





President's Message

At the time, when this message was first written, thousands of students who drive to NAIT will find it increasingly difficult to continue this practice. It almost appears that the City of Edmonton's transit system is hurting so bad, that they must now find ways to force people to use it. As of January 1, 1983, all the streets within 101 St. & 106 St., and 111 Ave. & 122 Ave., will be off limits to NAIT student & staff drivers. Starting on that date, from 9 a.m. - 6 p.m. these roads will have both , and or either, permit parking or 2 hour parking bans. The City's Administration sent around an inquiry to the residents of the area with regards to the changes and out of those who responded, 79 percent were in favour of the changes. Neither NAIT or NAITSA were advised of these changes. I believe that there must be a simple formula that can be derived to solve this problem. The city should at least give NAIT time to build additional parkades before enforcing their new parking bylaws in the NAIT Community. The NAITSA Executive have drawn up a petition to protect the City's new parking bylaws. If you protest the changes sign the petition (see your Tech. Pres.) and we will let City Hall know your

On Wednesday, Dec. 15, at 1:15 in the North Gym,

we will have an annual referendum. There are only two issues 1) read the budget 2) approve the present constitution under the Technical Institutes Act. For the last 19 years, NAITSA has been registered under the Societies Act, and since we have gone under a Board of Governors we have to change Acts. This will not take long, you simply attend the referendum, ask questions about the issues and vote.

In about 4 months our association will have another election to see who its new executive will be. Hopefully, by now, some of our 1st year students will be interested in an office. However, there are those who are interested but don't know anything about it, or who to ask. To make things a little easier we will hold an information session for those 1st year students who might be even remotely interested in running for a NAITSA Executive office next year. Watch for posters in January for more details.

IT MAKES ME SICK!

Countrary to extensive propaganda, Hydrogen Sulfide gas, known commonly as sour gas does make people sick, even in low concentrations. Every day people are coming down with the flu, sore throats, stomach cramps, headaches and many more such They are all ailments. connected with the hydrogen sulfide gas coming from the wildcat well at Lodgepole, Alberta.





Although the new wave movement produced some very fine albums and acts in 1979, including: Gary Numan, The Police, Blondie and The Pretenders, the best selling album of the year was recorded by the quintessential psychedelic band of the 60's and 70's, Pink Floyd. The Wall was the band's twelfth LP, and was chosen the most popular album by the influential rock magazine, Rolling Stone. CBC Radio's 25 Years of Rock reviews the year and the phenomenal success of The Wall on Dec. 18, at 11:05 p.m.

Rock To A Close, Dec. 18.

Pink Floyd was launched in the mid-sixties. It got caught up in the psychedelic vibrations coming across the Atlantic from San Francisco, and became weirder with every passing month. By 1966, it was the toast of the London underground and developed a performance presentation that was to soon be adopted by almost every performing rock outfit in the 70's. Floyd's use of changing back-lit slides, became de rigueur at most rock performances.

Long after the psychedelic era had petered out, Floyd stormed North America with the LP. Dark Side of The Moon. Musicologist Michael Bane said, "It was a wildly successful album that carried the group's conception of the psychedelic era into the decidedly good-natured eraof the 70's". The album stayed on the charts for seven years, while the band was hard at work on its next effort, The Wall. Rolling Stone said, "The Wall is a stunning synthesis of Roger Waters)the band's bassist and the man who wrote all the words and a majority of the music on the LP) by now familiar thematic obsessions: brutal misanthrophy, sour, middle-aged tristesse; the surprisingly shrewd perception that the music business is a microcosm of institutional oppression; and the dread of impending psychosis that runs through all these (Floyd) records plus a strongly felt antiwar animus..." It was destined to become a rock masterpie-

The Teardrop Explodes In Concert On Rock And Roll Saturday Night, Dec. 18

The Teardrop Explodes hails from Liverpool, one of a new generation of bands at the forefront in the renaissance of a city which has brought the world some great music. The band is heard in this final concert broadcast on CBC Radio's Rock and Roil Dec. 18, at five minutes past midnight.

The group dates back to 1977 and an outfit called The Crucial Three, which was formed at a drama school by Julian Cope, Ian McCullock and Pete Wiley. McCulloch went on to Echo and the Bunnymen, Pete Wiley put together a band called Wah, while Julian Cope set out to write material which he describes as "thoughtfull rock", a description which fits the tone of the whole Liverpool movement. Some critics have dubbed this sound as "new psychedelic", but as Polygram, the band's record label says, "...it was soon clear to everyone that Teardrop's sound was no acid-flash-

In 1979, the band's first records were released, but the breakthrough came in 1980 when they joined forces with Madness producer Clive Langer and recorded a Cope song called Treason. The next single, When I Dream, was a hit in the U.K. and established the band's name in North America.

There have been several personnel changes, but for the performance at Guildford Civic Hall where this concert was taped, the line-up was as follows: Jeff Hammer on keyboards, Troy Tate on guitar, Alfie Agius, bass, Garry Dwyer on drums and Julian Cope on guitar and vocals. Also included in this concert are Luke Tunney and Edward Emmett on trumpets.

2 STUDENIS CRITICIZED FOR CALENDAR PROJECT.

An innovative attempt at avoiding summer unemployment has led to charges of misrepresentation against two Edmonton students.

At issue are the popular pin-up calendars "The Women of U of A" and "The Men of U of A"

The matching black-and-white calendars are the brainchild of Dawn Izzard, a fourth year U of A home economics student, and Keeley Vickerson, a second year student in NAIT's radio and television arts program.

But a recent issue of the campus Gateway newspaper charges the businesswomen with misrepresenting themselves to advertisers and customers.

The Gateway charges the women used non-U of A students as models, implied to advertisers the calendars were affiliated to Universiade '83 and suggested to some advertisers and customers that all proceeds from the calendar were going to charity.

Izzard says 20 of the 24 models are fulltime U of A students and the remaining four are former U of A students.

"It's bad personal exposure, but good for the calendars," says Izzard. "Even if we don't make any money, we've learned some invaluable lessons...This is our first business venture."

"We don't like the idea of being knocked for taking chances and being individuals."

Universiade officials were contacted regarding the calendar endorsement, says Izzard, but signed with another calendar before they were ready.

Some proceeds from the calendar are going to CHED's children's charity, but not all the money as the CHED logo suggests, says Izzard.

"We've had no complaints. There's been no misrepresentation as far as we're concerned. We're happy with the calendars and so are the students," says Colleen Olexiuk, the U of A bookstore purchaser. The campus bookstore is the only retail outlet for the calendars, which sell for \$5.95.

The calendars feature one student model for each month. Izzard says the pictures stress "quality" and a "wholesome look".

"Just because the economy is bad doesn't mean people are going to stop living. They still need some entertainment."

Izzard says most people involved in the project were unemployed or just starting their careers and benefited from the experience and exposure.

If all 5,00 calendars sell, the women may earn as much as \$4,000 each, Izzard said.

Izzard said she and vickerson got the idea while visiting an American university last Christmas and had a good response when they made their proposal to the bookstore manager.





RELAX & LEARN

When you think of a sensory deprivation tanks do scenes from Altered States with hairy animals running around and eating live goats come to mind? These

were the scenes that started to run through my mind when Frank Grisdale, the owner of the Relax and Learn spa, called me up and asked me if I would like to try out the latest form of relaxation.

I agreed heartily and set up three appointments of one hour each, as Frank recommended. The first one was for orientation and becoming used to floating. The next two are arranged so you can have the full benefit of the tank. The ever supportive Nugget staff told me that it sounded great but if I come in with hairy arms they would definately keep their distance!

With these thoughts in mind I set off Wednesday, (Nov. 24/82), afternoon for my first appointment. With visions of a black steel tank in a cold tile room, and with flashbacks to my origins, dancing through my head, I opened the front door with only a slight tremble and greeted Frank with barely a tremor in my voice. We started off with an orientation to the tank and to precedures that followed. My first surprise came when I saw the flotation tank. It was blue fibreglass, 8'3" long, 45" high and was equal to a twin bed in width. It was in a dimly lit room with thick carpet and panelled walls. Basically there are no rules on how to float, the recommendable ways are either with your arms down at your side or with your hand clasped behind your head! 

It was a very pleasant feeling with no pressure on any one part of my body. I soon became very comfortable. Then I realized that I had left the door half open. I sat up, steeled my nerve and shut it all the way. Total darkness - opened and closed my eyes, no difference. I stretched out and waited for the cosmic experience. Suddenly the filter system came on, this was my hint that my hour was up.



That one in ten women in Canada is physically abused (the assessment would be higher if one considered mental and economical cruelty) is not surprising when our society keeps watching men like J.R. Ewing on "Dallas" or Archie Bunker as if they were cult figures. To be sure, J.R. and Archie Bunker are meant to be satirical - to try to change people that are like them. Unfortunately, like the Prime Minister giving

people "the finger", public use of such symbols more often than not just gives them public acceptance, if not increasing their existance.

Thus, our society gets caught in a spiral, wanting to decrease crime but continously watching(therefore, supporting) shows that, to some, depict crime as being somewhat glamourous, which(thanks to life imitating art imitating life) increases crime. And we wind up with a young generation that knows

more about how to hurt others than how to help others.


