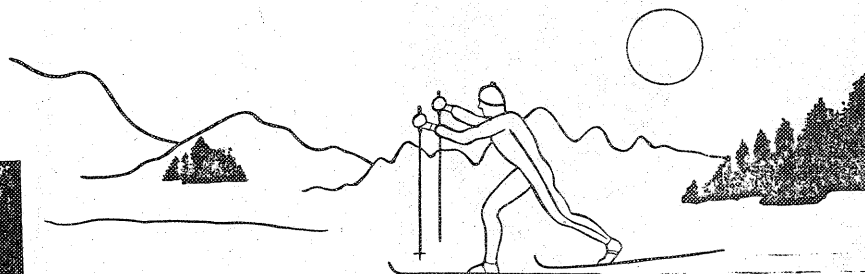

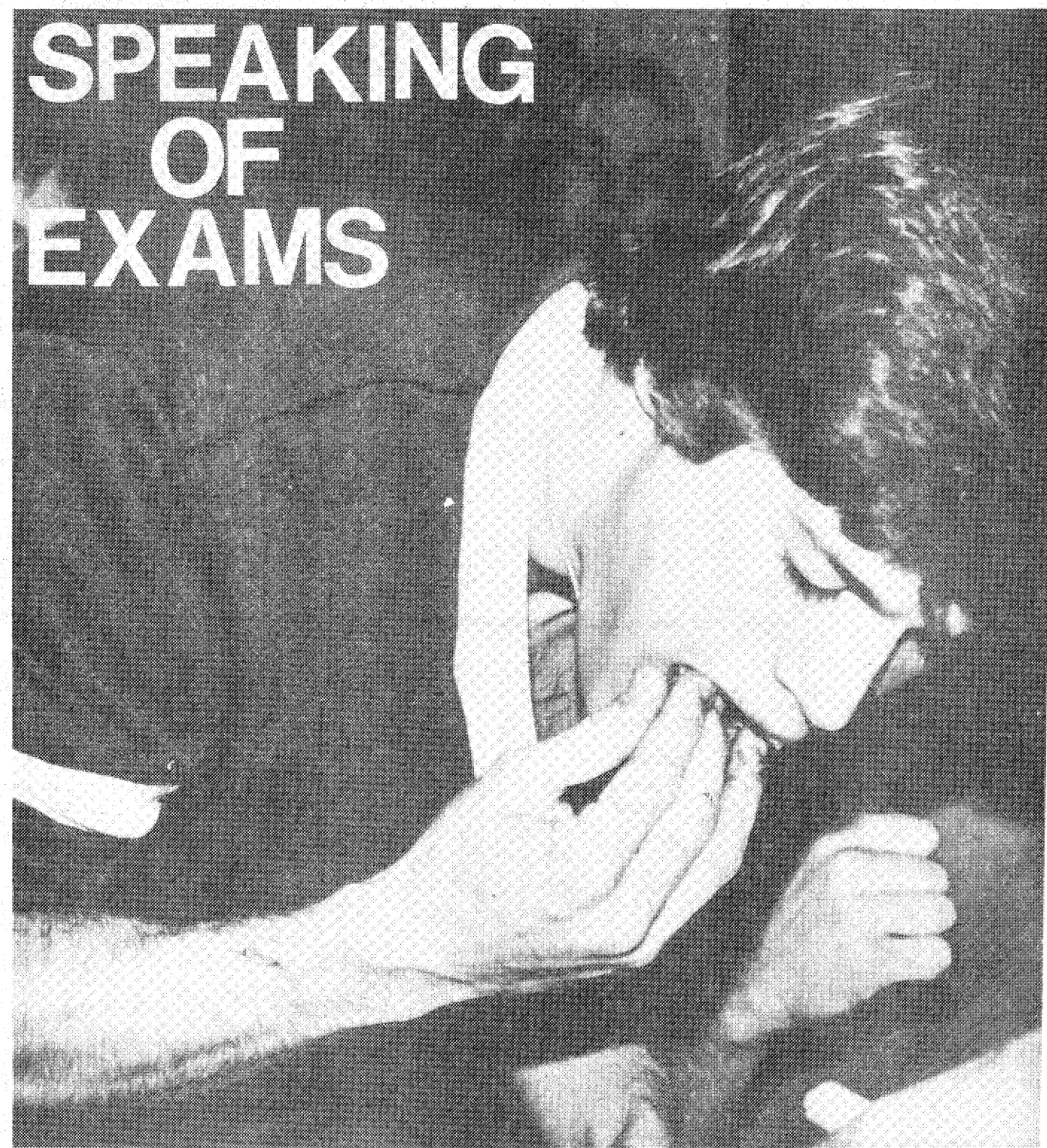

Editors Note

Young boy mugged in McCauley Plaza, Stabbing in Alley downtown, Crime hits record level! Headlines such as these are seen regularly in local papers. Most people are afraid to leave their homes or go downtown after dark. Many do not even feel secure while in their own houses. "The police should do something to stop crime" is a popular phrase. One local group has decided to no longer sit back and wait for someone to do something. They have decided to take action. The Western Protectors, a group similar to the Guardian Angels, has taken root in Edmonton. They are forming a citizens coalition to help deter crime. The idea behind the organization is to form groups to help patrol the streets and prevent crime, either by detaining offenders until police arrive at the scene, or, through their visible presence, encouraging would be offenders to reconsider their actions. The Western Protectors are badly needed in Edmonton. The police do not have the time or the manpower to adequately patrol the entire city, as is evident by the number of crimes committed each day. Sour Gripe

Dear Department Heads:

This institution's reason for being is to provide the education necessary for individuals to function productively in the work place. A generally accepted method of doing this consists of four steps:

- Step 1 - Present the material to the class.
- Step 2 - Discuss assigned material with the class.
- Step 3 - Evaluate the individual student by testing.
- Step 4 - Study the test results and adjust the presentation methods as required by the abilities of the class.

It is my opinion that many of the instructors are doing a poor job evaluating student achievement and are making little, if any, attempt to adjust teaching strategies after studying exam results.

Many times I have struggled with an exam that contains misspellings, poor grammar, vague descriptions and ambiguous questions. I have been frustrated by

questions that have several interpretations but only one answer. I have also noticed that some instructors will work you at 75 percent prior to the exam, but increase the difficulty to 100 percent for the exam.

What are you instructors evaluating? How well the student retains and comprehends the material or how well the student plays the game of test writing? Two conclusions can be drawn when a large percentage of students fail an exam. The first is that students have not properly prepared or studied. The second conclusion is that the instructor has done a stinko job of presenting the material and/or has written a poor test.

Department heads should stop patting each other on the back and look closely at the exams representing their department. They should also examine how their teachers adjust their teaching techniques depending on exam results. What else do you guys do during your inservice workshops!

Awards Format Change

Once again its awards time at NAIT. In the past, an Awards Night was held during which donors and recipients were honored. Because of the large numbers involved, awards night extended over two evenings, and the format proved somewhat cumbersome. To name but a few areas of concern, some students travelled a fair distance to attend the presentation and found their donor absent, often donors were present with no student to receive their donation, and many donors were unable to attend both evenings. It was felt, however, that both donors and recipients should receive some form of recognition. In recognition of student achievement, we have decided to publish a four page supplement in the Nugget. The supplement, devoted entirely to the awards and scholarships program appears in this week's issue of the Nugget. Our appreciation of donor generosity was expressed in an announcement in the Edmonton Journal which appeared on Nov. 17, and a reception was held in their honor on Nov. 16.

Over 600 awards, scholarships and prizes, from government, industries, businesses, professional associations, community service organizations, and individuals were awarded this year representing a total value of over \$300,000. A portion of this amount is provided through an endowment from the Alberta Heritage Savings Trust Fund: the Louise McKinney Post-Secondary Scholarships and the Jimmie Condon Athletic Scholarships. Forty-six in number, the Louise McKinney Scholarships are awarded to outstanding students who have completed the first year of a two year program and are enrolled in their second year or students completing their program and continuing their education at another post-secondary institution. The Louise McKinney Scholarship has a value of \$3,000. The Jimmie Condon Scholarships, each valued at \$1,000 are awarded to members of athletic teams that compete at a national level. The qualifying teams at NAIT are: basketball, volleyball, hockey and badminton. Students must maintain a satisfactory academic standing as well as uphold a practice and training program acceptable to athletic officials at the institution. Student athletes, 74 in total, are nominated by the institution and students are advised by the Students Finance Board of the status of their application. The scholarship recipients have not been announced by the Students Finance Board as yet, and their names will be published at a later date.

Recipients of the Louise McKinney Scholarship should be receiving their cheque from the Students Finance Board at the end of November. The Jimmie Condon Scholarship recipients will receive their first installment at the beginning of December and the second installment at the beginning of March, and the cheques are mailed directly to the student. Alberta Prize recipients will be able to pick up their prize at the Financial Administration Cashier's Office. The Students Finance Board should be forwarding the cheques (a total of 262) to the institution at the beginning of December, and the exact date will be published in the Nugget. All other awards and scholarships cheques are now available at the Financial Administration Cashier's Office.

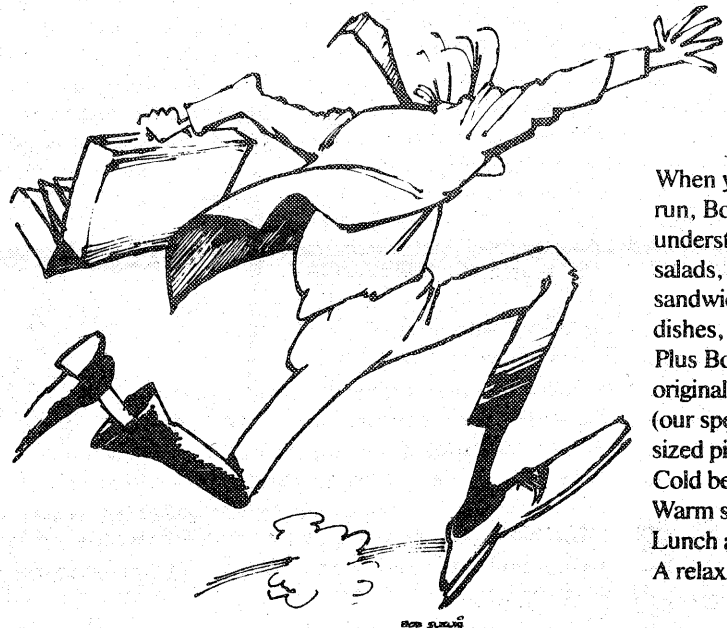

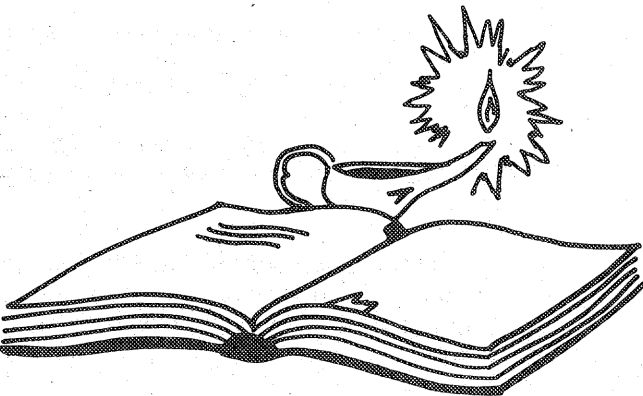

SCHOLARSHIPS AND AWARDS

Students attending NAIT are eligible for a variety of scholarships, awards, prizes and bursaries. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic excellence with financial need in some instances as a secondary criterion. Awards are granted in recognition of the student's technical skills, academic achievement, qualities of leadership and any other conditions stated by the donor. Prizes are awards given in the form of cash, books, and/or medals and are awarded to students with outstanding general proficiency or accomplishment in special fields of interest. Bursaries are awards given to a student who has a satisfactory academic standing and is in need of financial assistance to continue his education.

The scholarships and awards program is intended to encourage a high standard of academic achievement and to provide financial assistance to students who are in need.

General Information

All scholarships and awards are contingent upon the student either continuing his program in the next quarter or satisfactorily completing graduation requirements. Scholarships and awards are payable only when the student is in actual attendance as a full-time student at NAIT, unless otherwise stated.

To be eligible to receive a scholarship and/or award, a student must

- be enrolled full time-time,
- carry a full course load or its equivalent, and
- meet the conditions stated by the donor.

In order that scholarships and awards be equitably distributed, no student may hold more than one major scholarship or award.

NAIT assumes the liability for the payment of scholarships/awards to the extent that expected gifts from donors, or returns from particular investments for these purposes will permit.

Application Procedures

Most scholarships and awards do not require an application form and are awarded upon the recommendation of the Department Head or Program Head. The majority of industry sponsored scholarships/awards, and the government sponsored scholarships, e.g. the Louise McKinney Post-Secondary Scholarship, the Jimmie Condon Athletic Scholarship and the Alberta Prize, selection is done by the Program Head.
