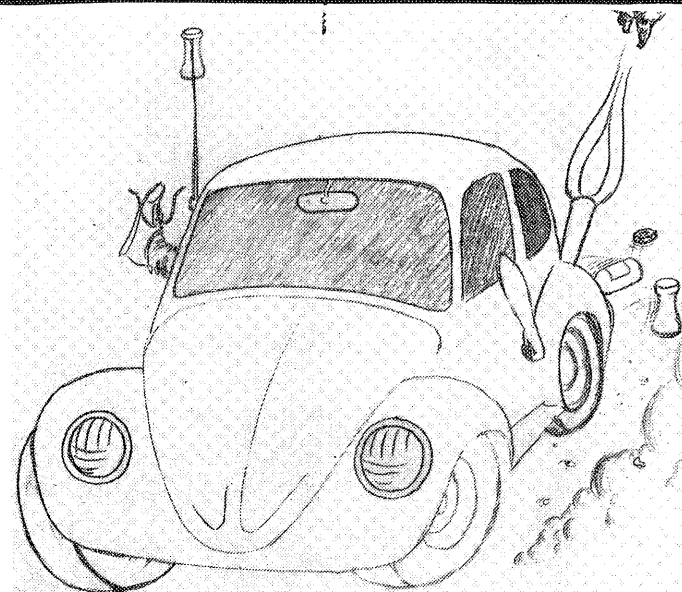
