Editor's Note

As May approaches NAITSA could find itself in a potentially explosive and costly situation. Last fall a decision was made to bring out the student yearbook, The Northern Torch, in May when students are still crawling the hallways. This was an attempt to get the yearbook to the students while they are still here. Economics could force the release date to be postponed.

In previous years the Northern Torch has been distributed in the fall. A fault or benefit of this system was that many of the graduated students did not receive a copy. The books were not mailed out and those students who were unable to get to NAIT for various reasons, failed to get a copy. Thus, NAITSA could get away with printing under 3000 copies for a 4000 plus student population and still have a few hundred copies left kicking around.

This year, the number of books to be printed was set at 2,400. The decision was made by NAITSA members in an effort to keep the cost of the yearbook down; around \$30,000 (about \$9 of the \$45 in student fees.) The 2400 copies will be totally inadequate in this situation of spring distribution.

A chain reaction will occur if these yearbooks come out in May. The scene of one student clutching her precious yearbook to her body will cause other students scurrying for their copy. In previous years when the yearbook came out in the fall, only the second year students were qualified to have one. This year all full-time students will be qualified to jockey for the 2400 copies.

A note written by this year's yearbook editor, Mike Rapati, which appeared in the Nugget gave the impression that only 2400 copies will be printed and students were encouraged to get personalizations to guarantee them a copy. A personalization is the student's name imprinted on the cover of the Northern Torch. In no way should a personalization guarantee a copy over someone who does not want one personalized. To do so would mean that the \$45 in student fees are only preliminary payments and guarantees nothing.

Although some NAITSA members have made statements that students are not guaranteed a yearbook in the constitution, neither are they promised anything else. NAITSA is a service by its nature and having to charter its services, to put them in writing, seems absurd. The only way out of this situation is to provide a yearbook to every student who wants one. Seems fair. Or bring it out next fall.

This is where the situation will get costly for NAITSA. There are 4200 students who have paid their \$45 and are looking for something in return. After the first 2400 copies have been gobbled up, 1800 students could still demand one. A reprint will cost thousands of dollars and that amount will vary in proportion to demand for the yearbook. If 2400 yearbooks cost \$25,000 on first printing, another 1000 copies will cost over \$10,000. On top of this expense, these extra copies will have to be mailed out. It would be discriminating to have those students who did not get a first edition come back to get a copy. It would be the least NAITSA could do for inconveniencing these students. The cost of mailing will be a couple dollars a book. Another hefty bill.

This situation has to be dealt with by this year's council even though they will be gone by the time the fan starts spinning in May. They accepted the concept of a May release date for the yearbook. It is their responsibility They have to spin with the fan on this one.



Since the success of last December's referendum which established the Building Development Fund, a good many student have been asking - Is it really possible for us to develop and construct a NAITSA building? With proper direction and leadership, we can indeed develop and build our resources such as a building and much more.

It is important to consider, that if this association is to grow, that we accept that growth starts from within. Good organization, effective planning and teamwork are signs of growth.

Ten months ago NAITSA empowered this office to, among its other duties, to initiate negotiations towards the development of a NAITSA Building.

The committee's responsibility will not establish policies but will include the following:


- (a) Conduct special meetings and inquires with our students to determine a true picture of our needs to be fulfilled by our building.



WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT??

In this past week, the NAIT Oopkiks picked up one point in their two games to move into a second place tie with the Red Deer College Kings. On Thursday, January 28th, the Ooks travelled to Camrose and dropped a 4 - 3 decision to the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings. On Saturday night, the Ooks battled back time and time again to tie the SAIT Trojans 4 - 4 in a contest that went into overtime.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 28--CAMROSE LUTHERAN COLLEGE VIKINGS 4, OOKS 3 AT CAMROSE

The NAIT Oopkiks did not turn out one of their finer performances on Thursday, January 28th when they were defeated 4-3 by the CLC Vikings. The Ooks had opportunities to win the contest, but they just could not capitalize.

At the 5:52 mark of the first period, Don Lauweryssen gave the Vikings a quick 1 - 0 lead. A sort 38 seconds later Brian Hermanutz brought the Ooks even with a tally set up by Ray Anderson.

In the middle frame, CLC's Mark Wemp of The Vikings regained the lead for his club with an unassisted effort at 6:45. At 8:47, Ron Chorney of the Ooks, notched the equalizer with assists going to Dave Souch and Daryl Holmquist. One minute later, Mark Wemp picked up his second of the game for the Vikes. NAIT's Dale Kolada tied the game up for the Ooks at the 16:19 mark.

In the third, CLC's Warren Aspenes found the mark with a goal that proved to be the game winner at 11:16. There were no other goals to report in the final 20 minutes.

The Oopkiks outshot the Vikings 31 to 24, and held the territorial advantage for the first 40 minutes. Ken Hodge was between the pipes for the Ooks while Matt Hayduk was in net for the Vikings.

The CLC victory was marred by what some observers might call incompetent refereeing. Two line passes were frequently missed and a number of penalty calls could be classified as suspect. One of the more suspect calls occurred when a linesman attempted to do the refereeing and did a slipshod job. The linesman signalled a penalty to Brian Hermanutz for virtually no reason. On the questionable call, the Ooks had a goal disallowed, which might have turned the game around.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 30--SAIT TROJANS 4, OOKS 4 AT NAIT

Four goals in the ten minute overtime period highlighted one of the most exciting matches of the year between the NAIT Oopkik and the SAIT Trojans. The game ended in a 4 - 4 deadlock after each team tallied twice in the tense overtime period.

SAIT's Jim Snodgrass opened the scoring at 1:39 of the first to give the Trojans a quick 1 - 0 lead. The Trojans held onto the lead going into the first intermission.

In the second NAIT's Ron Chorney pulled the Ooks even on a goal at the 20 second mark. John Mercer's tally allowed the Trojans to step ahead of the Ooks 2 - 1.

At 13:55 of the third, NAIT's Ken Ludwig tied the game at two. Ken's goal set the stage for an exciting ten minute overtime period.

In overtime, Jim Snodgrass notched his second of the game to give SAIT a 3 - 2 advantage. Two minutes and 29 seconds later, Dave Souch connected on a set up from Wayne Perkins and Ken Ludwig to even the count at three. At 6:07, SAIT's Wayne Merkel scored a goal which appeared to be the game winner. Merkel's goal could have caused a letdown for the Ooks, but it did not. With 57 seconds left in the ame and the goalie pulled, Ray Anderson found the net, and the Ooks tied the game in dramatic fashion.

In the shootout, the SAIT Trojans outsniped the Ooks 41 to 35. Goaltender Ken Hodge kept NAIT in the contest with many spectacular saves. SAIT's Greg Stewart also turned in a credible performance in the Trojan net.

The Ooks deserve full credit for their achievement on Saturday. The Ooks were behind in the games four times, and each time they came back to tie the score. The penalty killing unit was excellent as usual, handcuffing the SAIT Trojans all evening.

However, the Ooks should take a close look at their performance in the game. There was no doubt that the Ooks dominated play in the first two periods. Once in a while, the intensity seemed to drop, and the opposition scored. In order to be successful in post-season play, the Ooks must play a whole 60 minutes with full intensity, and give it their all each and every shift. With an all-out effort by every player on each shift, the sky is the limit.

ON THE BENCH: The Ooks are healthy as they prepare for a two game road trip to SAIT on Saturday, February 6, and Sunday, February 7...Certain players have stepped forward in January to provide steady play including Ron Chorney, Daryl Holmquist, Ken Ludwig and Tom Tookey...Upcoming home games for the Ooks are numerous. On Saturday, February 13 at 8 in the evening, the Ooks will entertain the first place SAIT Trojans. 


