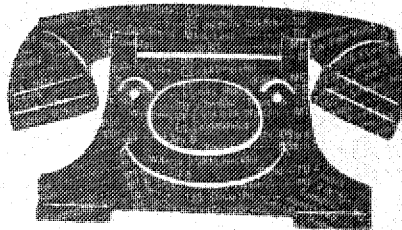

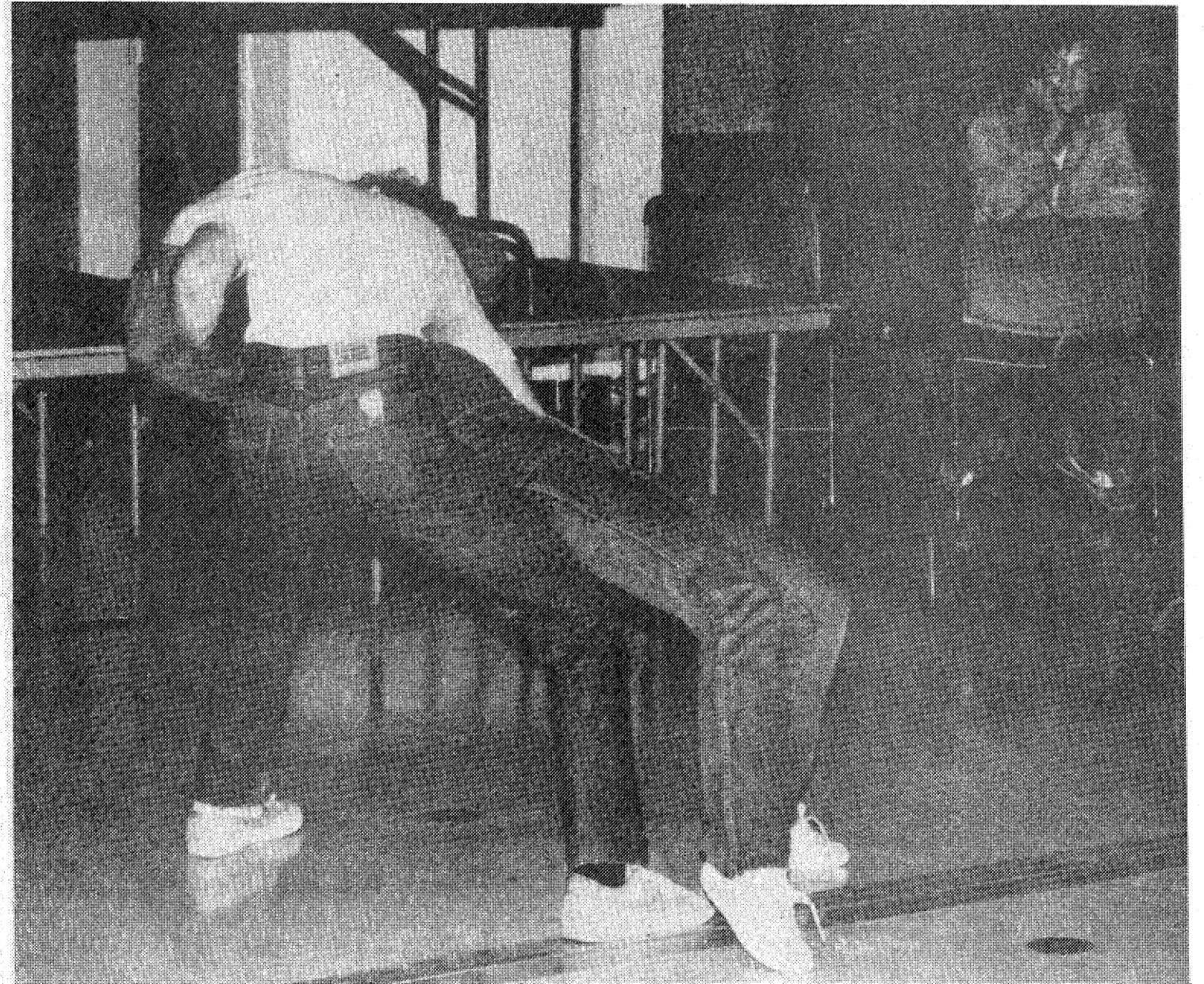

Editors Note

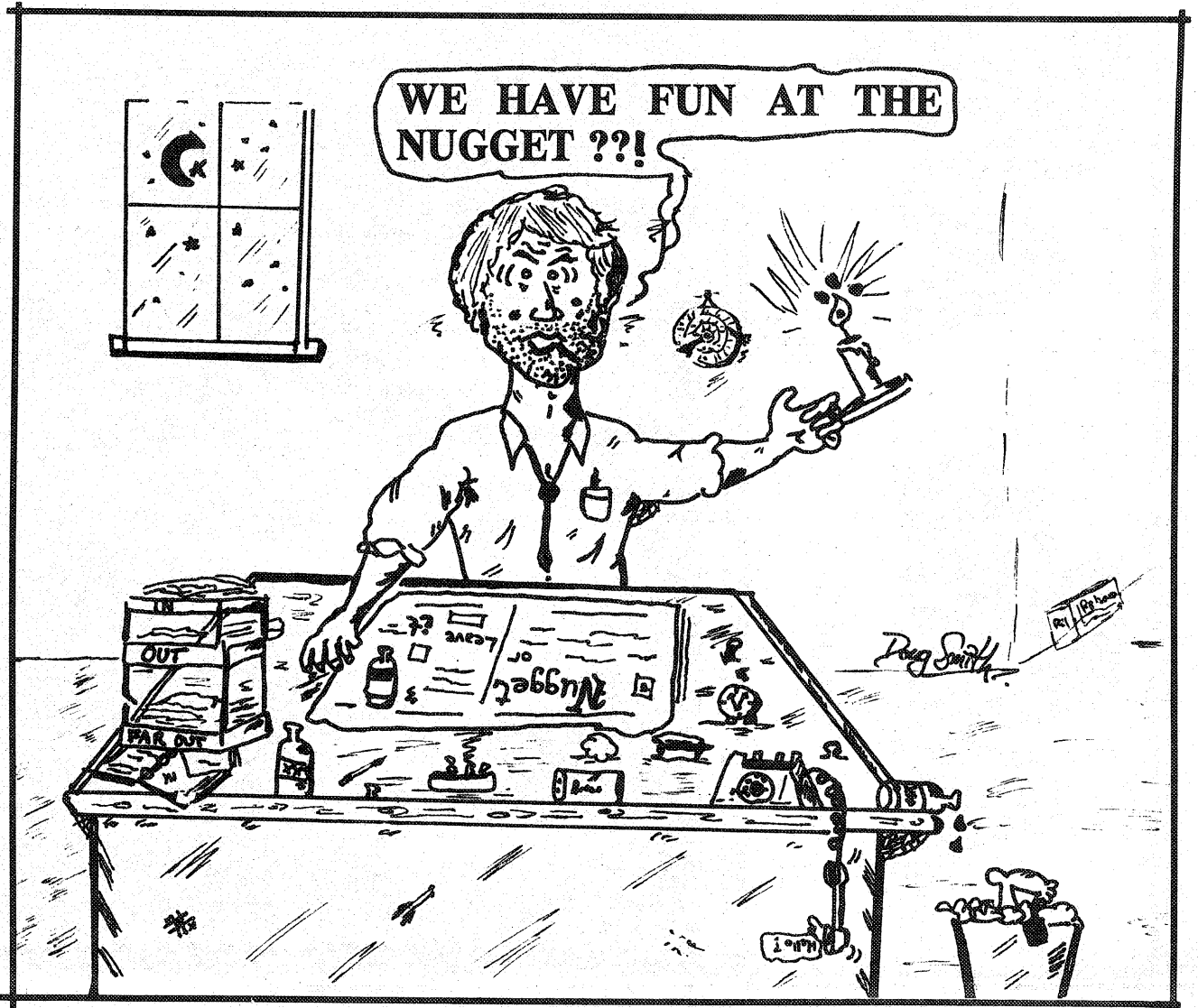

It's bad enough having to put up with burnt toast, dry sandwiches half rotten fruit plates ect, ect, but when we are expected to pay downtown prices its totally unreasonable. Think about it — if a student were to have daily:

Morning—coffee, toast & jam=90 cents
Lunch—Hot meal & coffee = \$2.85
Afternoon—coffee=35 cents
Daily Cost = \$4.10
Monthly Cost (X22) = \$90.20

In an attempt to remedy the problem, I began submit-

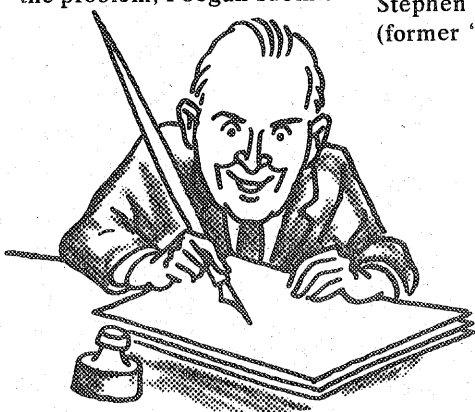
ting rhyming schemes, that I hoped would please the reader, but I missed the second printing deadline. Lo and behold, my dream came true, and somebody out there actually missed me!

NAIT Ookpik Hockey

As the leaves start to fall, the sportsfan starts turning to hockey as an alternative. Here at NAIT, the Ookpik Hockey Team is already making preparations for the 1982—83 season. During the 1981—82 season, the NAIT Ooks captured the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association (National) Championship.

Since the team organization meeting on September 8th, the prospective players have participated in five dryland training sessions and four on—ice sessions before Sunday's intrasquad game.

Originally, there were 75 individuals vying for positions with the Ookpiks. After the third on—ice session on Thursday, the 25th, the first cut was made. Twenty—nine players were given their walking papers.

Sunday, Sept. 26th — NAIT Intrasquad Game — The Blues 7, The Whites 2, at the NAIT Arena

With 46 players left in camp, the hopefuls for the Ooks took to the ice for the intrasquad game on Sunday, Sept. 26th. The Blues tallied twice in the first period as they coasted to a 7—2 win over the Whites.

Only 22 seconds into the contest, Richard Serniak beat Wayne Fisher on a set—up from Ken Ludwig and Dwight Hunks to give the Blues a 1—0 advantage. At 19:39 of the first frame, Daniel Cote doubled the lead on a set—up from Michel Johnson.

In the second, the Blues stretched the lead to three on Pat Lawson's marker from Ken Ludwig at 2:48. One minute and nine seconds later, the Whites got on the scoresheet with Terry Bakken's tally. Assists on the Whites goals went to Gary Hoekstra and Jeff Hendricks. Warren Sanregret made the score 4—1 in favor of the Blues at the 5:50 mark. The Whites then reduced the lead to two at 8:28 on Gary Hoekstra's penalty shot goal. Blair Berze found the mark 45 seconds later to give the Blues a 5—2 lead on a Keith Beyak—Dean Burles set—up. Then with 1:37 left in the period, Kevin Imrie capitalized on a play with Ted Gregson and Ron Francis.

Kevin Hayes rounded out the scoring with the lone goal of the third at the 8:33 mark.

The Blues dominated the game outshooting the Whites 47—33, and outscoring them 7—2. The coaches for this match were former Ooks Kent Wilmot and Rick Carrier for the Blues and the Whites respectively.

Following the intrasquad contest, the number of players left in camp was reduced to a figure in the low 30's. Of the players in camp, Coach Perry Pearn commented, 'I'm very pleased with the turnout this year. At each position, there is

depth, particularly in goal, and as the season unfolds that will help us greatly.' Perry added, 'At this point of the season, we are in better shape than we were last year at this time.'

There are seven returnees for the CCAA Championship team. Coming back this year are forwards Dale Kolada, Ken Ludwig, and Gary Hoekstra; rearguards Pat Kernaghan, Warren Sanregret, and Terry Bakken, and netminder Brad Breadell.

This season there will be many new faces joining the Ookpiks. As the camp enters its fourth week, some of the hopefuls are making impressive showings.

In goal, Cleo Rowein is having a good camp. Cleo played last year with the Lethbridge Broncos of the WCHL. Defencemen who might have a future with the Ooks include Dean Burles, formerly of the Prince Albert Raiders of the SJHL, Rick Serniak of the St. Albert Saints of the AJHL, and Darrell Hughes of Elite Electric of the Edmonton Junior B Hockey League. Up front, Randy Repchuk, who was with the Edmonton Warriors of the Edmonton Junior B Hockey League last year and Kevin Hayes, who was with the Red Rustlers of the AJHL last year, have made strong showings so far.

On the Bench: The Ooks open their exhibition season on Saturday, Oct. 2nd at the NAIT Arena when the play host to the Leduc Riggers. On Sunday, Oct. the 3rd, the Ooks will entertain the University of Alberta Golden Bears. BE there!

greenhouse effect that occurs when the sun is shining. Which at times can increase the temperature to a comfortable 32 degrees C.

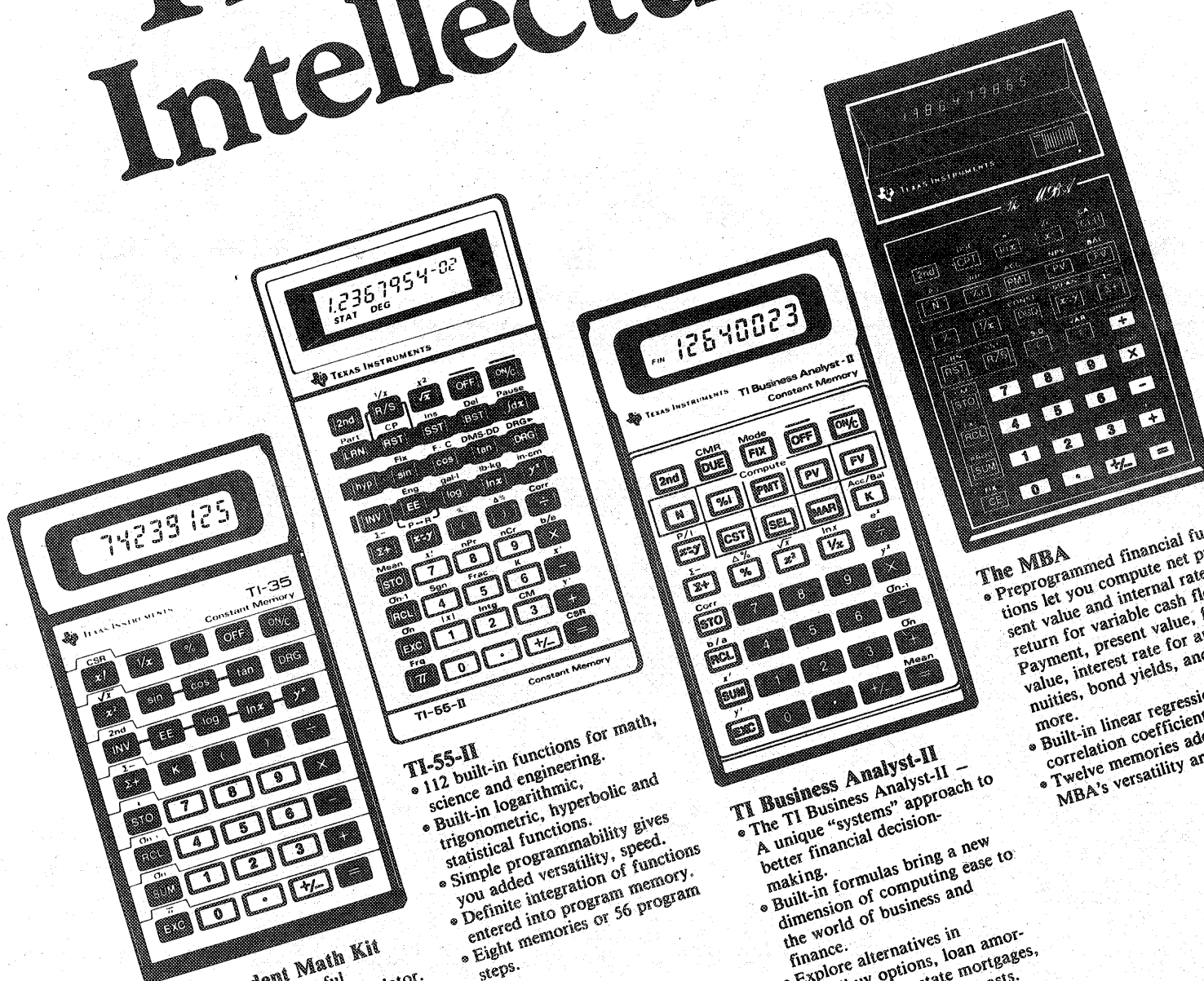
