The lifeblood of NAIT, or any technical institute, is the diversity of the programs it offers to the student population. To decrease that variety is to risk obsolescence by becoming a specialized dinosaur. Why penalize NAIT for putting another technical institute so close to the city.

The No Torch Flickers

Rumors are circulating that this year's edition of the Northern Torch will hit the stands before the 1980-81 edition.

The 'No Torch' has hit a series of delays which stem directly from last year's editor - Mike Vodden.

Vodden has consistently refrained from doing anything that would help finish the book.

Barry Dimitri, last year's photography coordinate, and Ken Davey, Ex NAITSA president, have been working on getting the No Torch together. Dimitri has said that about 200 pages of the edition have been laid out, of the approximately 280 total.

The remaining pages were to have been put together by Vodden, but he has lost pics and setups for such important things like last year's

Nugget staff. Vodden collected wages over the summer of '81 for being Yearbook Editor, along with taking the wages of the photography coordinator. He did nothing all summer.

A deadline has been set for the completion date of the No Torch. If the book is sent out by that date, students should have it by April or May. If not NAITSA may take legal action against Vodden. An emergency rescue team will then be sent in to salvage the yearbook and get it out this year.

If the No Torch comes out next school year, there will be no one present of the student population qualified to receive one. The 2600 copies will then languish in relative anonymity.

Board of Governors Update

The interim Board of Governors for NAIT has been meeting at regular intervals over the last few months. Although they have remained relatively anonymous to the students and the institute the governors are starting to become more visible as changeover date nears.

On April 1, the Board of Governors will assume control over the functioning of NAIT. At the same time the composition of the board will be increased to its full fifteen numbers, two of whom will be students.

In the meantime, the Board of Governors has been concentrating some of its energies towards setting up the departments that are currently looked after by the government. These include the setting up an independent financial system and a purchasing system. NAIT will also have to revamp its phone network. Currently it is tied into the Alberta Government RITE system. NAIT will no longer be able to use it. Capital projects, which have been looked after by the Department of Housing, will be under the control of the Board of Governors.

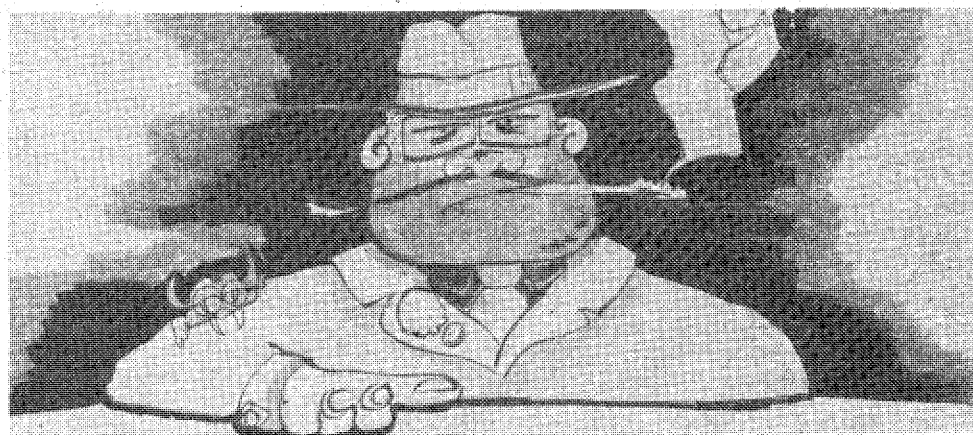
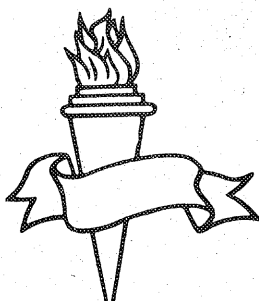
One item that has preoccupied much of the Board of Governors concerns is the possible transfer of technologies from NAIT to the new Stony Plain Institute. Reports have circulated that the Health Sciences section of NAIT has

been fingered to move to Stony Plain. The Board of Governors is resisting any decrease in the diversity of NAIT's programs. They are conceding the loss of some of the apprenticeship programs. The apprenticeship programs have grown too large and are cramping facilities.

The board does not want to lose Patricia Campus which currently serves apprentices. The Patricia Campus building is leased and upon changeover to a permanent board all leases and contracts will be turned over to NAIT. Negotiations for the contracts will be done by the Board of Governors.

Of interest to the students is the impact on their affairs, the transfer to autonomous control will have, although NAITSA may gain a bit more freedom they will still have to be responsible for their actions to the Board of Governors. Student councils may come and go, but NAIT has to live with the indiscretions.

An Academic Council will also be formed whose responsibility is to look after admissions, courses, and awards. The Technical Institute Act provides for up to ten students to be on this council. The specific make-up will be decided by the Board of Governors.



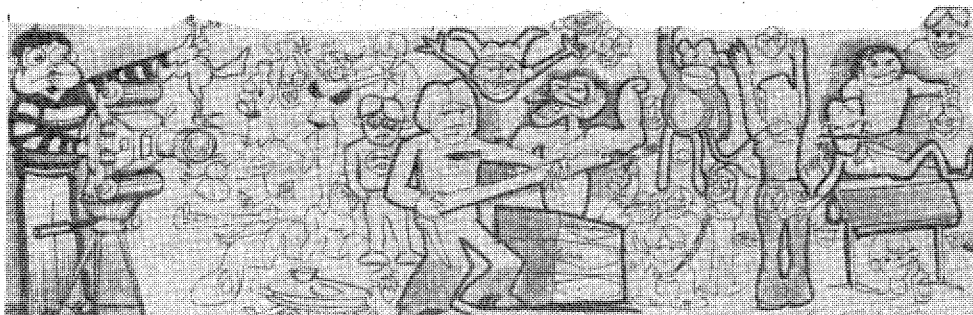

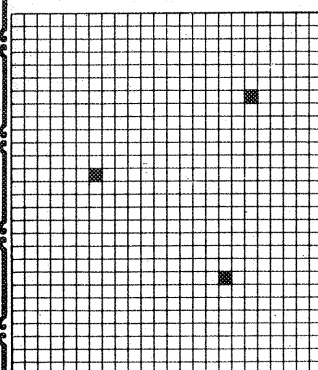

The NAIT Ooksiks rebounded from a disappointing 3-1 defeat at the hands of the Red Deer College Kings here on Friday night with a 4-1 drubbing of the Kings in Red Deer on Saturday. The weekend split keeps the Oaks one point behind the Kings in the ACAC standings. After 16 games the Oaks have record of nine wins and seven losses for a .563 winning percentage.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 22nd--RED DEER COLLEGE KINGS
3. OOKS 1 AT NAIT

A lacklustre effort by the Oaks combined with a strong performance by the Red Deer College Kings led the Kings to a 3-1 victory over the Oaks on Friday, January 22nd.

Kelvin Rosentretter opened the scoring for the Rd Deer squad at the 2:18 mark of the first period. Mike MacMillan doubled the lead to 2-0 with a mark at 11:11. Red Deer held onto the two goal advantage going into the first intermission.

At 2:47 of the middle frame, Dave Souch brought the Oaks to within one. With 53 seconds left in the period, Kelvin Rosentretter notched his second of the match.

Both teams were held scoreless in the final frame by some fine goaltending. In the Red Deer nets, Neal McPhedran blocked 21 shots, while Ken Hodge of the Oaks turned away 21 drives.

COLLEGE KINGS 1 AT RED DEER

The Ooks regained their composure in Red Deer on Saturday, January 23rd with a 4-1 victory over the Kings. Steady goaltending by Ken Hodge and all-around team effort were keys to the win.

Daryl Holmquist, Greg Fischer, Brian Hermanutz, and Kent Wilmot all tallied for the NAIT Ooksiks. Mike MacMillan replied for the Kings. Partial period scores in the game were 1-0 after the first and 2-0 at the end of two.

The Oaks outshot the Red Deer College Kings 56-21. Ken Hodge handled the netminding scores for the Oaks while Neal McPhedran was between the pipes for RDC.

SEVEN OOKPIKS CHOSEN TO ACAC ALL-STAR TEAM

Seven NAIT Ooksiks were chosen to the ACAC All-Stars in a poll of players and coaches. Netminder Ken Hodge and rearguard Warren Sanregret were selected to the first team. Forwards Greg Fischer, Brian Hermanutz, and Wayne Perkins were all named to the second team. Daryl Holmquist and Dave Souch also made the squad.

In the first game for the All-Stars, the ACAC squad were edged 6-5 by the University of Calgary Dinosaurs in Red Deer. Brian Hermanutz picked up two assists in the losing cause. In the second contest, the U of A Golden Bears downed the All-Stars 5-2 in Camrose. Ken Hodge played extremely well in net for two periods. Daryl Holmquist assisted on both of the ACAC goals.

ON THE BENCH: The Oaks have only one injury to report. Warren Sanregret hurt his shoulder in Friday's game here at NAIT, and injured it more severely on Saturday night in Red Deer. Warren is listed as questionable for the Oaks next game against the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings on Wednesday night in the Rose City... The next home game for the Oaks will be on Saturday, January 30 th when the Oaks entertain the first place SAIT Trojans. Game time is 8:00 and admission is free with your NAIT ID Card.

This past weekend there was ACAC basketball action in the NAIT gymnasium. On Friday, January 22, Lethbridge Community College came up to take on the NAIT teams, and on Saturday, NAIT took on the Medicine Hat Squads.

At 6:30 pm Friday night, the Ookchicks played the Lethbridge Kodiettes. The last time these 2 teams played, it was down in Lethbridge and the host team defeated the 'chicks by 10 points. The Kodiettes did it again, but not without a fight from the Ookchicks. Sandy Poole opened the game for NAIT by scoring 2 points on foul shots. But the Kodiettes played a strong offensive game led by Cathy Ferguson and led at halftime, 29-19.

The Ookchicks exploded in the second half, and at one time led 36-35. Rose MacMillan was the 'chicks key shooter against LCC, scoring 20 points. Guards Janice Rosenburger and Darcy Goodwin played well not only defensively, but offensively, scoring 13 and 8 points respectively. LCC's powerhouse Margo Duren led the Kodiettes to their victory, 66-51. Overall, both teams played well, supplying good entertainment for those who attended. At 8 pm the Ook took on the powerful LCC Kodiaks, who beat the Ook by a 38 point margin the last time the 2 teams met. The Ook played without Reid Warren and John Randolph, and with an injured Ian Robertson who has a sprained right hand (even more so after playing).

Murray Proctor played extremely well, going in for his rebounds after every shot he took, and even won a few of them against the tall Lethbridge team. But basketball is a team effort and the Kodiaks showed this by leading 40-25 at the end of the first half. About 3/4 through the first half, Bert Bertolin went down with a head injury. The big unit had his team worried as he stayed down for about 5 min. But Bert came back, starting the 2nd half and scoring 6 of the 8 points he got that night. NAIT worked hard during the 2nd half, and came within 6 points of the Kodiak's score. But it wasn't quite good enough, as LCC defeated the Ook 79-64. Top scorers were: Murray Proctor-19, Pat Gangl-12, Phil Bartlett and Harry Blacker with 10 apiece.

Saturday afternoon, the Ookchicks met up against the Medicine Hat Kudus, the team who beat our squad by 50 points the last time they played each other. It was obvious the Kudus' wanted to slaughter the 'chicks again, as they scored 12 points before Darcy Goodwin put NAIT on the board. Goodwin played an aggressive game, although Medicine dominated the first half with a 51-29 score. NAIT took 11 of the 22 fouls during that time.

The Ookchicks couldn't contain MHC shooters Karen Bongoards and Cathy Ferguson in the second half as the Kudus scored 26 more pts. to defeat our squad 77-45. Rose MacMillan led the 'chicks scoring with another 20 point game, and Janice Rosenburger followed up with 12 pts.

Murray Proctor must be doing something right, because he played very well again on Sat. against the MHC. He scored the first 2 points with a 15 footer, followed by another 2 from Phil Bartlett. The Ook burst out in the first half before the Antelope got going and when they did, they provided some excellent competition. It was a very interesting first half, with the Med. Hat team leading 29-28.

Pat Gangl's awesome outside shooting helped the team tremendously, as well as the great shooting by captain Harry Blacker (who led the scoring that night with 20 points). The Ook kept a 5 to 10 point lead on the Antelope throughout the second half. With 2:03 left in the game, Bartlett who got a breakaway but then lost the ball to an opposing player, decided to involve a little football in the game as he tackled the player (not really on purpose). Needless to say, Phil received his 4th foul and a minute and 1/2 later, fouled out. But that didn't dampen the spirits of the Ook, as they went on to defeat the Antelope 68-57. Murray Proctor and Pat Gangl followed Blacker's 20 point performance with 13 and 12 points respectively.

Dottie's remarkable comeback on the charts can be partially attributed to her duets with Kenny Rogers, and her show would not be complete without a duet. *What Are We Doing In Love* was chosen for this night. Keny Penney stepped in for Kenny Rogers and did a credible job with this chart topper.

A Grand Ole Opry regular since the early 60's, Dottie is one of the few performers to take requests. Tonight the fans wanted to hear *Stand By Your Man*. Dottie reciprocated with an outstanding performance of the Tammy Wynette original.

In her final set, Dottie dedicated a song to some very appreciative and vocal fans on the left side of the stage, *We've Got Tonight*, *So Why Don't You Stay*. Dottie closed out the regular show with a medley that included *I Wish I Was in Dixie*, and *The Battle Hymn of the Republic*.

Dottie then received a well-deserved standing ovation from the near capacity crowd. In addition, a four year old girl came on stage to give Miss West a dozen roses. For an encore, Dottie performed an Anne Murray hit, *You Needed Me*, better than Anne Murray could.

Hailing originally from McMinnville, Tennessee, Dottie West is one of the most entertaining performers in country music today, and her stage show is one of the best. Dottie displayed professionalism in the true sense of the word as she can entertain the crowd to the best of her ability with a couple of one liners and her unforgettable vocals.

One of the more versatile bands in country music, the Wild West Band was impeccable. Keny Penney is the most versatile member of the seven piece band acting as fiddler, electrical guitarist, and vocalist. In fact, Keny sounds like Dottie's former bass player, Steve Wariner, who is now making it to the top of the country charts. A former member of Tammy Wynette's band, Bob Whitton picks the banjo and strums the electric guitar. His distinguished guitar playing highlighted Dottie's version of *Stand By your Man*. The leader of the backing band is Mickey Basil, who was great on keyboards all night. Vickie Carrigo of Louisville, Kentucky, and Kerry West, who doubled as sound mixer, provided outstanding harmony throughout the night. Other members of the Wild West Band are Charlie Anderson on bass, Russ Simpson on synthesizer, and Bob Van Augh on drums.

The opening act on the night was local magician, John Charles. Charles placed the crowd at ease with fine sleight of hand, and appropriate comedy material. Charles was a welcome relief from the the dismal performances of Peter Johnson and David Wilson.
