

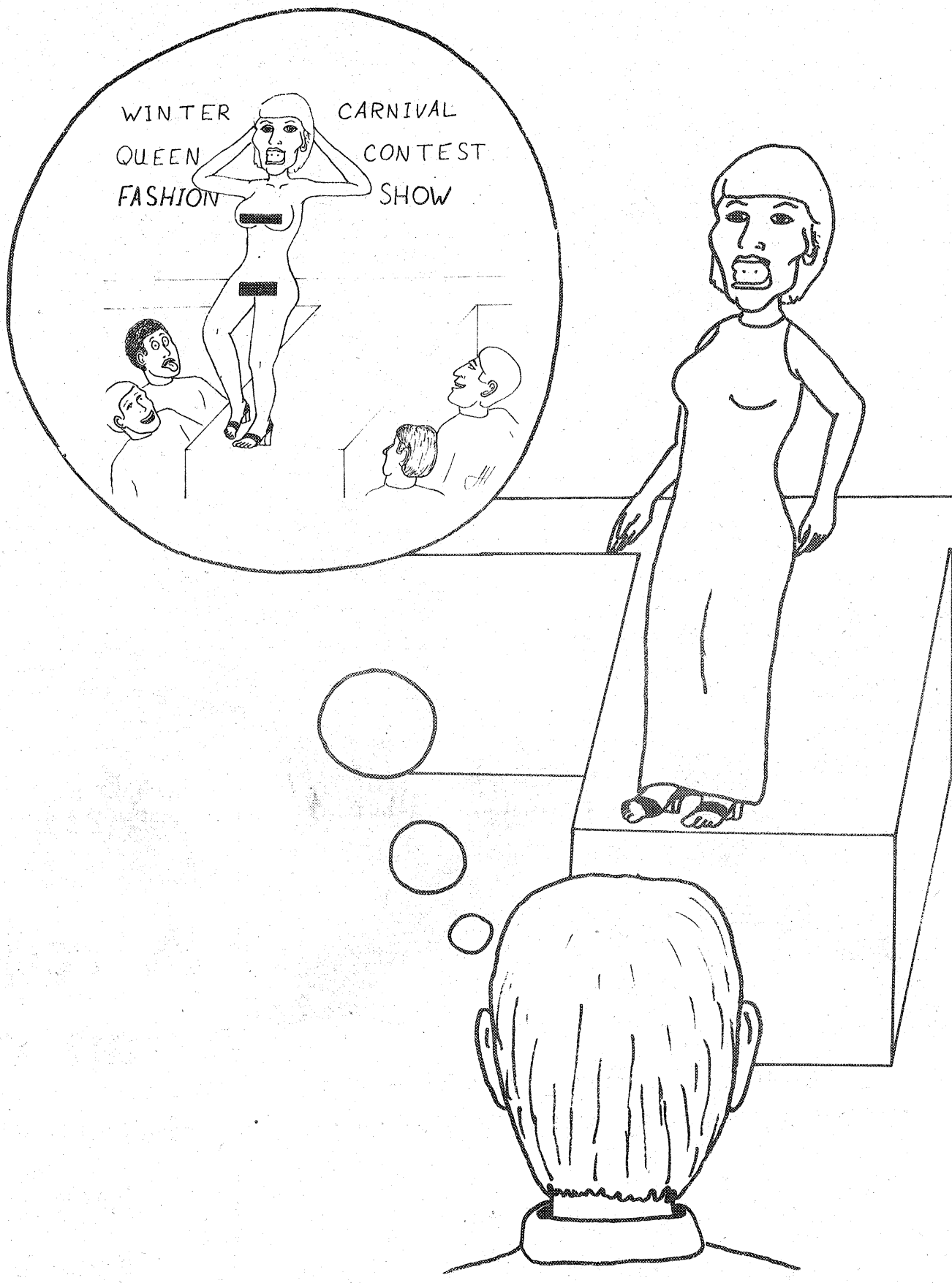

President's  
Message

At a time when this message was written, the possibility that some 3000 students might not have a way to come to classes thanks to a bus strike. That possibility will be a reality next Monday.

The Nugget is attempting to initiate an emergency car pool system. On this campus there are 1450 parking stalls allotted to students. If each driver did his part and picked up 2 other students on the way to classes and on the way home, we would have no problems. However, we all lead such unique lifestyles that a 100 percent success of this system will be difficult unless everyone co-operated. We need more action.

On Friday, February 5, I sent a message to Edmonton's Mayor and Members of Council, on NAITSA's behalf, asking them to temporarily lift all daily parking bans in the NAIT community for the duration of the bus strike. I was careful to note that we realize that the snow route signs stay in effect. Once we get word from the mayor's office, if favourable, we will post posters telling everyone. No posters means no go. The motive behind this tactic is simple. A lot of our members take the bus instead of their cars. If a bus strike does occur they will probably want to drive their cars to school. If this request goes through, they can park in the residential zones.

There are those students who can not find a reliable driver to catch a ride with or those that have no cars and are forced to thumb to school. For those people we have prepared a small yellow sign that can be attached to a binder or to a piece of cardboard that simply reads, NAIT Student. So while you are thumbing if you flash this sign some motorists might get the idea. These signs will be distributed to all technologies through their Student President via the mailboxes in Student Services, in the Student Stores, and in the NAITSA Executive Offices (E133).

If anyone has any ideas that they wish to share feel free to tell us.

Car Pooling

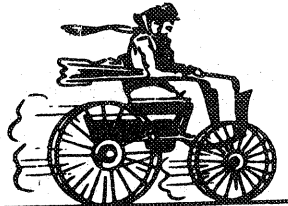

On Chinook Day, the NAIT basketball teams travelled to the Red Deer College to take on the Kings and Queens.

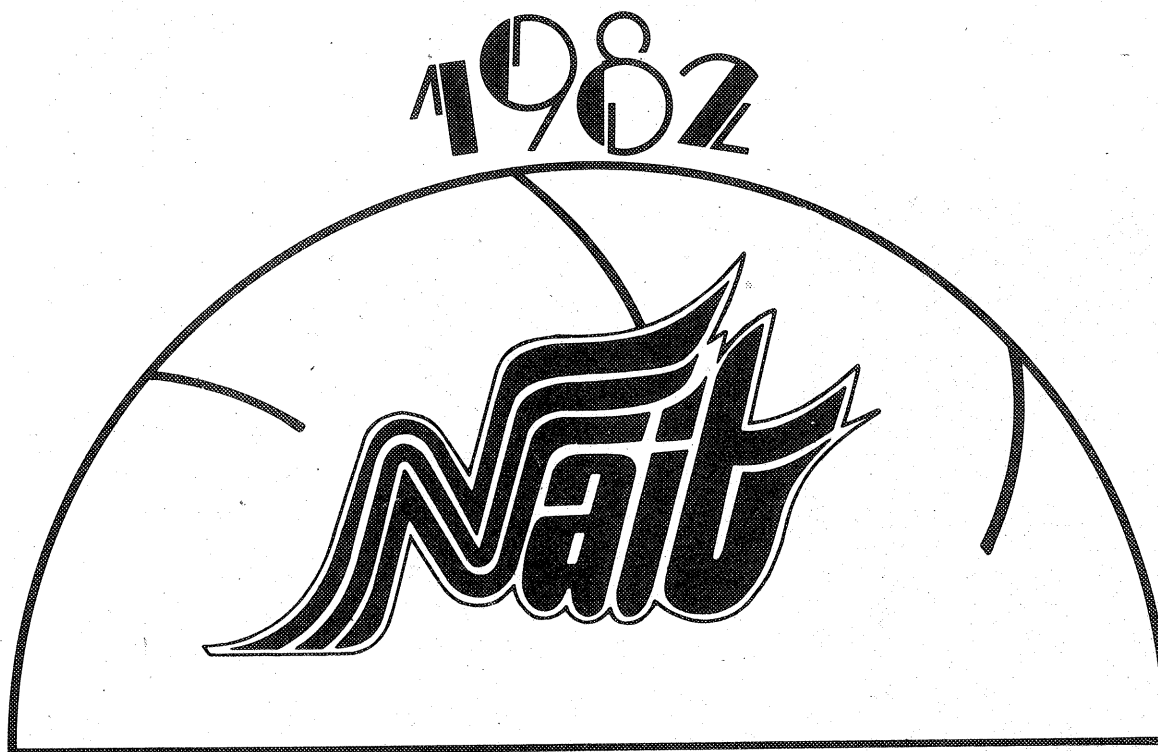
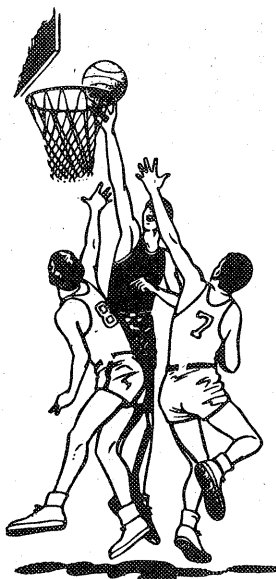

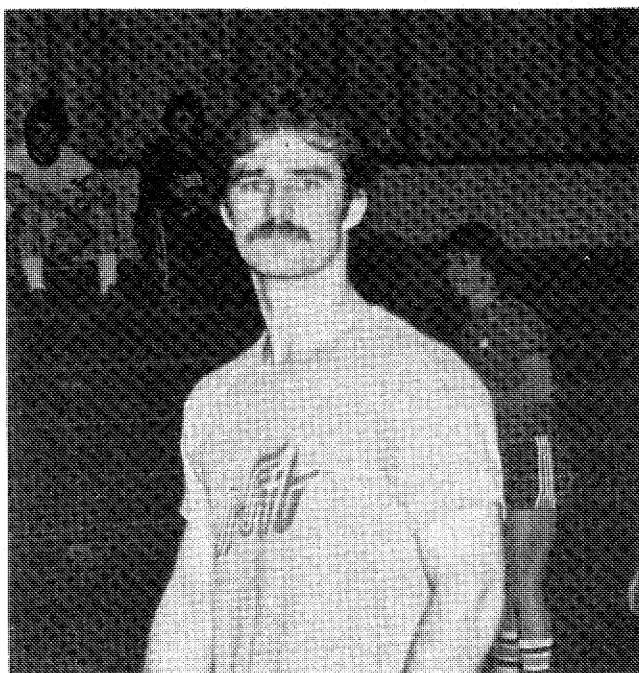

# Hockey

The NAIT Oookpiks made their weekend road trip to Calgary a memorable one by downing the SAIT Trojans 3-2 on Saturday, and tying the Trojans at four on Sunday. The three points accumulated on the road trip enables the Ooks to strengthen their hold on second place in the ACAC. The Ooks have a three point lead over the Red Deer College Kings, but RDC has three games in hand.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 6TH --OOKS 3, SAIT TROJANS 2 AT CALGARY

On Saturday, February the 6th, the NAIT Oookpicks overcame a 2-1 deficit to defeat the SAIT Trojans 3-2 in overtime at the SAIT Arena.

Rich Norberg of the Trojans kicked off the scoring with the lone goal of the first period at 4:42. At the 12:28 mark of the middle frame, Darrell Slupek found the net to tie the game at one. Two minutes and 46 seconds later, Greg Luhr regained the lead for SAIT.

Going into the third period, the Ooks were down 2-1. At 11:32, Terry Bakken notched his second goal of the season to bring the Ooks even.

Terry's marker set the stage for an overtime period which the Ooks completely dominated. At 3:45 of the overtime, Ron Chorney and Dave Souch set up Ken Ludwig for the game-winning goal.

In the NAIT net, Ken Hodge turned away 36 of 38 shots. At the other end, Greg Stewart of the Trojans blocked 41 of 44 drives.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 7TH--SAIT TROJANS 4, OOKS 4 AT CALGARY(OT)

On Sunday, February 7th, the NAIT Oookpicks outshot the SAIT Trojans 49 to 32, but could only salvage a 4-4 draw with the Trojans in the second game of the weekend series at Calgary.

Ooks Assistant Captain Brian Hermanutz opened the scoring at 10:29 of the first period. SAIT's Rich Norberg tied the game at 13:27. A very short nine seconds later, Norberg gave the Trojans a 2-1 lead.

In the second, Norber completed the hat trick and widened the SAIT lead to 3-1 at 2:08. SAIT's advantage increased to 4-1 when John Mercer tallied at 10:07. Facing a three goal deficit, the situation looked bad for the Ooks. At 13:58, Mike Moskalyk narrowed the Trojan lead to two with his second marker of the season. Four minutes and six seconds later, Dale Kolada Trimmed the SAIT lead to one.

Going into the final frame of regulation play, the Ooks needed one goal to pull even. Brian Hermanutz tallied the equalizer at 12:35. For Brian, it was his 15th goal of the season, tops on the Ooks. There was no scoring in the over time.

SAIT's John Gillespie turned in a strong performance between the Trojan pipes stopping 49 of 53 drives. At the NAIT end, Ken Jodge halted 32 of 36 shots.

ON THE BENCH: Three Ooks are currently out of the line up. Warren Sanregret and Wayne Perkins did not dress for Sunday's game and are questionable for the two games this weekend. Greg Fischer has also been absent from the Ooks line-up recently, and could be out for an undetermined length of time... The ACAC Hockey League will expand in size next year. Calgary's Mount Royal College will return to the league after a two year absence. Another member of the ACAC may also enter the league for the 1982-83 season... Plan to see the Cariboo College Club from Kamloops, British Columbia when they will be at the NAIT Arena for two exhibition games on February 20th and 21st... The Ooks have two home games this weekend. At 8 in the evening on Saturday, February 13th, the Ooks will entertain the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings. At 2:00 in the afternoon on Sunday, February 14th, the Ooks will play host to the Red Deer College Kings. Admission to both games is FREE with your NAIT ID card.

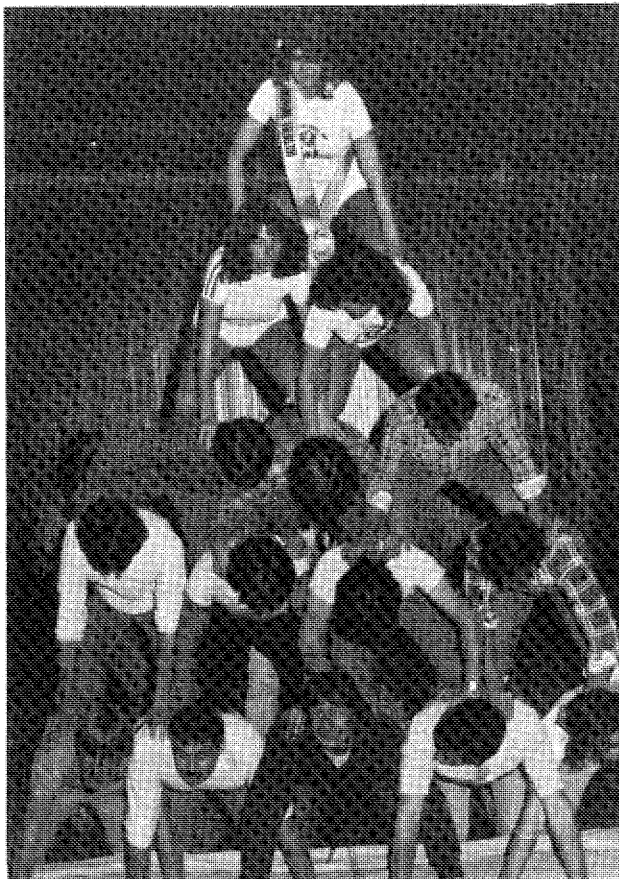

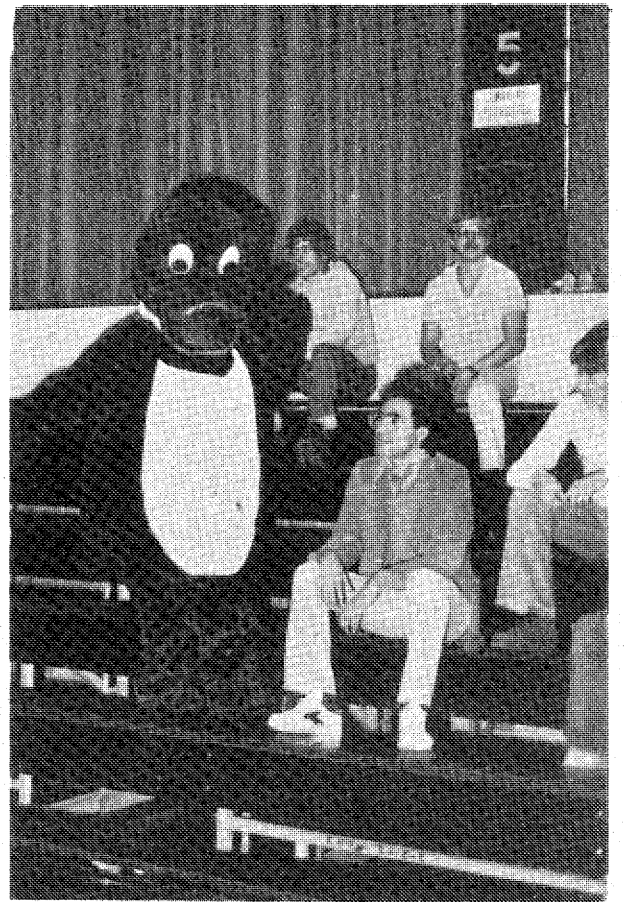

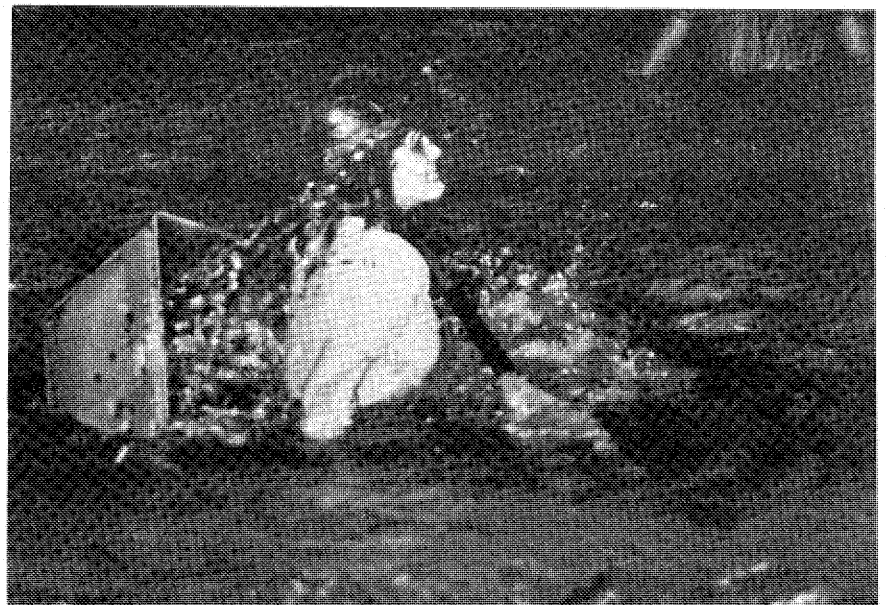

## Whose life is it anyway

Imagine yourself strapped to a chair in a room with no exits or openings. You are alone with no hope of ever being free of the chair and getting outside the room.

The room does not change. The only variation is the food that is spoonfed you by the people who mysteriously arrive into the room. After awhile even the food becomes bland. You are trapped in monotony. How long would you stay sane? Would you want to stay sane? Alive?

This is the story line behind the movie "Whose Life Is It Anyway?" The movie is an adaptation of a stage play. The play was presented at the Citadel Theatre about a year ago. In the movie, Richard Dreyfuss stars as Ken Emerson, the sculptor who suddenly finds himself trapped inside of a paralyzed body. Emerson's bed becomes the scene, his face carries the story, and his mind is the springboard for the action.

Here is the ironic situation presented by this movie. A human wants to die and who considers himself dead to

what he was. In his striving for his wish to die he attains levels of energy and spirit about life that few ordinary people ever attain. By Emerson's fight for his right to die he achieves a position of being kept alive because of his spirit. A Catch 22 situation.

Although Emerson wants to die, the hospital personell are trained in supporting life and there fore cannot accept his conclusion that he is already dead. John Cassavettes plays the senior surgeon who fights Emerson's wishes. The movie version puts Cassavettes more into a villian role that the stage presentation. The doctor and the patient are at opposite ends of the struggle, with the other characters interspersed along this polarity.

The emotional level developed by this film never lets up. It is a sad, conflicting situation of life and death. Death is the enemy which Cassavettes fights against. Should Emerson be handed over to the enemy or should he be kept alive? The viewer facilitates between these extremes as the characters

banter with Emerson. And although a scene of Emerson left in a wheelchair in the hospital basement, puffing on a reefer, with noone else in the room and asking the security guard who finds him, "is this dialysis?" can evoke laughter and hilarity at the absurdity of the situation, it is only a change of scene and the emotional tension comes back swiftly.

"Whose Life Is It Anyway?" is a well crafted film, done with sensitivity and good character development. Although Dreyfuss is center stage most of the film his supporting cast does an admirable job. It is only fitting that this should be. Emerson is reliant on other people to get him through the day. So it is that the supporting cast allows Dreyfuss to come across with a brilliant performance.

Euthanasia is not a dinner type of conversation but it is an ethical situation that will be much more prominent in the years to come. In a world that may end soon, we should be fighting for life; yet we find ourselves in the position of having to acknowledge death as a viable need.

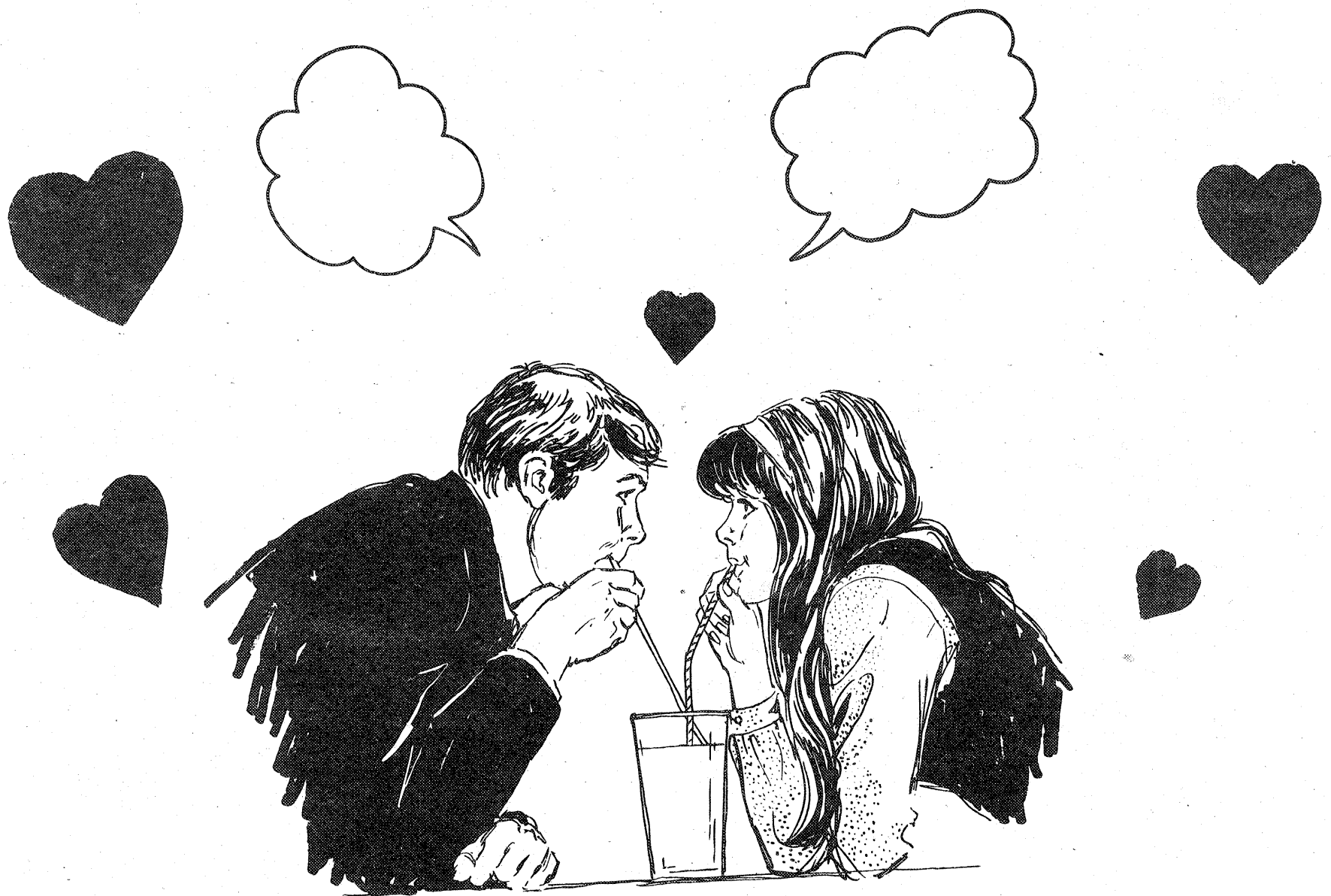
