into the sky, Where, up there, in ectasy they fly.


The first group are mostly drivers who are usually nice, But throughout the winter must cope with 'Black ice'. And then there's the sportsmen who go out in their boats.

## Seeing Seeing Things

I'm not looking forward to the telephone bill, but last week yours truly interviewed Louis Del Grande, co-creator/co-producer/star of CBC' comedy-mystery "Seeing Things" (Wednesday nights at nine). A good question for openers was, given his considerable experience in television and radio, what was his educational background. "I dropped out of school when I was 16."

An American who has convinced his friends to leave and then move back to Canada (in the States, he wrote for the series "Angie"), Del Grande hates situational comedies. He stresses that, due to his lack of education, he needed to find someone(like a graduate from NAIT's Radio & Television Arts programme) that he could trust to become his partner, especially for producing. But he doesn't recommend ignorance for success. "If you really want to look for work, make sure that you end up supporting stuff like Seeing Things", shows made in Canada for Canadians. "Start somehow to break that unfathomable self-inferiority feeling" that Canadians have. He notes that SCTV was not popular in Canada until it was sold to the States. "There comes a time when all of you have got to examine your own culture. It is terribly important that the talent drain stop." He's excited about the fact that many Canadian writers and producers who moved to Los Angeles and New York are coming back to work here.

And, it helps to support the industry you want to work for. "I don't think any of you know how serious it is. If you want work opportunities, and if you don't want to leave your family and you want to say hello to your grandmother other than just on Thanksgiving, you better, all of you, start watching." Apparently, many Canadian shows (even the CBC) are in trouble, and if they fail, the only good jobs for media students will be in the U.S. He's worried about the fact most of the people who watch Canadian television are either under twelve or over fifty and near death. "Maybe if you told people that we cure herpes..."

And what will the future hold? "First of all, decentralization is going to be a fact. We'll have a hundred --- stations." I already have problems flipping through thirteen stations. "That's what I do--very bad--fragmented conscience. Kierkegaard actually said that someday, because of lack of spirituality, they would have to invent a little box so people could stare at it!" Kierkegaard died one hundred twenty-seven years ago this week...
