

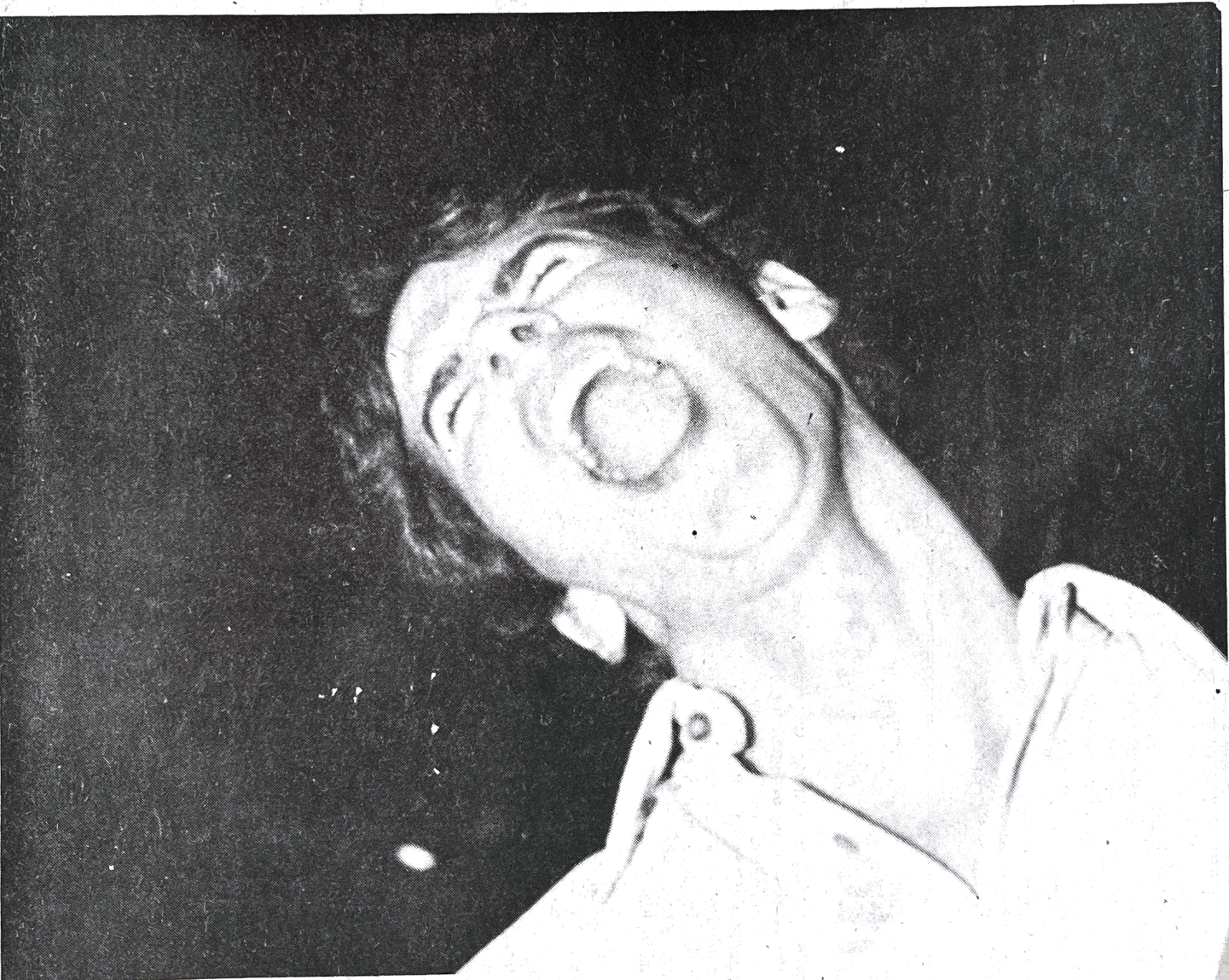

By now, many of you have seen those little red buttons making their way around campus. If you see someone wearing one, you can assume one of three things: one, they left it at home; two, they do not have one; three, it's too heavy to wear.

If you read what is printed on the button, you will see the following words: Edmonton A.C.T. Club Telerama "MAKE IT HAPPEN!" The question is - make what happen? If you donate a dollar you will receive a button and you will have done your part to make it happen. Last year's drive raised \$748,000. This year's organizers hope to raise more--naturally.

The funds are used to assist those who are not always as physically fortunate as the rest of us - in many cases it is used to provide technological equipment to handicapped people - so that they in return can make their contribution to society. For example, on campus there is a talking computer terminal that is on line and this terminal is used by blind people who wish to learn computer technology. This terminal was donated by the A.C.T. Club.

This year, NAITSA was approached to support the A.C.T. Telerama. We accepted. As a rule, we are approached to support many charities, but we usually like to keep it simple and tend to support local charitable groups, such as the Burn Society, Shinerama, and A.C.T.. Of course, there is a large multitude of other local groups seeking support.

This year the Telerama will be on the weekend of January 30 - 31. At 2 p.m. on Sunday the 31st, I will make a televised contribution to the A.C.T. on behalf of NAIT. We are hoping to receive a one dollar donation from all of NAIT's personnel. During the day, there are around 5,000 plus people at NAIT, so we are hoping to donate \$5,000. It would be very embarrassing to contribute \$3,000 on behalf of 5,000 people.

The Nugget is giving you the chance to complain about anything you want without having to put your name on the gripe. One Way Petition

Apparently the only one way street that applies to the road situation around NAIT is in the minds of the city Engineering Department. In the past weeks Dave Whalen has attempted to persuade the city Engineering and Planning Dept. to change 117 Ave. and 117 "A" Ave. between 105 st and 106 st to one way streets, therefore, providing parking on both sides of these street.

In his opinion this change will also provide more pedestrian safety and may help eliminate the confusion and awkward movement of traffic through this area. Whalen also mentioned that the additional 85 parking spaces may relieve some of the present parking pressures and may help "Accommodate out of towners and the Handicapped." With the proposed

city cutbacks in parking, the situation may become worse.

To abide with proper procedures, the city notified the citizens of the area (NAITSA) sent out an explanation letter as well. This prompted the citizens to circulate a petition in opposition to NAITSA's request. The petition represented some thirty households.

According to Mr. Geoff King of the Engineering Dept. This representation was "Almost one hundred percent of the residents". The petition lodged the complaints of "more traffic and less safety for their children" Mr. King said that his department had no technical objections to the proposal, but in this light they were in no way in favour of the change.

King also mentioned that residents from several other areas bordering NAIT have requested that the areas in front of their homes be specified as restricted zones. King blamed the present parking squeeze on the people who originally planned NAIT. He suggested that people should turn to alternate forms of transportation; namely public transit.

To counteract this move away from NAITSA's point of view, Whalen has initiated a petition. He hopes that his document will contain two thousand signatures. He intends to fill this petition and deliver it to the Mayor's office.

The petition will be available to be signed in the Tower Lounge, in the South Lobby, (Main Campus) and in the escalator area of Plaza II

Unfortunately you are wrong. Although our form of punishment is not as brutal, it is effective in maintaining control. Our form of torture is given the innocuous name of television.



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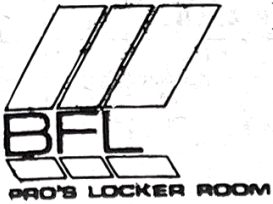

NAIT V LETHBRIDGE

It took the first game of this match for the team to settle down. They lost this game but came back to win the next three straight and defeat Lethbridge 12 - 15, 15 - 5, 15 - 6, 15 - 7.

NAIT V MOUNT ROYAL

Mount Royal always produces good women's volleyball teams, so NAIT was ready for a tough game. NAIT won the first 15 - 12, lost the second 12 - 15 and won the third 16 - 14. This seemed to take the sting out of Mount Royal allowing NAIT to win the fourth 15 - 11. So NAIT had a perfect first day with a perfect 2 - 0 record.

NAIT V MEDICINE HAT

This was the first game on Saturday. After four very close games it was 2 games each. In the final game NAIT couldn't stop the middle attack of the Hat and lost this game 15 - 10 and the match.

NAIT V OLDS

This was a game NAIT expected to win very easily; especially when they won the first 15 - 0. However, the team became complacent and found it difficult to concentrate and ended up losing to Olds 3 games to 2.

NAIT V SAIT

SAIT is hosting the National College Championships this year in volleyball. As a result they have recruited a very strong mens and womens volleyball team. NAIT went into this game knowing they would have to play very well to win. NAIT lost the first game 14 - 16, but won a marathon 2nd game 18 - 16. They lost the third 15 - 9 and at this stage both teams looking very tired appeared that SAIT might be getting on top. However, in the fourth game NAIT showed great fighting spirit to win 16 - 14. After a five minute break, the fifth game started. SAIT jumped into an early 7 - 2 lead; NAIT came back to be 8 - 7 as the teams changed ends. NAIT dug in and played some super volleyball to cause a great upset and win 15 - 12. Final score NAIT defeated SAIT 4 - 16, 18 - 16, 9 - 15, 16 - 14 and 15 - 12. The whole team played very well at this tournament, but special mention must be given to 2 young ladies who have joined the team since Xmas and have been largely responsible for the dramatic improvement in this team. Wednesday, January 13--OOKS 10, Camrose Lutheran College Vikings 4 at Camrose

The NAIT Ookpiks sniped ten unanswered goals in the first half of the game en route to a big 10 - 4 drubbing of the Camrose Lutheran College vikings on Wednesday, January 13 in the Rose City. The win allows the Ooks to stay in the dog fight for second place with the Red Deer College Kings in the A.C.A.C.

With 1:44 seconds gone in the first period, Gary Hoekstra found the mark to give the Ooks a quick 1 - 0 advantage. Three minutes and 36 seconds later, Rod Arychuk doubled the Ooks lead to 2 - 0. At 14:11, Dale Kolada increased the Ooks lead to three. Fifty-two seconds later, Greg Fischer tallied the first of two on the night to give the Ooks a four goal cushion. Wayne Perkins completed the first period scoring with a shorthanded goal that turned out to be the winning marker with 54 seconds remaining in the period.

The Camrose goaltender who started the contest, Murray Stevens was replaced by Matt Hayduk. However, the change did not seem to help the Vikings. At 2:44 of the second, Rod Arychuk connected on his second of the night.

One minute and 57 seconds later, Greg Fischer's shorthanded marker handed the Ooks a 7 - 0 lead. Wayne Perkins added his second tally to the shootout at 7:36. At the 8:47 mark, the NAIT power play executed to perfection as Ron Chorney received credit for the Ooks ninth goal. Brian Hermanutz brought the Ooks into double digits at 10:41.

After the Ooks hit double digits near the midway point of the middle frame, the flow of the game seemed to change. CLC's Don Lauweryssen broke Ken Hodge's shutout bid at 12:20. One minute and 17 seconds later, Craig Siemens beat Hodge to make the score 10 - 2. Dwayne Swanson of the Vikes tucked in his lone marker of the night at 15:16. At the 16:58 mark, Dale Pilon tallied to make the count 10 - 4. (Both teams were held scoreless in the final frame.)

The goaltenders appeared to be the victims of the offensive onslaught. NAIT's Ken Hodge blocked 24 of 28 shots, while the Camrose combination of Stevens and Hayduk warded off 29 of 39 drives.

ON THE BENCH: The win improves the Ooks record to a credible 8 wins and 6 losses...the Ooks have outscored their opposition 36 to 10 in heir last three games, and are starting to play to their potential...Relatively healthy, the Ooks are preparing for a crucial two game series against the Red Deer College Kings. On Saturday, January 23 the Ooks travel south to play the Kings in Red Deer. The night before, Friday, January 22, the Ooks will entertain the Red Deer College Kings at the NAIT arena. Game time is 8:00 and admission is FREE to students and staff with the NAIT I.D. card.

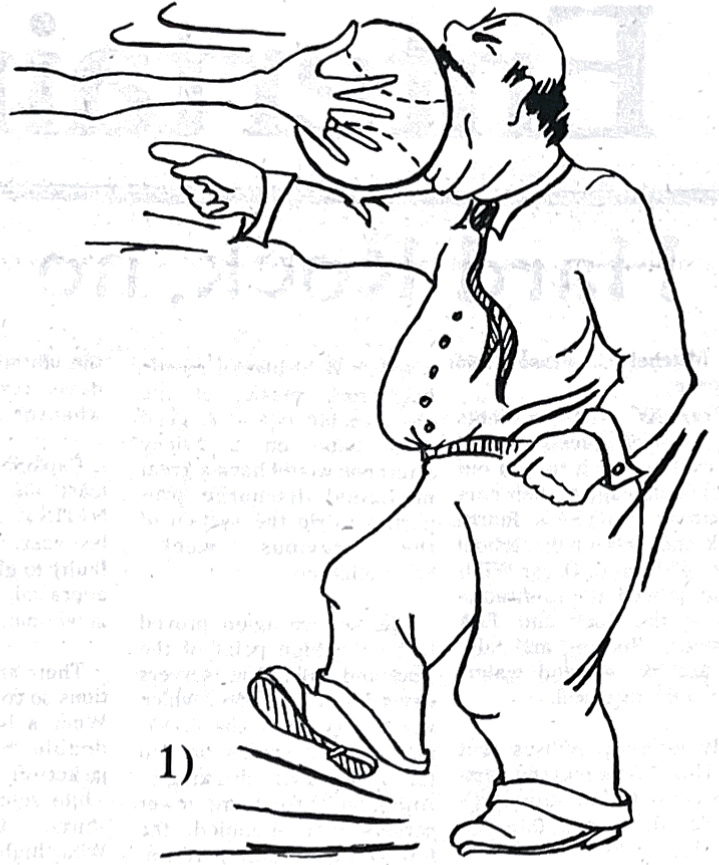
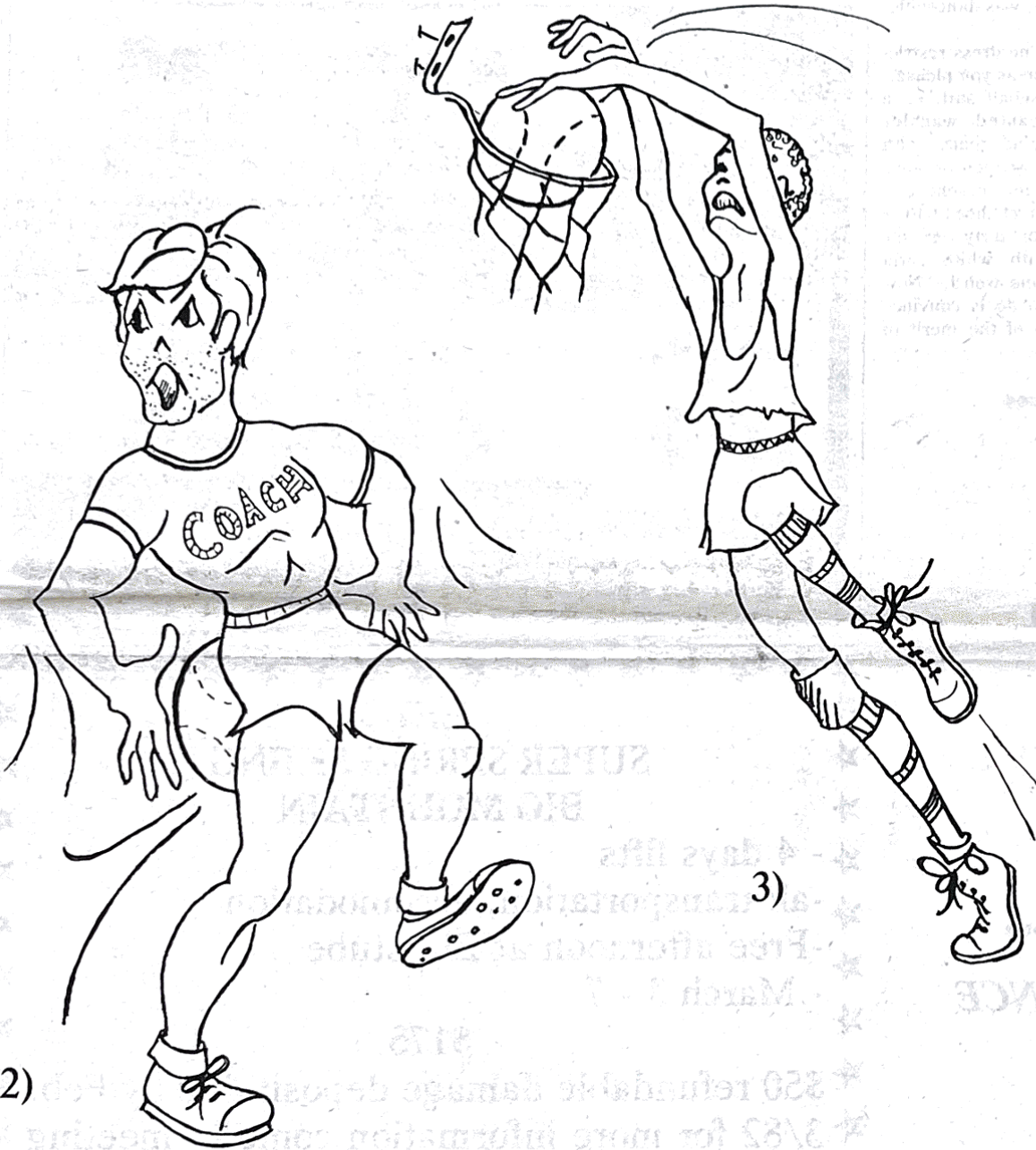
