## Editor's Note

NAIT was given another example of its second class status last week. This time around it was not the government which snubbed NAIT but the news media whose duty it is to report significant occurrences in the city of Edmonton. What is significant to NAIT must just barely get through the door at the daily papers.

A junior hockey team from Sweden visited the NAIT arena to give students and public a taste of international hockey. Granted the game was not an intense end to end battle, just in one end, but there should still be importantance given to international hockey games played in this city. NAIT Ook Piks won easily 13 to 3. Nowhere in the Journal was there any note of what the NAIT team did.

Instead the Journal reported on how the University of Calgary hockey team defeated a junior team from Czechoslovakia. The Czech team did win the Viking tournament in Camrose. However on Wednesday they were playing in Calgary, not Edmonton. A University of Alberta event has always carried more weight than anything that NAIT does. But since when did the U of C gain precedence? The Sun also declined to make a comment of the game at NAIT. Cable 10 was there to film the game at NAIT for later viewing. CFRN had a camera there, whether they did a spot on their sports show with it is unknown. No other media giants were noticeably in attendance that night.

Earlier in the year, NAIT sponsored a media luncheon in which all the sportscasters and other sport groupies were invited to a lunch. They were dined at the expense of NAIT. The purpose was to expose NAIT athletics and the ACAC to the Edmonton media. It didn't seem to help. Maybe a 2 x 4 across the forehead might.

David Whalen is hoping to get NAIT onto the front page of both the Sun and Journal by making a giant NAIT 82 on the football field with the assistance of a few thousand students and staff. With such an important event the media should come rushing up in all kinds of vehicles hoping to get exclusive interviews and whatever else that goes with major news stories. Good luck.

NAIT is continually being ignored. The city disregards the safety of students and staff and runs a freeway through the middle of NAIT. Thirty renters take precedence over NAITSA and block the changing of 117th and 117 A Avenues to one way streets to increase parking. The city ignores us, the media ignores us. Instead of fighting over which technologies will move out to the new Stony Plain Technical Institute, maybe we should all move out there and gain a bit of respect in the process.



Do not analyze your classmates by their involvement in school affairs, or lack thereof. Two year programs may mean two years of one's life influenced by NAIT policies, but two years are so short as to be inconsequential. The challenge to act lies ourside our doors.

If you want action, if you want student activism, give us an opening. Don't distract us from key issues (such as the quality of courses and instructors) with contests to predict how the world will

## President's

On Thursday, and Friday, of this week, you will be presented with the opportunity to make a decision on the extra parking areas found around our campus. Your decision will be made available to you in the form of a petition. Before going into the details, I should provide you with a little pertinent background information.

On October 21, 1981, I wrote to the City of Edmonton Engineering Department, a letter on the following subject:

Converting 117 & 117A Avenue, between 103 & 116 Street to One-Ways, and permitting either angle parking or parking on both sides of the avenues during NAIT's regular daytime hours.

Presently, we have established a parking allocation system based on one's priorities. In our system there are 4 accepted priorities, and after eliminating the fraudulent applications, we still have some 3,000 student applica-This implies that whether or not NAIT can accommodate them, these people must drive their cars to NAIT each and every regular school day. As a result, they are forced to park on the surrounding streets.

Last fall, it was brought to my attention that the city established prking bans on some of the local streets within walking distance of NAIT. As a result, those students who are forced to park on the streets are now in a bit of a squeeze, they must now walk at least an extra 3 - 4 blocks.

To make a long story short, the City Engineering Department examined our request and determined that no technical objection to creating one-ways and establishing two side parking is apparent. However, they claimed that local residents must support this aciton, and the City distributed a circular soliciting resident reaction. Once I got wind of this circular, I sent a letter to all of the residents explaining our motive and plans and asked for

their opinion. I received an earful of opinion telling me that if our proposal goes through that their "little Johnny will grow up thinking that he only has to look one way when crossing the street.'

To make matters very interesting, the residents, who rent through the Edmonton Housing Authority, organized a petition to shelve our objective. The gathered a whole 30 signatures. As a result of their petition, the City's Engineering Dept. notified me that they can no longer support our objective.

In essence, we should not settle for this nonsense and I believe that we should go for the top. This means that we forward our results of our petition to the Mayor and Council members, empowering them to reconsider the facts, and just maybe we can accommodate an extra 170 parking stalls for our students.

If you believe that this cause is justified, please sign your name on the petition; however, you must be a resident of the City for at least 6 months to be eligible to sign. Petitions will be set up on Thursday and Friday in the Tower Lounge, South Lobby and Plaza II.

We the undersigned, citizens of Edmonton, request that both 117 and 117 A Ave. between 103 and 106 streets (which has parking on only one side) be changed to a one way street, with parking on both sides of the street, for the following reasons:

1. 1500 plus persons must have access to safely walk between NAIT Plaza Campus and Main Campus.


Pedestrian and child safety.

# Post Secondary Funding

This spring the Federal Government is reviewing its committeent to post-secondary funding. A massive cutback would drastically affect us all. The following is a press release from the Secretary of State, Gerald Regan. He assures us to not to worry. What, me worry!

Many students, along with university and college administrators and faculty members, are concerned about the future of government funding for our universities and community colleges. As Secretary of State, I share this concern, and I am committed to work to improve the methods by which government funding for post-secondary education is provided.

The Government of Canada shoulders the major cost of post-secondary education. Under the 1977 agreement, the national government is contributing over \$3 billion to the operating costs of post-secondary education in 1981-82. That amounts approximately to 56 per cent of the total operating cost of post-secondary institutions.

The government of Canada also contributes over \$2 billion for students loans, research grants, occupational training and other items involved in post-secondary and other education.

These are the facts. Unfortuantely, Canada's 1.5 million full and part-time students attending universities and community colleges have been often fed rumors and distortions by parties employing scare tactics for political ends.

The Liberal government initiated direct support for post-secondary institutions in 1951. It was the Liberal government which agreed in 1967 to provide funding directly to provinces to operate post-secondary institutions according to the local and regional needs of the provinces.

As Premier of Nova Scotia, I demonstrated my support for higher education because I believed that money spent on a high quality of education was an investment in the future of my porvince. I continue to believe in the priority of post-secondary education, and my goal as Secretary of State is to work to strengthen government support for higher education in this country, and to improve the ability of our universities and colleges to meet national objectives.

At the same time, the Federal Government is concerned about present arrangements for the funding of post-secondary education which the Federal Government is paying through transfers to the provinces and the decreasing share of the operating cost of post-secondary institutions being paid by some provinces. If an increasing amount of available Federal funds continues to be used in this manner, there will be correspondingly less money available for direct Federal programs designed to achieve national goals and objectives.

Likewise, the Government of Canada wants greater assurances from provincial governments that money from the national treasury is actually being spent on post-secondary education. Under the present arrangement, there is no accountability or visibility for the Government of Canada's contribution to the provinces for post-secondary education.

In the immediate future, I am undertaking a comprehensive review of federal support for post-secondary education. I will be consulting with university and college administrators, students and faculty members, as well as with the provinces in order to determine the best ways to improve government support for post-secondary education.

With the support of the university and college communities, I am confident that it will be possible for me to work together with the provinces to reach an agreement for improving the funding and the very structure of post-secondary education.





# Ooks blast opposition

The signs of improvement that were in evidence in the January 2 match against the University of Alberta Golden Bears, transormed into results for the Ooks during this past week. In two contests, (one exhibition against Vaestra Froelunda of Sweden and one league game against Camrose Lutheran College Vikings), the Ooks outscored their opponents 26 - 5.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 6--OOKS 13, VAESTRA FROELUNDA 3 at NAIT

Seven second period goals helped the Ooks down Vaestra Froelunda of the Swedish Elite Junior Division, 13 - 3. The ninth game in eleven days for the Goteburg, Sweden club seemed to be one too many as they appeared tired. On the other hand, the Ooks were ready to play and savored the victory over the Swedes in front of their largest crowd of the season, 360.

Brian Hermanutz lead the way for the Ooks by completing the hat trick. Both Dave Souch and Wayne Perkins had two goals. Warren Sanregret, Mike Moskalyk, Ray Anderson, Ron Chorney, Kent Wilmot and Ken Ludwig rounded out the Ooks scoring.

For Vaestra Froelunda, Lars Ramneborn fired two tallies in the span of seven seconds in the final frame. Mikael Andersson notched the other Vaestra Froelunda marker.

NAIT dominated the play in the final two periods as the shotson goal total (47-16) would indicate. Partial scores in the contest were 3 - 1 after the first and 10 - 1 at the end of two.

Carling O'Keefe presented Most Valuable Player Awards to a player on each club. The winner on the Ooks was Captain Wayne Perkins who had four points (two goals and two assists). His Swedish counterpart, Mikael Andersson tallied their lone marker of the first 40 minutes.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 10--OOKS 13, CAMROSE LUTHERAN COLLEGE VIKINGS 2 AT NAIT

Strong back checking, three shorthanded goals and as all-around team effort guided the NAIT Ooks to a 13 - 2 beating of the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings on Saturday, January 10. The first league action of the new year for both clubs provided the Ooks with two points, a 7 win 6 loss record, and a chance to move in second place in the A.C.A.C.

Daryl Holmquist was NAIT's pillar of strength as he tallied twice and accumulated four assists. Kent Wilmot, Ken Ludwig, and Wayne Perkins also notched a pair of goals in the game. The other Ooks marksmen were Ron Chorney, Greg Fischer, Ray Anderson, Rod Arychuk, and Brian Hermanutz.

Replying for the Vikings were Blair Gaume in the first and Doug Osness in the third. Partial scores in the contest were 5 - 1 at the end of one and 9 - 1 after two.

Ken Hodge handled the Ooks netminding duties and turned away 36 shots. Matt Hayduk and Murray Stevens st opped 36 of 49 shots directed at the Vikes net.

ON THE BENCH: The Ooks have two injuries to report. DarrellSlupek is out for an undetermined length of time with an ankle injury. Gary Hoekstra will not dress for at least a week due to a knee problem aggrevated this past week...Kent Wilmot is proving that with ice time, he is one of the Ooks more valuable assets, notching three goals and one assist in his last two games. Tom Tookey is coming around providing solid defence and making his mark on the scoreboard with three assists in the Camrose game. ## KAMLOOPS BASKETBALL TRIP

On Thursday, January 7th, the NAIT basketball teams travelled to British Columbia for three days of exciting play at the Cariboo College in Kamloops.

Leaving at 6 am Thursday morning, the teams travelled through snowy, scenic mountains, arriving in Kamloops shortly after 4 pm B.C. time. The girls had to play at 5:15, so after checking into the David Thompson hotel, they dressed and left for the Kamloops Senior Secondary High School, where they met the Selkirk College Saints. Although the Ookchicks started out well, they were behind 29-39 at the end of the first twenty minutes of play. Rose MacMillan played well offensively, and Darcy Goodwin greatly supported the 'chicks defence.

During the second half, the Ookchicks quickened the pace of the game, and came within a few points, but the Saints maintained their 10 point lead, winning 70-60. The 'chicks had tried pressing constantly during the last five minutes of the game, but the fatique from the lengthy bus trip showed through. Top scorers were Marina Blaskovits with 10 and Janice Rosenburger with 16.

There was just over 6 minutes left in the first half of the mens game when assistant coach Mark Dobko and I arrived at the Cariboo College from the high school. During that time, I watched very close game between our Ooks and the Cariboo College Chiefs, with the Chiefs edging the Ooks 29-27 at the end of the first half.

There was an unexpected rest break for both teams during the second half. Midway through the period, the Chiefs took the ball into the Ooks end and took a shot. Sean Phelan and 2 Chiefs went up for a rebound. The ball was freed and headed out of bounds, so one of the Chiefs vent sprawling to retrieve it, hit the wall and cried out in pain. Standing just a few feet away from the player, I was able to see a severely dislocated shoulder. The player waited a good five minutes before properly treated. The game continued after the Chief was hauled away on a stretcher, remaining very close up to the last minute. With 51 seconds left in the game, Sean Phelan was fouled upon and sunk the 2 foul shots he took, tieing the score at 65. Then with 10 seconds to go, Ed Hammermeister was also fouled upon. He made  $\bar{1}$  of his 2 shots putting the Ooks into the lead 66-65. But the Chiefs made 1 last mad rush into the Ooks end and scored 2 points, defeating NAIT 67-66. The Ooks played an excellent game, with Harry Blacker as top scorer with 15 points, and Emanuel Bertolin, second with 13.

FRIDAY JAN. 8

The Ookchicks played Calgary's Mount Royal Cougars at 10:45 Friday morning. NAIT opened the game with 4 points from Darcy Goodwin and 2 pts. from Janice Rosenburger's foul shooting before Mount Royal got on the board. The score went back and forth, with both teams trying to out play one another. It was 22-22 at the end of the first half.

Again, it was very close throughout the second half. Near the end, rose macMillan and Darcy Goodwin, 2 of the team's better players, fouled out. But that didn't stop the 'chicks as they went on to defeat the cougars 53-49. Janice Rosenberger with 18 pts. and Darcy Goodwin with 14 pts. Mount Royal is considered one of the top teams in the ACAC and the 'chicks and coach Gregg Meropoulis were very happy to knock them out of the tourney.

The men's team played at 9:15 Friday night versus the Mount Royal Cougars. Emanuel Bertolin scored 2 points on foul shots to open the game. At one time during the first half it was 27-26 in favor of the Cougars with the Ooks giving them a competive challenge. But the Calgary team pulled away, with impressive offensive playing leading 46-30 at the end of the first half.

Then NAIT came on strong in the second half with some awesome rebounding. The Ooks came within 2 points of the Cougars score. Murray Proctor fouled out of the game on an unbelievable call for his fifth foul. Proctor had taken on a shooter in the Ooks end zone, went up with him and as the player tried to shoot, Murray checked him beautifully, not touching the opposing Cougar at all. But the ref decided to play blind and the second he saw Proctor jump, he blew the whistle. Needless to say, Proctor was upset as well as the rest of the team. As the game continued, NAIT's passing deteriorated, and the Cougars took advantage of this as they defeated our squad 78-72. Top scorers were Bertolin and Proctor with 14 and 12 points respectively.

SATURDAY JAN. 9

At 1:00 Saturday afternoon the Ookchicks took on the Gold Rush - the women's team representing Cariboo College, who fouled on the 'chicks twice to start the game. Two fast breaks by Janice Rosenberger put 4 points on the board for the NAIT team. Constant pressure and a tight defence put the 'chicks ahead 31-11 by the end of the first half.

The Gold Rush scored 6 points before NAIT got on the board at the start of the 2nd half but the Ookschicks maintained a good lead defeating the B.C. team 63-41. Outstanding shooting by top scorer Sandy Poole gave her 18 points with Janice Rosenberger scoring 12 points.

At 4:30 the Ookchicks played the College of New Caledonia (CNC) for the consolation final. Five seconds into the game CNC fouled and then Rosenberger scored 2 points for the 'chicks. NAIT's defence fell apart as CNC led by an 8 point margin but the Ookchicks managed to pull up a bit near the end of the first half, only behind 24-28. The "high" from the game before wasn't part of the team for the game against CNC. As they couldn't get it together, losing 52-62. It seemed the 'chicks couldn't sink a shot. Coach Gregg Meroupoulis stated that his team "WAS NOT MENTALLY READY." Top scorer: Janice Rosenberger 18 pts. Darcy Goodwin 12 points.

The overall outcome of the tourney: Camrose Vikettes won the women's A event and the College of N.C. won the men's. Due to some overexposure, the pictures failed to turn out properly much to my dismay.


